

A stakeholder group will guide the community input and visioning for Centerbrook Village. 
Selectman Bruce Glowac is leading a capital committee focus group for the Town as we are examining a number of capital projects that may go out to bond this year. The projects are mostly for repairs to the school and Town Hall buildings, as well as necessary bridge repairs. The Town of Essex is currently seeking an engineering firm to provide engineering services for the preparation of construction contract plans and documents for the Rehabilitation of Walnut Street Bridge over the Falls River in Ivoryton, Connecticut.

Selectwoman Stacia Libby is chairing a committee who will oversee the work related to grant a recently awarded to the Village of Ivoryton. A \$435,000 Main Street Investment Fund (MSIF) grant for project work to enhance a shared "Village Center" around Main, Ivory Summit Streets in Ivoryton. The grant funds will be used for intersection improvements at Summit Street and Main Street; installing new cross walks, renovating existing crosswalks, and other improvements to help in the continued renewal of Ivoryton as a robust economic center. As a Clean Energy Community, Essex is excited to have been selected to participate in the Solarize Connecticut program. This is a great opportunity for our residents to take advantage of group pricing on solar array purchases or leases. The Town continues to seek and provide residents with opportunities for reducing energy costs and switching to cleaner energy options. This program helps to improve the environment while saving residents' money and promoting local jobs in such areas as project planning, site prep and installation.

Work on the Civic Campus Enhancement Project will be completed soon. This project, funded by a Small Town Economic Assistance Grant, has expanded the Town Hall parking area, replaced the Grove Street Park playscape, and improved pedestrian safety while connecting the campuses of the library and Town Hall. We will soon finish the rebuild of the tennis courts and all project landscaping.

The Town of Essex Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is accepting applications for volunteers under the Essex Emergency Volunteer (EEV) Program for 2014/15. The Town needs organized and skilled volunteers to respond to or recover from the impacts of large emergencies or disasters in our community. Special events and training dates will be held as needed. ## **Registrars of Voters**

Notice for publication: In Connecticut you must belong to a political party in order to vote in that party's primary. If you are registered as unaffiliated, you may switch to a party up to the day before that party's primary. If you are registered in a party, but want to vote in another party's primary, you must switch to that party at least 90 days before that party's scheduled primary.

In 2014 the scheduled date for statewide primaries is August 12. So, to switch party in order to vote in a different party primary, you must switch prior to May 14. Any questions please call us at 860-767-4340 ext. 142.

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## **Renter's Rebate Program**

#### **Department of Social Services**

Program starts April 1 and runs through October 1.

To qualify you must be 65 years or older or 100% totally disabled through Social Security and your income must have been less than \$41,600 for a married couple \$34,100 for a single person.

The following information is needed to complete the application for the 2013 Calendar Year.

**EXPENSES:** Rent receipts, letter from landlord stating what you paid for rent in the year 2013. Utility (Electric, water, oil and/or gas) receipts or statement from utility company. You can call CL&P for a printout at 1-800-286-2000 (have account number ready)

**INCOME:** Social Security SSA-1099 statement or print-out from the Social Security Office, bank interest, pensions, VA benefits or any other sources of income. If you file a federal income tax return, a copy of your return is required.

If you are filing as 100% disabled, proof of disability is required every year by the State of Connecticut. A statement from social security STATING TOTALLY DISABLED OR A TPQY FROM SOCIAL SECURITY DATED FOR CURRENT YEAR stating that you were disabled the previous year.

You must have all information to file your application. Filing period is from April 1, 2014 through October 1, 2014.

## New Connecticut Residential Building Code

#### Some Notable Code Changes in 2009 IRC

(Effective Feb. 28, 2014)

- Now exempt from permit: repairs limited to 25% of roofing or siding within one calendar year, sheds 200 sq. ft. or less in size. (R105.2)
- Where required by the Building Official, all braced wall lines shall be identified on the construction documents. (R106.1.1)
- Guards now required when walking surface is more than 30" to grade at any point within 36" horizontally from the edge of the open side. (R312.1)
- Now requires the height of guard rails to be measured from the walkway surface as well as from adjacent fixed seating. (R312.2)
- All smoke alarms must be listed in accordance with UL 217, (R314.1) OR,
- A household fire alarm system must be installed in accordance with NFPA 72. (R314.2)
- Drainage nuisances onto public way or adjoining property shall be a code violation. (R401.3.1)
- Minimum of two 1500# lateral load hold down tension devices required per deck. (R502.2.2.3)
- Window sills more than 72" above grade must be 24" above finished floor or operable window parts cannot allow the passage of a 4" diameter sphere. (R612.2)
- Water resistant gypsum board is not allowed as a tile

backer in tub and shower areas. (R702.4.2)

