



First Selectman's Corner

What does it mean to be a sustainable community? How do we plan and lead our community in this new challenging economy? Do we protect ourselves from dependence on State funds? Do we prepare for environmental disasters? Do we prepare ourselves from energy cost spikes? Do we plan and fund our long range capital infrastructure needs? Sustainability means that we must learn from our past and prepare for our future. The strengths of our town have always come from our residents, our land, and both our natural and economic resources. We have been planning for all these challenges for years now.

This planning for the future requires the involvement of many stakeholders to develop responsible budgets that provide essential services without imposing excessive costs. This future means we must make long term investments in our infrastructure in order to remain viable and sustainable.

The current municipal offices located in the East Haddam Village are located on one of the most valuable properties on the Connecticut River. Our Public Safety facilities require additional space and repairs so that our Police, Fire, Ambulance and Emergency personnel and volunteers have the facilities and equipment to protect our citizens and property. Moving the offices to a renovated old Middle School would open up the riverfront property for development adding to our tax base. Additionally, the Elementary School is over 50 years old and is in need of code upgrades and renovations.

These projects require voter approval at referendum. Many wonder when we will get the chance to vote on these projects. Unfortunately the long delay in hearing from our USDA grant application which would provide significant dollars toward these projects has been delayed for the last 4 months.

In the interim the proposed 2014-2015 Budget has received a valuable commitment from the Board of Finance to con-



tinue our capital reserves fund in anticipation of financing these large building projects. A guideline of bonding \$14 to \$19 million dollars for these projects (plus funding from state and federal grants including the USDA) has been set by the Board of Finance as an affordable debt threshold. With this guideline our building advisory committees will need to reconsider the scope of these projects to come in line with the maximum debt threshold. Please review the Citizens' Guide to the 2014-2015 East Haddam Budget that was

recently mailed to you. The Guide highlights key proposed budget items that will improve public safety, education, road infrastructure, vehicle replacement, Youth and Family Services support, citizen access to the unified library system network, dollar for dollar match to the Conservation Commission for land access upgrades, lake quality improvements, grounds and facilities beautification projects, and matching funding for a \$311 thousand school technology infrastructure grant.

What are some concrete examples of the actions we are taking to improve our infrastructure? Let's welcome Mike Olzacki (our Animal Control Officer) to his expanded role of grounds and general building maintenance. Mike has a background in field maintenance having worked for Hebron, Colchester and East Hampton in that capacity. In his first week in this role, Mike made noticeable improvements to town fields. These improvements are being done without increasing the town's operating budget! We were able to reallocate funds for contracted lawn services to accomplish this.

In one specific example, Craig Mansfield, Facilities Director, called upon the heads of Parks & Recreation, the Little League, and Soccer Club. These organizations face challenges due to severe limitations placed by the State of Connecticut on

fertilization and grub control. After several meetings, the Little League Board of Directors working with the Facilities Director, created a partnership to improve its fields using existing town resources. Little League agreed to fund a significant portion of the field restorations at a cost that it could not get in the private sector.

Because of this partnership with the town, the Little League now has five significantly improved playing fields, including both Nichols Field and the Elementary School fields, for a fraction of the cost they would have laid out and the town has received some funding to put toward the budget.

More good news on the road side mowing concerns. Over the last three mowing seasons the town has fallen behind in their ability to keep up with the growth of grass and weeds due to a 20 year old mower that kept breaking down. We just received a new John Deer tractor that will be seen on our roads keeping our site lines clear to make traveling safe.

Thank you for your patience and feel free to call anytime with your comments and ideas. You are the eyes and ears of our town and your feedback is always welcome.

