Future Projects

I'd like to thank the Higganum Vision Group for hosting a forum on the Scovil Hoe buildings. The panel discussion and citizen participation was crucial to the future planning of this property and it was a very informative and engaging meeting. The Town will have the chance to acquire the property next spring.

I am excited to work with the DOT, apply for some large grants and state funding to tackle this project and get feedback from residents on what they'd like to do next with these beautiful pieces of our past.

Task Forces

Both the Haddam and Killingworth Energy Task forces, along with the Clean Energy Finance and Investment Authority (CEFIA), Be-Free Solar and Smart Power, held two informational solar events in May and June. It was astounding to be in a room full of 250+



We will start to educate people about free recycling programs and how we can improve our transfer station and waste disposal budget.

Past HKHS grad, Erin Moriarty, and her mom Tanja, are leading the charge to preserve 43 acres of land on the edge of Higganum that borders the state forest in Durham. The land, which is currently on the market, is full of caves, vernal pools, multiple species of flora and fauna, including salamanders, fairy shrimp, and the rare Netted Fern.

IMPORTANT DATES TO REMEMBER

Active Duty Servicemen – Active Duty Servicemen, stationed outside of Connecticut, must file a written application yearly by December 31st for the exemption of one passenger motor vehicle garaged out of state. The forms are available in the Assessor's office.

VETERANS are reminded to file their Honorable Discharge with the Town Clerk's office on or before September 30, 2014. Those veterans who have already submitted their DD214 need not file again.

TOTALLY DISABLED AND BLIND exemption forms must be filed on or before October 1, 2014.

ADDITIONAL VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

The filing period for Additional Veteran's exemptions is February 1, 2014 to October 1, 2014. The exemptions for income qualifying applicants will be based on the income maximums as follows: the maximum income for single applicants will be \$34,100 and the maximum for married applicants will be \$41,600.

FARM, FOREST OR OPEN SPACE UNDER PUBLIC ACT 490

New applications for property owners claiming land as Farm or Forest or Open Space must be filed with the Assessor's Office before October 31, 2014. When filing for Forest land the application must be accompanied by the certificate from the Forestry Department. The Forestry department will no longer be responsible to certify parcels as forest land. They will provide a list of state foresters who will recommend to the Assessor's Office the number of acres to be considered as forest land. The Assessor is responsible for certifying land as forest.

ALL FORMS FOR THE ABOVE PROGRAMS are available in the Assessor's office and on our web page at www.haddam.org.

TRADE NAME CERTIFICATES – All new businesses in the Town of Haddam:

According to the Connecticut General State Statutes under section 35-1, no person or persons shall conduct or transact business under any name other than the real name of the person or persons conducting business in the Town of Haddam unless a Trade Name Certificate has been filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATIONS

Personal Property Declarations will be mailed from the Assessor's office sometime during the last two weeks of September. Notice is hereby given to all persons liable to pay Personal Property taxes in the Town of Haddam that they must return to the Assessor's office, on or before the first day of November 2014, their personal property list (declaration). Failure to declare will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

The personal property declaration shall include all furniture, fixtures, equipment and machinery of all commercial and industrial businesses; unregistered motor vehicles, snowmobiles, farm machinery and horses.

Manufacturing Machinery Exemption Applications must also be filed at this time.

Anyone not receiving a personal property declaration should contact the Assessor's office. Even though a declaration was not received, it does not preclude you from filing.

***PLEASE NOTE:** if you do not receive a personal property declaration and you are a resident business in the town of Haddam it is your responsibility according to Connecticut State Statues to file one. Failure to declare will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

If you have received a personal property declaration and will not be conducting any business in Haddam as of October 1, 2014 you must complete the Affidavit on the front page of the declaration and return it to the Assessor's office prior to November 1, 2014. This signed affidavit is mandatory as proof to allow the Assessor to remove you from the Grand List. If the documentation is not received it will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

Commercial Vehicle Exemptions (M-65 MV) – Certain newly registered (never registered in any state or jurisdiction prior to August 1, 2014, but must be registered in Connecticut on or after that date) commercial trucks, truck tractor and semi-trailers in excess of 26,000 pounds, gross vehicle weight rating, and used exclusively 100% of the time for the interstate or intrastate transportation of freight for hire, may be exempt as outlined in 12-81(74) of the Connecticut General statutes. Guidelines, information and applications are available in the Assessor's office. Please note that the application deadline is November 1, 2014.

TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station is located on Route 154, just north of the Haddam Meadows State Park. If you do not have a private trash collection service, trash and recyclables should be brought separated to the Transfer Station. To assure that only Haddam residents use the Transfer Station, a current Haddam sticker must be displayed in order to use the facility. Stickers are good for the fiscal year (July through June) and may be purchased for a \$50 fee from the Town Clerk at the Town Office building. The operators of the Transfer Station are licensed by the State and will assist residents to assure compliance with the recycling law.

Hours: Wednesday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Sunday, 8:00 am - 11:45 am.

All Transfer Station permits expire July 1st.

To insure that there is a clear understanding of the rules, please read below:

Permit must be clearly displayed and adhered to the driver's side window shield.

