



First Selectman's Corner

Needless to say we are all happy to say goodbye to winter and we welcome Spring with open arms. It has been a very difficult winter, particularly the month of February and beginning of March for all of us, but especially for our Public Works employees. They worked tirelessly to keep our roads open and safe during these unprecedented winter conditions. I would like to extend my gratitude to all of them for their efforts. Moving on to better days, we will prepare for warmer weather, however, there will be no rest for the weary since we now have to deal with the myriad of repairs to town roads, which includes filling pot holes and restoring curbing. This work will continue throughout the spring and summer and we ask for your patience during this time.

The Board of Selectmen and Board of Education submitted their budgets to the Board of Finance for consideration and on March 9, the Board of Finance approved the budgets as submitted and forwarded them to referendum on April 21, 2015. The budget totals \$90,703,425 and represents a 3.06 percent spending increase over the 2014-2015 budget. The Board of Finance estimates this would result in a tax increase of .82 mills or 2.99 percent, which is lower than it has been in prior years.

Guilford continues to have good news on the economic development front. The 66 High Street project has been approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission and construction should begin by early summer. The Guilford Food Center has been purchased

and will be remodeled this spring as an expanded market place with an indoor café called *The Marketplace at Guilford Food Center.* The new owners also plan to retain former owners Ron and Ray Rosa as part of the new operation. Even through the horrible winter months work continued on Guilford Commons. We still eagerly await DDR's announcement of the other tenants they have secured.

There are thousands of moments that inner-city children remember about their Fresh Air summers: walking barefoot through the grass, roasting s'mores over the campfire, or swimming for the first time.

Guilford residents, Doug and Brenda Fannon and their family have hosted Fatima, of the Bronx, for the past two summers. "It's really not a tough commitment," says Brenda, "Fresh Air kids just want to participate in what we consider everyday summertime activities. And it's been a great experience for our kids - to share what we often take for granted."

Doug adds, "While nearly 4,000 children were placed last summer, only three came to Guilford. We truly believe that if other

families in town were aware of this opportunity, that number would grow dramatically. Host families are needed."

The Fresh Air Fund, an independent, not-for-profit agency, has provided free summer experiences to more than 1.8 million New York City children from low-income communities since 1877. Fresh Air children are boys and girls, from 6 to 18 years old, who live in New York City. Children are matched to each family based on age, gender, and interests. Those on first-time visits are 6 to 12 years old and stay with host families for one or two weeks.



Assessor's Office

Elderly tax relief applications will be taken in the Assessor's Office, between February 2rd and May 15th during the hours of 9:00 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday. If you are unable to come in, an agent of your choice may file on your behalf. Please bring all proofs of income for both spouses (for the year 2014), including (but not limited to) your Federal Income Tax Return (if you file or will file), your Social Security (SSA-1099 Form) annual statements, statements of pension, interest or dividends, etc. All information must be in English and U.S. dollars. Homeowners Program A.k.a. Circuit Breaker (State Program)

Under this program, the State of Connecticut pays a portion of your tax bill ranging from \$150 to \$1,250. There is no requirement to re-pay the state.

The basic requirements are as follows:

The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date; The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year; The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state; The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; and The homeowner must have income (including Social Security) of not more than \$34,600 for a single individual or \$42,200 for a married couple.

Tax Deferral A.k.a. Gstrp (Town Program)

This program allows you to "defer" up to 75% of your taxes (depending upon income) until either the property is transferred or at the time of your death (at which time the taxes must be re-

paid with interest). The deferred taxes constitute a lien on your property. The basic requirements are as follows:

The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from social security as of that date; The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year; The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state; The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; and The homeowner must have income (including social security) of not more than \$36,100 for a single individual or \$43,600 for a married couple.

Elderly Tax Relief Program A.k.a. Etrp (Town Program)

Under this program, the Town attempts to "freeze" your taxes subject to budgetary restrictions and the requirements of the enabling ordinance.

The basic requirements are as follows:

The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date; The homeowner must have lived in Guilford for at least one year; The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; The homeowner, if eligible, must be on the State Program known as Circuit Breaker (see left column); The homeowner must not owe any taxes (including motor vehicles); The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state; The homeowner cannot be on both the town's tax deferral and this program; and The homeowner's income is based upon residency (as follows):

Guilford: A Destination for Special Occasions

Planning a special occasion in 2015?

Consider the wide-ranging picturesque backdrops that set Guilford apart as a Shoreline destination. Relatively inexpensive and abundant in sentimental and scenic appeal, your hometown's public parks can be an exceptional value when celebrating life's special moments.