Business Updates

The East Haddam Economic Development Commission (EDC) is pleased to announce the following:

Camp Kota, a youth recreational summer camp for kids 8-15 years old, is making plans for its inaugural season. The camp is situated at Cave Hill Resort and will be offering four weeks of camp starting June 23 through July 18. Overnight camp (4 nights) or day camp (9:00 a.m. to 3:15 p.m./5:15 p.m.) are offered. The sessions run weekdays only, meaning overnight campers arrive on Monday morning and leave Friday afternoon. Campers may come for one week or any combination of weeks that they choose. The camp is owned and managed by Melissa Luke, a teacher in the East Haddam School District for the past eight years. The Assessor's Office will be taking applications for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Program from April 1, 2014 to October 1, 2014. Applicant's total income must not exceed \$34,100 for a single person, \$41,600 for a couple (joint income), including Social Security and Medicare. Applicants must be 65 or older or totally disabled and bring all income, rent, and utility information from 2013.

In addition, the deadline for filing for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Homeowners Program is May 15. Qualifying income and age requirements for the Homeowners Program and Additional Veterans Benefits are the same as the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Rebate Program. It should be noted that the town of East Haddam has adopted by local option an additional tax credit to homeowners 65 and older whose income does not exceed \$50,000 (including Social Security). Applicants must bring proof of income including Social Security for 2013. Applications for the Additional Veterans Benefits will be accepted until October 1st. up in the summer camp setting, starting as a counselor and working her way through leadership positions up to an assistant director. From the Assessor

As the Tax Collector's Office prepares the July tax bills, those residents whose motor vehicles have been sold, stolen, totaled, or who have moved out-of-state may be eligible for a pro-ration of their car taxes.

Two forms of proof are necessary to pro-rate or remove a vehicle from the grand list. Residents must bring a copy of the plate receipt issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles at the time of cancellation of registration, and a copy of one of the following; bill of sale, transfer of title, receipt from junkyard, notification of total loss, trade-in papers, or some other document showing the date on which the vehicle was disposed.

The Assessor's office has its own web page on the town website. Included is information on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle assessments; property tax relief for seniors, veterans, and the disabled; renters' rebate; information on revaluation; access to applications and forms pertaining to the Assessor's office. Also, the assessments as a result of the October 1, 2012 revaluation are available on the website.

Registrar of Voters News

The Registrars have been working on the annual canvass of voters. This is a process in which we check all our files and records to make sure that the voting list is accurate and up to date. We rely on data from the postal service, the Secretary of State's Office, and the Town Clerk; and from replies to letters sent to voters.

We are looking forward to the annual referendum on the Town budget. Unofficially, we expect the date to be Tuesday May 20. Keep an eye on the East Haddam town web site (easthaddam.org) for up to date information and hours the polls will be open. Budget referenda are always held at the Old Town Hall, on Town Street, across from the Congregational Church.

The Memorial Day Parade will step off at 10:00 a.m. from the old Middle School parking lot on Monday, May 26. All community groups are encouraged to join the parade. If you East Haddam citizens who are registered to vote, of course may do so, but persons who own property in East Haddam, and are U.S. citizens, may also vote in budget referenda.

Another Spring delight for the Registrars is the Annual Student's in Government Day. This year we are expecting to have 4 students on May 14th from the EHMS helping and learning at our office.

Don't forget that you will most likely have a chance to help pick candidates for the State of Connecticut elections in November. Primaries, if needed, for both parties will be held at the NHRHS August 12, 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. Again, keep watch on the town web site for more information.

Ambulance Association



The operations crew of the EHAA is happy to have acquired a new squad car (referred to as squad 15-4) to replace an older and increasingly unreliable vehicle. This squad car allows medical emergencies in our community to be responded to without having to wait for a complete ambulance crew to assemble. It allows a first responder EMT to provide preliminary treatment to a patient prior to the arrival of the ambulance.

At a recent operational meeting several of the volunteer crew members commented on other useful features of the 15-4 vehicle. According to Paul Ross, a long time member of the crew, it can be used to transfer a patient to the ambulance when driveways (and sometimes even roads) are too narrow for the larger vehicle to navigate. The squad car is also used in support of community events, such as following runners during the East Haddam footrace. Everyone agreed that the new squad 15-4, with its up-to-date equipment and features, is a great improvement over the previous squad car.

