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### First Selectman's Corner

I am happy to announce that the Finance Director has reported to the Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance that based on the preliminary, unaudited results of the fiscal year 2012-13 budget, the town should expect a surplus in excess of \$947,000. The Board of Education has a reported surplus of roughly \$97,000. This results in a total anticipated surplus for both the Town and School budget of over \$1,044,000. The town realized this surplus through savings in both personnel and non-personnel line items, by replacing retired staff with new personnel at lower rates, and with the cooperation of department heads, keeping routine expenses to a minimum in light of unexpected costs incurred as a result of Hurricane Sandy and the February Blizzard.

The majority of the surplus will go directly to the Undesignated Reserve. This is the fourth year in a row that the Town has been able to produce a surplus, which has helped rebuild the Undesignated Reserve from \$2.2 million to almost \$5.2 million. I would like to thank department heads and their staff for cooperating with efforts to keep the budgets in line particularly when there were concerns about the costs associated with the two storms.

This past August, the Town through the efforts of the Parks and Recreation Department, had a rededication ceremony of the renovated Jacob's Beach. Parks and Recreation should be commended for the outcome of the project. The Town has

received many compliments about the improvements. The rededication was to commemorate Phase I of the project. Phase II will begin this fall with the construction of a boardwalk. Due to the renovations and the purchase of beach cleaning equipment, attendance has increased at the beach this year.



The Marina bulkhead and new fencing have all been completed and this greatly improves the appearance of the marina and its structural integrity.


This past summer Guilford hosted a number of events on the Green, including the summer concert series, which were widely attended. Other events included the annual Art Center Craft Expo and Shakespeare on the Green sponsored by the Shoreline Arts Alliance and their contributors.

A number of road improvements were made over the summer. The Engineering/Public Works Department chipsealed 11 miles of road, encompassing 19 roads. The department also did a number of major road repairs as well.

The Town has implemented an upgraded Everbridge Notification System, which will allow town officials to immediately notify residents who sign up to receive notifications of any emergency and non-emergency alerts.

It's important to stress that citizens must sign up in order to receive these notifications, which can be done through a link on the town website. You can register as many devices as you wish such as cell phones, land lines, and tablets etc. This will greatly improve our communication abilities with our residents particularly in emergency situations, but also for major event notifications.

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### Guilford 375th Anniversary

On Tuesday, December 31, Guilford Generations Jubilee, a day of fun and festivities for all ages, launches a year of signature celebrations marking the founding of Guilford in 1639. The event, which begins at noon and continues until 8 p.m., takes place at several venues on and around the Guilford Green.

The day opens in front of Guilford Town Hall, where an "aerial" photo will be taken from the bucket of a fire truck of all those gathered below. Photos will be available for sale from Chamber of Commerce members sometime after the event.

Following the photo, Sam Allery, the Guilford student who came up with the name Guilford Generations Jubilee, will lead a noise parade of musical merrymakers around the streets surrounding the Green. Their horns, pots, pans, spoons and other noisemakers are sure to create a racket heard throughout the town.

During the afternoon, young and old can participate in varied activities and games at the Community Center, where they'll find among other things, face painting, temporary tattoos, ballroom dancing, billiards and arts and crafts, as well as a room where they can stomp on bubble wrap.

Also in the afternoon, nearly twenty musical groups will present concerts at Christ Episcopal Church, Christian Science Church, First Congregational Church and St. George Church. Wristbands to attend these performances will be available in advance at the Guilford Parks and Recreation Department and at Page Hardware & Appliance Co. They may also be purchased the day of the concert at the Community Center. The prices of the wristbands, which admit wearers to all concerts at all venues, follow: children 4 to 14, \$8.00; adults 15 and older, \$12; seniors, \$10; family packet (any number of family members),

\$24. Concert goers who buy their wristbands before December 15 will receive a discount.

At twilight, a bonfire will be lighted at the northern end of the Green. All are invited to watch, get warm or help fan the flames with bad paperwork, including report cards, they've received during the year.

Lighting up the darkened sky and capping the Guilford Generations Jubilee will be a high-shoot fireworks display visible from the Green and surrounding streets.

