

Today our volunteer corps has 18 highly trained EMS personnel who take duty hours 365 days a year including holidays and weekends. Our medical members train monthly and attend special recertification courses. HVAS also benefits from the work of its Auxiliary, a dedicated group of individuals who assist the service in non-medical areas, thereby allowing our technicians to devote more time to training and other duties.

Additional Veteran's Exemption

The application period for Additional Veteran's exemptions is February 1, 2013 to October 1, 2013. Please call the Assessor's office at 860-345-8531 to make an appointment or to discuss your qualifications.

Proof of income is required when filing for the above programs. Income includes all taxable and non-taxable income as well as social security income. Exemption forms for the Totally Disabled and for the Blind are available in the Assessor's Office.

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Healthy Eating through Healthier Habits for Seniors



Seniors are encouraged to eat as many fresh fruits and vegetables as possible every day.

We all know that our tastes have changed over time. The things we like now – clothing, hair styles, cars, and so on - most likely are different today than they were 20 or 30 years ago. It stands to reason, then, that our overall diet should evolve as well (from necessity as well as preference).

As we age, the make-up of what we eat becomes more and more important to our bodies and our overall well being. With proper nutrition, we are better able to manage health issues such as high blood pressure, cholesterol and sugar levels.

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We also reduce or eliminate common ailments such as swelling and inflammation, poor digestion, and low energy.

While many seniors find themselves on some type of "restrictive" diet, this does not have to mean the end of enjoying a good meal. In fact, with better food labeling and an increasing selection of healthier foods in grocery stores, eating better really is easier - and tastier - than ever. Here are some tips to help get in the habit of shopping and eating well:

Fresh is best when it comes to fruits and vegetables, and frozen is second best (avoid high-salt or sugary canned foods). The fiber and vitamins in popular favorites such as apples, blueberries, plums, broccoli, cauliflower, and avocados provide countless benefits. Enjoy these foods raw, steamed or sautéed in a little olive oil.

Brown (whole grain) is better when it comes to breads, pasta, rice and cereals. For potatoes, sweet ones are far more nutritious than white.

Choose lean, high-protein foods such as fish, turkey, pork, beans, peas, nuts, for higher energy and better bone health.

Eggs, cheese and milk have calcium that is also beneficial to bone health. However, these foods should be avoided if cholesterol levels are a concern.

Use olive oils or soy-based margarines instead of butter whenever possible, to keep cholesterol counts down.

Choose water over high-sugar drinks and fruit juices.

Instead of canned soups or frozen dinners, keep bagged salads, canned tuna, and low-fat yogurts on hand for quick meals

If you live in a retirement community, discuss your diet with the chef, nutritionist, or nurse. They will make recommendations for you and prepare foods that meet your special needs.

By adopting better eating and shopping habits, we can find the best balance of foods that keep us healthy and help us enjoy a great (and delicious) quality of life.

Grant Awarded - The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) has awarded the Youth and Family Services of Haddam-Killingworth, Inc. a grant in the amount of \$48,258 for the Healthy Communities-Healthy Kids Coalition (an initiative of YFS) to prevent underage drinking through the Sober Truth on Prevention Underage Drinking Act (STOP ACT) grant program. The STOP ACT grant program provides funding for community based coalitions throughout the country to prevent and reduce alcohol use among youth ages 12-20. The program strengthens collaboration among communities, as well as state, federal, local and tribal governments in efforts to instill an active commitment to prevent underage drinking.

"Underage drinking is a major public health problem which endangers the health and lives of our nation's young people and others," said SAMHSA Administrator Pamela S. Hyde. "The STOP program is based on the simple truth to effectively address this problem we need to educate and persuade kids not to risk their health and futures through underage drinking." The Coalition may receive up to \$50,000 annually over four years.