"There is so much beauty in Guilford," says Rick Maynard, Director, Guilford Parks and Recreation. "From the rural, New England attraction of North Guilford to the gorgeous shoreline with public beaches and public access, Guilford is just a great place to live, visit, and grow up in." Maynard fields phone calls all year long from individuals, civic groups, and organizations looking to reserve outdoor town parks as well as rooms in the Community Center for a host of occasions. While no alcohol is allowed in any public space, which limits the type of receptions possible, there are plenty of occasions where such a policy works for all involved.

Of particular note, Guilford's 375th Anniversary celebration last year ushered in two more scenic venues for intimate, special occasions like weddings, renewal of vows, and milestone anniversaries and birthday parties.



Rollwood Park

The first Rollwood Park wedding occurred on September 27, 2014. It was a beautiful day and location, enjoyed by all in attendance. Rollwood Park (cover photo)

is situated directly adjacent to the historic Henry Whitfield State Museum and has a history of its own. Once the site of the home of Governor Rollin Woodruff, who was the 62nd Governor of Connecticut from 1907 to 1909, today it stands as a "pocket park" for all to enjoy. Thanks to the vision and hard work of the Guilford Garden Club, which celebrated its 75th Anniversary during the Town's 375th, the spot is now a peaceful, serene destination lovingly landscaped with 17 new trees, 260 yellow daffodils, two granite benches, and additional walkways and plantings. Rollwood Park was officially handed over to Guilford Parks and Recreation last June in a ribbon-cutting ceremony marked as a 375th Anniversary event.

Chittenden Park

Chittenden Park, situated on the shore of the Long Island Sound, was also the site of a ribbon-cutting dedication in June 2014 as a signature 375th event. The Park has been designated an Estuary of National Significance by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and is the official southern gateway to the New England Trail, America's 11th national trail (alongside the Appalachian Trail and the Oregon Trail).

The recent construction of a boardwalk, overlook platform, and kiosk, funded by the Connecticut Forest and Park association (including a \$10,000 grant awarded by The Guilford Foundation), now positions the Park as another picturesque backdrop for special occasions. "It's a gorgeous setting for a wedding ceremony," says Maynard, noting how both Faulkner's Island and Chaffinch Island Park can be seen in the distance. "Wow, what a spot to say, "I do!"

Other Town Park staples include:

Jacob's Beach Park

Perfect For: Large family gatherings, like reunions and anniversary parties.

Capacity: 120 (2 picnic shelters hold 60 each) Cost: ranging \$35 - \$200 range, based on size of group(s) and number of hours (up to 4).

Lake Quonnipaug

Perfect For: Casual, small birthday and graduation parties. Capacity: 1 picnic shelter. Cost: Free for residents; \$150 for non-residents.

Chaffinch Island Park

("A gem of a place," describes Maynard.) Perfect for: Small wedding ceremonies, fishing, bird-watching, small picnics. Capacity: Limited parking (20 cars), picnic areas. Cost: Free.

The Guilford Community Center

Perfect For: Piano recitals, birthday parties, anniversary dinners, baby showers, and banquets. Capacity: Largest room (Guilford Room) holds 240; others hold 50-70. Costs: Weekdays: \$30/hour for residents; \$45/hour for nonresidents. Weekends: \$45/hour for residents; \$60/hour for nonresidents.

Economic Development Department

In spite of a brutal Guilford winter, we are experiencing significant activity that will certainly warm us as we move into Spring and Summer.

Construction at Guilford Commons continued through the snow and ice. Recently, it was formally announced The Fresh Market will be an anchor tenant within the shopping complex. The Fresh Market is a specialty grocery retailer. According to developer DDR, several other tenant leases are close to signing and will be formally announced in the near future. As the weather breaks, expect to see additional roadwork in front of the site, including the Guilford Transfer Station entrance area. These changes are intended to increase visual sightlines and aid with traffic management. Guilford Commons continues projecting a late Fall 2015 opening. Tractor Supply, a business primarily supporting our local agricultural community has been approved through Planning & Zoning. This business will be located at 2945 Boston Post Road (Rt. 1) on the west end of Town, near the Branford border. Construction is expected to start as the weather improves, with opening expected by the Fall 2015 as well. The owner's of the **Arrow Paving** business on Whitfield Street presented and were approved through Planning & Zoning to redevelop their site as a 15 unit apartment complex. This is a significant change in use

of this industrial site but supports many aspects identified in the Town Center South Plan, approved in 2007. It is expected that some tenants may well utilize train services to commute to/from their employment. And will enjoy a walkable neighborhood to the beach, marina, restaurants and the Green. Another significant project was approved through Planning & Zoning, The Residences at 66 High Street. This project will transform the former industrial site where "Clinipad" operated for years into a higher end residential condominium complex. Final details are progressing through Town Departments and the Historic District Commission with construction expected to start in early summer.