Local restaurants, food trucks and St. George Hall will offer a selection of hot and cold foods and beverages for sale. Commemorative green and navy T-shirts, hats and mugs are already on sale at Bishop's Orchards, Guilford Food Center and Page Hardware & Appliance Co.

Throughout the day, shuttle buses, including a bus that can accommodate the handicapped, will pick up passengers at the commuter lot on the north side of I-95 at Exit 58, at Elizabeth C. Adams Middle School at 233 Church Street and at Calvin Leete Elementary School, 280 South Union Street, and drop them off at the Community Center, Guilford Town Hall and St. George Church.

The Guilford Generations Jubilee, as well as the other Guilford 375th Anniversary events that will take place during 2014, are made possible through the generous support of businesses and residents. ### Assessor's Office

PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATIONS must be filed by November 1st. Penalties will be applied to non-filed declarations. The Declaration is available on the Town's website: www.ci.guilford.ct.us/town-departments/personalproperty.htm

The following is an abbreviated look at some of the exemption programs that the Assessor's Office administers. Some programs are State Programs which means it is available in all towns. Some programs are Local Programs which means it is available in Guilford and only available in other Towns that have also passed an ordinance authorizing that particular program. If you think you might be eligible for any of these programs, please call the Assessor's Office, Monday through Friday, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm for more information. There is also additional information about these programs (and other important information) on the Town's website: www. ci.guilford.ct.us under Departments; Assessor's Office. Please note: Exemptions are always stated in assessment dollars. To calculate the actual tax savings, multiply the assessment exemption amount by the appropriate mill rate (e.g., the assessment exemption amount is \$1,000 and say the mill rate is 22.36 so the tax savings is \$22.36 or \$1,000 times 0.02236).

ONE SPECIALLY EQUIPPED OR SIGNIFICANTLY MODIFIED MOTOR VEHICLE (LOCAL OPTION) owned by the applicant as of October 1, 2013 and used exclusively for the purpose of transporting the medically incapacitated owner is exempt if such vehicle is not for hire and the required application is filed with the Assessor's Office by November 1, 2013, or for such motor vehicles purchased after October 1, 2013, within 30 days of purchase.

ONE MOTOR VEHICLE FOR AN ACTIVE DUTY SERVICEMAN (STATE PROGRAM) is exempt if the motor vehicle is registered in Guilford. Forms for this exemption are available from the Assessor's Office and must be filed no later than December 31, 2014 for taxes due and payable July 2013.

**DISABLED SERVICEMEN OR EX-SERVICEMEN** (STATE PROGRAM) may apply for an additional exemption by filing

### **Registrars of Voters**

On November 5th, Election Day, we will be initiating a brand new program, Election Day Registration. Here's how it works. If, on Election Day, you realize that you really want to vote but are not registered, please come into our office in Town Hall and you will be able to both register and vote. Simple as that! Just make sure you have identification that has both your name and Guilford address on it. This new program does not preclude registering before Election Day; mail-in registrations will be accepted until October 22 and inperson registrations until October 29. We highly recommend that you plan ahead and register well before Election Day, but if you miss those deadlines you can do it on Election Day. Form 20-5455a (issued by the Veterans Administration) with the Assessor's Office by January 31, 2014. The Amount of the assessment exemption will vary depending on the degree of disability.

**FARM AND OPEN SPACE** (STATE PROGRAMS) applications must be filed between September 1, 2013 and October 31, 2013.

**FORESTLAND** (STATE PROGRAM) applications must be filed no later than October 1, 2013.

FARM BUILDINGS (LOCAL PROGRAM) used exclusively for farming activities by farmers who are receiving an exemption for their farm equipment are eligible for an assessment exemption of \$100,000. An application must be filed no later than October 31, 2013.

FARM MACHINERY (STATE PROGRAM) used exclusively by a qualifying farmer may qualify for a \$70,000 assessment exemption. An M-28 Form must be filed no later than November 1, 2013.

FARM MACHINERY (LOCAL PROGRAM) used exclusively by a farmer who qualifies for the above described program may be eligible for an additional \$100,000 assessment exemption. An M-28 Form must be filed no later than November 1, 2013.