Registration must be written on the permit itself.

Any vehicles without a current permit or without a sticker on the vehicle will not be allowed to leave its contents at the Transfer Station.

Loose permit stickers will be required to be applied to the vehicle before dumping or vehicle will be turned away. In order to purchase a Transfer Station Permit, please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available: Proof of residency.

Persons may purchase additional stickers for their household with the following information:

CLEAN RECYCLABLES ARE IMPORTANT!

Dirty materials can't be recycled and can attract nuisance insects and animals. Please take care in what you recycle so as not to contaminate the load.

SPORTSMEN

2014 SPORTS LICENSES are available. Additional information regarding regulations, permits, conservation education/firearms safety courses are available on line at http://www.deep. state.ct.us. DEP reminds anglers age 65 and older that the free resident "lifetime" inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses for individuals age 65 and older became "annual" licenses effective October 1, 2009. All "age 65 and older" free inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses obtained since October 1, 2009 must now be renewed annually. Additionally, all "age 65 and older" free marine fishing licenses must be renewed annually. Holders of age 65 and older "lifetime" Connecticut inland fishing licenses obtained prior to October 1, 2009 are not required to reregister for a new license. However, should one lose this "lifetime" license, they will need to obtain a free replacement by accessing the licensing system from their home computer, or by visiting a town hall, DEP office or other participating vendor. All individuals with "lifetime" hunting or combination hunting & fishing licenses will need to register themselves in the Automated Licensing System to obtain the appropriate permits and tags along with their unique Conservation ID#.

In subsequent license years, this Conservation ID# will be re-used and the free hunting license will need to be selected annually prior to obtaining permits and tags. For assistance in renewing these licenses, contact DEP Licensing and Revenue at (860) 424-3105.

MARRIAGE LICENSE INFORMATION

STATE OF CONNECTICUT

The Connecticut license must be obtained in the town in which the marriage will take place. You will be asked to show your driver's license, or other form of legal identification. There is no waiting period. The marriage may take place at the time the license is issued. The marriage must take place within 65 days of issuance of the license. The partners do not need to appear at the same time but both must come in and sign the license in person. Cost for a marriage license is \$30.00. The cost for a certificated copy of the license is \$20.00. Applications are now available on line at Haddam. org - Town Clerk's Office.

DOG OWNERS REMINDER

If you have forgotten, please be sure to pay your Dog License fee so that you have the current tag. Our Animal Control Officer will be contacting you, if you are delinquent. Fees: A neutered or spayed dog \$8.00, an unneutered or unspayed dog \$19.00. Kennel License is \$51.00, beginning July 1, a penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying/neutered certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at 30 Field Park Drive, Haddam, CT 06438, along with your fee. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records. If you have any questions or concerns regarding licensing your dog(s) please call or email our office.

The Haddam Historical Society is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization founded in 1955. Our mission is "to preserve, collect, interpret and promote the history and heritage of Haddam for present and future generations."

The Society operates the Thankful Arnold House Museum and the Wilhelmina Ann Arnold Barnhart Memorial Garden in the scenic lower Connecticut River Valley Village of Haddam, Connecticut. Visitors hear the story of the Widow Arnold and that of her daughter and granddaughter. Representative of their time, these three generations of women were head of the household in the home that was built between 1794 and 1810. The house is open year round. Community Classes at CTMS

"Education begins at birth" - Dr. Maria Montessori.

Another summer has arrived, to take its' place in the Mobius of seasons. The certainty with which the calender pronounces the date of arrival provides comforting assurance of the immutable passage of time, that this summer is no different than any previous or future. But look closely and one finds that each summer (and spring and fall) varies from the last. This year, we are noticeably short of pollenators: the bees, and wasps and flies that do the yeoman work of plant propogation. The crop of dragonflies as yet lacks abundance and the butterflies are sadly all but missing. This is in sharp contrast to last year when all these transient denizens filled the air above the fields. Was the winter to cold/ wet /long? What about the spring? Are we experiencing a natural cycle? Habitat destruction? Hard to say. My observance of these phenomena is inadequate in scope to have much opinion, but it is likely a bit of each.


I do not despair the death of the Gypsy Moth caterpillars, probably from Bacillus due to the wet spring, but the lack of dragonflies and their ravenous hunger for mosquitos, not to mention their electric colors, instills reflection. All is not lost, the lightning bugs have been spectacular in numbers and display, in sharp contrast to previous years. Nature gives and takes.

What will next year bring, and the year after? I remain vigilant and hopeful that next year will be better, that the cycle of nature will prove unprovoked.





Illnesses Caused by Heat

Even short periods of high temperatures can cause serious health problems. During hot weather health emergencies, you can keep informed by listening to local weather and news channels or contact local health departments for health and safety updates. Doing too much on a hot day, spending too much time in the sun or staying too long in an overheated place can cause heat-related illnesses. Know the symptoms of heat disorders and overexposure to the sun, and be ready to give first aid treatment.

