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## **First Selectman's Corner**

The last three months have been like no others we have experienced. Not long after the last Old Lyme Events article, we started hearing more about the novel coronavirus (COVID 19) that originated in Wuhan, China. It spread west to Europe and east to South Korea, Japan and ultimately the west coast of the United States. There were dire predictions about how many Americans would be infected (1.7 million) and die (170,000). When it got a firm grip on New York City, it seemed as if we in Connecticut were next, waiting for the pandemic hurricane to sweep over us, and there was little we could do. There was no vaccine to take and the personal protective equipment (PPE) and hospital ventilators were in woefully short supply.

On March 16th, the Board of Selectmen signed a Declaration of Health Emergency and on March 18th, the Town Hall was closed to the public. Some Town Hall staff continued to work in Town Hall while others worked from home. Most town boards and commissions are now meeting using such electronic formats as WebEx and Zoom. Because town meetings may not be held at present, the Governor 's Executive Order allows the Regional School District 18 Board of Education to approve the school budget and the Old Lyme Board of Finance to approve the town budget. We do have items that will need to be approved at a future town meeting but that must wait for now. Our public works employees and police kept functioning as did the Town's Emergency Services staff and volunteers. All public schools in Connecticut shut down on March 16th and the teachers scrambled to implement lesson plans for distance learning. The Governor closed non-essential businesses which has had a profound effect on retail stores, restaurants and other operations.

Old Lyme had its first "positive" COVID-19 case reported on March 29. As of May 2nd, we have a total of 15

reported cases, including one related death. We have been practicing social distancing in public places and staying at home as much as possible. The Governor has issued dozens of Executive Orders, one of which prohibits short-term property rentals for periods of less than 32 days, excepting to essential workers needing to self-isolate from their family members.

I made the difficult and controversial decision to close the Old Lyme public beaches effective May 2nd until further notice. The primary reason was related to the beaches at Sound View which attract crowds of several hundred young, non-resident people on warm, sunny days. With the first warm, sunny weekend forecast **continued on page 5**

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this season and "cabin fever" at its highest, the team of advisors I assembled concluded that we had to prepare for the worst rather than do nothing and react to a potentially bad situation. We also concluded that we could not close the Sound View area while allowing White Sand Beach and Hains Park to remain open; thereby creating a distinction between town residents and public at large. The beach closings will hopefully be for a short duration because we know many of our town's businesses depend on seasonal customers.

Other effects from COVID-19 have been the cancellation of the Town's Memorial Day Parade and the Mid-Summer Festival. Another regrettable cancellation is the graduation ceremonies for our high school seniors, but plans are underway to make the best of a bad situation for all concerned.

There are some positive notes amongst all this unfortunate news. The Old Lyme Public Safety Departments (Ambulance, Fire and Police) conducted a vehicle parade throughout town on Friday April 24th. It was a loud and well received thank you from the front line responders to the townspeople for their support. There have also been numerous acts of generosity such as the \$2,000 donation from the Old Saybrook Rotary Club for Emergency Services PPE and over \$50,000 in donations to the Lymes Youth Services Bureau fund to help struggling local people. There are many local sources of help and assistance, many of which may be found on the Town's web page. We all look forward to things returning to normal or, at least, a new normal soon. Hopefully, the COVID-19 virus will subside to the point where we all may get back to work and resume the activities we all love.

#### **OTHER LOCAL NEWS IN BRIEF**

Following the Town's five-year revaluation by Vision Appraisal Inc., the Town's Grand List (taxable value of real estate, vehicles and personal property) decreased 2.47%. One should note – when the Grand List decreases, the taxes must increase to support a level amount of spending. While the school budget actually decreased slightly and the town budget increased slightly, the decrease in the Grand List and the increase in Old Lyme portion of the school budget (based solely on student count) caused the town's mill rate to increase from 22.41 to 23.2. Thanks to the School Board and the Old Lyme Board of Finance for their hard work.

