We write to ask that you join us in thinking ahead to winter


and the families in our community who may not be able to afford to give their children a Christmas this year.

The Probate Court and You

The classic definition of real property is land and everything attached or affixed to it by nature or the hand of man, from the core of the earth to the center of the heavens. When a person dies owning real property in Connecticut, the Probate Court assists in a number of ways to ensure title to that property is either distributed to the heirs or beneficiaries of the person who died, or by helping to ensure clear title so that the property can later be sold.

A common scenario arises when one spouse in a married couple passes away, and all assets, including their home, are jointly titled. It is a mistaken belief that because the real property is held jointly, that probate involvement is unnecessary. The Probate Court is designated by the legislature to determine whether a decedent died with a Connecticut taxable estate. When an estate is deemed to be nontaxable, the Probate Court issues a release of lien that gets recorded in the land records in the town where the decedent owned the real property. This release of lien is required for the eventual sale of the home. In the scenario where all assets are jointly owned between spouses, full probate may not be needed, and a Tax Purposes Only Estate may be appropriate.

Tax Purposes Only Estate – If a person dies owning no solely owned assets (can own joint assets or assets that pass by beneficiary designation such as life insurance), the Probate Court can issue a release of lien for any real property jointly held once the following paperwork has been filed: certified copy of the decedent's death certificate, the deed to the real property, and a Connecticut Estate Tax Return (Form CT -706 NT) if assets total \$3,600,000 or less in 2019. Municipal Election

The Municipal Election will be held on November 5 from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm. In all three voting districts, please come out and vote for your next: First Selectman, Selectman, Tax Collector, Board of Finance, Board of Finance Alternate, Board of Assessment Appeals, Planning and Zoning Commission, Planning and Zoning Commission Alternate, Zoning Board of Appeals, Zoning Board of Appeals Alternate, Board of Education.

REMINDER

If you have forgotten, please be sure to pay your DOG LICENSE fee so that you have the current tag. Our Animal Control Officer will be contacting you if you are delinquent. Fees: A neutered or spayed dog \$8.00, an unneutered or unspayed dog \$19.00 Kennel License is \$51.00. Beginning July 1, a penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying/neutered certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at 30 Field Park Drive. Haddam, CT 06438, along with your fee. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding licensing your dog(s) please call or email our office.

TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station is located on Route 154, just north of the Haddam Meadows State Park. If you do not have a private trash collection service, trash and recyclables should be brought separated to the Transfer Station.

To assure that only Haddam residents use the Transfer Station, a current Haddam sticker must be displayed in order to use the facility. Stickers are good for the fiscal year (July through June) and may be purchased for a \$75 fee from the Town Clerk at the Town Office building. The operators of the Transfer Station are licensed by the State and will assist residents to assure compliance with the recycling law.

Hours: Wednesday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Sunday, 8:00 am- 11:45 am.

All Transfer Station permits expire July 1st. To insure that there is a clear understanding of the rules, please read below:

- Permit must be clearly displayed and adhered to the driver's side window shield.
- 2. Registration must be written on the permit itself.
- 3. Any vehicles without a current permit or without a sticker on vehicle will not be allowed to leave its contents at the Transfer Station.
- 4. Loose permit stickers will be required to be applied to the vehicle before dumping or vehicle will be turned away.

In order to purchase a Transfer Station Permit, please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available:

- 1. Proof of residency.
- 2. Automobile registration.
- 3. \$75.00 payment. Cash or check. No credit or debit cards.

Persons may purchase additional stickers for their household with the following information:

- 1. Proof of residency.
- 2. Automobile registration.
- 3. \$75.00 payment. Cash or check. No credit or debit cards.

CLEAN RECYCLABLES ARE IMPORTANT!

Dirty materials can't be recycled and can attract nuisance insects and animals. Please take care in what you recycle so as not to contaminate the load. WHAT TO RECYCLE: Newspapers, magazines & catalogs, cardboard, mixed office paper, food and drink containers, telephone books, leaves, brush, motor oil, antifreeze, tires, scrap metal, electronics and some bulky waste.

SPORTSMEN

2019 Sports Licenses are available. Information regarding regulations, permits, conservation education/firearms safety courses are available on line at http://www.dep.state.ct.us.

All "age 65 and older" free fishing, hunting and trapping licenses obtained since October 1, 2009 must now be renewed annually.

