

First Selectman's Corner

Fiscal Year 2012-2013 Budget Adopted

On May 15th residents unanimously voted at Town Meeting to adopt the \$12,748,081 fiscal year 2012-2013 budget recommended by the Board of Finance. The new mill rate will be 22.45. The budget increased by 1.5 percent, \$192,228 of additional expenditures. The small increase was achieved by applying \$132,000 of surplus from the 2011-2012 operating budget and using \$174,641 of the current general fund balance. This allocation complies with the Board of Finance's strategy to maintain a 10 percent revenue reserve in the fund balance. The new mill rate means that for a home with an assessed value of \$300,000, real estate taxes will increase by \$102 per year.

The 2012-2013 budget allocates 27 percent to Town operations such as public works, fire, police and library; 70 percent to education for operations at the Chester Elementary School and Region #4; and 3 percent funding for capital items such as road reconstruction, fire and public works vehicle replacement, Town and elementary school building maintenance. The five year capital budget continues to set aside funds for the Main Street improvement project and the preparation of design plans to enlarge public meeting space on the second floor of Town Hall. The Community Center insurance proceeds will be used for this renovation work. For fiscal year 2012-2013 the

capital improvement budget was increased by \$101,961 reversing a three year trend of reducing funds for large long term items. The Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance, supported by tax payers, recommend incrementally paying for large expenditures over several years to avoid spikes in the mill rate.

Middlesex Avenue-Denlar Drive-Water Main Project Begins



On April 17th the Board of Selectmen awarded the Middlesex Avenue-Denlar Drive Water Main Extension to B&W Paving and Landscaping, LLC of Mystic. B&W was determined to be the lowest qualified bidder by the Connecticut Water Company, the project engineer. The 8 inch main extension will be 1,800 linear feet, the majority of the construction, 1,150 linear feet will be on Denlar Drive. The contract price is set at \$149,894. Construction will start the first week in June and is expected to take four weeks to complete. This project is funded by a STEAP grant through the Connecticut Department of Public Health. The grant was

awarded to Chester to facilitate the abatement of water quality problems on Denlar Drive. Property owners abutting the water main will benefit from the availability of safe public drinking water and three new fire hydrants that will be located on Denlar Drive.

The water line will be owned by the Town of Chester and supplied, operated and maintained by the Connecticut Water Company. Property owners are encouraged to connect to this public water service. Connection to the water main will be the responsibility of the property owner as the project funding did not allow for work on private property. The Connecticut Water Company will be available to assist property owners in making arrangements to obtain water service. A modest contribution toward the installation cost, based on your service requirements, will be available from Connecticut Water. The contractor you select to make the private connection should be qualified and approved by the Connecticut Water Company.

Main Street Project Update

On May 17th the Main Street Committee interviewed four consultants who were invited to present their qualifications to prepare a master plan for Main Street improvements. The Committee selected the landscape architectural firm

of Kent & Frost of Mystic. This firm has designed and managed streetscape and similar municipal facility projects in southeastern Connecticut since 2003. The Committee was impressed with Kent & Frost's understanding of the project's requirement and their appreciation to maintain the uniqueness of Chester Center. The next step in the selection process is to finalize the scope of work, project schedule, and fee and contract documents.

Animal Control Officer Offers Summertime Advice

After a mild winter and crazy spring, you may notice a lot of wildlife moving around. Use caution as these animals could be looking to feed their young or may be sick. Wildlife is a D.E.E.P. problem; however, if your pet has contact with a wild animal, contact me. This could mean veterinary visits which could cost a great deal of money. Check your dog's rabies status and make sure it is up to date. This is mandatory in order to obtain your dog's updated license. A second concern to keep in mind is lawn fertilizer and other chemicals that may harm your pet. Read the labels carefully and be sure to store the chemicals in a safe place.

Taking your dog out for a ride can be a great treat for your dog, but once again use caution. Do not leave them in the car when you are shopping – the heat can build up in a car and turn deadly. Also, if the dog is in the car with a window open enough to place its head through can be an accident waiting to happen. The dog may appear friendly but that may be when it decides to bite a passerby. Once again use caution.

