

# Three Students Chosen for the Southern Regional Music Festival

For choral and band students in middle schools across Connecticut, being chosen to participate in the Connecticut Music Educators Association's Regional Middle School Music Festival is one of the highest honors the young musician can receive.

Jared Eliot band director, Ross Tucker, could not be more proud of the three students chosen for the privilege of performing in the Southern Region Music Festival which took place on February 27 at the Lincoln Middle School in Meriden, CT.

Consistently (for the last thirteen years), since Mr. Tucker has been the Eliot band director, Eliot students have been chosen to play at this festival.

The festival is organized by music teachers who volunteer their time to provide an opportunity for the best middle school musicians in the area to perform together. It features top instrumentalists and vocalists from over forty schools in Southern Connecticut. More than three hundred students participate in the various groups (band, orchestra, chorus and jazz band).

The audition process is difficult. Band students must memorize five major scales and the chromatic scale. They must also play a selected prepared piece. At the audition, students perform for a judge and get scored on several musical elements (dynamics, phrasing, articulation, tone, etc).

To prepare for the festival concert, students practiced with all of the students selected on the Friday before the concert for four hours and then an additional four hour rehearsal Saturday morning before the concert. It is amazing what these young musicians sound like after just two rehearsals!

The Jared Eliot students selected this year were: Sara Buzzeo (clarinet), Will Luke (trumpet), and Ben Buzzeo (alto saxophone).

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## **Food for All Garden Serves Hundreds at Food Pantry**

Nearly 10,000 pounds of vegetables, herbs and flowers have been produced during the past two years in the Food for All Garden, thanks to the efforts of dozens of hard-working volunteers and the generosity of many organizations, foundations, churches, businesses and individual donors. Everything grown is given freely and with much joy to the hundreds of people who seek assistance from the Clinton Food Pantry, one of five in the Shoreline Soup Kitchens and Pantries network, on Wednesday evenings at the Episcopal Church of the Holy Advent. Our produce, plus that contributed weekly

by the St. Mary's Garden in Clinton, helps increase the nutritious value of meals in area households for six months each year. The Food for All Garden is located behind Holy Advent at 81 East Main Street, adjacent to the Pierson School parking lot. It is fun for young and old alike. Of course it's labor-intensive, but that means free exercise – in the fresh air! We're mostly amateurs and find it a great learning opportunity, too. Wouldn't you like to join us? Regular volunteer times are Saturday mornings 9-12 and Wednesday afternoons 2-5. As the season progresses we add or shift hours and days depending on harvest

needs and weather issues. The garden is a great location for a community service project or a company outreach effort. Even a few hours make a big difference. # The Water Pollution Control Commission

The Water Pollution Control Commission's (WPCC) Public Involvement Program is now in full swing. This program is engaging people in Clinton in the roll-out of solutions for the Town's wastewater problems. The members of the commission feel it is important to have residents raise questions, concerns, and insights for consideration while developing the final plan. In January, the WPCC met with residents in the Rocky Ledge needs area to discuss a proposed concept of bringing public water instead of sewers into the neighborhood. After a brief presentation by the commission, a group of residents asked pointed questions about how this will affect their property in terms of physical disruption and cost.

In February, the WPCC met with residents in the Long Hill needs area. This area of town has some of the most noticeable pollution problems, making the property owners eager to see what we plan to propose. The WPCC was able to show this group of people what is different about the current approach versus previous plans proposed in the 2003, 1990, 1987, and 1979 reports, by highlighting the Commission's recognition and commitment to property owner involvement and proposing a focused solution.

Residents in other affected areas will be contacted soon to meet with the WPCC and flush out their concerns and gain valuable insights. These areas include the downtown Route 1 corridor and the shoreline properties. Other areas will also be contacted to ensure the WPCC hears as much public opinion as possible prior to finalizing the plan.

## Free Tax Help Available

Available for Households Earning \$53,000 or Less; Dial 2-1-1 for an appointment.

Families with a household income of \$53,000 or less are eligible for free tax preparation assistance which is available now through April 11, 2015 at two sites in Middletown.

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program is an official IRS program, and all tax preparers are trained and certified to ensure that low- to moderate-income families receive the refunds and credits that they have earned, including the federal and state Earned Income Tax Credits and the Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit.