Marine Waters Fishing Licenses are required for anyone 16 years of age or older fishing from shore or from a boat in the marine district or landing marine fish or bait species in Connecticut taken from offshore waters. Licenses are issued on a calendar year basis and expire on December 31st. Please see Marine Waters Fishing License FAQ page for more information. Any active, full-time member of the armed forces may be issued a fishing and/or small game firearms license for the resident fee. Credentials indicating active full-time membership or separation subsequent to the issuance of the license and prior to its expiration date must be carried while fishing or hunting.

Issuance of a free license to the blind or intellectually disabled requires proof of disability in the form of a certificate provided by any person licensed to practice medicine in this state. Any resident with the loss of a limb or the loss of the use of a limb and a doctor's certificate may be issued a free license. Qualified nonresidents who are residents of states which allow CT residents the same privileges are also eligible.

Assessor's Corner

Important Upcoming Deadlines

Active Members of the U.S. Armed Forces

Any active member of the United States Armed Forces (defined as United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Air Force and any reserve component thereof, including the Connecticut National Guard) is eligible for the exemption of one motor vehicle. Applications for the exemption must be completed annually and forwarded to the Assessor's Office not later than the December 31st following the date on which property tax is due in the town in which the motor vehicle is registered. In other words, for the 2018 Grand List year the deadline is December 31, 2019. The forms are available in the Assessor's Office and online on the Assessor's Page of the www.haddam.org website.

Farm, Forest or Open Space under Public Act 490

New applications for property owners claiming land as Farm, Forest or Open Space can be filed with the Assessor's Office between September 1st and October 31st, 2019. Please note that when filing for Forest Land, the application must be accompanied by a Certified Forester's Report which is due to the Assessor's Office no later than October 1st. The State's Forestry Department can provide a list of state foresters who can assist you. The Assessor's Office must review all applications, and accompanying reports, to determine if the property qualifies to be a part of the PA 490 Program.

Additional information and forms for the above programs are available in the Assessor's office and on our web page at www. haddam.org.

Personal Property Declarations

Personal Property Declarations were mailed in late September. Anyone not receiving a Personal Property Declaration should contact the Assessor's Office. Even though a declaration was not received by you, it does not preclude you from filing.

Notice is hereby given to all persons liable to pay Personal Property taxes in the Town of Haddam that they must return to the Assessor's Office, on or before the first day of November, their personal property list (declaration). Failure to declare will force the Assessor to estimate the value of the property and add a 25% penalty.

The personal property declaration shall include all furniture, fixtures, equipment and machinery of all commercial and industrial businesses; unregistered motor vehicles, snowmobiles, farm machinery and horses. Manufacturing Machinery Exemption and Farm Building Exemptions Applications must be filed at this time. Anyone claiming either of these exemptions must return the Declaration and Application by the November 1st deadline. A declaration received late, or not returned, will not be eligible for the exemption for the 2019 Grand List.

IMPORTANT ---

If you do not receive a Personal Property Declaration and you are operating a business in the Town of Haddam, it is your responsibility, according to Connecticut State Statutes, to file one. Failure to declare will force the Assessor to estimate the value of the personal property and add a 25% penalty. Once a penalty is applied to a Personal Property account, it cannot be removed.

If you have received a personal property declaration and are no longer conducting business in Haddam as of October 1, 2019, you **must** complete the Affidavit on the front page of the declaration and return it to the Assessor's Office prior to November 1, 2019. This signed affidavit is mandatory as proof to allow the Assessor to remove you from the Grand List. If the documentation is not received it will force the Assessor to estimate the value of the personal property and apply a **25% penalty.**

Defining a "Business"

There have been many questions raised over the past months regarding businesses and whether or not they should be picked up by the Assessor's Office. It is my hope that this article will help to explain and give the situation some clarity for everyone. The definition of a business is not easily conveyed in words because every situation is different and there are many aspects and questions that need to be asked in order to ascertain if a business should be listed with the Town. Here are the ways we look at it; hopefully this will help answer any questions that you may have.

Do you provide a good or service in exchange for compensation? If you answered yes, then you are in a business.

- Advertising
- Time Contributed
- Assets

• Income

- Compensation
- Home Based
- TT D
- Ownership
- Rent a space
- Sales Tax
- Self-EmployedTrade Name
- Certificate

There are a couple of ways to examine your individual situation to determine if you are a business or not. These are the most common aspects that we look to; and this list is not all-inclusive, but generally covers the most common aspects.

