First Selectwoman's Corner

The seasons here in New England seem to be playing tricks on us lately. Winter had remarkably spring-like weather, while spring gave us wintry weather, and May arrived with showers that are traditionally in April! But it appears that our summer has finally arrived, and we can all celebrate.

The Town Budget Meeting was held on May 15, 2017 at the Lyme-Old Lyme Middle School, where a proposed budget for FY 2018 of \$33,655,007 was presented, representing an increase of 2.61% over the prior year's budget. After a presentation by the Chairman of the Board of Finance, Andy Russell, on the significant changes within the budget, the voters approved the budget. The mill rate for FY 2018 will be 21.75 mills, an increase of .55 mills. Special thanks to the entire Board of Finance for its diligent work throughout the winter to develop a budget that keeps Old Lyme a reasonable place to live.

It has been a busy spring for projects as well. Phase 1 of the Boathouse Hains Park Improvements project has been completed, after three years of planning, design, review and construction. The Board of Selectmen held a ribbon cutting ceremony on May 6, 2017 with approximately 100 people in attendance. With the sun coming out just at the beginning of the ceremonies, the newly built Fred Emerson Boathouse on Rogers Lake was dedicated. After hearing about Mr. Emerson's philanthropy supporting the


sport of rowing, it was fitting that the boathouse should continue to bear his name. Selectman Sibley shared the history of Fred's efforts in our community, as well as his personal background, which prompted the rowing community to discuss an area within the boathouse dedicated to that history. Special thanks to the Fundraising Committee for the

Hains Park Improvements for coordinating the event, as well as successfully raising nearly \$50,000, which will be used for further enhancements of Hains Park. Phase 2 of this project includes a renovation of the bathrooms in the Park, making them ADA accessible, more secure and hopefully, year round accessible. The goal is to complete this project before next winter sets in, but we will need to follow all standard processes for the project, including permitting and approvals from required Boards and Commissions. Stay tuned. Thank you to all the members of the BHPIC Committee for their diligent work over the past three years!

Avenue now has new sidewalks, newly configured parking with bumpouts, benches, trees, bike racks and more. The road has been paved with new striping, making it much easier to navigate. Special thanks to Selectwoman Nosal for her daily visits to the project to assure a quality job was being completed. If you venture down to Sound View Beach, you may notice the fence that has been erected between Sound View Beach and Miami Beach. As a reminder, Miami Beach is not a Town Beach, though for years the public has enjoyed free and unimpeded access to this privately owned beach. While many respect private property, others have abused this access, damaging property and trespassing on individual's private property. Miami Beach Association will now charge for access to its beach for the general public, but has committed to allowing residents of Old Lyme to get a season pass to the beach. The work on the Academy Lane Fire Dock will begin in earnest this summer, and should be completed before summer's end. The fire dock is essential for water access for fire emergencies anywhere within the village, and will serve the town for many years to come. It has been in deteriorated condition for decades, waiting for DEEP approval, town approval and final approval of the financing. With all of those approvals now in place, we will get one more project completed this summer. The Fire Department has been a supporter and advocate for completion of the project for years.

This summer, we will see the installation of LED street lights throughout town, saving the town money on both energy and maintenance. Chris Kerr (BOF), Tim Griswold (Treasurer), and I have worked closely with Tanko Lighting to develop the design maps and replacement schedule. Many of our neighboring towns have recently made the transition and are enjoying the benefits of LED lights. Thanks to the committee members for their support on this project.

Our new program, "On Exhibit at Old Lyme Town Hall," continues to sponsor artwork exhibits for local organizations in the halls of Memorial Town Hall. Over the last year, we have expanded our display areas throughout the building so more organizations can enjoy sharing their talent. In April, the winners of the Annual Photo Contest sponsored by local Land Trusts were on exhibit, and in May and June, the Connecticut Valley Camera Club have their top photos on display. The Senior Center Art Class will once again display their artwork, both drawings and continued on page 4

Assessor's Office

Personal Property forms will be mailed at the end of September. Forms are due on or before 11/1/2017. A 25% penalty is imposed on the assessed value if postmarked after 11/1/2017. In order for new residents in town to have their Veteran's Exemption on their properties, they must file their DD214 (Discharge papers) with the Town Clerk before October 1, 2017.