Tax Collector

The Tax Office is busy preparing for the mailing of the 2013 Grand List tax bills. All bills will be in the mail by June 30, 2014 with a due date of July 1, 2014, payable by August 1, 2014 without interest.

If you still owe taxes on the 2012 Grand List, an attempt should be made to clear up the back taxes before the new bills come out. Liens will be placed on all outstanding Real Estate balances. This is an additional charge.

Tax payments may be made in person, by mail or on-line. Office hours are; Monday, Wednesday, Thursday 9:00 a.m. -4:00 p.m., Tuesday 9:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. and Friday 9:00 a.m. - Noon. **The Tax Office will be open late on Friday, August 1st, 2014, 9:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.** There is a secure Lock Box in the front alcove, which is available during non-business hours. Our on-line payment service, Point and Pay, is available to all taxpayers who wish to pay tax bills by e-check, credit or debit. There is fee of 2.95% on all credit/debit transactions. The fee for e-check is \$2.95 per transaction. These fees also apply to all over the phone and in office payments.

To pay taxes online, go to www.easthaddam.org and click the link "Pay Taxes".

East Haddam Library System

Hello Friends & Neighbors,

Instead of a traditional article I thought we might try something different this time around. A lot of people have been asking about our new library system. Even though the staff & I love answering questions, I thought it might be helpful to answer a few of the most common questions to help out the quietly curious among us. So without further ado, here are some...

Frequently Asked Questions (And 100% Honest Answers) About the East Haddam Library System:

What is the East Haddam Library System?

In June 2013, the two libraries (East Haddam Free Public Library & Rathbun Free Memorial Library) came under town management to form the East Haddam Public Library System. Prior to last summer, the libraries were two semi-private institutions that had no formal relationship. The libraries are still working to get a common computer system, which will allow patrons to renew and pay fines at either location. The plan is to get that piece of the puzzle in place by early 2015.

Ok so, why do we need two libraries in town?

This is the question I hear the most. The simple answer is: We need to because we have two.


The libraries hold over 45,000 materials including books, movies, and audio books. Consolidating into one of the existing libraries would mean discarding hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of materials. Not to mention the time and money it would take to figure out what to keep. The libraries serve over 7,000 library card holders in East Haddam. If one library was to suddenly disappear, the remaining library would be unable to meet the demands of East Haddam's citizens. Frustrated about the time you had to wait a few days for Game of Thrones on DVD or how long it took to get your hands on the book? Imagine if our town had half as many copies, and twice as many people checking them out. Ouch.

Why do we even have two libraries in the first place?

Good question. The current EHFPL building was built in 1920 by Judge Albert Purple. The Rathbun Library was built a few years later in 1935 by a bequest left by Norris and Frances Rathbun. At the time, East Haddam and Moodus were (in a sense) further apart. In 1930, only 1 in 5 American families owned an automobile (even fewer in rural New England). Cars were considered a status symbol in the 1920s and were downright unaffordable during the great depression. The convenient seven minute drive that now separates the libraries was easily forty-five minutes to an hour during those days. It made sense to have two libraries, one for each side of town. Not to mention that the Farmers and the Mill Workers had vastly different tastes (one would imagine).

If we have two libraries, does that mean we're buying two of everything?

A common misconception is that the two libraries are duplicating all their items. Not true. While you can certainly *continued on page 10*

get the latest James Patterson book or Johnny Depp movie at the library of your choice, the libraries have developed certain specialties over the years. In general, only the bestselling new releases warrant a copy at each library. If the town had a single library, we'd still have to buy more than one copy of certain items just to meet demand. There's definitely some duplication that would be cut down on, but not as much as you'd think.

Is there a difference between the libraries?

There's a reason so many people use both libraries in town. Each library has its own distinct personality, and one of the ways they express their personality is with the materials that are offered. There's an advantage to having a library account at each building. For example, look at the following specialties:

EHFPL Specialties: Movies, Television Shows, Young Adult Fiction, Classic Literature, Graphic Novels/Manga, Anime, Books on CD, and Large Print

Rathbun Specialties: Adult Fiction, Adult Mysteries, Biographies, Historical Collection, Foreign Films, BBC Productions, Music CDs, and Digital Books & Audio Books

So if a library specializes in something that means its better, right?