- 1) *Advertising* if you are advertising, in print media, online, or in any other way, you are in business.
- 2) Amount of Time it doesn't matter if you work at the business 3 hours a week, full-time, part-time, seasonally, or whenever someone calls to ask for you to provide a good or service to them. The number of hours, or time spent, doesn't factor into the determination on whether or not you are in business.
- 3) Assets The amount of tangible business personal property also does not factor into the determination on whether or not you are in business. Business personal property can range from a hundred dollars for a part-time, home-based business, all the way up to millions of dollars (as is the case with most public utilities, and, in Haddam's case, the Connecticut Yankee property).
- 4) *Compensation* The amount of compensation you receive also does not factor into the determination of whether or not you are in business. If you receive a 1099 for tax purposes, or you self-report your income to the IRS, you are in business. If you receive a W-2 from the business, then you are an employee and the business owner would declare the business personal property, not you as the employee (unless, of course you are an employee of your own company).
- 5) *Home-Based Businesses* If you operate a farm, or make crafts for the local fairs, or are a CPA at home, you are in business. You are not required to rent or lease a space in order to be considered a business.

- 6) Income The amount of money you make from your goods or services is irrelevant to determining whether or not you operate a business.
- 7) *Ownership* If you have filed paperwork to be incorporated, or have created another legal entity (LLP, LP, LLC), then you are in business.
- 8) *Rent a Space* If you rent/lease a space, then you are in business.
- 9) *Sales Tax* If you have a Sales Tax Certificate, or if you collect sales tax, you are in business.
- 10) *Self-Employed* If you are self-employed and work for yourself, you are in business.
- 11) *Trade Name Certificate* If you have filed a Trade Name Certificate with the Town Clerk, or have a Trade Name that you use for your operation, you are in business.

The Assessor's Office can be reached by phone at (860) 345-8531 x 213 or 226. You can email the Assessor at assessor@haddam. org or stop by the office. We are open Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm; Thursday from 8:30 am to 6:00 pm and on Fridays from 8:30 am to 12:00 noon.

2020 Revaluation

Revaluations are conducted every 5 years with a full revaluation every 10 years. The revaluation we completed in 2015 was an interim revaluation. The 2020 revaluation is a full measure and list of all properties.

The major phases to a municipal revaluation are Data Collection, Market Analysis, Valuation, Field Review and Informal Hearings eQuality Valuation Services LLC was hired to conduct our revaluation. The inspections should be starting within the next few weeks. There will be an introduction letter sent to you before they start the inspection in your neighborhood. The inspectors will be wearing ID badges and have appropriate credentials. This process will continue through the summer of 2020.

In the event that you are not available during the time they will be in your neighborhood we will also be sending data mailers for your review and correction of any incorrect information. The inspectors will also be taking new photos of the front exterior of your home for our database. We appreciate your cooperation in this process.

If you have access to the internet, I would encourage you to review your property record card for accuracy before your inspection. It will alert you to potential issues that you may want to bring to our attention during our visit. If you do not have access to the internet, you can always call our office, or stop by, and we can review the data with you before your inspection. Online property record cards can be found at: www.haddam.org.

I encourage all taxpayers to stop by, or call, if they have questions regarding their specific property, or any general assessment questions.

Board of Assessment Appeals

The Board of Assessment Appeals has completed its work for the prior fiscal year. Meetings were held in September for motor vehicles and March for real estate, personal property and supplemental motor vehicles.

The Board would like to remind taxpayers that fall means a mailing from the Assessor requiring a Declaration of Personal Property be completed. This form goes out only to someone running a business based in Haddam. If you do not complete the form or file it by the deadline, there is a penalty. The penalty is 25% of the assessment of the personal property.

The Board of Assessment Appeals cannot rebate this penalty, per state statutes. Please see the Assessor or the Assistant Assessor for assistance. They are more than willing to guide you. Also, keep a copy for use in completing next year's form.



Fund. The money will go to buy safety related equipment (bullet proof vests, tracking beacon collars, etc) that these specialized dogs need to stay safe while they do their important jobs, helping protect CT residents.

The Brothers and their families learned from Ct State Police TFC Matt Weber about the relationship he has had with his German Shep-

ard K9, named Tazz. Born in Czechoslovakia, Tazz joined Matt, his work partner, as a puppy and immediately went into training.

