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East Lyme Superintendent's Note

The East Lyme Public Schools has had an excellent few months of school during this 2018-2019 year. Our award winning and outstanding schools continue to do wonderful things for our children at every grade level, and we remain proud of all that continues to be accomplished in our district.

One of our most important ventures during this 2018-2019 year is the \$37.5 million dollar elementary alteration project occurring at Niantic Center School,

Lillie B. Haynes School, and Flanders School. The renovations at all three buildings began back in late June, and a great deal of work has already been accomplished during what will be a total of fourteen months of construction work. Recently, our staff and students have moved into phase two of four total transitions that entail multiple classroom moves and sectioning off wings of each building for renovation work to occur. We are happy to report that the projects are running ahead of schedule and on budget. I would like to credit our staff, students, and families for their patience, commitment, and diligence in enduring a full school year of construction while schools are in session. Educating our children remains our number one priority, and we continue to ensure that happens while working through this tedious process. Each of the three buildings should be completing all work by the end of this coming summer.

For the 2019-2020 school year (once renovations are complete) we will be redistricting students across our three elementary buildings. Equally balancing out our 800+ elementary students across the schools is a priority that was studied over the course of last year and unanimously approved by the Board of Education last May. We are using this current school year to engage in transitional activities for children that will be moving school locations. Our district is currently in year two of a five-year Long Range Plan to bring forth an improved Pre-K to 12 instructional alignment, technology enhancements and use for children, and improved social and emotional support for every child. Our ongoing focus on fiscal responsibility and building school district budgets around need remains core to our beliefs.

Our sports teams, clubs, bands, and all other programs continue to thrive as we work hard to provide multiple offerings and activities to all students. A high percentage of our high school students participate in the activities that we offer. Bringing forth the propensity within our student body is essential, while also ensuring a well-rounded graduate leaves us with a vast opportunity for greatness!

As the Superintendent, I remain extremely proud of our excellent school district, wonderful town, and all that East Lyme continues to offer us.

Flood Facts - Drainage System Maintenance



The Town of East Lyme is a participant in the Federal Emergency Management Agency Community Rating System program which entitles its residents to

discounts on their flood insurance policies. One of the objectives of the Community Rating System is to encourage and recognize programs that preserve & restore the natural functions of floodplains and minimize damage & disruption to infrastructure & critical facilities.

KNOW YOUR FLOOD HAZARD

In the Town of East Lyme, one of the primary threats of flooding results from the "ponding" of water during heavy storms. Some flooding can result from small ditches and streams overflowing during significant storm events. Many local urban flood problems are caused when trash, yard waste, brush, fill or other debris is dumped into channels. This debris can clog storm drains & culverts, divert flows, and reduce the conveyance capacity of channels.

STREAM DUMPING REGULATIONS

The house you flood may be your own. Do not dump or throw anything into drainage ditches or streams. Obstruction and pollution of our waterways and ditches is a violation of Town Ordinances and Regulations. Dumping or disposal of debris



throughout East Lyme's drainage system is prohibited. A Town Ordinance regulating the disposal of solid waste indicates that no person shall throw or deposit any refuse in any stream or other body of water. According to the East Lyme Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Regulations, filling or depositing material within 100 feet of a wetland or watercourse is considered a Regulated Activity.

The regulations that prohibit disposal of debris in East Lyme's drainage system are enforced throughout the entire community. The East Lyme Wetlands Enforcement Officer and the Town Engineer are responsible for receiving complaints and monitoring compliance.

East Lyme Public Trust Foundation New Officers & Committees Announced

Support of the Boardwalk, support of the Environment, the exploration of new recreation venues, and fundraising have all led to very active year for The East Lyme Public Trust Foundation. In 2019, the Foundation will continue this work on behalf of the Community.

The East Lyme Public Trust Foundation is pleased to announce its new officers and committees. Jessica Todd, the previous vice-president, will become the new president. Ms. Todd is the VP and Director of Finance of Chelsea Groton Bank. The new Vice-President will be Ted Norris, President of Pamlico Group. Jim Gallagher will continue as the Chair of the Shore Grass Erosion Studies, while Bill and Fran Rinoski will continue as Co-Chairs of the Plaque Fund Raiser, and June Hoye will continue as the Chair of The Promise of Tomorrow's Trees.

In a new area, Sandy Greenhouse and Matthew Whittico will be the Co-Chairs to research Hiking and Bike Trails in East Lyme, in addition to Ted Norris serving as the Chair for a committee exploring possibilities of Gorton Pond Development.