- Foam insulation installer shall sign, date, and post on job certificate of R value & thickness. (N1101.4)
- Energy efficiency certificate required posted at electrical panel prior to C.O. (R1101.9)
- Access doors to unheated spaces weather-stripped & insulate same as surrounding area. (N1102.2.3)
- Areas required to be sealed to limit air infiltration must demonstrate compliance by a blower door test or visual inspection by approved independent party. (N1102.4)
- First 10 ft. of service hot water piping and first 5 ft. of cold water pies from water heating tanks shall have minimum insulation value of R-2 installed. (R1103.4.1)
- Duct sealing tightness required to be verified by testing at rough-in or post construction. (N1103.2.2)
- Equipment and appliances supported from ground must be on a level slab or approved material at a minimum of 3" above adjoining ground. (M1305.1.4.1)
- Where space for a clothes dryer is provided, an exhaust duct system to the outdoors must be provided. (M1502.4.6)
- Shower liner test with 2" of standing water now required. (P2503.6)
- All 15a and 20a outlets shall be listed tamper resistant receptacles. (E4002.14)

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## 2014 Is An Exciting Year for Essex Historical Society

With a little over half 2014 left, Essex Historical Society has exciting times ahead! Please mark your calendars and set reminders on your computers and phones for all of the exciting programs and events we have scheduled.

April 8, 2014 was the Bicentennial of the British Raid on Essex, or the Burning of the Ships. EHS partnered with the Connecticut River Museum, the Essex Library, the Griswold Inn and Jerry Roberts to bring to light the entire story of the British attack on the town of Essex in 1814. Hopefully, you attended one of the 3 bonfires on April 8th for "Light up the Night" which was a commemoration of the lost ships of the war. British sailors and marines rowed up the river under cover of darkness to burn 27 vessels in Essex harbor. The entire Essex Battlesite reaches from the mouth of the Connecticut River at Old Saybrook to North Cove in Essex. One of EHS's contributions to the bicentennial is the creation of four graphic panels to be located at the sites of some of the most significant phases of the battle. The first will be at Gardner's Landing on Saybrook Point in Old Saybrook, marking the site of the old fort where the British first landed. The second panel will be found at the Foot of Main Street in Essex, where the British landed in force. With collaboration from the Essex Land Trust, the third panel will be located in Osage Trails Park at Falls River Cove where the British burned the largest ship built in Essex, the Osage. The final panel will be located at Ferry Landing in Old Lyme, where you can view the gauntlet from the D.E.E.P. boardwalk.

On behalf of EHS, the Archival Angels regularly maintain two display cases at the Essex Library. In honor of the Bicentennial of the British Raid on Essex, Jerry Roberts worked with the Archival Angels to design an exhibit which offers visitors an overview of the battle, its significance in State and National history, and where different events took place along the river. There are photos, artifacts and graphics in the display, so make sure not to miss this snapshot of our history.

May 10th will be the Annual Commemoration Day Parade, the Burning of the Ships, in Essex. In addition to the parade, there will be tons of activities for families and friends in town to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the British Raid. The Pratt House will be open from 10 am to 3 pm for tours. We will also provide walking maps of town and additional information on all of the activities of the day. EHS will have a special guest at Pratt House, Lynn Rankin, proprietress of the Polite Society's Traveling Tea Room. Come by and have tea and conversation with Lynn and learn more about life in Essex at the time of the Raid.

In addition to helping to plan all of the special events surrounding this bicentennial year for Essex, EHS has been hard at work developing other programs and events for the

community. On May 28th and 29th, three classes of Essex Elementary 4th graders will spend the mornings learning about spinning and weaving at the Pratt House and what it was like to be a student in 1900 at Hills Academy. This is a very interactive educational program for the children. On June 22nd, from 1pm to 4pm, we will host our Annual Strawberry Social on the grounds of the Pratt House. We will have old time games for children, as well as period music. Of course, we will be serving up our amazing strawberry shortcake. In addition, we will present our 4th Annual Preservation Award. Past years' winners have been the Ivoryton Library (2011), the Centerbrook Meetinghouse (2012) and the Ivoryton Playhouse (2013). 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## Bicentennial Commemoration of British Raid Begins in 2014

#### War of 1812 Celebratory Events are Planned

On Saturday, May 10th, a full roster of activities is planned to commemorate the 200-year anniversary of a significant event in Connecticut's history: the British raid on Essex during the War of 1812. All are welcome to participate.

Professional re-enactors from Maryland will present a historically accurate portrayal of British officers, soldiers and marines attacking and patrolling the town, while a regional re-enactment group will play the parts of the "local militia" attempting to defend the town. Additionally, there will be narrated boating excursions tracing the events that occurred along the Connecticut River, historic walking tours, special exhibits, period dining and musical events and even an 1814 Commemoration Ball. These events will surround the Commemoration Day Parade, also known as the Burning of the Ships Parade, hosted and led by the Sailing Masters of 1812, a fife and drum corps. This year will mark the Parade's 46th year!



