As fall ushers in the cooler temperatures, the Scarecrows have adorned the lampposts in our three villages, jumpstarting this season's events! Coming up is the 18th Annual Pumpkin Festival in Ivoryton on Saturday, October 20th; the Halloween Parade in Essex Village on October 31st; the Trees in the Rigging Carol Sing and Boat Parade on Sunday, November 25th and Ivoryton Illuminations on the first Saturday in December. I encourage you to support our local events, businesses and organizations. To find out more about what's happening in our three villages visit the Essex Board of Trade's website essexct.com and the Ivoryton Village Alliance website at ivorytonalliance.org.

With the increase in website traffic coming from smart phones and tablets, I'm pleased to announce the newly redesigned Town website, Essexct.gov on an upgraded platform with CIVICPLUS. This new responsive design will automatically reconfigure the layout of the website for different size screens and devices and offer increased security with an SSL Certificate. Please have a look and let us know what you think.

We are continuing to make progress on our goal of continuous sidewalks from the Connecticut River to Bushy Hill. Sidewalks along Main Street from the Essex Steam Train area to the center of Centerbrook will be getting an upgrade in the spring as a result of a STEAP Grant awarded to the Town. In addition to this, a recent Connectivity Grant for \$142,500 was awarded to the Town and will fill in some of the missing links in the corridor to complete the connection.

With the hurricane season still upon us, I encourage all residents to prepare an

emergency supply kit and have an emergency plan in place if you haven't already done so. The Town has an Emergency Preparedness Guidebook on the website and a link to sign up for the Safer Essex Emergency Alert Program to ensure you receive important community news.

Although it's easy to leave your vehicle unlocked with valuables inside, it is unsafe. Throughout the shoreline area vehicles are being gone through and valuables taken. If the keys are in the car they take them. The thefts are occurring at an alarming rate and residents should remember to lock their vehicles, homes, and garages. Economic Development Commission

Main Street, Essex Village draws thousands of tourists each year due to its proximity to the Connecticut River. To keep this a viable destination, Economic Development Commission Chair Janet Peckinpaugh submitted a project idea to the UConn Civil and Environmental Engineering Senior Design program. It has been chosen as the subject of one of 22 Senior Projects. Peckinpaugh and an EDC subcommittee will work with the design team's faculty advisor and department head on the project throughout the school year. The students will look at ways to update parking, walking biking and beautification of the Village.

The students will be collecting data, doing preliminary calculations and assessments and proposing several design ideas. Once the top design is chosen, they will make a final report that will include, drawings, a class presentation and a public poster presentation. The Economic Development Commission will review the proposal then make a public presentation.

"We are very excited to be partnering with UConn Engineers to come up with ideas that can help make our vision for the future a success. While Main Street, Essex Village is the main subject, we hope these findings can be applied to Centerbrook and Ivoryton as well," said Peckinpaugh.

Assessors' Office 2018 Revaluation Information

The Town of Essex is undergoing the state mandated revaluation project. The revaluation will be effective with the October 1, 2018 Grand List. This means that the first property tax bill you receive with the new assessed value will be due in July 2019.

A revaluation is the process of performing all the necessary market analysis, property review, and valuation steps to determine accurate and equitable values for all properties within town. The equalization of the values creates a fair distribution of the tax burden. The purpose of a revaluation is not to raise taxes but to create an equitable distribution of the tax load.

We will continue the property review process throughout the fall. Mainly properties that have recently sold or that have received building permits will be visited. Please keep in mind the following:

- 1. All persons driving in Town on behalf of the Assessor's Office have magnets on their vehicles identifying them as Assessors
- **2.** Their vehicles will be on file with the Essex Police Department and First Selectman's Office

- **3.** Any person knocking on your door for purposes of the revaluation will have a photo identification badge clearly affixed to the front of their clothing
- **4.** They will have a letter of introduction signed by the Assessor, Jessica Sypher.

We encourage all homeowners to allow the listers to do an interior viewing of the buildings so that the Town will have the most complete and accurate information. However, this is not mandatory.

You will be receiving notice of your new property valuation before the end of the year. There will be instructions and information included with the notice if you would like to have a hearing regarding the new value.



What is meant by revaluation?