Discounts for Seniors

Charter Oak Pass. The Charter Oak Pass provides senior citizens access to the Connecticut State Parks and Forests and is available free to Connecticut residents, 65 of age or older.

The pass is accepted at all day use areas where a parking fee applies. Presenting it allows free access for the entering vehicle and passengers. The pass holder does not have to be the vehicle driver.

Free admittance is also provided for the Charter Oak pass holder when visiting Gillette Castle, Dinosaur or Fort Trumbull State Parks or fishing at the Quinebaug Valley Hatchery. All other visitors, however, will be required to pay the appropriate fee.

Please note that each pass is issued to a specific person and can only be used when presented by that individual. The passes are non-transferable. They are not valid for camping or special events having separate admission charges and may not be used for commercial purposes.

To obtain a Charter Oak Pass by mail: Send a LEGIBLE photocopy of your current CT drivers license or other legal proof of age and residency to: DEP Charter Oak Pass, State Parks Division, 79 Elm Street, Hartford, CT 06106-5127. (Phone 860-424-3200).

Amtrak Reduced Fare Program. Amtrak rail service provides a 15 percent fare discount on the best fare price of a regular ticket for elderly persons and persons with disabilities. Some holiday restrictions apply, but there are no restrictions on the length of stay. The reduced fare program is not valid on


the Auto Train. Reduced fares are only available on the Acela Train Express Service on Saturday and Sunday. To be eligible, a person must be 62 years of age or older. Verification of age must be shown by a driver's license, birth certificate or other document. Contact Information: Amtrak Toll: 800-872-7245.

Metro North Discount Program. Elderly persons and persons with disabilities may travel on the Metro-North rail service for a reduced fare anytime, except on peak morning hours. Such persons receive a 50 percent discount on a regular one-way fare when proper identification is shown. To be eligible, a person must be 65 years of age or have a disability and show proper forms of identification such as a Medicare card or driver's license. Call Metro North for fare and schedule information: 800-638-7646.

Senior Citizen Driver Insurance Discount. Drivers age 62 and older who complete an approved accident prevention course may receive a discount of at least five percent on their automobile liability or physical damage insurance. This discount may apply to an automobile's premium charges for at least 24 months. For more information on the length of time and the amount of the applied discount persons must contact their insurance company.

It's Tax Time and Here are Some Helpful Hints

- 1. If you have any questions about your taxes, DO NOT WAIT until the last week. It is much harder to try to help you when there are long lines. Contact the Tax office or the Assessor as soon as you realize you have a question. Phone numbers are on the bills.
- 2. Be sure to sign your check before mailing your payment and also be sure to double check your bank balance to make sure your check will NOT bounce.
- 3. If you use your bank's online service to pay your taxes, be sure to put your name and property location, so the payment can be processed accurately.
- 4. Our hours during July are Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday from 9-12 and 1-4 and on Wednesday's we are in the office just 9-12 noon. We will try to be open on Friday July 6th and Friday July 27th the same hours as Town Hall on Fridays and that is 9-12 noon.



- 5. Don't wait until the last day to pay, since there could be bad weather or sickness. If you are late the interest penalty is 3% which is 11/2% for July and 11/2% for August and on a large bill that interest really does add up.
- 6. If you want a receipt, be sure to include a self addressed stamped envelope and all your copies of your bills and we will mail back your copies with the payment validated.
- 7. Do not be surprised if we send emails or make phone calls toward the end of July to try to remind as many as possible to pay and not to be late, since the interest is high!
- 8. Read your bills carefully, and do not double the MV bills. Pay what is labeled: Total due. MV's are paid in one installment and nothing due on them in January, unless you buy a new vehicle. Read the bill carefully!
- 9. Information about MV's that are sold and plates turned in should be given to the Assessor early in the month to help the whole process go smoothly if a reduction is due!
- 10. If you are coming in to pay, try to have ALL the copies of your bills with you to help yourself and our office process everything efficiently.

Children's Summer Program Day Camp. Our traditional camp program is better than ever! It is open to children entering grades 1 through 7 and the hours are from 8:30am until 3:30pm, the weeks of July 9, 16, 23, 30, August 6, and 13, at Chester Elementary School on Mondays and Thursdays and Cedar Lake on Tuesdays and Fridays. The children take field trips on Wednesdays. The fee is \$95 per child, per week, and payable at the time of registration.