Anyone interest in applying for Farm, Forest and Open Space must file an application (available in the Assessor's office) and present it to the Assessor between September 1 and October 31, 2017. Any questions: contact 860-434-1605 Ext. 219 (Mickie Fraser, Administrative Assessment Technician). Office hours are Monday through Friday 9 am to 4 pm.

Transfer Station/Landfill Hours. The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am-3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am-4 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.






On Exhibit at Old Lyme Town Hall



Tax Collector's Notice

Notice is hereby given to the Taxpayers of the Town of Old Lyme that I have a warrant to collect the taxes on the Grand List of October 1, 2016. Motor Vehicle taxes are due in full July 1, 2017. Real Estate and Personal Property bills may be paid in full on that date; however, Real Estate and Personal Property bills over \$100.00 are paid in two installments: July 1, 2017 and January 1, 2018. Partial payments are always accepted. If the tax due, or installment due, is not paid within one month of the due date, the tax becomes delinquent and subject to interest at the rate of one and one half percent (1 1/2%): 18% per year. The minimum interest charge is \$2.00. August interest is 3%.

Beach Stickers are available online at the Town's website www.oldlyme-ct.gov or in the Selectman's Office, Monday through Friday, 9 am – 3 pm. Price for a beach sticker is \$25 and \$20 for senior citizens over 60. Car registration must be shown and additional proof of property ownership (if vehicle is registered in a place other than Old Lyme) may be required at time of purchase. Please note the cost for replacement stickers is \$25 unless the original sticker is returned (regardless of condition).

In addition, weekly cottage renters (with lease dates) can request a temporary beach pass for use during their stay for \$25, and we also offer a temporary day pass for \$10 for other special circumstances. Please visit the Selectman's Office or phone Michele Hayes (860.434.1605, ext. 212) for details and purchase of these passes as well as additional questions you may have. Thank you!

Rogers Lake Authority News

Every leap year Rogers Lake is to be lowered in the fall so that landowners can perform any maintenance at the water's edge. This did not happen in 2016 because of the drought. The hope is the lake can be lowered for this activity after Labor Day of this year. Monitor the Rogers Lake Authority website at http://www.oldlyme-ct.gov/Pages/OldLymeCT_Bcomm/rogers_lake/index for any updates.

The Rogers Lake Authority deploys a patrol boat on Rogers Lake for 30 hours a week during the summer months to promote safe activities on the lake. Allowed 10 am to 6 pm weekdays and to 7 pm weekends. Wakeless speed (6 mph) within 200 feet of shore, rafts of other boats.

TRAFFIC PATTERN

At speeds above 6 mph, go in a counterclockwise direction. Keep islands on your left when going North. Go one-way South on West side of Picnic Island.

New Zoning Regulations

Effective June 1, 2017, new zoning regulations will protect the aquifers that provide drinking water to the wells in Town. The new regulations control certain activities that can cause pollution to Old Lyme's groundwater. Homeowners' activities will not be affected; commercial activities, such as excavation, salvage yards and dry cleaning processing will be regulated. The Zoning Commission passed the new regulations in order to ensure that our groundwater continues to be plentiful and clean and that our wells keep providing sufficient, good quality drinking water for our families and businesses. The Commission meets on the second Monday of each month at 7:30 pm in the Town Hall Meeting Hall. All meetings are open to the public.

No Smoking Allowed

NO SMOKING ALLOWED on Town Properties, including parks and beaches

The Town of Old Lyme is committed to maintaining and improving the health and well-being of the community and has determined that the prohibition of all smoking and tobacco product use at, on or near Town facilities is a matter of public health. Therefore, the following policy became effective on May 1, 2017:

No person shall smoke (e.g., cigarette, pipe, cigar, electronic cigarette, hookah pipe) or use any form of tobacco (e.g., chewing tobacco) at, on or within twenty-five (25) feet of any Town facility, except in specially designated areas, or in any Town-owned vehicle.

TOWN FACILITIES SPECIFICALLY INCLUDE, BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO,

Memorial Town Hall; Firehouses at Lyme Street, Cross Sound View Beach;

Lymes' Senior Center; Lane, and Boughton Road; and all Town owned, leased or Police Station; Cross Lane Park; rented buildings, athletic fields, Public Works Garage; Hains Park; playgrounds, tennis courts, Animal Control; Town Woods Park; basketball courts, Open Space,

Transfer Station; White Sand Beach; and/or hiking trails.

