

From the Assessor

The Town of East Haddam is preparing to conduct a revaluation of all property for the October 1, 2017 grand list. The town has chosen Vision Government Solutions to perform full inspections of all improved properties. Information concerning the revaluation will be available on the town's website.

The Board of Assessment Appeals will meet in March 2017 to hear appeals on real estate assessments. Requests to the Board are due by February 20, 2017. Written requests should include the property owner's name, name and address of the person appealing the assessment, type of property being appealed (real estate or personal property), reason for the appeal, and opinion of value. Although any written request is accepted, forms are available at the East Haddam web site: www.easthaddam.org. The mailing address for the Board of Assessment Appeals is P.O. Box K, East Haddam, CT 06423.

The Assessor's Office will begin taking applications for the Homeowners Credit Program, and the Homeowners' Local Option Program on February 1, 2017. The deadline for applications is May 15, 2017. The income limits (including Social Security) for the state Homeowners' Program are

\$35,200 for a single person and \$42,900 for a married couple. The limit for the Local Option Program is \$50,000 per household.

Disabled veterans must submit proof of disability by March 31, 2017 to receive exemption benefits. Qualifying income for Additional Veterans Benefits is the same as the Elderly and Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program. Applications for the Additional Veterans Benefits will be accepted from February 1, 2017 until October 1, 2017.

Any person or entity starting a new business in town should notify the Assessor's Office so that we can send a personal property declaration in the fall. Personal property assessments are based on the declarant's filing. These assessments can be appealed to the Board of Assessment Appeals. Please note that legislation has raised the assessment limit for appealing to the Board from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. Assessment appeals over \$1,000,000 will be tried in the Superior Court.

Registrars of Voters

A Presidential election year is always a busy one! We had Presidential primaries in April, a budget referendum in May, a Republican primary for First Selectman in October, a Presidential election on November 8 and, last but not least, the election for First Selectman on December 20.

Turnout for the November election was over 78%, with 5,176 East Haddam residents voting. Election Day Registration was available for the November election, and 77 people registered to vote that day. On December 20, 1,609 people voted for First Selectman, a turnout of over 24%.

Our office has been affected by several

changes this year. Registrars are now required to complete an eight-class certification program, plus an additional 10 hours of training. They must also attend two conferences each year, and any additional training sessions mandated by the Secretary of the State. A new assisted voting system was put in place and the state also instituted an Election Management reporting system to help provide election results as quickly as possible. People can now register to vote at Motor Vehicle offices and online. Online registration has been popular, with many people taking advantage of its convenience.

Connecticut's system of using paper ballots read by optical scan machines provides a

paper trail which can be audited to ensure the accuracy of the vote. The Secretary of the State randomly selects 10% of polling places for audit after each state-wide election. After the Presidential primary in April, East Haddam was selected for an audit. The ballots were hand counted and the results matched the vote totals from the optical scan machine.

Thank you to all of the dedicated citizens of East Haddam, we appreciate that you participate in the Democratic process by both working at the polls and voting! We could not do our job without your support. The Registrars of Voters office is located in the River House, at 7 Main Street, East Haddam, telephone 860-873-5029.

Tax Collector

The Tax Office would like to remind everyone that the second payment on Real Estate and Personal Property taxes was due January 1, 2017. The last day to pay without interest or penalty is February 1, 2017. Motor Vehicle Supplemental bills were mailed December 9, 2016 and were also due January 1, 2017, payable by February 1, 2017. If you cannot pay your taxes in full, please call the tax office to set up a payment arrangement. Payments may be made in person, by mail or online. To pay by mail, send to: Tax Collector, P.O. Box 376, East Haddam, CT 06423-0376. To pay

or look up taxes online, go to easthaddam.org and click the link; "Pay Taxes Online." There is a fee for all credit/debit payments. This office is for the collection of taxes only. Any adjustments to your bill must be made by the Assessor.

Ease Winter Blahs. Spend Time Outdoors.

Spending time outdoors in natural areas is good for more than one's physical health. Research continues to show that walks in wooded and natural areas renew short-term memory, revive concentration, lower stress, ease anxiety, and generally improve one's bad mood.

Children and adults reap these benefits by spending as little as 15 to 30 minutes wandering the woods and meadows of our town's preserved acreage. The idea is to get away from built-up areas and traffic so your senses can absorb the quiet wonders of Mother Nature. East Haddam Land Trust (EHLT) maintains trails ideal for wandering in nature.

