

As I travel around town daily, I don't have to go very far to see some of what has been accomplished in this period. From


roads, sidewalks and drainage improvements to enhancements in our assets at the beach, marina and recreational facilities, Clinton is a town on the rise. Our buildings are now,



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### The Alice and David Crosby Environmental Scholarship

The Alice and David Crosby Environmental Scholarship was established in 1997 in memory of Alice C. Crosby, who was for many years Chairman of the Clinton Board of Education. Subsequently, Alice's husband, David Crosby, a former CLCT Board member and graduate of the Yale School of Forestry, was added to the name of the scholarship. Alice and David Crosby became members of the Clinton Land Conservation Trust in its early days and remained active in its programs and projects throughout the rest of their lives. The scholarship is a \$1,000 grant awarded each year to a Clinton graduating senior planning to pursue an education in a field related to the study of or preservation of the environment. The scholarship was awarded this year to 2011 Morgan School graduate, Tiffany Alling, who will be attending the University of Tampa in the fall to major in Biology. Tiffany intends to become a zoologist when she finishes college. Growing up in Clinton, Tiffany has always enjoyed being outdoors and learning about the natural environment of Clinton and the

animals that live here. The Clinton Land Conservation Board of Trustees wishes Tiffany all the best in her studies and beyond.



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### **Inland Wetlands Commission**

Seven years ago, the Cedar Island Marina pledged to become a "clean" marina within one year - taking extra precautions, such as reducing pollution from mechanical activities, fueling, painting and fiberglass repair, hauling and storing boats and facility management. Today, the Clinton Marina still has not met those written standards, and there is much debate over the quality of the Cedar Island Marina.

The Cedar Island Marina is not listed among the twenty-nine 'clean' marinas in the state, which include Saybrook Point, Harry's Marine Repair, and Dodson Boatyard. Until a marina meets the minimum guidelines, it is considered a 'clean' marina pledge.

"Cedar Island Marina has pledged to become a 'clean' marina, but has not yet completed the required compliance and award checklists that are needed in order for the DEEP to certify the facility," says Kate Brown from the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection via e-mail.

Jeffrey Shapiro, the Cedar Island Marina owner, cleared up the reason why his marina is not listed as a 'clean' marina. "It's kind of a protest for the Clean Marina Program upping the requirements from years ago.

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Nowadays, you need to make lists and take pictures of the marina... you basically have to give them a book. To be on their list, you need to prove you've done things like storm water and pollution protection. Places like Saybrook Point don't need to deal with as much stuff. I don't need to hang the flag because I know they're not going to find a cleaner marina. We have won the Green Circle Award and an award from the EPA for being one of the twenty-five most environmentally conscious marinas in the country."

The Cedar Island Marina is connected to main waterways and the acclaimed town beach. In 2010, according to The National Resources Defense Council, 21% of the 14 water samples from Clinton's beach exceeded the state standards for bacteria.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) website shows recent data that the Clinton Harbor is an "impaired" waterway, signifying that the water quality conditions do not support certain uses (such as aquatic life harvesting). The lower Hammonasset River is also listed as impaired, as it empties into the Clinton Harbor. According to Eric Thomas from the DEEP, the Clinton Harbor has impaired water quality and is unable to be used for aquatic life, although it is authorized for shell fishing.

"It's brown, filthy, and you can't see anything two inches below the surface." says longtime Clinton resident, Daphne Tuccitto, on the quality of the marina.

According to the EPA, Jeffrey Shapiro was denied an additional 396 boat slips in 1988. He decided that he would prove his marina was not destroying the life and habitat of marine life. In Shapiro's own words, "We decided to prove Connecticut wrong." Shapiro went out of his way to hire environmental consultants to investigate the water quality, and that turned into a full-fledged ecology research laboratory. Research has been underway since 1989 on the temperature of the water, marina habitat, and coastal birds. Shapiro says that according to his research, the Clinton Harbor has lower bacteria (coliform) counts than those at the town beach.

Marinas that are part of the federal Clean Marina Program are recognized for protecting the quality of their coastal waters. This program varies from state to state, but has one common objective: reducing pollution. As of now, eleven states have adopted the Clean Marina Program and nine are in the process of developing it. Connecticut certified its first "clean" marina in June of 2003.

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### Asset Allocation: A Key to Portfolio Success

For many investors, investing typically begins with one stock or mutual fund. Over time, other selections are added because many people understand it may not be prudent to invest everything in a single security, even if it has a "blue chip" reputation. However, just "spreading money around" in a haphazard way may create only an illusion of diversification.

If you have assembled a "hodgepodge" portfolio, you may not know the extent to which your investments are (or are not) consistent with your objectives. How do you go about setting up a framework which tailors your investments to your particular circumstances?

A sound portfolio management strategy begins with asset allocation – that is, dividing your investments among the major asset categories of equities, bonds and cash. Since each type of investment category has unique characteristics, they rarely rise or fall at the same time. Then, you can make finer distinctions within each asset category (i.e., diversification). Combining different asset classes could help reduce risk, although it doesn't eliminate market risk altogether. Still two nagging questions remain: What factors guide the asset allocation process? How much of a portfolio should go into each category.

To answer the first question, the main objective of asset allocation is to match the investment characteristics of the various investment categories to the most important aspects of your per-

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sonal investment profile – that is, your tolerance for risk, your return and liquidity needs, and your time horizon.