The Healthy Communities-Healthy Kids Coalition (HC-HK) has been dedicated to preventing and reducing substance abuse, other risky behavior and promoting the wellness of the community. Representatives from all twelve sectors of the community are involved in the Coalition. They include youth, parents, businesses, media, school personnel, youth-serving organizations, law enforcement agencies, religious/fraternal organizations, civic/volunteer groups, healthcare professionals, government and other substance abuse organizations. 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Haddam Killingworth Project Graduation

WHO WE ARE - Project Graduation is a non-profit, volunteer group that has been in existence for 24 years. Our mission is to provide Haddam-Killingworth High School's Senior Class an all-night, substance- and alcohol-free, activity-packed graduation party on the night of graduation. High school graduation night typically has one of the highest rates of alcohol and substance-related accidents nationwide. Over the past twenty-four years, Project Graduation has hosted over two thousand Haddam-Killingworth High School graduates and our communities have not experienced a single graduation night tragedy.

WHAT WE DO - The Committees of Project Graduation work from September to June planning and fundraising. During the winter months, the entertainment and decorations committees go to work in earnest, setting up the activities and creating the decorations that will transform the field house for the celebration. On the night of graduation, nearly 100% of the graduates arrive to enjoy unlimited food, entertainment, activities, sports and prizes.

HOW WE DO IT - Community members volunteer their time to Project Graduation and to our various committees: from fundraising to publicity, entertainment to clean up. These volunteers chaperone, decorate, shop, plan and organize the event. Community members and businesses also

donate goods, food items, beverages and funds.

WHAT WE NEED - Your support: we need volunteers to join our committees; we need a co-chairperson for our decorations committee and volunteers for all our committees. We also need your financial support. The cost per student is approximately \$130. Although both H-KHS and the Board of Education support this event, they do not provide any financing. Our funding comes entirely from fundraising activities and generous donations from our communities. High School Students - Catch the Bus to the Brainerd Library

Beginning on October 2 HK High School students may ride a District 17 school bus to the Brainerd Memorial Library after school. They may come in to do their homework, use a computer, read a newspaper or magazine, or check out a book, CD or DVD. Students must bring a permission note from their parents to the school in order to ride the bus to the library. Students can ride the bus to the library Tuesday through Thursday, when the library is open from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm and on Friday, when the library is open from 10:00 am to 6:00 pm. Remember that the library is closed on Monday. Students will need to arrange for their own ride home from the library.

treatments vary depending upon the nature, severity, and duration of the illness.

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

Middlesex Community Garden

UConn Extension's Model Community Garden Expands Demo Capability

The UConn Extension Model Community Garden, a 900-square foot plot on the Middlesex County Extension Center grounds, was designed as a teaching and learning garden for Master Gardeners to exhibit various gardening practices, techniques and tools that can be applied to the individual home garden. Each year, the Master Gardener volunteers who manage the garden enhance its demonstration capabilities. In the past few years, the group has built a 3 bin compost system and a cold frame, and purchased a compost tea brewer.

While the garden soil texture at the Extension Center is easily workable - it lacks the rocky characteristics many CT gardeners have to grapple with - the soil does not hold moisture well, making watering a significant challenge, especially during the drier periods of the growing season. "We've struggled with keeping the garden appropriately watered since it was created in 2007," explained Maureen Gillis, who co-leads the volunteer group. "After using a variety of soaker and other systems, all of which required significant monitoring, we decided an automated system was the 'must-have' improvement for this year." With a generous donation of labor and key components from Jordan Brook Irrigation of Waterford, CT, an outreach grant from the Connecticut Master Gardener Association (CMGA), Extension staff support, and the hard work of several Master Gardener volunteers, a new system will be ready for use and public demonstration by spring. The system, which includes an electrical component as well as four-zone watering, monitors rainfall and supplies the appropriate amount of water for the various crops grown.

