First Selectman's Corner

Greetings from the First Selectman!

It's hard to believe that the summer is already gone and another holiday season looms just over the horizon.

A lot has happened over the last few months. We continue to make progress on developing our new municipal website, which will hopefully be online before the end of the year; Tom Fitzgerald has brought a new level of professionalism to managing the Town Hall maintenance department; the new Emergency Management Office has been completed; Parks and Recreation has moved from its successful summer programs to its anticipated fall schedule; primaries have been successfully held and we now prepare for November's presidential election; an Emergency Preparedness Guidebook has been published and circulated throughout town; roads and sidewalks have been repaired, and a new sidewalk and crosswalk added at the intersection of North Main and Grove Streets something long desired by local residents; a proposal for some additional property tax relief for seniors is almost complete; Scott Jeffrey is the new principle of Essex Elementary School and Joanne Beekley has assumed her new role as Assistant Superintendent for Region 4. On July 29th and 30th the Town participated in a Statewide Hurricane Drill, to help us prepare for a level 3 hurricane (it was a sobering experience).

A group of citizens, led by Selectman Joel Marzi, has undertaken the task of compiling a list of medium and long term capital needs for the Town. I'm hoping to get their report this fall, so that our citizens will have the opportunity to examine the list and determine what needs to be done now and for the future.

Notice from the Public Works Department

In order to proactively respond to pollution entering Long Island Sound, the State of Connecticut has implemented regulations to help stop pollutants from entering our stormwater system.

According to Phase II of the Storm Water Control Plan, the Town is responsible to identify the presence of illicit discharge into street drains and tributaries that flow out into Long Island Sound.

One way to prevent this pollution is to wash your vehicles on the lawn rather than in the driveway, where soapy water flows down into the street and then enters into the sewer system.

People are also encouraged to report any evidence of illegal discharges to the Highway Department at 860-767-0715.

We also remind people that free compost is available for pick-up for residents of Essex, Ivoryton and Centerbrook at the Essex Landfill. It provides excellent nutrients for gardens.

If residents wish to dispose of fallen leaves this season, they can bring them to the leaf collection area of the Landfill. Please restrict the disposal to only leaves (no bags, sticks, etc.). Thank you.

Essex Foundation Is Beneficiary of Funds from Sale of Alice Powers' House

Everyone in Essex knew her or knew of her. Alice Powers was a friendly, involved citizen, who during her more than 25 years in town, was deeply involved in dozens of important causes—from the Essex Land Trust, to Garden Club, to the Connecticut River Museum. And she wasn't just an ordinary member of the organizations she supported. She served as President of the Essex Land Trust during the years when decisions were being made concerning the Cross Lots property. She served for a number of years as the chair of the Essex Garden Club Scholarship committee, strengthening the club's commitment to help local youths

interested in college careers focusing on environmental and conservation initiatives.

Alice lived in her house on Maple Avenue until the last years of her life, surrounded by her favorite possessions and avidly tending her beautiful gardens and landscaped grounds. The house was left to The Essex Foundation to be used, according to the conservator, Anna Sweeney, as the Foundation saw

fit. According to David Hyde, the President of The Essex Foundation, the house has been sold to Paul Angellini and the funds from the sale will be dedicated to furthering the many community activities in which Alice was interested. The Foundation, which has been in existence since 1970, is a nonprofit, tax exempt corporation whose purpose is to receive and administer funds and other property to help meet the educational, social, welfare, cultural and civic needs of the citizens of Essex. The Foundation serves as a pool for funds for individual donors. For example, the Bumpy Warner Scout Building Fund administered by the Foundation has

been operating the Scout Building on Bushnell Street for many years. The primary purpose of the Foundation is to use funds to help fill needs that are not met by any other sources or organizations.

Alice Powers was born in Troy, New York. She was a graduate of the Emma Willard School in Troy and went on to graduate from Smith College in 1942. Before coming to Essex,

Alice was a Vice President for Human Resources at Young and Rubicam, one of the largest advertising agencies in the United States, who, in 1951 produced the world's first color television commercial. She maintained a host of friends from her agency days, some who had summer homes in Essex and who inspired her to retire here.