The Board of Selectmen selected the Low Interest Rate Option in the Governor's Executive Order 7S which provides relief to taxpayers for their tax bills due on 1 July 2020. If taxpayers do not pay their taxes by the end of July, the unpaid portion will bear an annual interest rate of 3.00% (0.25%/month) rather than 18.00% (1.5%/month) from July 1st until paid during August and September. 

will lose the low interest benefit and be charged 18.00% back to July 1st.

#### TOWN PROJECT UPDATES

**Sound View Water & Sewer:** Due to COVID-19, CT Water suspended its work to replace certain water lines and to make lateral connections to houses. The Town and the three private beach associations (Old Lyme Shores, Old Colony & Miami) have been working on documents concerning the assets they will share for the sewers (collection pipe, pump station and force main to East Lyme) and the intermunicipal agreements with East Lyme and New London that govern the charges for processing our sewage. A future Town meeting will likely be necessary to approve certain rights of way for the sewer pipes.

**Sound View Sidewalks:** The Town is working with an engineering company to design sidewalks on Hartford Ave. (from Bocce La. to Rte. 156) and along the north side of Rte. 156 (from Cross La. toward the Police Station.) The Town is responsible to pay engineering costs of \$40,000 and a State grant of \$400,000 will pay for the construction of the sidewalks.

Hains Park Bathroom Building: The Town is preparing to put out for bid the construction of a new bathroom building in Hains Park. The budget provides for \$150,000 for the building and we shall seek Town meeting approval to use the remaining funds in the Boathouse account (about \$32,000) to install an 800 gallon water storage system and a concrete crawl space under the building. The Committee plans to have construction begin in July.

**Senior Center Building Expansion:** The Towns of Lyme and Old Lyme have formed a committee to perform a needs assessment for a possible addition to the Senior Center. Each town has designated \$15,000 in its budget to fund the work of a consultant, yet to be determined, once the Committee has performed some preliminary work.

**Mile Creek Road Bridge Replacement:** Machnik Brothers Inc. is about to start work on replacing the bridge over the Black Hall River. We await the movement of the electric wires at the bridge before the work may begin. The bridge will be out for about two and a half months and there will be signs instructing motorists how to detour the work zone. The project is being funded by a 50% State grant.

**Grassy Hill Rd. Bridge Replacement:** The bridge at the beginning of Grassy Hill Rd. will be replaced next year. The Town was informed by the State that it must perform an archaeological survey of the work area before construction begins. The Town is also working with the various utilities to move a significant utility pole that is very close to the work area. The State will also fund 50% of this project.

Lt. Governor Bysiewicz has taken the lead in Connecticut to encourage everyone to complete the census forms that were mailed out. She noted recently that Old Lyme's response rate was 43% versus the State average of 56%. When speaking with someone from the Census 2020 organization, I found that the reason is because census cards were sent to all town property addresses and, as we know, many of the beach properties are owned by people who are not Old Lyme residents and they evidently did not return the card stating they do reside here. If you have not completed your census form (electronically or manually,) please do so as soon as possible. The census information has a direct bearing on how much funding our state receives and determines **continued on page 8**

how many congressmen/women we will have. You may recall Connecticut lost a Congressman after the last census.

I am pleased to report that the beaver problem in Bucky Brook/ Black Hall River just south of Black Hall Pond has been dealt with. With thanks to Michael Kiernan, President of the Old Lyme Land Trust, we were able to confirm that there is only one beaver dam between Black Hall Pond and Whippoorwill Rd. on the Trust's property. The Trust took steps to deal with the problem and the water should be flowing properly.

Last, but not least, we welcome our new Resident State Trooper Matt Weber. It's great that Matt is a resident of Old Lyme and, along with his K-9 Taz, has hit the road running. We also welcome two new part-time police officers - Benjamin Paul DeCrosta and Matt Ward. Ben retired from the East Haven Police Department as a Detective Sergeant and Matt, who is also an Old Lyme resident, recently retired from the CT State Police.