Golet Farm Preserve, just across Great Hillwood Road from Heritage Park, is a great place to meander through meadows and wooded trails. Follow the red then blue trails to reach interior meadows lined with wooded wetlands.

Take the blue trail in Hidden Valley Farm Preserve to enjoy the beautiful Moodus River. Once the power source for the Moodus twine industry, the Moodus River has been restored to its more natural and cleaner state. From the Gristmill Road parking area, take the red trail onto Gristmill Road and over the Moodus River. Take a right over a wood bridge and follow the trail markers (or use the map) to the red and blue trail intersection.

Sheepskin Hollow Preserve has three trailheads. Off the Mount Parnassus end of Sheepskin Hollow Road take the blue trail for a brisk walk across a stream and through woodlands. Stay on this trail a bit longer (left onto red and left onto white trails) to observe an active beaver pond. The white trail off the end of Ridgebury Road twists through the higher woodlands

of this 120-acre preserve while the yellow to red trails off Woodmont Circle meander wooded wetlands into deeper woods.

Find and download maps for these and other EHLT preserves at www.ehlt.org. You can also get your outdoor time during Land Trust scheduled hikes on the last Sundays and work parties on the third Saturdays of January-June and September-December. Check Events at www.ehlt. org, or follow East Haddam Land Trust on Facebook or www.meetup.com.

Moodus Reservoir Preservation Group (MRPG)

We are a charitable organization whose mission is to improve the quality of Moodus Reservoir through programs to control invasive weeds, and combat lake pollutants.

MRPG is concerned with pollutants entering the reservoir and impacting its quality as a resource for the town of East Haddam. Storm drains in surrounding streets that feed directly into the lake are of particular concern since they are a primary source of sand, salt, road oils and other contaminates.

In the fall of 2016 MRPG worked with students from Wesleyan University's Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences to GPS locate the storm drains on fourteen roads surrounding the reservoir, these being a likely source of storm water runoff that could flow into the reservoir. Once GPS coordinates were obtained, the team used Geographical Information System software, mapping tools and a number of databases from ArcMap, Google Maps, US Census Data, and CT DEEP to identify storm drains

most likely to flow into the reservoir. A couple of conclusions were reached at the end of the project:

The surrounding environment can be a source of pollutants coming from public and private roads, developed residential areas and agricultural properties.

Because of the contour of the surrounding property, even if some storm drains don't lead directly into the reservoir they could enter the surrounding watershed and ultimately make their way into the water body.

Our thanks go to Ms. Kim Diver, Assistant Professor of Earth & Environmental Sciences and our Wesleyan student team of Eliza Carter, Matt Forker, Ryan Nelson, and Natasha Nurjadin for their efforts in creating this analysis. Over the past few months, members of East Haddam Ambulance Association (EHAA) have been busy with various training sessions and community events. EHAA again participated in Project Safe Halloween. Children and adults had the opportunity to explore the ambulance and EMTs handed out candy.

An EMT course sponsored by East Haddam Parks and Recreation ended in December. Ten students including three students from East Haddam spent four months learning about patient assessment, cardiac arrest management, airway management, patient immobilization, diabetic emergencies, respiratory emergencies

and trauma. Students are currently going through certification testing. On November 19th, the class participated in a Lifestar Safety Program. After a lecture by a Lifestar crew member, students were given a tour of the helicopter and a chance to ask questions. Special thanks to East Haddam Volunteer Fire Department for setting up a landing zone.

EHAA members have completed protocol and medical control training that was mandated by OEMS and Middlesex Hospital. Technicians attend monthly training nights when skills are practiced and equipment is reviewed.

On February 11th, EHAA and East Haddam Parks and Recreation will sponsor the 2nd annual Evelyn Comer and Alumni Free CPR/AED Certification. East Haddam is a HeartSafe Community and offering CPR classes is part of our proactive approach in teaching our community what to do in the first few minutes of an emergency.






Preschool classes follow the East Haddam Elementary School Preschool time schedule. Learning partners will attend two morning classes weekly.