Alice loved the outdoors. An avid skier, she served for many years on the Board of Directors of the Amateur Ski Club of New York. She was especially fond of the club's lodge at Mad River Glen in Vermont. Her passion for skiing took her to slopes throughout Europe. Golfing was one of her favorite summer sports—and she was an active member of the Old Lyme Country Club. The Essex Yacht Club afforded her access to another favorite sport—sailing. She sailed and crewed on all types of sailboats and motor yachts and loved canoeing on the Connecticut River. And, she loved to travel—her last big trip, when she was 80, was down the Amazon River in South America.

Sister Cities Essex Haiti


The Sister Cities Essex Haiti Tennis Project is alive and well. We are grateful to Essex Events for including an article about its inception earlier this year and inviting us to send an update.

During the summer tennis clinics took place almost every day. Now that school is about to start, they will probably revert to clinics three times a week in the afternoons.



The Deschapelles Tennis coaches and players have been competing in Federation Tennis Haitienne tournaments for youth of 10 years and younger. The tournaments take place in Port au Prince, a two and a half hour trip from Deschapelles. The tournaments include several teams from the Port au Prince area as well as more from the outlying areas. The Federation has sponsored seven tournaments, and the Deschapelles Team has participated in four. James Adler Germinal, our 8 year old star, is now ranked #1 in Tennis 10 level throughout Haiti. In addition 5 of the top 20 ranked youth in the Tennis 10 level are from the Deschapelles Team.

The tennis coaches had shared their concern about many in the program who did not know how to read or write as they could not afford to go to school. When I suggested that those coaches who know how to read and write could teach them, one of the coaches pointed out that they had no books to do that. I promised to solve that problem. In June, fellow traveler and educator Diane Huot, who had been to Deschapelles 25 years earlier when her former husband volunteered as a resident from Yale University and I (Jenifer Grant) helped them set up a "Coin d'Enrichissement" in the building adjoining the court where they already stored their tennis equipment. We brought down books in French and Kreyol that have easy to follow step by step lessons in helping children learn to read and write. Each child received a lined notebook to use for writing letters and numbers. We also brought down little books with appealing stories, all written in Haitian Kreyol. We modeled reading to the children and carrying on discussion about the books for the Coaches who would direct this additional program after we left. The "pieces de resistance", however, were Pringle cans, emptied and filled with a variety



of writing materials such as pencils, crayons, markers, erasers, small water color paint sets, colorful pipe cleaners and wound up inside were pieces of blank paper to create artistic works. These thoughtful recycled Pringle cans were gifts from students in Deep River Elementary School's Art classes. Each can was covered with wonderfully decorated pictures on plain white paper, glued around each can. The coaches have continued this program, and a very nice aspect is that the children who do go to school enjoy it as much as those who do not. I am sure that they are as a great an asset in helping the unschooled learn to read and write as the coaches! When I return in November, I will bring math materials for them as well. This time we resorted to playing cards and a few puzzles that were math oriented for their numbers learning. Activities in the "Coin d'Enrichissement" have become an integral part of the tennis clinics and occur just after the clinic.

In addition, the tennis coaches have responded to requests from neighboring towns to come and introduce tennis to their youth. It provides them with an opportunity to either strengthen their own competitive team or to create small tournaments between towns in the area.

And, best of all, they now have 17 girls in their program.

In addition, as a "spin off" a Basketball clinic was held in Deschapelles, led by a former Deschapelles resident, Jackson Jules. M Jules has held this clinic for four years and he now has coaches in place to continue the clinics during the year. He and his coaches have expressed interest in having his project become part of the Sister Cities Essex Haiti/ODES organization.

So, as stated above, the Sister Cities Essex Haiti Tennis Project is alive and well and moving forward in Deschapelles, Haiti.





What's Your Best Side?

Are you claustrophobic? Can you tolerate having a CT scan? If so, you can now comfortably get an MRI at Middlesex Hospital, with its new "wide-open" MRI. Even for people who are not claustrophobic, the wide-open MRI provides a much more comfortable space during the exam than in the past.