While in lodge, Tazz continuously demonstrated his fascination with his favorite tennis ball. When his expertise is needed to

The Hartford Whalers – Forever and Always

The iconic logo is omnipresent. There are Hartford Whalers hats, t-shirts, and sweatshirts seemingly everywhere. It doesn't take much to get the conversation going. Bumping into someone with Whalers' gear spawns a trading of stories, a bonding moment full of laughs and nostalgia. Why do we still care so much, yearn for the past, and continue to hope for the future?

Alums like Chuck Kaiton, the beloved voice of the Whalers and John Forslund, former Whalers PR director/television broadcaster and now television broadcaster for the Carolina Hurricanes and NBC, provide some answers.

They fondly recall the Whalers as a pioneering organization that focused its efforts around the community and the fans. Together, they can compile a number of firsts: the first National Hockey League (NHL) team to earmark a charity as its own (the UConn Children's Cancer Fund); the first NHL team to have a team store right in the arena; the first NHL team to boast a blimp that dropped prizes and gift certificates to the crowd. Kaiton points out that the Whalers came up with the idea for a skills competition for the 1986 All-Star game held in Hartford. The team spearheaded youth hockey development that ultimately evolved into today's local elite programs. "We were ahead of our time," said Kaiton. "Speaking engagements, school visits. It cemented the relationship between the team and the community. The 1980s were a great period with a lot of innovation that has carried into today."

Forslund agrees. The tradition continued into the 1990s with events like the "Tip-

a-Whaler" fundraiser (soon after adopted by the Kings) and Casino Nights (also later in vogue). "When we had PR and marketing meetings, we talked about programs with high schools and boys and girls clubs. It was grass roots." The community connection remains, he says, due to the hands on nature of the team.

The history is also special - beginning with the upstart World Hockey Association (WHA) to become the only U.S. based WHA team to enter the NHL in 1979. There are so many names and moments. Gordie Howe, of course. The playoff run in 1986. And there were the low moments. The Ron Francis trade in 1991. The ultimate heartbreak? The move to Carolina.

The Whaler passion endures. For the past three years, the Hartford Yard Goats host a Whalers Alumni Weekend. "It's terrific," says Kaiton. He, among other Whalers, attends every year. The weekend kicks off with tradition - visiting patients at the UConn Health Center. A luncheon on Saturday precedes the first pitch that is thrown out by the Whalers alumni. There an autograph session.

The Whalers Booster Club continues a presence. Once down to 30 or so members it is 140+ strong.

The club meets monthly. It provides for an annual scholarship for a CT student, organizes a trip to see at least one NHL game a year, and continues to hope for a Whalers return. "We do what we can to try to bring back a team," says Mark Anderson, a member since 2011. "Since we can't do it with money, we keep the name out there. We keep the spirit alive."

There are Whalers, too numerous to mention, still making a hockey impact. A few examples include; Joel Quenneville (Florida Panthers' coach), Dave Tippett (Edmonton coach), Ron Francis (Seattle GM), Mike Liut (agent), Ray Ferraro (broadcaster), and Mark Johnson (University of Wisconsin women's coach).

Both Kaiton and Forslund refer to the Whalers in terms of "we." Kaiton was there for the NHL start. "I was the luckiest person to be chosen and to broadcast from day one. I will never forget it. The relationships with management, the players, the fans ... so passionate. I really cherish the memories. 18 years - I wish it were 28 or 38." Forslund joined the Whalers shortly after the Francis trade. "We were doing damage control," he recalls. The ticket base went from over 11,000 to around 6,000." But there were still high moments. "We got through a lot of adversity. The fans came back. We wanted to be more competitive. The team was good enough to make the playoffs."

Forslund vividly recalls broadcasting the last Whalers game. It took

him until a few years ago to actually watch. He wasn't sure he had done the moment justice. "It was the toughest thing I've ever done in my career," he notes. "How do you go on the air for the last game? There's no playbook for closing a franchise and leaving a city. How do you present that so it makes sense...is poignant. No one wanted to see it happen. We did [the broadcast] in the right way. You could feel the emotion of the fans."

As Kaiton puts it the Whalers years "were special years and it was a special place." The same goes for Forslund. "That's the one thing to convey, how special that time was...It was like family."