In 2014, the two VITA sites in Middletown helped more than 530 Middlesex County area residents file their taxes for free and returned \$767,781 back to taxpayers. Those who filed with Middletown VITA sites had an average Adjusted Gross Income of \$19,676 and received an average refund of \$1,706, money they have earned. This impacts not only those who filed their taxes, but also their families and the local economy. Appointments are required and are being offered during the evenings and on Saturdays in downtown Middletown. To make an appointment, dial 2-1-1 from any phone. 2-1-1 is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Individuals should bring a check or bank statement for direct deposit of their refund. Direct deposit is the quickest way to receive the refund, usually within 7 to 14 days. When attending their pre-scheduled appointment, individuals should bring: valid photo ID for yourself and your spouse; social security cards or ITIN for everyone in the household;

birth dates for everyone in the family; documentation for all income; interest and dividend statements; documentation for deductible education expenses and student loan payments; total amount paid for child care as well as day care provider's tax identification number and address; property taxes paid, including automobile taxes; evidence of health care coverage in 2014; a copy of last year's federal and state income tax returns, if available; and the current year's tax package if you received one.

Middletown VITA sites are coordinated by the Middlesex VITA Coalition, a partnership of Middlesex United Way and the North End Action Team.

The Middlesex VITA Coalition receives support from the Connecticut Association of Human Services.

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






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## **Clinton Business & Community Expo**

## **New Urgent Care Center**

Old Saybrook, CT - Middlesex Hospital will open a new urgent care walk-in medical center this spring at 1687 Boston Post Road (at the intersection of Spencer Plains Road). The center will provide patients with a lower-cost alternative for non-emergency medical care. The Hospital has two other urgent care centers, one in Madison and another in Middletown.

More and more people are seeking lower-cost, more convenient options for their health care needs. As a result, urgent care centers have begun to spring up in many communities to address this consumer preference.

The Middlesex Hospital Center is unique from other such centers, because of the electronic patient medical records system that ties together all hospital medical records, as well as medical records from all Middlesex primary care physicians. This gives the providers at the urgent care center access to a patient's medical history, as well as allowing for results of the urgent care visit to be reviewed by the patient's primary care provider.

The new urgent care center treats non-emergency health problems, including colds, coughs, earaches, moderate fevers, minor cuts, bruises, severe sprains and more. Patients should seek immediate emergency care for things such as head injuries, broken bones, uncontrolled bleeding, chest pains and any signs of a stroke.

The urgent care center is staffed with physician assistants and advanced practice registered nurses, and also has x-ray capabilities.

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### **Welcome to Clinton!**

Clinton traces its history from 1663 when the land between Guilford and Saybrook, as they were then bounded, was known as Homonoscitt. In this year, a committee was appointed by the General Court at Hartford to lay out this area as a plantation.

In 1667 the settlement was designated a town and named Kenilworth. By the middle of the eighteenth century, through changes in usage, this name became Killingworth. In 1838, the southern portion was incorporated by the General Assembly as the Town of Clinton, the northern portion retaining the name of Killingworth. The line marking the division between the towns of Killingworth and Clinton was the same as that which divided the first and second

ecclesiastical societies, or, as they were later known, "school societies," which were established in 1735.

As in most small New England shore towns, life centered about fishing, farming, shipbuilding, and the church.

One of the early leaders of Clinton's church was the Reverend Abraham Pierson. In 1701, when the General Court of the Colony in Hartford granted a charter for "the founding of a collegiate school within His Majesty's Colony of Connecticut", its founders chose the Reverend Mr. Pierson as its rector.


The first classes were held in his parsonage in Clinton. In later years the school was moved to Saybrook and then to New Haven, where it eventually became Yale University. (Data provided by Clinton Historical Society)

With beautiful views of Long Island Sound, this gem of a town is approximately 100 miles from both New York and Boston and is easily accessible from New Haven, Middletown and New London.

# MacLachlan - First Term as State Representative



State Representative Jesse MacLachlan (R-35) was sworn in on January 7th as state representative for the 35th General Assembly District covering the towns of Westbrook, Clinton and Killingworth.

MacLachlan was among 19 other Republican freshmen who vowed to serve their districts over a two-year term. MacLachlan states he is committed to reducing the expense of government and making our state a better place to live and do business in.

"Our state is becoming a less and less affordable place to live. College graduates receive degrees and due to a lack of jobs consequently move out of Connecticut; a growing number of seniors that have lived and worked in this state their entire lives are struggling to afford retirement. We need to change the direction our state has been going in," said Rep. MacLachlan. "It is the utmost honor to represent the people of Clinton, Killingworth, and Westbrook - a community that supported me in youth that I now have the privilege of serving," said MacLachlan.

For the 2015-2017 legislative session, House Republican Leader Themis Klarides appointed MacLachlan to serve on the Transportation Committee, Higher Education and Employment Advancement Committee, and Energy and Technology Committee.

Rep. MacLachlan took the oath of office and was sworn in by Secretary of State Denise Merrill on Wednesday afternoon in the State House Chamber. He then participated in a Joint Convention of both the House of Representatives and Senate as Gov. Dannel Malloy addressed lawmakers about the 2015 Session.

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## A Diversity of Diabetes Pills

If you or someone you love has diabetes, you know how important it is to manage it well. What happens if you don't? You're at risk for serious complications that can affect your heart, kidneys, eyes, and nerves - to name a few.