Produce grown by the Master Gardeners at the Model Community Garden is donated to Amazing Grace Food Pantry and St. Vincent DePaul Soup Kitchen. If you are interested in learning more about the Master Gardener program, visit their website at http://www.ladybug

.uconn.edu/. Applications for the 2013 class, which begins in January, are currently being accepted. 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Board of Assessment Appeals

Before the crush of the holiday season is upon us, it's a good time for all homeowners to review the assessment of their property. If you disagree with the town's assessment, you will have an opportunity to challenge it before the Board of Assessment Appeals. Here's what you need to know.

When you will need to apply: Applications will be available at the Assessor's Office beginning in mid-January. Completed applications must be returned to the Assessor's Office no later than the February 20, 2013 deadline.

When the hearings will be held: The Board of Assessment Appeals normally holds its hearings in March of each year. You will be notified of the date and time of your appointment via letter. If the appointment is inconvenient, the Board will try its best to accommodate your schedule.

What you will need to bring to the hearing: You should bring any evidence that supports your position i.e. a recent appraisal, invoices, contracts, photographs, maps, letters, etc. In addition, the Board may need to schedule a site visit to see the property first hand.

What happens next: An Action Letter with the Board's decision will be sent to you within 2 weeks of your hearing.

Town Clerk's Office

REMINDER - If you have forgotten, please be sure to pay your dog license fee so that you have the current tag. Our Animal Control Officer will be contacting you if you are delinquent. Fees: A neutered or spayed dog \$8.00, an unneutered or unspayed dog \$19.00 Kennel License is \$51.00, beginning July 1, a penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying/neutered certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at P.O. Box 87, Haddam, CT 06438, along with your fee. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records. If you have any questions or concerns regarding licensing your dog(s) please call or email our office.

Transfer Station - is located on Route 154, just north of the Haddam Meadows State Park. If you do not have a private trash collection service, trash and recyclables should be brought separated to the Transfer Station. To assure that only Haddam residents use the Transfer Station, a current Haddam sticker must be displayed in order to use the facility. Stickers are good for the fiscal year (July through June) and may be purchased for a \$50 fee from the Town Clerk at the Town Office building. The operators of the Transfer Station are licensed by the State and will assist residents to assure compliance with the recycling law. Hours: Wednesday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Sunday, 8:00 am - 11:45 am. All Transfer Station permits expire July 1st.

To insure that there is a clear understanding of the rules, please read: Permit must be clearly displayed and adhered to the driver's side window shield. Registration must be written on the permit itself. Any vehicles without a current permit or without a sticker on vehicle will not be allowed to leave its contents at the Transfer Station. Loose permit stickers will be required to be applied to the vehicle before dumping or vehicle will be turned away.

In order to purchase a Transfer Station Permit, please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available: Proof of residency, automobile registration, \$50.00 payment; cash or check - no credit or debit cards.

Persons may purchase additional stickers for their household with the following information: Proof of residency, automobile registration, \$50.00 payment. Cash or check - no credit or debit cards.

Clean Recyclables are Important! Dirty materials can't be recycled and can attract nuisance insects and animals. Please take care in what you recycle so as not to contaminate the load. What to Recycle: Newspapers, magazines & catalogs, cardboard, mixed office paper, food and drink containers, telephone books, leaves, brush, motor oil, antifreeze, tires, scrap metal, Electronics and some bulky waste.

Contractor Bulky Waste Vouchers - You must have a transfer station permit plus the bulky waste voucher. Vouchers are available in the Town Clerk's Office at a cost of \$10/each or

a book of 12 for \$100.00 - limit two loads per day. In order to purchase bulky waste vouchers please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available: Proof of residency, Automobile registration, Transfer Station Permit and voucher payment. Cash or check - no credit or debit cards.