Now that the warm weather has returned, the Board of Selectmen hopes you are coping with COVID-19 as best you can and we all look forward to a timely return to our new normal. Be safe and be healthy.

#### Transfer Station/Landfill Hours:

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker, should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers,) along with a driver's license and registration.

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## **Assessor's Office**

The Assessor would like to bring to your attention the following important deadlines.

Notice of Extension of Deadline to File Annual Income & Expense Report with the Assessor's Office.

Executive Order 7S, §10, extends the taxpayer filing deadline in General Statutes § 12-63c to August 15, 2020

Section 12-63c (d) of the Connecticut General Statutes requires any owner of income producing real property to file an Income and Expense Report annually no later than the close of business June 1st. This includes owners of real property that is rented or leased, including commercial, retail, industrial and residential property. Please note there is no postmark provision to this statute and all late filings will be subject to a 10% penalty to be applied to the property assessment. Per CGS 12-41, all business operating in the Town of Old Lyme are required to file a list of Business Personal Property with the Assessor's Office on or before November 1, 2020. Declaration forms will be mailed by the end of September, failure to receive a form from our office does not relieve obligation of business owner to file prior to November.

Any Service Members eligible for a Veterans Exemption under CGS 12-81 must have on file their DD214 or equivalent discharge papers with the Town Clerk before October 1, 2020.

Per CGS 12-107 (b) – (g), any property owner wishing to file for Farm, Forest and Open Space under PA490 must file an application with the Assessor between September 1 and October 31. During the revaluation year applications are due by December 31, 2020. Further information and Applications are available on the assessor's page on the town website or in the Assessor's Office



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## **Tax Collector's Notice**

#### LEGAL NOTICE TOWN OF OLD LYME TAX COLLECTOR'S NOTICE

Notice is hereby given to the Taxpayers of the Town of Old Lyme that I have a warrant to collect the taxes on the Grand List of October 1, 2019. Motor Vehicle taxes are due in full July 1, 2020. Real Estate and Personal Property bills may be paid in full on that date. However, Real Estate and Personal Property bills over \$100.00 are paid in two installments, July 1, 2020 and January 1, 2021 Partial payments are always accepted.

If the tax due, or installment due, is not paid within one month of the due date, the tax becomes delinquent and subject to interest at the rate of three percent (3%) per annum, in arrears, so long as payment is made by October 1, 2020 in full. If the tax due, or installment due, is not paid by October 1, 2020, interest will be charged against the delinquent amount at the rate of eighteen percent (18%) per annum, in arrears to July 1, 2020. The minimum interest charge is \$2.00.

Any landlord will be eligible for the same three percent (3%) interest rate until October 1, 2020 only if the said landlord files with the Town tax collector, by July 1, 2020, a written

certification that the landlord has granted commensurate relief or forbearance to its/his/her tenants and lessees. The certification form and more particular information about it may be found on the Town's website as https://www.oldlyme-ct.gov/.

The three percent (3%) charge is established by approved motion of the Board of Selectmen dated April 20, 2020 under authority of the Governor's Executive Orders 7S and 7W.





## **Halls Road Improvement**

The Halls Road Improvement Committee (HRIC) is working to create a more vibrant and economically attractive streetscape that maintains the traditional charm of Old Lyme. Our focus is to make the future Halls Road attractive to businesses and Old Lyme residents alike. This is particularly important as local retail is under increasing pressure nationwide. Survey respondents agree: Any future development in the Halls Road area should match the traditional character of Old Lyme.

Analysis of inputs from surveys, public meetings, and economic data has brought

two aspects of the Halls Road master planning to the fore:

#### Create an Experiential Environment:

A pedestrian-friendly streetscape that takes advantage of the natural setting and encourages visitors to park, stroll, and browse is crucial for retail trade. The long-term ideal is to create a neighborhood that is an attractive meeting place for the whole town (as Lyme Street was for generations.)