"Open" vs. "Wide-Open" MRI

Many people believe that having an "open" MRI can eliminate the claustrophobia they feel when having the same test in a traditional MRI unit. These types of "open" MRI systems are only open on the sides, and the top of the magnet is still very close to the body. In addition, these MRIs are also usually "low-field" MRIs, and although they do give patients more room during the test, they also have a significant drawback — it takes a lot longer to obtain the same image quality as traditional, "high-field" MRI machines. To cut down on exam times, some lower-field MRI systems may not have the same image quality as a state-of-the-art, higher-field system.

Middlesex Hospital only uses high-field MRI machines, since they produce the clearest images — because the higher the field strength, the better the quality of the images produced. However, the opening in these traditional machines is considered too small by some larger or claustrophobic patients to allow them to be comfortable during the exam.

All that is changing at Middlesex Hospital. The Hospital now offers a new dimension in patient comfort — in its wide-open bore, high-field MRI that combines a much larger bore (circular opening) size and a much shorter "tunnel" (length). The new MRI looks just like a CT scanner, only a foot longer. The new wide-open bore design accommodates all sizes (up to a 550-pound patient) eliminating anxiety and claustrophobia. For many exams, both the feet and head remain outside the machine. The newer technology combines an open feel with the ability to capture high-field quality diagnostic images. In addition, the new MRI is quieter and may require less time to capture the necessary images.

Why should patients care about the quality of their MRI images? When your doctor orders an MRI, he or she is looking to get as clear a picture as possible of what is going on in your body. The best way to get a clear picture is to use the type

of technology that provides physicians with crisp and clear photos of the anatomy.

"This is great news for patients who may have chosen to receive a low-field, open MRI in the past," said Laurel Patt, Middlesex Hospital Director of Radiology.

The new "wide-open" MRI system at the Hospital is currently operational. In addition, the current MRI scanner at the Outpatient Center on Saybrook Road in Middletown will be replaced with a new, "super-high-field strength" MRI. This new MRI has double the field strength and can produce even clearer, more detailed images. It will be operational at the beginning of March 2013. The new Shoreline Medical Center in Westbrook will also have a brand new, stationary MRI system operational when construction of the facility is completed in 2014.

When using the new, wide-open MRI systems at Middlesex Hospital, patients will be comfortable, experience less noise, spend less time in the machine and can still be sure that their doctors will get the highest quality medical imaging. 
Healthy Eating through Healthier Habits for Seniors

Pump-out Boat Program to be Continued


When it comes to protecting our waters, Essex is doing a fine job. We are rated second best in Connecticut in pumpout boat activity. Connecticut is rated number one throughout the nation.

What is the Pumpout Program all about? It is a federally funded program that concerns itself with preserving the delicate balance of marine life in our coastal waters. For us, that means the Connecticut River and estuary in particular. This year, Connecticut received the highest grant of all the states, and we are putting it to good use.

Our Pumpout Boat operates on the Connecticut River from the East Haddam Bridge to Long Island Sound, safely removing thousands of gallons of sewage from boats annually. This sharply reduces the discharge of untreated waste and disease-carrying organisms into our local waters and harbors, protecting shellfish beds and swimming areas.

The Pumpout Boats, based here in Essex, go out to boats that are docked, properly anchored or moored in order to make this service available. The service is free to boaters.

The Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) has recently announced that one million dollars of federal funds will be available for the 2013 boating season. Along with helping to finance the Pumpout Boat, it also makes money available for private and public marine facilities to repair or upgrade their equipment.



Rated number two in Connecticut, Essex has reason to be proud of its Pumpout Boat accomplishments, which runs under the management of Joel Severance (Chester Harbor Management Commission) and Wally Schieferdecker (Essex Harbor Management Commission). We are doing our part to keep our waters clean and safe

Connecticut River Marks Half Century of River Rebabilitation Success

This article first appeared in the Essex Land Trust's Essex Woods & Waters in conjunction with this year's Connecticut River Watershed Council 'Source to Sea' cleanup. ELT's concentration this year was on Great Meadow, where the trust recently acquired 25 acres, increasing its holding to 79 of the parcel's 174 acres.

Flowing past our shores in Essex is what only can be described as a miracle in modern ecology: the recovery of the Connecticut River, which not so coincidentally started back in the 1960's political aura of flower children and environmental reawakening.