Introduction to Day Camp for children ages 4 through 7 (or entering grade 3) meets from 8:45am until 12:15pm, Mondays and Thursday at Chester Elementary School and Tuesdays and Fridays at Cedar Lake, the weeks of July 9, 16, 30, and August 6, with staff and programming designed specifically to meet the needs of younger children. The cost is \$55 for the 4-day week.

We will be at the Chester Sunday Market on June 24, providing complimentary Arts & Crafts and Science Projects


with our Camp Staff. Program registration materials will be available.

Babysitter's Training (Plus!) will be offered to students ages 11 through 15 on Monday, July 30 and Thursday, August 2 at Chester Elementary School, from 11:15am until 3:45pm. The program will include American Red Cross Babysitter's Training, Pediatric First Aid/CPR/AED certification, and the hands-on opportunity to assist our teachers in the preschool camp. The fee is \$60, or \$35 for those registered for camp that week. Students who have previously completed Babysitter's Training are welcome to attend this enhanced program for the extra First Aid and CPR certification, the hands-on experience, as well as for review.

Swimming Lessons at Cedar Lake. Swimming lessons offered by the Park and Recreation Commission are open to Chester residents or current nonresident park pass holders. Children must be at least three years of age and able to attend the classes independent of their parents. Small group classes meet for 6 lessons during session 1, on July 9, 10, 12, 13, 16, and 17 with July 19 and 20 as severe weather makeup days. Session 2 classes are held on July 30, 31, August 2, 3, 6, and 7 with severe weather make-up days on August 9 and 10. The fee is \$40 per session.

Beach Schedule and Access. The Town Beaches on Cedar Lake are scheduled to be open for the 2012 season from June 16 through August 19, 10:30 am until 6:00 pm. Hours may vary according to staff availability, training, weather, or special programs. Access to the Town parks, including the beaches on Cedar Lake, is by permit only. Non-resident passes are available at Pelletier Park during operating hours. Chester residents may enter staffed facilities by showing a driver's license, or other proof of residency or taxpayer status with identification. Taxpayers, Chester nonprofit organizations and Chester businesses may purchase a non-resident pass that is transferable to their guests. Non-resident pass holders may purchase a second pass that is transferable to their guests.

Non-resident Park Passes for the year May 1, 2012 through June 18, 2013 are available for \$65 at Pelletier Park, during regular staffed hours. 

Exciting Whites for Summer

Summer is just around the corner and it is time to start planning on enjoying great times with friends and family. Whether it be picnics, the beach, barbeques or just relaxing on the deck at home there are always exciting summer wines to enjoy with your festivities. Although Chardonnay and Pinot Grigio are very popular, there are other very interesting and tasty whites worth experimenting with.

One of the lightest whites is from Portugal and is called Vinho Verde, meaning "Green Wine," and is meant to be drunk young. It is a very light and refreshing wine with a small amount of effervescence. This type of wine is low in alcohol and fairly inexpensive.

Austria produces a popular white called Gruner Veltliner which is grown in over one third of their vineyards. This wine is medium-bodied with a dry finish and can also take on some spicy qualities. Over time it will develop into a fuller wine, much like a White Burgundy from France.

Up and coming is the varietal Chenin Blanc, a grape that has been around for a long time. Chenin Blanc has been growing in popularity in California and is known as Vouvray in France, which is the appellation where it is grown and produced. Chenin Blanc from these regions are soft and fruity. If you try a Chenin Blanc from South Africa however, you will be presented with a crisper, dryer finish with a small complexity of fruit. This grape is typically used for blending but is becoming more common on its own.

All of these wines are perfect to pair with seafood dishes, salads, cheeses and lighter meals, or just as a refreshing treat

on a hot summer day. The next time you are looking for a white wine try something new, you just may be surprised at what you find!