Appropriate signage about this policy will be posted at all Town facilities, and any designated location where smoking and/or use of tobacco products is permitted will be clearly identified and posted. This policy shall apply to all persons using Town facilities. Use of Town facilities is contingent upon compliance with this policy. Dog licenses will be available in the Town Clerk's office in June and should be purchased by June 30, 2017.

FEE: Male or Female - \$19.00

Neutered Male or Spayed Female - \$8.00

PENALTY: Late Fee - \$1.00 per month

after June

- All dogs six months or older must be licensed and wear a collar and tag at all times.
- A dog without a tag is presumed to be unlicensed and is not protected by law.

- An assigned tag must be used on the dog described in the license bearing the corresponding number.
- A dog owner is liable for damage done by owner's dog, including damage to shrubs, flowers or trees.
- All dogs must be vaccinated against rabies and proof of the vet's certificate must be submitted to the Town Clerk when licensing a dog. (Per CGS Sec. 22-338).
- Owners of roaming dogs are liable to prosecution.

 When a spayed or neutered dog is licensed for the first time, a certificate from a licensed vet must be presented.

containers are clearly marked and the same colors as household containers in Old Lyme. All recyclables can go in the green Mixed Recycling containers. The Town of Old Lyme Recycling Committee would like to thank Public Works, Parks and Recreation, and First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsnyder for their help with the new containers.

Rental Properties: Homeowners, please help renters recycle! Renters may not be familiar with what can be recycled in Old Lyme. A link to the above website or printed material, as well as labeled and easy accessible recycling containers should be provided. Renters should be reminded that recycling is mandatory in the State of Connecticut.

Reminder: Anything put in recycling containers must be **Empty and Clean!**

New info for plastic bags and plastic wrap: Old Lyme is working with the CT W.R.A.P. program to help increase the recycling of all types of plastic wrap (bread bags, cereal bags, plastic overwrap, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, etc.), not just plastic grocery store bags. This type of plastic can be brought back to many stores just like your grocery bags can. All plastic returned should be clean and dry. A Reminder from the Harbor **Management Commission**

Boating season is upon us and I want to remind those who plan to install a mooring that a current permit is required. The information & instructions regarding permits and the fillable application is available online at oldlyme-ct.gov on the Harbor Management Commission page. The application fee is \$25 for the year. New permit applications require a Mooring Inspection Form as well. If submitting a renewal, be sure that you sent an inspection form last year or the application will be returned pending receipt of an inspection report.

All mooring float balls should be white with a blue stripe across the middle. The last name of the permit holder and the weight of the anchor must be painted legibly on the ball. Magic marker and tape do not last so painting is advisable. In July, inspection of mooring fields takes place to be sure all moorings in Old Lyme waters have permits. Moorings without permits or identification will get a warning sticker and thereafter if no contact is made within 3 weeks, the mooring may be pulled under the authority of the Harbor Master. Claiming a mooring that had no permit or could not be identified will require payment of the hauling charge and possibly a fine per the Harbor Management Plan. I hope that you all enjoy a safe and fun boating season in the exceptional waters of Old Lyme. Please contact me if you have questions or concerns.





Lyme-Old Lyme Schools Reap Honors Galore

LYME-OLD LYME SCHOOLS KEEP ON WINNING!

The district and its students have earned a series of prestigious honors in recent months.

First, when the Advanced Placement (AP) performance rankings were released by the College Board in February, Lyme-Old Lyme High School (LOLHS) not only came in second in the state in terms of performance but also ranked fifth in AP course participation. The school offers a total of 17 AP courses, as well as numerous online AP options, and throughout New London and Middlesex Counties, no other district placed higher than 20th in AP performance.

Secondly, soon after the announcement of the AP rankings came news that LOLHS had performed exceptionally well in the Shoreline Arts Alliance's annual art show. All 18 works submitted by LOLHS students were juried into the show, and seven went on to receive awards. Margaret Berger, Claudia Mergy and Skyelar Shaw also received awards at this year's Connecticut Scholastic Art competition, hosted by the Connecticut Art Education Association. Mergy received

a Gold Key for her painting "Asparagus and Cupcakes," which advanced to the national competition. Shaw and Berger received Silver Keys, and Shaw was offered a scholarship by the University of Hartford in recognition of her portfolio's quality.