**Zone as a Village District:** We are recommending the current Commercial [only] District be zoned as a Village District. If approved, this new zoning would open up opportunities for property owners to diversify their land use to include residential and open space while keeping within the traditional character of our town. Doing so would create, long-term, a more sustainable tax base; as well as position Halls Road as an attractive gateway to our town.

Components of our developing plan include sidewalks, a pedestrian bridge over the Lieutenant River, and other improvements. For previous reports and updates, please visit our web page: https://www.oldlyme-ct. gov/halls-road-improvements-committee.

There is no trash pick-up on the following holidays: Christmas (Dec. 25,) New Year's (Jan. 1,) Memorial Day (last Monday in May,) July 4th, Labor Day (first Monday in Sept.,) and Thanksgiving Day (fourth Thursday in Nov.). Trash normally collected on Thanksgiving is picked up the next day, and Fridays trash will advance to Saturday for pickup. For other holidays, trash pickup moves to the following day. Please be advised that CWPM DOES NOT take off the same Holidays as the Town does.

#### Please have trash container out at curbside by 6:00 am on your

**assigned day.** Containers should be three feet away from any other objects, such as mailboxes, cars, other containers, planters, etc. Please be mindful not to block breakdown/emergency lane with receptacle. Clearly mark your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. **Single stream curbside recycling pick-up** is provided for clean bottles, cans, plastics and paper products co-mingled in the green recycling carts every week. Additional automated trash and recycling containers should be ordered through Michele Hayes at: 860-434-1605, ext. 212 in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall, 52 Lyme Street. Containers cost \$80. Please mark clearly your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. Homeowners are responsible to replace lost, stolen or broken cans at their expense.

## **Transfer Station Information**

#### TRANSFER STATION/LANDFILL HOURS

The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am - 3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am - 4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayer's vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker, should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers,) along with a driver's license and registration.

**Bulky Waste and Demolition:** Vehicles will be charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5.

**Brush is charged on a per load basis** at \$40 per ton. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

**Grass clippings are not allowed** at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

#### Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station.

Residents are able to bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers (personal computers, mainframes, med-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs,



hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.


- 1 Veggie scraps, uncooked or cooked, without oil or salt. Moldy or freezer-burned veggies okay.
- 2 Fruit scraps and rinds, uncooked or cooked, are fine with sugar, honey, or molasses on them. Moldy or freezer -burned fruits okay.
- 3 Coffee grounds, tea bags, filters, bags, strings, tags.
- 4 Olive, avocado pits, other large seeds.
- 5 Expired herbs, spices, tea bags, tea leaves.
- 6 Eggshells, preferably crushed.
- 7 Shells of nuts and peanuts, salt-free.
- 8 Dry popcorn-Unpopped or popcorn chains, strings with cotton or burlap twine is compostable.
- 9 Leftover gelatin dishes, gelatin packets past expiration (sugar not a problem.)
- 10 Used potpourri and mulling spices.



Compost-ready items range from familiar to surprising

- 11 Paper napkins and paper towels are compostable free of glossy paper, or residue of dairy, meat, poultry, or fish. Traces of oil or liquids okay. Color is okay.
- 12 Plain brown gift boxes and plain newsprint, torn or shredded.
- 13 Plain gift tissue, without plastic or metallic sparkles. (Colors okay.)
- 14 Plain paper gift wrap or ribbon, without glossy, waxy, plastic, or metallic surfaces.
- 15 Plain egg cartons (no glossy paper or plastics).
- 16 Cardboard rolls inside paper towels, gift wrap, toilet paper
- 17 Plain envelopes (not metallic or coated).
- 18 Leaves and needles from Christmas trees and wreaths, dead poinsettias and bouquets.
- 19 Fireplace ashes, matches.
- 20 Cotton "snow" decorations without plastics or metallic sparkles, all-wool and all-cotton items.