Moves and changes continue to impact our economic landscape. We are pleased to report the **Guilford Food Center** has been acquired by Guilford residents. They have plans to remodel the location and will remain open during the transition. Several traditional aspects will remain in-place, including many of the smiling faces that have serviced customers for years. Additional services will be incorporated into the store as it becomes **The Marketplace at Guilford Food Center. The House of Fashion** opened on Whitfield Street in the former Kimberly's Boutique location. Kimberly's closed this store to consolidate their operations into their West Hartford location. **Village Greene Gardens** has

operated in the former "Fonicello's "location on Boston Post Road for several years but moved down the road to allow for an expanded retail presence and outdoor display and sales area. Red Rooster Gourmet Cookies completed their move from the Gatehouse West development to 16 Church Street (yellow section of remodeled building) to support their growing business. The Bird Nest Salon and Gallery is another success story. They are moving to 25 Water Street, enabling an expanded hair salon, gift shop and gallery area. Joint Effort, a health and fitness service that specializes in elderly and people with special needs, recently doubled their space in the Village Walk plaza.

Characters and Costumes / R.E.A.D.
Amusements moved from River Street to
1310 Boston Post Road (Strawberry Hill
Plaza). Guilford Paint is moving from
688 Boston Post Road to 260 River Street.
Principals from the Durham Veterinary
Hospital will be opening an animal care
center at 1795 Boston Post Road (former
Chesley Sleep Center location).

2015 Mooring Permits

Fred Brisbois, State Harbor Master, Town of Guilford



As we approach the boating season (finally!), boaters are reminded that mooring permits must be obtained / renewed for 2015. There is a State requirement for all moorings in Connecticut waters to have a permit issued

by a State appointed Harbor Master. In my capacity as the State appointed Harbor Master for the Town of Guilford, I am required to perform duties specified by Connecticut General Statutes consistent with an approved Harbor Management plan. Fortunately, the Town of Guilford has a State approved Harbor Management Plan that was prepared by the Guilford Harbor Management Commission with inputs from the public and various town government departments. This ensures a mooring permit process that is locally controlled to implement the State requirements in a manner that best serves Town residents. I will be enforcing the permit requirement by frequent patrols utilizing the Shellfish Commission's boat, the fire rescue boat, or my personal vessel as well as by land patrols. Moorings found without the required permit are subject to a municipal citation that may result in a \$100 per day fine. To assist residents in obtaining their permit, the application and renewal process has been made as easy as possible.

Residents who had a 2014 permit will receive a renewal notice, either electronically or via U.S. mail. New permit applications can be submitted electronically via the internet or on paper applications. Applications are available at Town Hall on the table outside the Town Clerk's office or at the Town Marina. To submit an electronic application, you access the online mooring system at http:// permits.onlinemooring.com/GuilfordCT/ or via the link on the Harbor Management Commission's web page on the Town's website. There is a \$25 fee for the permit that can be paid for online or via a check made out to "Town of Guilford" and mailed to the Harbor Management Commission, 31 Park Street, Guilford, CT. Once the application and fee is received by the Guilford Harbor Management Commission, it is reviewed by a representative of the Guilford Shellfish Commission and upon their approval it is forwarded to me. If all the required information is provided and there is no valid reason to disapprove the application, I assign a mooring identification number and issue a permit to the applicant. Permits expire on December 31, must be renewed annually, and are not transferable.

There are several reasons why moorings must have a permit issued. When the Connecticut Department of Energy & Environmental Protection (DEEP) reviews an application for a shellfish permit, one of their considerations is whether or not there is an existing mooring at the location. If moorings are not legally permitted, DEEP would not be aware of their existence and there is the potential for a commercial shellfish operation to be approved

which will prohibit any future mooring permits at that location. Also, if a non-resident properly submits a mooring application, it may be approved and a resident who desires to have a mooring at that location will not be able to do so.

A final reason to obtain a permit is that the Town of Guilford has an ordinance to enforce the requirements of the Harbor Management Plan. Each violation is subject to a \$100 municipal citation, and "...each day of the violation shall be considered a separate offense and subject to separate citations."

As I patrol the shoreline, my focus is to educate the public of the requirement to obtain a permit and assist them in processing their application. I am confident that most boaters will adhere to the requirement and minimize the issuance of citations. Boating is meant to be enjoyable. The mooring permit program will ensure our shores remain safe and enjoyable for all our residents.






You should wear a separate sunscreen every day with an SPF of at least 25. My favorite ingredients for the best protection are minerals - either zinc or titanium dioxide. So even after the summer winds die down, don't let your guard down. Protect your face. Today's tan is tomorrow's wrinkle.

"Text Neck"

Did you know your head weighs approximately 15 pounds and for every 1 inch your head is forward of your shoulders it weighs an additional 15 pounds?