### How to Avoid A Facelift

No one enters into young adulthood expecting to have a face-lift one day. Unfortunately, many of us do not care for our skin when we are young and find ourselves in a bit of a predicament at a certain age. Even though aging is inevitable, there are a few things you can do to slow it down and a few tricks in the beauty bag to reverse some damage

The most important step when you are young is to protect your skin from the sun. The sun is not your friend. It may be warm and comforting, but it is not your friend. If you didn't wear a sunscreen when you were younger, I suggest you start today. Not my moisturizer has an SPF of 15, but a separate sunscreen. If you have young girls in your life, children, grandchildren, etc. please pass along the message.

If you smoke, it's time to stop. Smoking robs your skin of oxygen and nutrients by constricting the blood vessels in your skin, resulting in skin with no vibrancy and even a grayish hue. Smoking also breaks down collagen which is the support system in your skin, leading to wrinkles and sagging. And if that wasn't enough, the physical act of puffing on a cigarette and having smoke rise up into your eyes can cause deep set wrinkles around your eyes and mouth.

If you're still slapping on a moisturizer and running out the door in the morning, it's time to re-evaluate your routine. That barely worked when you were twenty. 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### Harbor Moorings

There is a State requirement for all moorings in Connecticut waters to have a permit issued by a State appointed Harbor Master. In my capacity as the State appointed Harbor Master for the Town of Guilford, I am required to perform duties specified by Connecticut General Statutes consistent with an approved Harbor Management plan. Fortunately, the Town of Guilford has a State approved Harbor Management Plan that was prepared by a local Harbor Management Commission with inputs from the public and various town governmental departments. This ensures a mooring permit process that is locally controlled to implement State requirements in a manner that best serves Town residents.

Permits can be submitted electronically via the internet or on paper applications. Applications are available at Town Hall or the Town Marina. To submit an electronic application, you access the online mooring system at http://permits.onlinemooring.com/GuilfordCT/. There is a link to this system on the Harbor Management Commission's page on the town's website. Applications must be mailed to the Harbor Management Commission, along with a \$25 fee, at 31 Park Street, Guilford, CT. If the application is submitted electronically using the online mooring system, the applicant must print his application and mail it with his fee. We are working to implement an on-line electronic payment system.

Once the application and fee is received by the Guilford Harbor Management Commission, it is reviewed by a representative of the Guilford Shellfish Commission and upon his/her approval it is forwarded to me. If all the required information is provided and there is no valid reason to disapprove the application, I assign a mooring identification number and issue a permit to the applicant. Permits expire on

December 31 and must be renewed annually. Permits are not transferable.

There are several reasons why moorings must have a permit issued. When the Connecticut Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (DEEP) reviews an application for a shellfish permit, one of their considerations is whether or not there is an existing mooring at the location. If moorings are not legally permitted, DEEP would not be aware of their existence and there is the potential for a commercial shellfish operation to be approved which will prohibit any future mooring permits at that location. Also, if a non-resident properly submits a mooring application, it may be approved and a resident who desires to have a mooring at that location will not be able to do so.

A final reason to obtain a permit is that the Town of Guilford recently passed an ordinance to enforce the requirements of the Harbor Management Plan. Each violation is subject to a \$100 municipal citation, and "...each day of the violation shall be considered a separate offense and subject to separate citations."

As I patrol the shoreline, my focus is to educate the public of the requirement to obtain a permit and assist them in processing their application. I am confident that most boaters will adhere to the requirement and minimize the issuance of citations. Boating is meant to be enjoyable. The mooring permit program will ensure our shores remain safe and enjoyable for all our residents.



### Dental Care - A Partnership Between Patient & Professional

Patients often ask, "How often should I have my teeth cleaned?" The standard answer used to be "every six months". But recent studies and advances in oral health have shown that this may not be the case. Personalized care, tailored by recommendations from your dentist is now the rule. Oral health, like physical health, is a partnership between the patient and their dental professionals.