"It was a brief but dynamic moment in our nation's maritime history yet this story has been virtually left out of the history books" Roberts declares, "- the forgotten battle of the forgotten war." Roberts and the British Raid on Essex Bicentennial Committee intend that the 1814 British attack – and the incredible story behind it - is forgotten no more.

Essex is recognized by the State Register of Historic Places as a War of 1812 Battle Site District. Designation as a Battle Site by the National Register of Historic Places is anticipated imminently.

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## Trash and the Connecticut River

In general, Essex is not one of those communities where trash in public places is a problem. Along the length of our Connecticut River shoreline, however, it is another matter. The amount of debris that accumulates along our shores is nothing short of amazing. Unfortunately, there seems to be a neverending supply of debris along the riverbanks.

The Connecticut River's steady flow towards its mouth brings with it logs, branches and other organic material that are swept into the river by storms, high tides and occasional flooding. It also brings with it an incredible array of items that have clearly been carelessly allowed to be swept away or dumped outright into the river.

For the past two years the Essex Land Trust has tried to do its part by focusing on cleaning up Essex's Great Meadow. This past Fall, on a bright and sunny Saturday morning, 65 volunteers dedicated three hours to gathering all kinds of trash including, significant quantities of Styrofoam, bottles, cans, car tires and more.

This effort is part of an annual program sponsored by the Connecticut River Watershed Council Participating. Called the Source to Sea Cleanup, each September communities along the 410-mile length of the Connecticut River dedicate themselves to cleaning up their shoreline. This past year, 2,227 volunteers collected a total haul of 45 tons, which included electrical appliances, furniture, automotive parts, and mattresses, among many other items.

The list of debris collected on the Essex Great Meadow is shown below.

Other Items Include: 6' x 3' plastic tub, 50 gallon plastic and metal drums, 30 gallon plastic drum, 2' x 4' plastic float,



fiberglass kayak, hunting tent, large float/raft, LP gas container (20 lb.), and a plastic sled.

Besides being unsightly, trash in our water bodies has a damaging effect on the environment particularly impacting wildlife and vegetation. One measure of this impact is the decomposition rate of common debris. The chart on page 23 illustrates how long items last in our environment, i.e., 200 years for aluminum cans and 450 years for plastic bottles.

The Connecticut River has come a long way from the 1950s when it was called the "best landscaped sewer in the country." The passage of the Clean Water Act and the ban on DDT in 1972 have done much to help the river recover to a Class B status, meaning that it is safe for all purposes excluding drinking. Turning to the future, our challenge is to build on the progress achieved by ensuring a cleaner and healthier river, one that would harken back to the days when the Algonquians gave it its name, the "quinetucket," the place of the long tidal river.

The Land Trust intends to repeat the Great Meadow clean up this coming September. The date has already been set: Saturday, September 27 at 9 am. So, mark your calendars!




Chart illustrating how long items last in our environment from article on page 22.

Essex was recently chosen as one of ten communities to join the Solarize CT program (www.solarizect.com), which is sponsored by the Clean Energy Finance and Investment Authority and Smartpower. Solarize CT is a program designed to encourage the adoption of residential solar photovoltaic (PV) systems by deploying a coordinated education, marketing and outreach effort, combined with a tiered pricing structure that provides increased savings to homeowners as more people in one community go solar. The program will offer a variety of financial options to purchase or lease solar equipment.

The Solarize CT program is based on a proven residential aggregation model designed to bring down the cost of solar PV when residents sign up for a pre-selected installer's offering. During the twenty week signup period, the more residents who sign up to install solar, the greater the cost reduction for every-one who participates. And because the installer, the technology and the exact price of PV are provided upfront, it is much easier for residents to make the decision to go solar. ## **Probate Court Update**

The last 36 months have been very busy for the Probate Court. As most of you know, in 2011, the individual town courts were merged into a regional court, serving nine towns. This merger was part of a statewide effort that reduced the number of Probate Courts from 117 to 54. The Saybrook District Court serves the towns of Chester, Clinton, Deep River, Essex, Haddam, Killingworth, Lyme, Old Saybrook, and Westbrook. The total population of these towns is over 62,000 citizens. As you can imagine, merging nine courts into one was not a simple matter, but with the help and cooperation of the former Judges and the significant effort of the clerks, we were successful in completing the task. The Court is now a full time court and is open week days from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. It is located on the second floor of the Old Saybrook Town Hall, at 302 Main Street.

The statewide consolidations have been a financial success in that it has saved the taxpayers \$8.5 million dollars, over the past two fiscal years and those savings will continue. Despite the increase in files, the Saybrook Court has been able to keep its budget the same over the last three and a half years.