HOLOCAUST ESSAY

Nathan Hale-Ray Middle School is proud to announce our participation in the 2017 Holocaust Survivor Interview Project. This is a project that has been happening in the greater Hartford area for the past six years, as part of the Greater Hartford Community — wide Yom HaShoah Commemoration Program. Students from high schools in the greater Hartford

area have been paired up with Holocaust survivors. The project gets its inspiration from the "Adopt a Survivor" Program which was developed by Irving Roth, Director of the Holocaust Resource Center at Temple Judea of Manhasset, NY. The goal of the "Adopt a Survivor" program is to preserve the memory of a survivor's experience. The students meet with the survivors on an individual basis to learn their story. The students trace the survivor's story from childhood and retell experiences with parents, siblings, friends and school life in pre-war Europe. The students continue to tell the story through the war years and then through rescue and liberation. The program has several goals. One is that the students learn of the survivor's attitudes and feelings towards these events to understand exactly what the survivor experienced through a living primary source. Seeing and hearing an eyewitness makes history come alive. Another critical goal of the program is that the student is able to retell the survivor's story and preserve the story accurately for future generations. Unfortunately, Holocaust survivors are aging and dying. The availability of eyewitness accounts are becoming more and more difficult to obtain. Someone needs to keep their story alive. The students make this possible. After meeting with the survivors, the students write an essay which will appear in the program for the Yom HaShoah Commemoration which takes place on April 23, 2017 at Beth El Synagogue in West Hartford.

Choral Concert

The students of NHRMS ramped up their holiday spirit and presented two extraordinary vocal concerts. The first of these, on December 12th at the Middle School, featured the voices of the 4th and 5th grade choruses under the direction of Marisa Alfano. They performed a song in Spanish, a mock "opera" tune called "Christmas Is Coming and We Are Getting Fat", a beautiful arrangement of Trans-Siberian Orchestra's "Christmas Canon" and a hilarious song and dance- "The Reindeer Prom", among other numbers. Both audience and students had a wonderful time and left the concert full of holiday cheer. On December 14th, the 6th, 7th and 8th grade choruses and newly formed "A Cappella Choir", again under the direction of Marisa Alfano, joined the high school Concert Choir and Trillium, directed by Rose Marie Evans, in an outstanding program in the high school auditorium. The middle school choirs sang a wide variety of music- from traditional "snow themed" songs to the music of contemporary artists like Kelly Clarkson to jazz standards like the great Louis Armstrong's "Cool Yule". There were several featured soloists, including 6th graders Yiana Kariotis, Elizabeth Olander, Marisol Chupas and Ella Rogerson who did a splendid job facing the huge audience with poised and elegant singing. The "A Cappella Choir" also made their debut, wowing the audience with a challenging jazz version of "Carol of the Bells".

After the high school choirs' extraordinary entertainment, the night ended with a combined a cappella piece, "African Noel", accompanied by percussionists from the high

school and middle school. It was the perfect way to end the evening and a wonderful way to celebrate the outstanding talents of both schools' vocal departments.

Take a Hike: Get to Know the Harris Preserve



Five years ago, our town, with the help of the State of Connecticut, acquired a remarkable piece of property of some 134 acres that offers delights for hikers, birders, cross-country skiers, and history buffs alike. Twenty of those acres were set aside for future municipal use, but the balance is joyfully managed by the Conservation Commission and considered by us to be one of East Haddam's crown jewels of rural character.

Over three miles of marked and maintained trails wind the walker through old farmland and near upland forest, and then near wetland, vernal pools and intermittent streams. The nearly one and a half mile orange trail makes a loop deep into the forest and over streams, and the red trail, just under a mile in length, offers distant, seasonal views of Long Island Sound.

Two other trails invite you to explore as well. While the Harris preserve is easy to find at the top of Mt. Parnassus, situated right in the middle of town, it is possible to escape completely there from the noise and clutter of civilization.

There is another side to the Harris Preserve, however, that makes it a treasure: Its connections to East Haddam's rich history. First there is its connection to our history of farming. The old barn is gone, but the handsome saltbox farmhouse remains adjacent to the Preserve and is being brought back to life by its new owners. The farm lanes and fallow fields bespeak a time when East Haddam was dotted with farms that fed their owners, their neighbors, and even people far away. Picture the farm wagons coming down Mt. Parnassus Rd. to the landing on the Connecticut River, with milk and produce bound by boat and train to towns and cities to the south.