In the June 10 issue of the Journal of Dental Research, researchers from the University of Michigan School of Dentistry explored the link between long-term tooth loss and frequency of preventive dental visits in adults with and without three risk factors for periodontal disease, smoking, diabetes and interleukin-1 genetic variations. The study concluded

that individual risk factors help to dictate the frequency of cleanings needed per year to help prevent periodontal disease. Based on data analysis, researchers speculate that high-risk patients would likely benefit from more frequent dental visits, while low-risk patients may see the same benefits from only one cleaning per year. The key takeaway for consumers, underscored by this study, is that personalized oral care is a necessity for good dental health. The ADA encourages people to work closely with their dentists to identify any potential risk factors that would determine the need for and frequency of follow up visits to enhance the outcomes of preventive care.

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### The Joyful Noise!


The Joyful Noise! Concert Series at First Church Guilford

Considered by many to be one of the few authentic voices of the most American of musical styles, the blues, Josh uses his concert settings to make audiences of all ages familiar with the music that made his families name a household word from the mid-thirties thru the folk boom of the sixties. Along with his unique arrangements of folk, blues and jazz, Josh brings to his concerts the continuity of the authentic music of the rural, southern blues tradition that emerged during the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

"I guess that the apple does not fall far from the tree", says Josh in reference to

There were work songs, spirituals, chants and ballads. As I was growing up, Josh taught me those songs and told me the stories surrounding how those songs came to be written.

And now I bring those stories and songs to a generation that has grown up on rock and roll, a musical idiom whose very roots come from the songs my dad made famous at Café Society Downtown in New York City."

Like his Dad, Josh, Jr. began his singing career at an early age. "The story goes that I was just four years old when my Mom took me to Café Society Downtown to see my Dad perform. Dad started singing "One Meat Ball", a song that I knew from home, and, during the chorus, I chimed in and began singing along. The spotlight operator heard me singing and moved the light from Dad to where I was standing on a stool singing."

"You should have seen the smile on Josh's face when it happened" said Josh, Ir's mom, Carol. "Josh put down his guitar, walked over and grabbed Josh, Jr. in his arms and they finished the song together, center stage." And Josh has been singing ever since.

Josh, Jr. incorporates the blues, spirituals, songs of protest, ballads and work songs into his concerts in a musical collection of American songs, both historical and contemporary that makes for a most entertaining afternoon.

As Mark A. Cole of Big City Blues magazine said, "...he is a master of vocal inflection and involvement; Josh White, Jr.

pushes his envelope and shows why he is considered one of music's premier vocalists and performers... solid folk/blues, nothing short of magnificent!"

When questioned about the authenticity of the material that Josh performs, Elijah Wald, author of the most complete biography of Josh White said, "There are some other relatives of older blues artists performing, but none who were raised as performers together with their famous parent and worked together for years, and can show the direct transmission of the style the way Josh White, Ir. can."



### Cats Are Unique Animals

Anyone who owns a cat appreciates the fact that cats are not just small dogs. Feline Urinary Tract Disease (FLUTD) is an example of a disease syndrome specific to cats that dogs do not experience.

FLUTD is a group of diseases that affect cats' urinary bladder and urethra. These diseases include sterile cystitis (inflammation of the bladder), urinary tract infection, bladder stones, or a urethral obstruction. The signs cats exhibit are usually the same regardless of which underlying disease is causing them. These signs include urinating outside the litter box, straining to urinate, urinating more frequently, bloody urine, over grooming of the genital region, and urinating on cool surfaces such as the bathroom sink or bathtub.

Since multiple diseases can cause any combination of the above signs, it is very difficult to know which specific disease is causing the problem just by how a cat is acting. Owners are critical in helping veterinarians narrow down the list of diseases by sharing which signs their cat is experiencing, discussing what they feed including treats, and describing the cat's environment at home. It is almost always necessary to perform diagnostic tests, as well, to complete the picture and obtain a diagnosis. Diagnostics may include x-rays of the urinary tract, microscopic evaluation of the urine, urine culture, and blood work. All of these diagnostics are not necessary in every case, however the more tests performed,

the more information is provided and the more accurate the diagnosis. Obtaining normal or negative test results should not be viewed as a waste of time or money. Normal test results have useful information, knowing what disease is not responsible helps narrow down what disease it is.