HEAT STROKE

Heat stroke occurs when the body is unable to regulate its temperature. The body's temperature rises rapidly, the sweating mechanism fails, and the body is unable to cool down. Body temperature may rise to 106 F or higher within 10 to 15 minutes. Heat stroke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not provided.

Recognizing Heat Stroke

Warning signs of heat stroke vary but may include the following: An extremely high body temperature (above 103 F, orally), Red, hot and dry skin (no sweating), Rapid, strong pulse, Throbbing headache, Dizziness, Nausea, Confusion or Unconsciousness.

What to Do

If you see any of these signs, you may be dealing with a life-



threatening emergency. Have someone call for immediate medical assistance while you begin cooling the victim. Do the following:

Get the victim to a shady area and cool the victim rapidly using whatever methods you can. For example, immerse the victim in a tub of cool water; place the person in a cool shower; spray the victim with cool water from a garden hose; sponge the person with cool water; or if the humidity is low, wrap the victim in a cool, wet sheet and fan him or her vigorously. Monitor body temperature, and continue cooling efforts until the body temperature drops to 101-102 F. If emergency medical personnel are delayed, call the hospital emergency room for further instructions.

Do not give the victim fluids to drink and get medical assistance as soon as possible.

Sometimes a victim's muscles will begin to twitch uncontrollably as a result of heat stroke. If this happens, keep the victim from injuring himself, but do not place any object in the mouth and do not give fluids. If there is vomiting, make sure the airway remains open by turning the victim on his or her side.

HEAT EXHAUSTION

Heat exhaustion is a milder form of heat-related illness that can develop after several days of exposure to high temperatures and inadequate or unbalanced replacement of fluids. It is the body's response to an excessive loss of the water and salt contained in sweat. Those most prone to heat exhaustion are elderly people, people with high blood pressure, and people working or exercising in a hot environment.

Recognizing Heat Exhaustion

Warning signs of heat exhaustion include the following: Heavy sweating, Paleness, Muscle cramps, Tiredness, Weakness, Dizziness, Headache, Nausea or vomiting or Fainting. The skin may be cool and moist. The victim's pulse rate will be fast and weak, and breathing will be fast and shallow. If heat exhaustion is untreated, it may progress to heat stroke. **Seek medical attention immediately** if any of the following occurs: Symptoms are severe or the victim has heart problems or high blood pressure. Otherwise, help the victim to cool off, and seek medical attention if symptoms worsen or last longer than 1 hour.

What to Do

Cooling measures that may be effective include the following: Cool, nonalcoholic beverages, Rest, Cool shower, bath, or sponge bath, An air-conditioned environment, Lightweight clothing.

HEAT CRAMPS

Heat cramps usually affect people who sweat a lot during strenuous activity. This sweating depletes the body's salt and moisture. The low salt level in the muscles may be the cause of heat cramps. Heat cramps may also be a symptom of heat exhaustion.

Recognizing Heat Cramps

Heat cramps are muscle pains or spasms, usually in the abdo-

men, arms, or legs, that may occur in association with strenuous activity. If you have heart problems or are on a low-sodium diet, get medical attention for heat cramps.

What to Do

If medical attention is not necessary, take these steps: Stop all activity, and sit quietly in a cool place, Drink clear juice or a sports beverage. Do not return to strenuous activity for a few hours after the cramps subside, because further exertion may lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Seek medical attention for heat cramps if they do not subside in 1 hour.

HEAT RASH

Heat rash is a skin irritation caused by excessive sweating during hot, humid weather. It can occur at any age but is most common in young children.

Recognizing Heat Rash

Heat rash looks like a red cluster of pimples or small blisters. It is more likely to occur on the neck and upper chest, in the groin, under the breasts, and in elbow creases.

What to Do

The best treatment for heat rash is to provide a cooler, less humid environment. Keep the affected area dry. Dusting powder may be used to increase comfort.

Treating heat rash is simple and usually does not require medical assistance.



The Village Parks Society of Haddam - Update

As you visit the Town Hall this summer, take a good look around. Most of the driveway and grass area leading up to the Town Hall is owned and maintained by The Village Parks Society of Haddam. The Society was founded around 1880 with the purpose of providing "A pleasure ground for the people of Haddam". There are several small parcels around town including the Meeting House Green on Walkley Hill Road. Currently, the largest property maintained is Field Park, an approximate 9 acre parcel located behind the Haddam Town Office Building.

Unfortunately, the park does not get many visitors other than those that live in the immediate area or people walking their dogs. The Society is trying to change that. "We have been doing a lot of work to make the park more user friendly for residents," remarks Scott Brookes, the president of The Village Parks Society of Haddam.

The Society is also working on some exciting programs over the last year. A walking map has been created to identify the historic significance and diversity of some of our older trees. Maps can be found in a weather proof box in the area above the Town Hall. Extensive tree maintenance has been done to help the longevity of these trees and others throughout the park. Because of the many sugar maple trees in the park, this spring we will be tapping them and boiling the sap into maple syrup. Demonstrations will be open to the public.

The park is available for use for all Haddam residents free of charge. Plan a wedding, organize a soccer game or use the picnic tables and the out-

door grills. The goal is to make the park more of a destination for families. Stop by and have a picnic this