Please keep in mind that both libraries offer a little bit of everything. The specialties listed above are based off of statistics, and are not a list of what section is "better." Even if one library has a smaller section than its counterpart, it still has a vastly different set of materials within that

section. Your own personal taste is the only measurement for what section you prefer.

Why should I visit the library?

How much do you spend renting or buying books & movies that you only get one use out of? Save your money! The libraries have brand new books, films, TV Series, and more, all available to checkout for free. Most items are available the same week they're released. The wait lists are quick, and online ordering is easy. The libraries also have free computer access and free WiFi, which are great for job-searching, facebooking, or even gaming. There's also printing, photocopies, and faxing. Best of all, the libraries are a great place to meet with friends & neighbors.





Spring is SWEET for Hale-Ray Vo-Ag!



Winter has finally ended and the sap is flowing! The Agricultural Education students are busy collecting sap to boil in the newly constructed sugar house. Last fall, students built a 12' x 20' shed with a functioning cupola to house their evaporator and maple syrup supplies. They identified sugar and red maple trees to tap on the high school property and hung pails to collect the sap. Students are keeping records on each individual tree to compare differences in which trees produced the most sap for the season.




By processing sap into syrup, Hale-Ray students are learning how to make one of the oldest natural food products in North America. Students gather sap and filter it into a holding tank. Then they boil the sap down to syrup which involves students filtering, tending to the fire, taking regular temperature readings as the sap boils, learning how to use a hydrometer to test the specific gravity of the syrup when it is done, splitting wood and keeping equipment and facilities sanitary.

Producing the maple syrup has proven to reward far beyond the sweet product of these students' labor!



Master Gardener's Corner

It's that time again! Spring has brought forth an explosion of flowers, showy shrubs and glistening trees. But the grass....., Oh that grass, such a pain...., it doesn't par with May's horticultural offerings. Every year you try something new to bring forth a lush lawn, but instead see bare spots, disease, and weed invasions by July. OK, so what do we do? It's time to look at a few basics. Instead of running to the store to spend your money on fertilizer, seeds, or herbicides, following these simple steps will lead to a hardy lawn for a fraction of the cost. Firstly, don't guess, soil test. Follow through on this testing and you will learn exactly what your lawn needs. Go to http:// www.soiltest.uconn.edu/ for details.

Next, dethatch your lawn area if needed and aerate with a spike aerator if possible. It is best to wait until fall for plug aerating. The soil test results will tell you if you need to apply lime and/or fertilizer, and it will give you the exact concentrations for both. Now, the hard part, what grass seed is best for this area? This is a big topic so to keep it short; I'll go straight to the point. Turf-type Fescues tolerate wear, shade, salt drought and acid soils. They require lower water and less fertilizer. Perennial Ryegrass is excellent turf grass under ideal conditions and is often mixed with fescues and Bluegrasses. A good mix is 30-40% fescue, 30-40% Kentucky bluegrass and 20% or less Perennial ryegrass. You can try a fine or tall fescue blend. Purchase from a source that understands grass and offers the best quality. Apply as directed and then follow these simple steps.

Cut high and often. Shaving your grass or cutting it low inhibits deep root growth. Deep roots provide a thicker lawn, which in turn prevents weeds.

Keep your mower blades or reels sharp.

Mow when grass is dry.

Deep, infrequent watering is best-between 4:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m., as this will avoid fungus disease.

Return grass clippings as you cut. Clippings add natural nitrogen.

Avoid fertilizing when grass is not growing, such as, early Spring; the heat of summer; when grass is dormant; or in the late fall. Fertilize in the Spring when growth is flush, or in late summer or early fall. Wait until weather is between 50 and 80 degrees.

Follow these simple steps and you will find having a lush, green lawn doesn't have to be a pain in the grass. Enjoy!