Most people understand that we handle all aspects of decedent's estates, however the Court also handles a variety of other matters including determining the necessity to appoint conservators, reviewing the conservator's accountings and restoring conserved persons. We also appoint guardians both for minors, if they are going to inherit, and for adults with intellectual disabilities. We oversee testamentary trusts and trust accountings, we determine custody matters including termination of parental rights and visitation. We also handle name changes and adoptions. We do not process passports, as they are handled at the Old Saybrook Post Office which is just up the street from the Court.

We open and process approximately one thousand new matters, of all types, per year. Some of these matters require hearings and some do not. As a result I hold, on average, 15 to 20 hearings per week.

Last year the legislature adopted extensive new rules for probate court proceedings which went into effect on July 1, 2013. The purpose of these new rules is to simplify the probate process and to make it more consistent with other court procedures. Additionally, new forms, consistent with these rules, are available online at www.ctprobate.gov. Most of these new forms are fillable for the convenience of the public. The Court has been busy learning and implementing these new rules and forms. I will write an article about these changes shortly.

In addition to the normal duties of a Probate Judge, I was fortunate to be the only new judge elected to the Executive Committee of the Probate Court Assembly. The Executive Committee meets monthly to discuss the rules and policies of the Connecticut Probate Courts. I also joined the National College of Probate Judges, so that I can stay current with the national probate trends and procedures. In addition to attending state seminars regularly, I also attend national seminars annually.

Thanks to the efforts of the chief clerk Valerie Shickel, and the other clerks and assistant clerks, Sharon Tiezzi, Marjorie Calltharp, Stella Beaudoin, Helene Yates, Peggy Schroeder, Jackie Craco and Heather Graves, I am pleased to say the Court continues to operate smoothly and efficiently.

## **Trees on Mares Hill Road**

In an effort to promote greater collaboration within the community, Augie Pampel, Essex Tree Warden, called a public hearing on March 19, in accordance with Chapter 451, Section 23-59 of the Connecticut General Statutes and in response to public complaints about the planned removal/ pruning of approximately 40 trees on Town owned land adjacent to Mares Hill Road, Ivoryton, CT between #5 and #72 address locations. CL&P requested the removal of these trees to satisfy the trimming/removal specifications they follow on the road.

The hearing gave members of the public a chance to voice their concerns and CL&P a chance to provide an understanding of the specifications that are used for "Enhanced Tree Trimming ("ETT"). ETT is a severe form of trimming calling for an eight foot clearance zone on either side of the conductors and ground to sky.

Susan Stotts, the CL&P representative, presented slides of the various trees under consideration, indicating those she thought should be removed and those that could remain.

Augie Pampel reported at the hearing that he was authorized to make a decision about the trees within three days following the hearing, considering the public's input and after a walk-through of the trees with Susan Stotts. His decision would be based on the health of the trees including diseases as well as structural issues. He initially estimated that 20-25 of the trees might stay but each tree would need to be examined to make the final determination. He noted that the Town owns 20 feet on both sides of the road and that all the trees designated for removal are on Town property.

People raised concerns about the ground to sky regulation which was considered extreme and worried that the result would be the same as on route 153. Also some expressed concern about the impact of tree removal on the soil environment, water runoff and possible flooding if the soil becomes less absorbent. Other questions about a plan to plant new trees and the payment of the tree removal were raised.

Augie noted that the Town tries to replace as much as is possible and that CL&P pays for the tree work, leaving the wood for people to collect. The contractor for CL&P will follow CL&P specifications. Nonetheless, Augie and Susan Stotts will consider the residents' wishes to maintain the country road appearance when examining the trees. Augie clarified that the tree work done on Melody Lane and Hickory Lane was done on private property with the consent of the property owners.

Augie informed the public that there are no other Essex streets being considered for tree removal at this time. CL&P looks at streets with 40 or more customers and considers liability issues.

The general consensus at the hearing was that as many trees as possible should be preserved to maintain the country road affect while keeping in mind the necessity to avoid power loss and maintain access due to fallen trees.

Since the hearing, Augie Pampel, as Tree Warden examined the trees and posted the final decision on March 21, regarding



the tree removal on Mares Hill Road. Based on a review of all trees posted for removal, 17 will stay. The remaining trees will be removed because "they either have defects sufficient to warrant removal, or the CL&P ETT specification requires that they be removed." Augie will issue a removal permit to the CL&P contractor with this decision detail.

Though this is the final decision of the Essex Tree Warden, it should be noted that Chapter 451, Section 23-59 of the

Connecticut General Statutes states '...the Tree Warden shall render his decision granting or denying the application, and the party aggrieved by such a decision may, within ten days, appeal therefrom to the superior court or the judicial district within which such town or borough is located."