Treatment for FLUTD is specific to the underlying disease causing the signs. Urinary tract infections require antibiotics, bladder stones often require surgery, and obstructions require urinary catheterization and hospitalization. In cats younger than 10 years old with lower urinary tract signs consistent with FLUTD, sterile cystitis is the most common diagnosis. Urinary tract infections are quite rare in cats younger than 10 years of age, but are the most common diagnosis in cats older than 10 years old. Sterile cystitis is unlike the other conditions because there is not one therapy that will resolve the illness, it often takes multiple therapies and is controlled over the life of the cat, it is often not curable.

Finding successful treatment for sterile cystitis is important since it is the most common disease causing inappropriate urination around the house and pain for the cat. It is important to realize that cats that are urinating outside their litter box are doing so because of a specific stress, change in environment, or illness causing sterile cystitis and are not being spiteful. Environmental stressors include number and location of litter boxes, human factors as how many people live in the house, if anyone has moved in/out recently, interactions with other pets in the house or feral cats outside the house, construction occurring in and around the house, or even change in seasons. Once your veterinarian diagnoses sterile cystitis by performing the examination and diagnostics listed earlier, the veterinarian can provide ways to treat the cystitis. Resolving the cystitis will resolve a painful condition for your cat and prevent you from becoming angry and resentful towards a beloved member of the family.

Management of sterile cystitis includes increasing hydration, providing a safe place for your cat in your house which includes the presence of catnip, low fat treats, cat trees, and scratching posts for your cat to retreat to in times of stress. Increasing the number of litter boxes, varying their locations or what type/amount of litter can help. Giving your cat more individual attention or increasing exercise can help, especially since most cats with sterile cystitis are overweight. Still some cats do benefit from Feliway, a cat pheromone product, that when smelled decreases anxiety. Medical treatments including glucosamine to decrease inflammation in the bladder or antianxiety medications are sometimes an option. Antianxiety medications are saved for last resort because almost every cat can be helped by changing their environment as listed above.

Every cat is different and treatment needs to be tailored to the individual cat, that's where having a discussion with your veterinarian is critical in developing a plan for your individual cat's needs.

Important Note: <u>Urethral obstruction is a life threatening condition if not treated quickly.</u> Obstructions have the same signs as the other diseases that cause FLUTD, but the cats are usually acting more distressed, painful, or vocalizing while trying to urinate. The safest thing to do is bring your cat to a veterinarian for an exam to determine if there is an obstruction or not. Obstructions are much more common in male cats than females due to male's narrow urethral tract.

### Parks and Recreation Commission

The Guilford Parks and Recreation Commission has been working diligently on the Jacobs Beach Project with staff and Architect Will Thompson and Landscape Architect John Cunningham during the spring and summer months to make improvements to Jacobs Beach Park. Due to the improvements, the department saw an increase in the number of people on the beach throughout the summer.

With a \$500,000 Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) grant, the improvements included a re-graded parking lot with drainage and landscaped islands, the installation of two new shower pedestals and drinking fountains, an irrigated grass strip between the beach and parking lot, guard rails, stone dust walkways, and shade trees. Other improvements not included in the STEAP grant include skylights in the restrooms, new fixtures, and the purchase of a beach groomer. This machine removes many of the shells, stones, seaweed and other debris. It has clearly improved the quality of the beach sand.

On August 23, the park improvements were celebrated with a dedication ceremony, inflatables and activities for the kids, food and a concert. First Selectman Joe Mazza, State Senator Ed Meyer and Parks and Recreation Commission Chairman Ralph Schipani spoke and recognized the sub-committee that included Parks and Recreation Commissioners Barbara Pine and Sue Robins, Building Committee member Jim Goodridge, residents Joe Nugent and Carolyn Grave, Parks and Recreation Director Rick Maynard and Recreation Supervisor Ellen Clow. Over 300 people attended the festivities.

Phase 2 of the Jacobs Beach Park improvements will be the installation of a boardwalk from the playground area to the bath house. The boardwalk will improve accessibility at the beach and provide a safe path between the playground and the bath house. It is expected to be built in the fall.



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
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