Nathan Hale-Ray Middle School to Break Ground for a School Garden

Spring Beautification



Nathan Hale-Ray High School Electrathon **Engineering Program**

Throughout the year Hale-Ray High School students work as a team using design and fabrication skills to produce electric vehicles to be used in competition at Lime Rock Park. Each fall and spring they compete in the Connecticut Electrathon Engineering Challenge. The competition is sponsored by Central Connecticut State University and Lime Rock Raceway to promote engineering and alternative transportation energy sources. Students across New England design and build efficient, aerodynamic vehicles following strict safety criteria to compete against each other. The objective is to drive a vehicle the farthest distance in one hour using a limited amount of energy (72 pounds of batteries).

Following a year of intense design and fabrication, the students of the Engineering and Product Design classes make modifications to existing cars in addition to building new vehicles. Since 2001, Hale-Ray students have manufactured more than eleven vehicles and placed first more than 26 times.

As the current year moves toward spring, students are working hard to complete two new vehicles, a carbon fiber composite car and the first ever leaning metal frame vehicle. From the CAD designs to race ready completion using CNC machinery to mill sprockets, components, and body shell molds usually takes 11/2 - 2 years.

Community support for the program and annual funding from the Ray Board truly enables these students to be successful. As a result of this program, hundreds of students have gone into careers in manufacturing, design, engineering and automotive trades. The chance to work as a team member, communicate ideas, and apply individual skills to create such an exciting product is invaluable. Provide students with the resources and opportunity and it is amazing what they will achieve.

Singer Chris Bauer is from Middletown while Cary Burns, our keyboardist, hails from MA. Guest vocalist Sue Rivard, lead singer of Fountainhead, will add her talents. Additionally, Bluesberry is the house band for the annual Moodus Sportsmen's Club Harvest Fest. Please note that the band will play an original song, "Jimmy River Chubs" - the ONLY song ever written to celebrate the joys of ice fishing on the Moodus Reservoir. You heard it here first!

Notable venues include the open-air theater in Disney World, the Boardwalk in Atlantic City, at the "Galaxy Jazz Festival" in Milwaukee, the Embarcadero in San Francisco, the John F. Kennedy Center Millennium Stage in Washington, D.C., and at Mardi Gras in New Orleans. The group has also performed on numerous radio and television broadcasts across the nation. August 4 - New Riders of the Purple Sage - New Riders of the Purple Sage, an American Country Rock Band, emerged from the psychedelic rock scene in San Francisco in 1969. The original group included co-founders John Dawson and David Nelson with Jerry Garcia and several members of the Grateful Dead. As the Grateful Dead personnel moved on to concentrate on their own sound, the New Riders enjoyed the adulation of an established audience. Their hit songs "Panama Red", "Glendale Train", "Truck Drivin' Man" appealed to both the counter culture movement and the Cowboy Outlaw genre of the 70's & 80's. The New Riders of the Purple Sage continue to bring audiences together to celebrate a bit of nostalgia, fine music, and dancing.

August 11 - Fiesta del Norte - Fiesta del Norte is an exciting versatile Mariachi band that plays music of Mexico and other Latin American countries. Dressed in traditional charro outfits, they perform a repertoire that spans the styles of the Mariachis of Jalisco, Nortenas of Chihuahua, harp music of Vera Cruz, and marimba music of Chiapas. Bring your sarape and sombrero as we celebrate our Fiesta on the river.

August 18 - Parsonsfield (formerly Poor Old Shine) - Parsonsfield is a roots band with a grassroots ethos. Formed at the University of Connecticut, where singer and banjo player Chris Freeman met banjo and mandolin player Antonio Alcorn in a folk music club on campus, an early version of Parsonsfield landed its first gig opening for a friend's band at the legendary New Haven club Toad's Place. Reminder notices will be mailed to licensed dog owners at the end of May. If sending in your payment via the mail, please include any updated paperwork; it will be returned to you with the license.