And finally, in March, Lyme-Old Lyme Middle School's team came first in the Connecticut Science Olympiad State Championship. The school has won this championship five of the past six years and advanced to the national competition in Dayton, Ohio in late May. The Science Olympiad competitions include 23 team events in subjects such as anatomy, chemistry, genetics, mechanical engineering, and technology. The LOLMS team earned gold medals in nine events, silver medals

in 10 events, and bronze medals in three events.

SENIOR FARMERS' MARKET NUTRITION PROGRAM (SFMNP)

Individuals 60 years of age or older, with incomes that do not exceed 185% of poverty income guidelines are eligible.

Each eligible recipient receives six (6) three-dollar (\$3) checks (\$18 per recipient, per market season), which can be redeemed at FMNP authorized markets throughout Connecticut for fruits, vegetables, fresh cut herbs, and honey. Contact the office to request the checks if you are eligible, or for more information.

RENTERS' REBATE

The application period for the Elderly/ Totally Disabled Renters' Rebate program runs through October 1st. State law provides a reimbursement program for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Please contact the office for more information or to make an appointment to apply for this program.

Old Lyme Social Services offers help with information, paperwork and documentation processing for many of the state and federal programs available to residents. Bugs and more.... FOODBORNE ILLNESS

Summer will be here before we know it and with the warm weather

comes the risk of food borne illness. Bacteria grows fastest in hot and humid conditions. Enjoy your picnics and barbecues by keeping these four simple food safety rules in mind.

- Clean: unwashed hands are often the culprit of food borne illness. Wash your hands with warm, soapy water before handling food and after using the bathroom, changing diapers, and handling pets. When soap and water is not available, use hand wipes or a hand sanitizer.
- Separate: cross-contamination during preparation, grilling, and serving food is a prime cause of food-borne illness. Wrap raw meat securely and store below any uncooked items to prevent droplet contamination and don't re-use cutting boards or plates that were used to prepare raw meat, especially poultry.
- Cook: use a thermometer to ensure that food is thoroughly cooked to 165°F. Cook all meat at the picnic site. Partial cooking of food ahead of time allows bacteria to survive and multiply to the point that subsequent cooking cannot destroy it.
- Chill: Cold refrigerated perishable food like luncheon meats, cooked meats, chicken, and potato or pasta salads should be kept in an insulated cooler packed with several inches of ice, ice

packs, or containers of frozen water. Food should never remain in the "danger zone" (between 45° and 140°F) for more than 4 hours.

TICKBORNE DISEASE

We all have heard that due to the mild winter, ticks will be in abundance this summer. None of us want to get Lyme Disease or any other tick borne diseases, so follow these recommendations to help protect you and your family.

- Walk in the center of trails; avoid wooded and brushy areas with high grass and leaf litter.
- Use an insect repellent that contains 20 percent or more DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin for protection that lasts several hours. Go to the EPA website and search insect repellents.
- **Use products that contain permethrin** on clothing or treat clothing with products containing 0.5% permethrin. It remains protective through several washings.
- Bathe or shower within 2 hours after being outside to help wash off ticks and find them more easily.
- **Do a full body check for ticks** especially under the arms, in and around the ears, inside the belly button, behind the knees, between the legs, around the waist, and especially in hair.
- Check clothing and pets for ticks. Tumble dry clothing on

high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks or wash clothing in hot water.

MOSQUITO-BORNE DISEASE

Mosquito-borne disease, like West Nile Virus and Eastern Encephalitis, are a real concern in Connecticut, so here are some recommendations to keep those pesky mosquitos from biting you this summer.

- Use insect repellents when you go outdoors. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, and some oil of lemon eucalyptus and para-menthane-diol products provide longer-lasting protection.
- When weather permits, wear long sleeves, long pants, and socks when outside.
- **Limit outdoor activities** from dusk to dawn during peak mosquito biting hours.
- Install or repair window screens.

- Empty standing water in pots, wading pools, bird baths, tires and other containers.
- If you need assistance or advice on treating standing water on your property, a District Sanitarian can help. Ledge Light Health District has purchased a supply of larvicide briquettes (dunks) that can be used to treat standing water of less than 400 square feet on private property. This larvicide prevents mosquitoes from developing into adults. For more information please call Patti Myers at 860-434-1605 ext. 214.

If you have special needs or are homebound please fill out the forms either from Lyme or Old Lyme to assist us.