Revaluation is a mass appraisal of all property within the town limits to equalize or bring about uniformity in assessed values.

Why is revaluation needed?

As the above indicates, the primary purpose of a revaluation is to eliminate any assessment inequities that may have developed since the implementation of the last revaluation (2008). A balancing or equalization of the town's real property tax burden among its taxpayers cannot be accomplished unless


revaluations of property are conducted on a regular basis.

When will the new assessments be effective?

The revalued assessment will create the 10/1/2018 Real Estate Grand List. You will be notified by Jan. 2019 of what the new value is. The tax bill you receive in July 2019 will be based on the new value.

Do they need to come into my house?

We encourage all homeowners to allow the "listers" to do an



interior inspection, however, you are not required to have an interior inspection.

Isn't fair market value what I paid for my property? Not always. The true test is what your property would sell for in today's real estate market.

Energy Assistance - Winter Heating Program 2018-2019

The Connecticut Energy Assistance Program (CEAP) is designed to help offset the winter heating costs of Connecticut's lower income households, specifically those households whose income falls at or below 60 percent of the state median income. CEAP is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) Block Grant. The Connecticut Department of Social Services administers CEAP, in collaboration with its partners, Community Action Agencies across the state.

Winter heating assistance pays for a household's primary heating source such as oil, natural gas, electricity, propane, kerosene, coal, wood and wood pellets on behalf of eligible households. The amount of heat assistance may not be sufficient to cover a household's entire winter heating cost. Homeowners and renters

may apply. Benefits are available to households with incomes up to sixty percent of the state median income.

Liquid assets include: checking, savings, CD's, stocks/shares, bonds, annuities, certificates of deposit and individual retirement accounts. Individual Retirement Accounts are considered to be liquid assets if the accounts are in the name of a household member who is 59-and-one-half years old or more. The purpose of the liquid assets test is to try to ensure that winter heating assistance dollars go to households most in need; that is, to people without the financial means to heat their home. For homeowners, the first \$15,000 in liquid assets, and for other households, the first \$12,000 in liquid assets, is disregarded. Any amount over that limit, when added to the annual gross income must be below the income guidelines. Income & "liquid asset test" applies all those

Household Size - includes homeowners and renters that pay separately for heat, and renters whose heat is included in the rent, as long as more than 30% of gross income is paid towards rent.







Diabetes and the Eye

Diabetes is a disease that affects your ability to produce or use insulin to effectively control the blood sugar (glucose) levels in your body. Too much glucose in the blood for an extended amount of time can damage many parts of your body, including your eyes. According to the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) about 90% of diabetes related vision loss can be prevented with early detection. Yet a study performed by researchers at Wills Eye Hospital saw that 60% of people with diabetes skip their annual exam needed to preserve their vision. It is imperative that people with diabetes get an annual dilated eye exam because ocular complications due to diabetes may show no signs or symptoms.

When blood vessels in the eye's retina swell, leak, or close off, or if abnormal new blood vessels grow, it is called diabetic retinopathy. Since last November, time had been at a standstill in Essex Village. The 158-year old town clock, housed in the cupola of the First Baptist Church on Prospect Street, stopped keeping time with the arrival of the cold weather. It had been keeping time and chiming on the hour for the past eight years when it was last repaired. Earlier this summer a proposal for new repair work was presented by Dick Adams, a Baptist Church volunteer whose duties include being the clock caretaker. The Town of Essex, owner of the historic clock, and The Essex Foundation, a nonprofit charitable organization, agreed to co-fund the overhaul of all motion works and transmissions behind the four dials of the clock, and the replacement of 100 feet of strike weight rope.

This September, Connecticut Timekeepers, a Stratford-based tower clock specialist, provided the services and returned the clock to full operation. Blast-All, Inc. donated the use of the lift and lift operator. The clock was a gift to the town from Theodore Dwight Pratt shortly before his death in 1860, with the provision that it be placed in the steeple of the Baptist Church. At that time, the church's steeple was the highest point in Essex and the town hall was located directly across the street. Tending to the clock has proved challenging over the years. Gravity powers the heavy granite weights suspended from the clock that keep the clock hands moving. Three times each week, the weights need to be wound up to a height four stories above the ground, an easy but tedious chore that is performed by Mr. Adams and volunteers Dot Buron and Matt Nuss. The location of the clock four stories above ground level makes it difficult to maintain the four outside faces that are exposed to extreme weather conditions. Repairs on the clock are expensive, and because the clock is located in a private building, town funds are not always available to cover costs.