Sportsmen - 2012 Sports licenses are available. Information regarding regulations, permits, conservation education/firearms safety courses are available on line at http//www.dep.state.ct.us all "age 65 and older" Free fishing, hunting and trapping licenses obtained since October 1, 2009 must now be renewed annually. Marine Waters Fishing Licenses are required for anyone 16 years of age or older fishing from shore or from a boat in the marine district or landing marine fish or bait species in Connecticut taken from offshore waters. Licenses are issued on a calendar year basis and expire on December 31st. Please see Marine Waters Fishing License FAQ page for more information. Any active, full-time member of the armed forces may be issued a fishing and/or small game firearms license for the resident fee. Credentials indicating active full-time membership or separation subsequent to the issuance of the license and prior to its expiration date must be carried while fishing or hunting. Issuance of a free license to the blind or intellectually disabled requires proof of disability in the form of a certificate provided by any person licensed to practice medicine in this state. Any resident with the loss of a limb or the loss of the use of a limb and a doctor's certificate may be issued a free license. Qualified nonresidents who are residents of states which allow CT residents the same privileges are also eligible.

Marriage License Information - State of CT - The Connecticut license must be obtained in the town which the marriage will take place. You will be asked to show your driver's license, or other form of legal identification. There is no waiting period; the marriage many take place at the time the license is issued. The marriage must take place within 65 days of issuance of the license. The partners do not need to appear at the same time but both must come in and sign the license in person. Cost for a marriage license is \$30.00. The cost for a certificated copy of the license is \$20.00.

A New Dimension in MRI Comfort

Middlesex Hospital Now Offers a "Wide-Open" MRI System. Are you claustrophobic? Can you tolerate having a CT scan? If so, you can now comfortably get an MRI at Middlesex Hospital, with its new "wide-open" MRI. Even for people who are not claustrophobic, the wide-open MRI provides a much more comfortable space during the exam than in the past.

"Open" vs. "Wide-Open" MRI -Many people believe that having an

"open" MRI can eliminate the claustrophobia they feel when having the same test in a traditional MRI unit. These types of "open" MRI systems are only open on the sides, and the top of the magnet is still very close to the body. In addition, these MRIs are also usually "low-field" MRIs, and although they do give patients more room during the test, they also have a significant drawback - it takes a lot longer to obtain the same image quality as traditional, "high-field" MRI machines. To cut down on exam times, some lower-field MRI systems may not have the same image quality as a state-of-the-art, higher-field system.

Middlesex Hospital only uses high-field MRI machines, since they produce the clearest images - because the higher the field strength, the better the quality of the images produced. However, the opening in these traditional machines is considered too small by some larger or claustrophobic patients to allow them to be comfortable during the exam.

All that is changing at Middlesex Hospital. As of September, the Hospital now offers a new dimension in patient comfort - in its wide-open bore, high-field MRI that combines a much larger bore (circular opening) size and a much shorter "tunnel" (length). The new MRI looks just like a CT scanner, only a foot longer. The new wide-open bore design accommodates all sizes (up to a 550-pound patient) eliminating anxiety and claustrophobia. For many exams, both the feet and head remain outside the machine. The newer technology combines an open feel with the ability to capture high-field quality diagnostic images. In addition, the new MRI is quieter and may require less time to capture the necessary images.

Why should patients care about the quality of their MRI images? When your doctor orders an MRI, he or she is looking to get as clear a picture as possible of what is going on in your body. The best way to get a clear picture is to use the type of technology that provides physicians with crisp and clear



photos of the anatomy.

"This is great news for patients who may have chosen to receive a low-field, open MRI in the past," said Laurel Patt, Middlesex Hospital Director of Radiology.

"These patients can now feel assured that if they get an MRI here at Middle-sex Hospital, they won't have to worry about their size or the fact that they may be claustrophobic. Our new machine offers both patient comfort and convenience, while still giving

physicians the best possible image quality."

The new "wide-open" MRI system at the Hospital is currently operational. In addition, the current MRI scanner at the Outpatient Center on Saybrook Road in Middletown will be replaced with a new, "super-high-field strength" MRI. This new MRI has double the field strength and can produce even clearer, more detailed images. It will be operational at the beginning of March 2013. The new Shoreline Medical Center in Westbrook will also have a brand new, stationary MRI system operational when construction of the facility is completed in 2014.