Jessica Todd, the new Foundation President, is dedicated to continuing the Foundation's support of the Boardwalk, the new Band shell, the Grass Project to help stabilize the beach, the exploration of new recreation venues, and The Promise of Tomorrow's Trees and the Plaque project.

To support the Environment, The East Lyme Public Trust Foundation has been working since 2015 to provide a model for long-term management of Connecticut beaches through a joint program with the UConn SeaGrant program. It has focused on the Niantic Bay Beach and Boardwalk, in cooperation with the East Lyme Parks and Recreation Department.

Also to help individuals develop a greater connection to the environment as they frequent the Niantic Bay Boardwalk, the local Niantic beaches, and the waters of Niantic Bay, the ELPTF, with the Sponsorship of UCONN Sea Grant has provided and will continue to provide new educational pamphlets to improve the public's understanding and protection of the Ecosystems living on our shores.

In its ongoing support of the Boardwalk, in 2018, the Executive Committee of the E.L.P.T.F. unanimously voted to donate up to \$10,000 to the Town of East Lyme to upgrade the security system at the Boardwalk, Cini Park, Hole in the Wall, and McCook Park.

In 2018, the East Lyme Public Trust Foundation was also pleased to announce the donation of approximately \$7,000 for the purchase of twenty, 33 gallon Trash Receptacles that have been placed at the Hole in the Wall, along the Boardwalk, and at Cini Park.

The Public Trust Foundation has also been working on a project to make the Niantic Bay Beach more accessible for people with disabilities, with walkers, with canes, or for parents with strollers. Shortly before Memorial Day, the E.L. Parks and Rec. Commission installed an ADA compliant beach accessibility surface mat to allow wheelchair access to the Niantic Boardwalk beach.

In order to support its many projects, the Foundation has developed some unique fundraisers, one of which is the plaques that line the railing of the Boardwalk. Twenty four years ago, when the boardwalk first opened, none of the members of The East Lyme Public Trust Foundation would have predicted the overwhelming popularity of these plaques. Over the years, 1911 plaques have been installed, each with its own unique story. The plaque donors have come from 28 different states across the nation and from 2 foreign countries. Connecticut towns are represented from north to south and west to east - from Windsor to Woodbury and Greenwich to Guilford.

Another unique fundraiser is a commemorative tree program which has made available to the public, trees to be placed in public spaces in East Lyme. The East Lyme Public Trust Foundation, in co-operation with the East Lyme Parks and Recreation Department, uses the profits raised by The Promise of Tomorrow's Trees to support the Niantic Bay Boardwalk and other projects of the Trust.

In 2015, 8 trees were sponsored at McCook Park. In 2016, 5 dog-wood trees were sponsored at the Cliff Walk to McCook Point. In 2017, the foundation offered a walkway of Cherry trees along the chain-link fence at McCook Park on Columbus Ave. In 2018, Sugar Maple trees were offered at BrideBrook Park along the outfield fence. The areas that still have trees available are Bridebrook Park, Cherry Lane at McCook Park on Columbus Avenue, the Smith Harris House, the Samuel Smith House, the Library, and the East Lyme Town Hall,

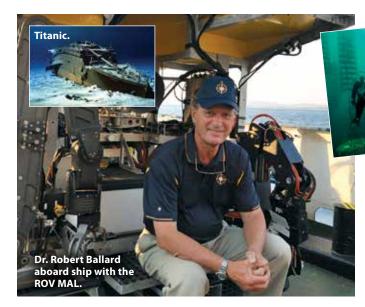

multiple tracks; internships, community STEM and STEAM (to include the Arts) programs, and fellowships. Each ocean expedition includes scientists, student interns and educators as part of the Nautilus corps. The OET website is maintained on a 24/7 basis while the Nautilus is at sea to provide for live communication and interaction. During the last expedition, over 24,000 questions were answered live. Each expedition cultivates a new set of students and mentors (both on and off-board). "The key is to do it wave after wave after wave," he says. To make a difference you needed to reach millions of students.