Chester Fife and Drum Corps 1868

CHESTER FIFE AND DRUM CORPS 1868 Welcome to the summer of 2012! Here is hoping that this summer is really a summer and not a winter that wasn't. I would like to start off

by giving you a little bit of history about our Corps and Corps in general. As many of you know by now, Chester Drum Corps was established in 1867 but was put on the road in 1868. This Corps has continuously been playing our music since the beginning with no time taken off for good behavior. We have gone through many uniform changes and are now in our fourth or fifth uniform in 144 years. We now sport a more easily manageable colonial white shirt, colonial vest and Tricorn with medallion on it. We play on wooden colonial drums and 6-hole fife in the key of B flat.

A little background on fifes and drums: A fifer and a drummer were officially and necessarily attached to each company in both European and American military forces in colonial times. While in camp, they sounded all the duty calls, such as dinner time, reveille, and taps. In the field, on maneuvers or in battle, they signaled movements and actions ordered by the officers, such as forward, retreat, fire.

The earliest American reference to the massing of fifers and drummers under the leadership of a fife major or drum major occurs in George Washington's general orders for August 23,

1777, wherein he not only orders the massing, but specifies how they will look or act. So much for ANCIENT history, now back to the future.

Our drum line is surging, however our fife line needs more players, but if you do not want to play, we also need members in the Color Guard to carry our colors. We offer drum lessons, fife lessons and how to march in unison. We are still practicing at the Company of Fifers and Drummers in Ivoryton, CT for the time being until we can get a home back in Chester.

Sun, Skin Cancer, and Aging

Snookie's tan, skin cancer, and wrinkles, OH MY! Does a suntan still sound desirable? The dangers of the sun and artificial lamps have been known and preached for years, yet some people still consider a tan an indispensable element of beauty. There is no such thing as a safe or healthy tan. In fact, a tan is the skin's response to damage of the skin's structure and the cell's DNA. According to the Skin Cancer Foundation, "up to 90% of visible changes commonly attributed to aging are caused by the sun." Sun damage is cumulative. Every day that our skin is exposed to the sun's harmful rays, we accumulate damage (yes, the winter months are included) unless we do our part to protect our skin. What are the signs of sun damage?

- Skin tone becomes uneven. Enlarged pores.
- Skin sagging/laxity.
- Fine lines and wrinkles.
- Dull, lackluster, sallow skin. Broken blood vessels.
- Rough or bumpy texture.
- Abnormal skin growths.
- Dehydrated skin.

We all fear losing our youthful appearance; but if you ask me, skin cancer is even more frightening. Skin cancer has become the most prevalent type of cancer in the United States. According to the Skin Cancer Foundation, "One in five Americans will develop skin cancer in the course of a lifetime." Skin cancer may be the most common form of cancer, but it is also the most preventable.

Prevention is much easier than correction! A sunscreen that contains either zinc oxide or titanium dioxide should be a part of everyone's daily routine. Be sure to reapply sunscreen every 2 hours when you are outdoors or more frequently if you are sweating or doing water activities. Other ways to protect the skin from ultraviolet radiation include:

- Avoid the sun between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.
- Seek shade whenever possible.
- Avoid tanning beds at all costs.
- Wear a hat, sunglasses, and UV protective clothing.
- Apply a topical antioxidant such as Vitamin C, Resveratrol, or Aloe Vera.

The Joys and Benefits of Staying Active

We humans are social creatures. This means we have the natural desire to interact and be with other people during every stage of our lives – including our senior years. However, some seniors, through a variety of reasons, find themselves living alone with limited interaction or engagement with friends or family.

This is unfortunate since social involvement is a major component of the overall well-being and good health of any senior. Consider the 2008 study by the Harvard School of Public Health, which found evidence that elderly people in the U.S. who have an active social life may have a slower rate of memory decline. Or "The Nun Study," which detailed how positive emotions and thoughts in life (often a result of being active and involved) are linked to less disease and lower mortality rates, and can help develop a natural immunization against Alzheimer's disease.

These and other research illustrates that when seniors maintain an active social life, and each day is filled with purpose and friendship, seniors have a greater opportunity to enjoy a high quality of life during their retirement years. Social activity also greatly reduces or even eliminates loneliness or depression, something that affects more secluded people.