When using the new, wide-open MRI systems at Middlesex Hospital, patients will be comfortable, experience less noise, spend less time in the machine and can still be sure that their doctors will get the highest quality medical imaging. In other words, patients now have the best of all possible worlds at Middlesex Hospital if they need to have an MRI.

A Love Story about Local

Did you have a garden this year? Lots of us are becoming successful gardeners and others, not so much, but appreciate home grown and homemade foods. Some have tomatoes enough to fill a swimming pool! At our house, my husband tries every year to grow pumpkins, or winter



squash, but no matter how much attention he gives them, they just go kaput in our yard (or else they spring up as volunteers in the weirdest places). Yet, we know where to find the very best locally grown squashes and more. It is no secret, but in case you didn't know, there's a farmers' market in Haddam every Friday from the beginning of June to the end of October. Going strong, and born out of necessity, the market has maintained a commitment to being local and bringing you local, for four years.

The weekly Higganum Village Farmers' Market event is the best example of a "mutual admiration society," on many levels. We endeavor to keep our local farmers farming, first and foremost, but it's also good for all of us. Money spent there helps support local farmers and other fine food makers and a few artisans, but this money likely gets spent locally too. Finally, as a society, we may all have differences, yet we all have one thing in common; we all have to eat. So why not eat good foods, locally grown, and good for you, too? It may surprise you that the prices of produce are now more competitive with bigger grocery stores, and the more you visit, the savvier you become on what's in season.

The HVFM has always aimed to bring fresh foods to our local townspeople, and more. Of course, it takes some planning, attention to detail and broad shoulders to put on a market every week—plus two indoor markets before the holidays. There are scheduling headaches, budget concerns, and diplomacy issues - not to forget - Mother Nature! But the reason we do this is because we believe in local.

Freshness, Flavor and Fuel and Food Safety

Before it reaches you, most produce takes a 1,000 mile trip – or more. Most factory farm produce is picked before it is fully ripe and is very likely grown from "super seeds" so that it stays "looking good," to withstand bumps and bruises from handling and shipping. When you buy locally grown produce and foods you are getting quality foods while lessening the carbon footprint. You are getting something at its peak nutrition and flavor, too.

Local People, Local Farms, Local Economy

One of the best reasons to buy local is that you are helping your local farmers keep growing food for our state and our region. You are keeping farmland in production and preserving our farmland for crops. If there was an interruption in

the food supply from California and other parts of the world – we would need to rely on local foods more than ever. This is also an investment in our local community; money spent here usually stays here. And, our Connecticut Farmers are diversifying their croplands; they grow what consumers want because they have a direct link to you!

Buying local means you can talk directly to the farmer who tills the soil, plants the seed, and harvests your food. You get to find out what foods are grown and how they are grown. This relationship between farmer and consumer is a vital link in getting all of us to be smarter about what foods we eat and gets us a little further away from processed foods.

One thing no one wants to think about is contaminated foods. Bagged produce with salmonella bacteria, tainted eggs, hamburger with ecoli – these things are less likely to happen when you purchase locally grown food. Farmers do not have to maintain factory farm production numbers with large herds and so do not use the antibiotics and growth hormones associated with getting foods to market sooner to turn a faster profit. Local farmers raise animals and offer produce for foods on a much more personal and smaller, family-farm basis and are in-touch with their crops, be they animals or plants. Dairy farmers know the names of their herd!

When people are knowledgeable about food choices, they are generally healthier, too. Buying local food is wise for you every way you look at it.

The market is a place where friends run into friends; new friends of course, are made at the market, and teenagers get a safe place to meet their friends on a Friday after school and get some Community Service hours. Note to High-Schoolers; we would love to see more of you! Out-of-towners are amazed they stumbled onto our little green jewel-box oasis and some even tell us how glad they were to have "come back to Higganum." It's a nice place to see people and their dogs on leashes, and younger kids unleashed on the green where they can all unwind on a Friday, too.

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


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
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