No Boundaries

Dr. Ballard's message, however, is about more than just the ocean. Life's lessons include understanding one's self. Dr. Ballard is dyslexic. For quite a while, he didn't even know it. It took the book "*The Dyslexic Advantage*" to explain me to me. It was a strange but enlightening experience. Those affected (which is 10% of the population) are often loathe to admit it. To him, it is a gift - an interesting advantage. "I created a dyslexic world that I excel in," he explains. Dyslexia has caused him to rely on visualization and memorization. "It's perfect," he says. "In the sea, it's all dark…it's pitch black. But the water goes away and I see everything." He recalls a dive in 1986 to explore the Titanic. Everything went wrong. No sonar. No tracking. Landing 12,000 feet below surface in the mud, there were no signs of the Titanic to the other crew members. "It's over there," pointed Ballard. And, indeed, the Titanic was.

Dr. Ballard is also a keen proponent for empowering women. As he puts it "males as top leaders is by their design." Empowering women, he maintains, is a key to saving the human race. Accordingly, he mandates that 50% of his team be comprised of women.

Where Do We Go From Here?

Dr. Ballard is a problem solver - from 15 years spent restoring an earlier home to jigsaw puzzles (even when the 1,000 pieces are the same shade of blue, with no border pieces, holes in the puzzle, and extra pieces just for kicks.) But he doesn't have the ultimate answer. Will the human race survive? "I am a realist. The Earth is becoming aware of us and deeming us as a threat," he observes. "We still have time but indications are we are going in the wrong direction." What can we do? "Look at the first 12 feet around you. Look at what you are doing," urges the avid recycler. "Leave things better than you found them. That's what my grandmother taught me."

Just back from the last leg of a 7 month-long expedition by his Corps of Exploration, Dr. Robert Ballard was at his Lyme, CT home - busy summarizing the 2018 series of expeditions by his 64-meter exploration vessel, the E/V Nautilus. Yes, he discovered the Titanic in 1985 (old news, he says, of what was actually a cover for a top secret naval operation). Yes, his work caused a wholesale change in how science was taught by uncovering the secrets of plate tectonics and hydro thermal vents (a revolutionary revelation evidencing that sunlight wasn't needed to support life). And the 30-year naval veteran and /geologist/undersea robotics developer/explorer has for so many years revealed to the world human history lost beneath the sea with over 35 National Geographic television specials and countless books. After 150+ expeditions, starting at age 17, retirement isn't in the works for the 76-year old.

Our Oceans - The Last Frontier

Dr. Ballard's unrelenting pursuit of ocean education and exploration through his non-profit organization, the Ocean Exploration Trust ("OET"), is urgent. There are sobering facts: 95% of the Earth's population lives on less than 5% of the Earth's surface; farmland is being replaced with housing tracts; while 95% of all living space is located in largely unexplored international waters. But 90% of all large, predatory fish have been hunted down and killed. The carrying capacity of our planet is already at the brink. By 2050 we will not have enough food to feed everyone.

The Wichita, Kansas-born explorer explains that the Earth's waters, largely unexplored, are the human race's final hope. "I'm worried about the human race," he says. "The big question is, will the human race survive? The Earth will be fine. The planet is a creature. It was born. It evolves. It will die. It just has a long life expectancy. But there's no Plan B for the human race." The key, he says, is to move from hunting/gathering in the ocean to creating productive waters via deep sea farming - just as society thousands of years ago moved away from hunting and gathering on the Earth's lands and into organized food production. Every Ballard/OET/ Nautilus expedition provides vital information as to how our Earth's waters can provide for the survival of humanity. The programs run on



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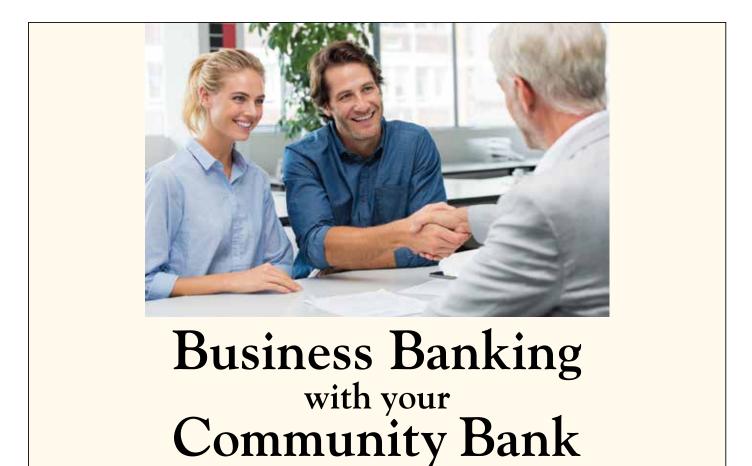
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