In April we held a Blood Pressure Clinic during lunch hour at the High School. Over seventy students and faculty members attended, another record.

The Old Lyme Historical Society brought renewed life and luster to an old lady this month. The lady in question was the back drop or "grand drape" as they are called, discovered rolled up at the back of the stage at Grange #162. The building and its contents at 55 Lyme Street were purchased by the Society in 2014. OLHSI

has been slowly renovating the building ever since, using mostly voluntary professional labor headed up by Ellis Jewett. Among the projects last month was to work on the stage, and bolster the supports for our "lady" and restore the scene depicted with its accompanying advertisements paid for by local merchants. Thanks to some sleuthing by Co-Chair Mark Lander, the Society discovered Curtains Without Borders, founded by Christine Hadsel, an organization whose mission it is to document and restore historic painted theater curtains throughout New England. Mark contacted Chris Hadsel, and a date was set for her and her colleague, Wylie Garcia, to come to Old Lyme for a two-day intensive restoration project. A crew of six volunteers was assembled on Friday, April 21 to assist the Curtains Without Borders professionals. By Saturday afternoon our "lady" was glowing once more.

The Society held an Open House on Monday, May 29, 2017 from 11 am to 2 pm, following the Memorial Day parade. Photos and

a short talk about the curtain were featured at that time.

The Connecticut Hand Weavers took a break while the curtain was being restored. They are now revving up for summer long activities at 55 Lyme Street and have resumed their demonstration work with the community loom every Tuesday morning, 10-12 noon. This is open and free to the public.

The Society is a co-sponsor of the annual Old Lyme Town Band Concert held Sunday at 4 pm, July 16, 2017 on the town green next to the First Congregational Church and in front of the Rectory of Christ the King Roman Catholic Church. The Society is proud to support our very talented town band. Our thanks go to Christ the King, the Historic Commission, and to the Florence Griswold Museum for being co-sponsors for this event. We also thank the Chamber of Commerce for underwriting the cost of ice cream supplied free to the public by the Old Lyme Ice Cream Store. The public is asked to bring their own lawn chairs.



FLORENCE GRISWOLD MUSEUM FLORA / FAUNA

The 101 works in Flora/Fauna: The Naturalist Impulse in American Art (on view June 3 through September 17, 2017) survey the history of environmentally-conscious artists in the United States from the dawn of the 19th century through the mid-20th century. The exhibition begins with early-American artists such as the Peale family, John James Audubon and their contemporaries, then examines the naturalist impulse in works by the Hudson River School, American Pre-Raphaelites, and American Impressionist artists before featuring select 20th-century artist-natu-

ralists such as Roger Tory Peterson, creator of widely-used bird guides. Works in the exhibition reveal how artistic production corresponded with social developments in American history, from an early concern with establishing a national identity distinct from Europe; to reflecting Americans' shifting philosophies on evolution and the human relationship to the environment; to the growth of the conservation movement in the United States.

When members of the Lyme Art Colony made nature the focus of their practice, they were drawing on an American tradition that began one hundred years earlier with some of the country's first artist-naturalists and explorers. Today, issues of climate change, land conservation, and preservation of endangered species and habitats have acquired new urgency in the twenty-first century, making the chronicling of America's natural history through art more relevant than ever. The Florence Griswold Museum remains dedicated to the pursuits of the artist-naturalist by fostering the understanding of American art with an emphasis on the art, history, and landscape of Connecticut.

Coming to the Museum with children? The Museum's youngest patrons will enjoy the newest keepsake publication, My Sticker Book Guide to the Florence Griswold Museum. The booklet, beautifully illustrated by Lyme Academy College of Fine Arts graduate Kelsey Ross, tells the story of Miss Florence and her artist friends.

White Wines - Steel vs. Oak

Steel vs. Oak is a choice made by the winemaker. During the wine making process, white wines are fermented in steel tanks, French oak or American oak barrels and, although not as common, in cement vats. By the mere selection of what type of barrel or tank is used, the winemaker can impart a particular flavor from that source into the wine. If you are a person who enjoys Pinot Grigios or Sauvignon Blanc, it is the crispness that excites your palette. This also includes citrus and tropical fruit ending with a clean sometimes tart finish. The brightness of these wines are due mostly to the stainless steel tanks. That's not to say that these and other similar wines are never put in oak. They may rest in oak for a few months or small percentages of the wine.