Some people can manage diabetes with meal planning, weight loss, and exercise alone. Others also need medication. Pills to lower blood sugar levels are one type of drug used to treat diabetes.

Can diabetes pills help you? Not if you have type 1 diabetes. Do you have type 2 diabetes? Then, you're more likely to benefit if you've had diabetes for less than 10 years and your body still makes insulin. That's the hormone that regulates sugar levels in your blood. There is more than one type of diabetes pill, and the FDA has approved several new ones in the recent past. Sometimes combining more than one type is the best solution.

Or, your doctor may prescribe pills plus insulin.

There are many classes of diabetes pills. They help you control your diabetes in different ways. These drugs may do one or more of these things:

- Stimulate the pancreas to release more insulin
- Decrease the amount of sugar the liver produces
- Make muscle tissue more sensitive to insulin
- Help insulin work better
- Lower blood sugar, but only when it gets too high in your body
- Help the kidney get rid of extra sugar, which lowers levels in your blood
- Block the breakdown of starches such as pasta and potatoes, and slow the breakdown of certain sugars, which slows the rise of sugar levels after eating
- Both lower cholesterol and reduce blood sugar

Isn't it amazing how many different ways these drugs work? If one doesn't work well for you or if it stops working, another may be more successful. That's because doctors and scientists think that the cause of type 2 diabetes is not the same for all people with the disease.

If your doctor has prescribed one of these drugs, I can provide you with more information. To help avoid interactions with other drugs, print a list of all your medications, both prescription and over the counter. Bring that list with you when you come to talk to me. I can answer other questions you might have about your medication, such as:

- 1. Are there special instructions for this medication?
- 2. Do I need to take the medicine with meals or at certain times of the day?
- 3. Should I avoid taking this medication with any foods, vitamins, or supplements?
- 4. What are the most common short-term and long-term effects of this drug?

As you can see, the arsenal for fighting diabetes just keeps growing – and we haven't even touched on new injectable and inhaled medications. Let's save that for another day!

## **Dry Eye**

Everyone will likely experience the symptoms of dry eyes at some point in their lives. Blinking replenishes our tear film providing the moisture the eyes need. The prevalence of electronic devices has resulted in a decrease in blink rate. Red, itchy, sandy, gritty, burning, and tired eyes are some of the more common complaints. Excessive tearing is also a sign of Dry Eye disease, often a result of poor tear film quality. Many dismiss and accept these symptoms as "normal". This is an incorrect assumption. Though dryness can be transient, it becomes problematic and potentially vision threatening when it persists into Chronic Dry Eye disease.

The tear film not only keeps the eyes lubricated, it also maintains the optical and anatomical integrity of the ocular surface. It provides a smooth interface between the eyelids and the eye itself. It also helps remove environmental debris that can cause ocular allergies. The tear film partially supplies nutrients to the cornea, as well as help defend the eye from infection. Without a sufficiently healthy tear film, the front surface of the eye is more susceptible to irritation, infection, and allergic reaction. The ocular surface insult dry eyes are subject

to eventually lead to inflammation of the cornea which can lead to blurry vision. In severe cases, corneal scarring may lead to permanent vision impairment.

Certain medical conditions may also cause Chronic Dry Eyes. Autoimmune disease (e.g. Sjogrens, Rheumatoid Arthritis, Lupus, etc.), Bell's Palsy, Menopause, Skin disease (e.g. Rosacea, eczema, etc.), and Thyroid disorders are only some of the more common conditions. Medications such as anti-histamines, anti-depressants, birth control pills, tranquilizers, and certain blood pressure medications can also cause dry eyes.

Fortunately, there are many treatment options available for dry eye disease. Though, it is important to customize and tailor these treatment options to each individual. Regardless of the severity or cause, dry eye disease should be addressed and treated accordingly before it threatens vision, and before it affects the quality of your life.

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
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

### **Wallet Medication Card**

The Connecticut Department of Public Health is working with partners including the Connecticut Hospital Association (CHA), the CHREF Patient Safety Organization, Qualidigm, and the Qualidigm PSO to promote awareness of patient safety strategies and empower patients to be more active partners in their care. As the first step in this statewide effort to engage patients in safety, we have developed a wallet medication card in order to assist consumers in maintaining an accurate record of the medicines they take and other important information. It is critical that your healthcare providers have complete information about your medical history and current medications, and we encourage all consumers to use the

wallet medication card or a similar tool to track this information.

The wallet medication card and instructions are available in two formats by clicking on the links at the website below. The first format (PDF) is for consumers who will print the card and complete it by hand. The second format (Word) is for consumers who would like to download the card as a Microsoft Word document and save it to their own computer for filling out electronically before printing.

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
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## **Clinton Land Conservation Trust Upcoming Events**