Playing It Safe in the Sun



The sun sends us heat and light and is beneficial to our health. Ninety percent of our Vitamin D comes

4 Steps to Playing it Safe in the Sun

1. Avoid Too Much Sun: Wear protective clothing (shirt, hat, pants, sunglasses) when in the sun for more than 15 minutes; seek shade as much as possible; avoid mid-day sun.

2. Apply Sunscreen to Exposed Skin: Apply 15 minutes before sun exposure; apply a generous coat and reapply every 2 hours or more often if getting wet or sweating heavily.

3. Choose Sunscreen Wisely: Look at the label. Choose a sunscreen that: Offers broad spectrum (UV-A & UV-B) protection, Is rated as SPF 15 or 30, Contains zinc oxide as the active ingredient or as a blend with titanium dioxide. These mineral blockers are preferable to chemical absorbers. Choose water resistant.

4. Do Get Some Sun Every Day: Your body needs a daily dose of Vitamin D from the sun. For most people 15 minutes

of sunshine without sunscreen will not damage the skin and will give you enough Vitamin D.

How Do I Choose A Sunscreen?

Read the label for the following features: SPF 15 or 30: The SPF (sun protection factor) is an indication of how much extra time you can spend in the sun and not get a sun burn. For example, if it normally takes you 1 hour to get a sunburn, using a SPF 15 sunscreen will prevent a burn for 15 hours. But that is not realistic as the sunscreen will wear off from swimming, sweating and contact with other surfaces. Proper use of a SPF 15 or 30 sunscreen is usually sufficient to protect the skin. A higher SPF is not needed and would still need to be reapplied just as often.

Should I Apply Sunscreen To My Infant Or Young child?

For babies under six months of age, it is best to shelter them from the sun with hats, clothing and shade. If there is sun exposure, use sunscreen sparingly over small areas of exposed skin. Beyond 6 months of age you can use sunscreen normally but avoid the area around the eyes because children may wipe it into their eyes and cause irritation.

Moodus Reservoir Preservation Group

Spring is here, finally, and we're all looking to yard and lawn preparation. It's important to keep in mind the harmful effects of fertilization and pesticides that enter our lakes, encouraging over growth of native and invasive aquatic plants as well as harmful algae. Try to keep fertilizer use to a minimum, especially near any body of water where run-off can affect the lake. Plan to mow your lawn with the mower in mulch cycle, distributing as you mow. Keep in mind that you must keep your mower blade sharp (3 sharpening minimum per season recommended; cut to about 3" for healthiest grass). An alternative is to bag your clippings and establish a mulching area to create very rich mulch for

bare spots and later applications.

State Audit Benefits East Haddam Residents

Residents of East Haddam got some good news this week after a second audit by the State Board of Education who found in favor of the town. On initial review, the state claimed that more than \$1 million worth of school construction at the Nathan Hale-Ray Middle School was ineligible for reimbursement according to the parameters of the state grant. After a meeting at the State Education Department office in Hartford attended by State Representative Melissa Ziobron, First Selectman Mark Walter and Finance Director Cindy Varricchio, the final audit reduced that amount by more than \$450,000 saving the town in excess of \$215,000.

In addition, Rep. Ziobron was also able to add an additional \$36,000 to a forgiveness priority list. Those monies were for a penalty for prior window replacement project at the former middle school. The total savings to the town are over \$250,000.

"All large capital projects are an incredible undertaking for any community, and I am so grateful for the service all the volunteers provided on the building committee. I am especially grateful for the assistance from our State Representative Melissa Ziobron who saw this project from its beginning stages through a successful finish. The new middle school will serve as a cornerstone of our community for generations to come" said Mark Walter, First Selectman of East Haddam.

In regards to her efforts with the project Ziobron said, "I am proud of my work on the former 4-8 School Building Committee and glad I was able to provide first-hand knowledge of the project. In fact, I had actually asked the same questions the state had while I was a member of the committee. The town brought forward a lot of great documentation to the audit review and they should be commended for their due diligence."