Perhaps the most surprising historical footnote to the Harris Preserve is its immediate neighbor to the north, a tiny piece of state land that commemorates one of our most fascinating historical figures, George Comer, polar explorer, whaler, cartographer, and authority on the native peoples of Hudson Bay. If you look closely as you drive across the top of Mt. Parnassus, you will see a stone monument with an inscribed plaque. All the activity at the Harris preserve has helped revive interest in this fascinating East Haddam citizen, who died here in 1937 and whose grandchildren and great-grandchildren still reside among us. Watch the news next spring for a ceremony to rededicate this monument.

In the meanwhile, lace up your walking shoes and take a hike through history, both natural and man-made, at the Harris Preserve.

Detailed trail maps of The Harris Preserve and other East Haddam outdoor opportunities are always available to you online. Just go the East Haddam town website, click on Town Boards, find the Conservation Commission, and click on East Haddam Trail Maps.



More Than \$82 Million Awarded for Arts Projects Nationwide Includes a \$20,000 Grant to the I-Park Foundation

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) grant will support a 2017 residency and exhibition of site-specific, ephemeral artworks in the landscape. NEA Chairman Jane Chu has approved more than \$82 million to fund local arts projects and partnerships in the NEA's second major funding announcement for fiscal year 2016. Included in this announcement is an Art Works award of \$20,000 to the I-Park Foundation in support of its signature Environmental Art Biennale (residency and exhibition), which is scheduled to begin on May 15. The Biennale will culminate into an exhibition which will take place over the first weekend in June of 2017. Art Works supports the creation of new works, the presentation of both new and existing works, lifelong learning in the arts and public engagement with the arts. For the Environmental Art Biennale, retitled the Site Responsive Art Biennale, a multi-disciplinary jury and curatorial panel will choose 12 artists who will create their installations during the 3-week residency.

The public is invited to meet the artists during the public exhibition on Sunday, June 4, 2017.

I-Park's co-founder and Executive Director, Joanne Paradis, said: "We are gratified to receive this important award by the NEA. We consider it an important milestone in our evolution. The NEA

The Community Foundation of Middlesex County (CFMC) received an early 20th anniversary gift this year with news that the nonprofit organization will be the recipient of an \$8 million bequest from the trust of the late Mary Janvrin.

CFMC President and CEO Cynthia Clegg commented, "It is indeed a great honor to be given the responsibility of ensuring that Mary's and Natalie's life passions are supported now and forever, and to be one of the chosen facilitators. We look forward to finding many ways to maximize the community impact of their profound legacy. What a wonderful gift to everyone in our region."

This process uses a mere 5 gallons of propane each month, resulting in a cost of just 30 cents per curing cycle, saving thousands of dollars in monthly expense.

National Glaucoma Awareness Month

January is National Glaucoma Awareness Month. Glaucoma affects 60 million people worldwide and more than 3 million people in the United States. Glaucoma is often called the "thief of sight" since often there are no symptoms and glaucoma-related vision loss is permanent. As much as 40% of vision can be lost without a person noticing. If not diagnosed and treated, 1 in 10 people go blind from glaucoma. Glaucoma affects people of all ages, even infants.

There are two main types of glaucoma: Primary Open-Angle Glaucoma and Angle-Closure Glaucoma. Open-angle glaucoma is dangerous because most of the time a person affected will not notice any symptoms until vision is severely damaged. The vision loss isn't noticed because it often starts with your peripheral vision and the brain makes up for what you don't see. The inner eye pressure (IOP- intraocular pressure) rises because the

correct amount of fluid can't drain out of the eye. This occurs usually deep into the drainage canals. Closed-angle glaucoma occurs when the drainage canals get blocked or covered. Angle-closure glaucoma is dangerous because, while there are often symptoms of pain including headaches, nausea, and eye pain they happen rapidly and without warning.

It is very important to get an annual dilated eye exam. As you age or if you have a family history of glaucoma you may have the visual field test performed. This test checks your peripheral vision and the loss of your side vision is one of the first signs of glaucoma. If you are diagnosed with glaucoma there are ways to manage it. In the early stages you might be prescribed eye drops or have laser surgery performed.

Other ways to manage glaucoma are done by performing filtering surgery or a drainage implant. Dr. Mascarenhas at Middlesex Eye Physicians is our Glaucoma Specialist. She is a Yale educated specialist and trained in Trabectome glaucoma surgery.