Investing according to your risk tolerance will help keep you from abandoning your investment program during times of market turbulence. One way to measure your risk comfort zone is to ask yourself how much of a loss in a one-year period you could withstand and still stay the course.

Finding an appropriate match for you means balancing your tolerance for risk against the different volatility levels of various asset classes. For example, if you have a low tolerance for risk, that fact may dictate a portfolio that emphasizes conservative investments while sacrificing the potentially higher returns that usually involve a greater degree of risk.

Return need refers to the income and/or growth you expect a portfolio to generate in order to meet your objectives. For example, retirees may prefer a portfolio that emphasizes current income, while younger investors may wish to concentrate on potential growth.

Your personal time horizon extends from when you implement an investment strategy until you need to begin withdrawing money from a portfolio. For example, a very short time horizon (less than 5 years) is probably best served by a conservative portfolio emphasizing safety of principal. On the other hand, the more time you have to invest, the greater risk you may be able to withstand because you have time to recover from market downturns.

The short answer to how much of a portfolio should go into each category is that asset allocation is more a personal process than a strategy based on a set formula. There are guidelines to help establish the general framework of a well-diversified portfolio. For example, you may decide on the need for growth in order to offset the erosion of purchasing power caused by inflation.

However, building an investment portfolio that is right for you involves matching the risk-return tradeoffs of various asset classes to your unique investment profile. One final point that is worthy of emphasis – when you put together your own asset allocation strategy, you should combine all your assets (i.e., your investments and retirement savings). That way you can ensure that all your assets are working together to help meet your goals and objectives. Keep in mind, investment return and principal value will fluctuate with changes in market conditions so that shares may be more or less than original cost. Diversification cannot eliminate the risk of investment losses.

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

### Shoreline Community Women: Boxes for Soldiers

Shoreline Community Women has been sending care packages to our troops in Iraq and Afghanistan since 2006. We do this through continuous community support from businesses, schools, scout troops, churches, and everyday citizens. We send boxes all year... not just during the holiday season. We generally have 25-30 military addresses on our list; some are local servicemen and women. We welcome military addresses from anyone; it doesn't matter where the soldier is from, since they are all fighting for us.

Our boxes are generally 20-25 lbs and are about the size of a copy paper box. Shipping costs are paid through donations we collect. Each box costs an average of \$20-\$25 to send, and includes toiletries, socks, wet wipes, drink mixes, paperback books, healthy snacks, and notes, letters, and cards from school children. The notes from the children are a big hit with the troops and we are always looking for more from teachers and scout troops. We put plenty of everything to share in each box!

We receive heartfelt thank you's from many of the soldiers, and they've said that it means so much to them that people they don't know take time to think of them.

Items we need: wet wipes, socks (white or dark), hot and cold drink mixes, nuts, hard candy, gum, instant oatmeal, sunscreen, bug repellent (not aerosol), men's razors, movie DVD's (used or new), sudoku/crossword books, foot powder, healthy snacks/raisins/granola bars,trail mix, etc.

Problem gambling occurs when a person loses control over how much money is gambled, how much time is spent gambling and how often gambling is occurring. This gambling interferes with normal recreational activities, family obligations and/or work responsibilities. Other signs of a problem are getting behind on bills, borrowing money to gamble and having gambling-related debts. All forms of gambling can become a problem to a person of any age or race. Depression and alcohol/ drug abuse are two major conditions that may lead to (or result from) a gambling problem. 

# Middlesex United Way Announces Funding for Two Local Programs

# Department of Public Safety Thinking of Installing a Pool for Next Year?

Information from the Office of State Building Inspector

Installation of a new swimming pool REQUIRES application for a permit to the local building official when the pool depth will be 24 inches or greater deep. This permit requirement includes in-ground swimming pools, above-ground swimming pools, on ground swimming pools, hot tubs and spas.

Outdoor private swimming pools MUST comply with the State Building Code barrier and entrapment protection minimum regulations. The primary reason for compliance with these minimum code requirements is for preservation of individual's life safety. The purpose for these provisions is to provide an effective barrier surrounding the pool area to reduce the potential for young children to gain uncontrolled access, and to provide a level of protection against possible entrapment at the pool suction inlets. In addition to the State Building Code swimming pool requirements Connecticut General Statute

Section 29-265a has specific criteria for installation of a pool alarm prior to issuance of a building permit.

Inflatable swimming pools which can contain water over twenty-four inches deep is a relatively new product which has been made available to the Connecticut Consumer. The inflatable walls of an above grade inflatable swimming pool, (which contains water over twenty-four inches deep), are not an effective pool barrier and require a pool barrier which is typically a fence enclosure.

The 2005 State Building Code provides detailed provisions for barriers around swimming pools along with

entrapment protection for swimming pool and spa suction outlets. These requirements address:

- Minimum heights and maximum openings allowed in fences
- · Criteria for the fence gates and latches
- Criteria for the means of direct entry into a pool area from the house
- Criteria for the pool and spa suction outlet cover and grate
- Minimum number and separation distance of suction outlets
- Criteria for circulation systems equipped with atmospheric vacuum relief systems
- Minimum and maximum depths for pool vacuum cleaner fittings
- · Criteria for power safety covers

All newly installed swimming pools, hot tubs and spas installed after September 30, 2009 must comply with the revisions of the 2005 State Building Code that became effective August 1, 2009. Pools installed prior to August 1, 2009, and in compliance with the State Building Code that was in effect at that time, are not affected by these revisions.