The Essex Foundation has provided assistance in the past and looks to establish a designated fund for ongoing maintenance and repair. The hope is that the Town will also set up a sinking fund for the clock in its annual budget.



Essex Land Trust - Canfield Woods: Dedication to an Idea



In 2018, the Essex Land Trust is celebrating 50 years of preserving and enhancing our community's open space and natural resources for the benefit of future generations.

Canfield Woods is one of the area's most popular parks, a preserve of wooded trails, rocky outcroppings and abundant wildlife. Together with its contiguous neighbor Meadow Woods, the two comprise more than 300 acres of hilly, forested land with mixed old-and new growth forest.

It came into being 40 years ago, thanks to a team of citizens, town administrators and government agencies dedicated to the idea of preserving open space for the use and enjoyment of future generations.


Creating the preserve was no easy task, and, at one point, it looked as though the 226 acres would be offered up for the residential development for which it was zoned. In the end, it took patience, sacrifice and compromise to bring Canfield Woods into being. As such, it was an object lesson for those involved in future land donations on a grand scale, including the 1,000-acre Preserve.

It began with a 1976 proposal from Earl and Margaret Canfield, longtime residents of Deep River, to give over control of 226 acres in Deep River and Essex to be used as open space. The couple would donate half the appraised value of the land to the two towns, and they, in turn, would obtain the remainder of the funds from the Dept. of the Interior's Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR).

The Canfields had already made one gift to the Town of Essex, the continued on page 34



tract of land known as Meadow Woods. That had "met with such success that we chose to see this land [Canfield Woods] used in a similar fashion," Earl Canfield said.

The saga began in March of 1977. Jerome Silverstein, an appraiser chosen by the towns, walked the property and submitted an approximate valuation of \$3,500 per acre for the 116 acres of land in Essex, \$2,500 for the 109 acres in Deep River. Meanwhile, voters had authorized the two towns to apply for the federal funds that would help pay for the property and applications had been forwarded to the BOR.

Then, the state DEP called for a second appraisal. Robert Palmer, an appraiser chosen by the state and approved by the DEP, suggested the first appraisal was too high and the BOR would likely not accept it. The second appraisal came in at "slightly under \$2,000 per acre" and Canfield, saying he could not accept the latest figures, withdrew the offer.

It was the nadir; the year-old proposal looked dead in the water. Lorraine Wallace, Deep River First Selectman, expressed doubt

that talks would continue. Carl Ellison, First Selectman of Essex, expecting no further action by the town, says he's "disappointed that it did not work out." But the idea persisted. In late November, newly elected Essex First Selectman Richard Riggio set up a meeting with Canfield, Silverstein and Jerry Knight from the DEP's Open Space Acquisition Unit to come up with a third set of figures. "We think we will finally get this thing completed," Riggio said. Canfield re-opened his offer, expressing hope that a middle ground can be found between the two appraisals. The meeting resulted in an agreement between Silverstein and Knight to study Silverstein's original figures.

The DEP completed its review in mid-February 1978 and a compromise appraisal figure of \$497,200 was reached, \$185,000 less than the original figure, \$64,000 higher than the DEP's appraisal. Canfield, the DEP and both towns accepted it. The BOR still had to OK the figures and release the funds. In early May, word came from Capitol Hill in Washington that the BOR had accepted the figures and US Rep. Chris Dodd said a formal announcement was "imminent." On May 25, the BOR accepted the appraisal figure. It was the last major hurdle. The closing took place in September at the Essex offices of the Connecticut River Estuary Regional Planning Agency where Canfield signed over deeds to 226.09 acres to the towns. Ending 40 years of what he termed his family's stewardship of the land, Canfield said, "[We] derive great pleasure knowing that generations of people will enjoy Canfield Woods." Said Deep River First Selectman Wallace, after "two and a half years of ups and downs, we've at last come to this. I'm pleased."

Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger

Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer, the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. In fact, the inaugural art gallery exhibition (Horses: In Harmony) takes place from September 28 to October 26. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."