The river's improved quality has been so unique and exemplary that this year, on May 29th, the 412-mile long Connecticut River became the first U.S. river to be designated a "National Blueway." (Inland trails are sometimes known as "Greenways.")

U.S. Interior Secretary Ken Salazar made the presentation at a Hartford riverside ceremony. The citation applauded the many organizations in the watershed's four New England states working together for over 50 years to serve as a model for other watersheds. (The Connecticut's progress is even more impressive when compared to the daunting and costly cleanup still facing other rivers in the Northeast, such as the Passaic, the Hudson, and the Housatonic.)

The Big Picture, "Source to Sea"

Spearheading the annual cleanup effort by local volunteers for fourteen years now has been the Connecticut River Watershed Council, headquartered in Greenfield, Massachusetts. Since it's founding in 1952 it has been serving the entire watershed, from the river's headwaters in northern Vermont and New Hampshire on the Canadian border, to its estuary on Long Island Sound. According to Andy Fisk, the council's executive director, the annual cleanup event this year on September 29th is expected to include over 50 organizations along its route, including the Essex Land Trust.

Of course there is nothing new about ELT volunteers helping to clean up along the river. David Hyde recalls working with Al Macgregor, Jennifer Grant, Chet Arnold and other members in hauling debris by boat across South Cove from Thatchbed Island to dumpsters in the Essex Yacht Club's parking lot. That was almost a decade ago.

Meanwhile the Land Trust's haul of junk from the riverbanks has grown every year. As chief steward last year Macgregor recalls over 40 volunteers working on the shores not only of Thatchbed, along South Cove-including Turtle Creek but also Great Meadow. The collected litter included upwards of 1,000 glass and plastic beverage bottles, cans and lids, plus almost 2,000 Styrofoam items, not to mention six 55-gallon drums and 16 automobile tires.

From Kate to Congress

The river's comeback, however, certainly took time. Back in that enlightened environment of the sixties Ellsworth Grant, a resident of Hartford and Old Saybrook's Fenwick, wrote, photographed and produced the thirty-minute documentary film "The Long Tidal River." The film is narrated in lilting patrician tones by Grant's sister-in-law, none other than Katherine Hepburn, whose

own high profile undoubtedly helped the cause. In the film the river's scenic, historic and recreational virtues are extolled in words and pictures, while man's abuses to it are decried: "Fair, noble, glorious river has now become labeled 'the world's most beautifully landscaped cesspool."

The film was first telecast August 2, 1965 on WTIC, Hartford, and was shown at numerous locations throughout the state. Senator Abraham Ribicoff then had the text entered into the Congressional Record. That same year Connecticut passed its own Clean Water Act.

Then in 1972 the Congress overrode a presidential veto to pass the federal Clean Water Act. For the Connecticut River alone this meant almost \$900 million in federal funding for the construction or upgrading of 125 sewage treatment plants. Along with elimination of other sources of pollution, such as manufacturing runoff and waste, and with the passage of additional state and federal regulations, water quality in the river improved to the point that soon it was upgraded by the EPA from Class D to Class B. Most of the river again was swimmable and fishable (large shad and salmon populations had returned), and its wetlands protected in perpetuity.

But at the same time the question remained regarding protection of the river's esthetic and historic integrity. As a result in 1973 the Gateway Commission Compact was established largely to take a regional leadership role in response to the federal government's proposed establishment of three national parks recreation zones on the river. The one planned to be at bucolic Selden Creek just south of East Haddam alone was destined to bring thousands of visitors annually to the area. While having its detractors over the years, the compact has arguably served more than any other legislative vehicle to preserve the pristine beauty of the lower river.

The eight towns involved in the Gateway Compact are Haddam, East Haddam, Chester, Deep River, Lyme, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, and of course, Essex. The commission monitors local zoning regulations and insures compliance, particularly with regard to standards for erecting or modifying structures along the river. To this same end, the commission also has the right to limit the cutting of timber, the excavation of earth materials, and to acquire scenic easements, such as those protecting the views in part of Hamburg Cove and of Joshua's Rock overlooking the river.