Chardonnays are fermented in stainless steel or oak barrels and then might be aged for 6 months up to a couple of years. This additional aging enhances the flavor of the wine with a rich, woody taste. It may impart flavors of vanilla and sometimes smoky and spicy. This leaves the wine with a full and rich finish. It is well known in the industry that the use of new oak barrels gives a fuller taste than older or used barrels. Also smaller casks produce more of that oak flavor than larger ones.

All of these choices give the winemaker freedom to develop their own unique structure and taste of a particular wine.

Looking for a crisp dry Chardonnay, try a French Chablis. The wine has a mineral and limestone finish, great with seafood. Sauvignon Blanc and Pinot Grigio are an excellent choice if you are having a light dish. Something heavier such as creamy chicken warrants a rich oaky chardonnay. I hope this has given you a better insight towards white wines and their particular fermentation process. Enjoy your choices, of which there are many.

"BUY LAND - THEY'RE NOT MAKING IT ANYMORE."

The Old Lyme Land Trust has taken Mark Twain's advice to heart during its 51st year. Two more parcels were added to the Trust's preserves so far in 2017. The largest parcel was acquired by the Trust from The Nature Conservancy. It is 185 acres and known as Lay Preserve. Near RT 1 on the east side of Old Lyme, the property has two loop hiking trails, marked in orange and blue. Easy to access, a day on the Lay can lead you to think you are miles away from civilization while being right in town.

The second completed acquisition was 10 acres of the former Denison Farm. This small but beautiful property contains numerous stone walls, remnants of the old farm, and plenty of wildlife habitats. The Denison Farm property is another link in the plan of developing a greenway through Old Lyme and connecting with open spaces in other towns. The total acreage preserved by the Trust now exceeds 1100 acres! All of the Trust's holdings are open to the public, and maintained for all to enjoy.

In March, the Trust held its 51st annual meeting at the Lymes' Senior Center. The Trust annually honors a "Volunteer of the Year." The honoree is selected for the hours of time they donate to the Trust to maintain and improve one of the Trust's 14 preserves, continued on page 40

or in some significant way, has helped the Trust to progress on its goal of "Keeping Tomorrow Green," not only for the town and people of Old Lyme, but also for the entire area and the enjoyment of all who wish to use the open spaces.

In 2017, there were two noted honorees: Anne Galliher and Jonathan Lathrop. Anne and John are the volunteer stewards of the John Lohmann CT River Preserve. As such, they walk the property regularly to insure that trails are open and safe, that trees have not been toppled by storms, that invasive plant species are not encroaching on the park-like portions of the property, and to survey any needs for maintenance to insure that the property is open, available and safe for public use. They spend hours lovingly caring for the land. Anne also devotes her skills to the Trust as the corporate secretary. In that capacity, she process donations to the Trust, sends numerous thank you's to donors, and manages matching grants from IBM, Pfizer, and other corporate donors.

The Trust is continuing work on management plans for all the preserves. To date, seven of 14 needed plans are complete. These plans detail maintenance and improvements to the preserves, and for those lands bequeathed to the Trust, the plans indicate how the land is to be maintained according to the wishes of the donor.

The Trust currently operates with a Board of Trustees consisting of nine dedicated volunteers. Anyone interested in joining the board would be welcome. The Trust is open to new general members and anyone looking for volunteer opportunities. Work parties are held regularly.

Mark your calendars to visit the Trust's booth at the Midsummer Festival. You will be able to meet wild birds rescued and rehabilitated, and some of Old Lyme's local reptiles. 

But the survival of honey bees is threatened. Parasitic mites, viruses and pathogens, exposure to pesticides, and fewer open flowering meadows for bee forage contribute to colony losses.

YOU CAN HELP

- Don't spray herbicides on dandelions! Dandelions provide nectar in the spring for bees and beneficial insects, as they transition from a long winter to the abun dance of spring blossoms. (startribune.com/top-ten-bee-friendly-tips-2-tolerate-dandelions-and-other-useful-weeds/257190851/)
- Buy only organic untreated vegetable flower seed and birdseed, labeled organic. Non-organic seed is usually treated with herbicide during growth, causing a systemic effect on the entire plant. Good sources to buy seed: Foodworks, Natureworks,

- Hudson Valley Seed Co, Accord, NY 12404.
- Plant pollinator-friendly flowers.
- Lobby your state representatives to support honey bee inspection and education programs.