Being social is achievable through purposeful planning. Individuals can create opportunities to be with other people and be involved in groups by:

- Contacting local senior centers, church groups or other organizations that offer a schedule of daily activities
- Signing up for art, music, or physical fitness classes through the local community college or parks and recreation department
- Volunteering or mentoring at a local school, library, or museum
- Joining a local club (such as gardening, writing, reading, chess, knitting)
- Taking part in travel programs designed specifically for senior citizens
- Attending lectures at a local university or other organization

One time of day when socialization is most important is meal time – which most people share with others at least once a day. Senior citizens are encouraged to attend community meals at a senior center, church, or other organization, or to invite friends and family to dinner at a favorite restaurant, or at their home or retirement community. Additionally, seniors should try to accept invitations to join others at mealtime as often as possible.

Competitive sports are becoming more conducive to active seniors, with the growing popularity of organizations such as the Olympic-style "Connecticut Senior Games" for those over age 50. These events include badminton, table tennis, racquetball, golf, basketball, track and field, tennis, volleyball, bowling, cycling, shooting, softball, and swimming – and athletes up to age 89 take part. Additionally, seniors can be on the

lookout for competitions in art, music, gardening and more at local fairs and other regional events.

As seniors age, they may consider moving into a retirement community, assisted living residence or a continuous care retirement community (CCRC), all of which typically have suitable social and cultural programs available daily, under one roof. These communities often include some type of van or transportation service – which helps those who no longer drive maintain a level of independence. These communities also have scheduled mealtimes, so gathering with friends and family for lunch or dinner is easily accommodated (and strongly encouraged).

If there is a senior in your life – or if you are planning for your own retirement – be sure to include as much social, physical and cultural activity as you can manage. You will be impressed by the benefits, and will enjoy a higher quality of senior living!

Hurricane Preparedness Tips

Families and Businesses reminded to be prepared

The Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection (DESPP) is reminds Connecticut residents and businesses to be prepared. "Tropical Storm Irene reminded us all that hurricanes and tropical storms do impact Connecticut and individuals and businesses need to be prepared," said Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection Commissioner Reuben F. Bradford. "Every home and business should have a basic emergency plan that can be used for any emergency".

"I urge residents to know what potential risks your community and neighborhood may face, such as storm surge, flooding, road or bridge closures", added Commissioner Bradford. "Carefully monitor the media and promptly follow instructions from Public Safety officials as a storm approaches."

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1 to November 30; the principal threat period for Connecticut is from mid-August to mid-October.

"I recommend that all Connecticut residents take three simple preparedness steps: Get a kit, make a plan, and stay informed," said State Emergency Management Director William J. Hackett. "With last year's storms still fresh in our minds, personal preparedness is essential."

The Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection offer the following preparedness tips:

Recommended Items to Include in a Basic Emergency Supply Kit:

- One gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- At least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit

An Urgent Message from the Chester Hose Company

The Chester Hose Company/Chester Ambulance responds to over five hundred calls to render emergency aid on a yearly basis. Many of the calls for assistance occur during nighttime hours and during periods of bad weather. When a call for help is received by our Emergency Dispatch Center, the caller is asked to provide as much information as he or she can regarding the nature of the call and location of the call. In days past emergency responders may have been provided the name of the person asking for help and because "everyone knew everyone" the location could be determined.

Today that recognition system does not always work. With new people moving to our town and building on the upsurge, visual identification of the problem location becomes critical. A simple solution to aid responders, display your street number on your house, mailbox, driveway signpost etc. The Town of Chester adopted this identification system years ago as a Town Ordinance. When response time is critical, wasted time trying to ID a location does not have to occur if the number is readily visible. During nighttime hours, reflective numbers are a tremendous asset. It is a simple procedure but one that could save a life. Help us find you when the call for assistance is made. NUMBER YOUR LOCATION.

Town Ordinance Requiring the Numbering of Buildings Enacted March 3, 1998

- Numbers should be no less that (3) three inches in height.
- Numbers shall be visible from the street.
- Numbers shall be located on the top or side of the main entrance.
- Reflective numbers will produce the best results.
- Applying residence numbers to a mailbox and driveway signpost would also be helpful.