On March 13, 2020, the Lyme-Old Lyme Schools announced an indefinite school closure due to the COVID-19 pandemic. A few days later Governor Lamont mandated that all schools statewide be closed. In response to this unplanned and potentially lengthy closing, the Lyme-Old Lyme Schools started preparing for a distance learning program. During the week of March 16, teachers and other staff members began making plans for this unprecedented occurrence. On March 20 all schools distributed materials to students and parents in preparation for the beginning of the distance learning program on March 23.

The Lyme-Old Lyme Schools were well prepared to adapt to this new-found reality based on years of preparation and effort to develop online learning tools. The district was able to supply all students in Kindergarten through grade 12 with an electronic device (laptop, Chromebook, or I-Pad) to ensure all students were able to participate remotely.


Teachers have used Google Classroom, Canvas, Google Meet,

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## The Plan to Reopen Connecticut's Colleges & Universities



On May 6th, Governor Lamont announced that he had received a detailed report with recommendations for a phased-in re-opening of Connecticut's private and public colleges and universities. The report was compiled by the education committee of the Reopen Connecticut Advisory Group,

State Representative Devin Carney

The recommended sequencing of the reopening is as follows... First, research programs and administra-

tive functions will be able to open on the same timetable as the first phase of the general business reopening (May 20th as of this article.) Next, early in the summer, workforce development programs at community colleges may open, and schools may allow back students who were unable to complete courses with lab or studio requirements for their spring degrees.

If public health conditions continue to improve, some institutions may resume graduate and some summer programs. By the end of the summer, undergraduate residential facilities may have the option to reopen.

The phase-in of this reopening, though, depends upon the status of public health conditions. The prevalence of COVID-19 must be low enough to allow for the safe reopening of campus, the institution must have adequate capacity for contact tracing, and schools that have residential facilities must have access to enough COVID-19 tests so that every student can be tested upon arrival. If a student tests positive, they must be immediately isolated.

The phase-in also requires schools to file reopening plans with DPH detailing how they plan on repopulating the campus, monitoring public health, containing the disease if detected, and shutting down campus, if necessary.

## Fire Well Signs & Your Fire Protection Rating

You may have noticed a couple of months ago, white reflective signs with a blue "W" were popping up all over town. The Town of Old Lyme, and specifically the Old Lyme Fire Department (OLFD,) is in the process of being evaluated for its Fire Protection Rating. The Fire Protection Rating is a factor that the insurance industry uses to calculate the cost of property insurance. One of the items we have been asked to develop is a better understanding of the fire well locations in town. All of Old Lyme's fire engines carry water ranging in capacity from 500 gallons to 2000 gallons, depending on the purpose and set up of the truck. The Town of Old Lyme has a small area that is covered by hydrants, supplemental fire protection water comes from Fire Wells. Fire Wells consist of ponds, streams, rivers, and cisterns. Extra water that is occasionally needed to control a fire comes these Fire Wells. Fire Wells are located on public and rivate roads and public and private property. The publicly accessible Fire Wells are maintained by the OLFD and the Town of Old Lyme Public Works department. We ask that if you have a Fire Well on your private property, please clear access to the water so we can place an Engine within several feet of the Fire Well to withdraw water and supply it to a fire for extinguishment. The access area should be able to accommodate a fire engine that is nearly 9' wide and up to 12' in height.

Other factors that affect the Fire Protection Rating, and the OLFD is providing, include equipment (apparatus, pumps, hose, ladders, tools, and material) quantities, condition, and testing records; personnel training type, hours, frequency, and content; inspection records; water supply (fire well and hydrant locations, access, and volume); dispatch systems, certifications, and methods in-

cluding radio infrastructure and computer programs and file systems.

Lastly, we want to relay to everyone in town, that the dedicated volunteers of the Old Lyme Fire Department are fully prepared to respond to any emergency during this COVID-19 pandemic. We have had to adjust our operations to fit the criteria from the State level, but we have found ways to communicate to our membership, brought in an online training system and ensuring we have the proper the PPE required so can respond effectively. The Old Lyme Fire Department would like to thank all the citizens that supported us through this time and also thank those who made signs, waved and saluted during our First Responder Parade. We know it made us feel good and hope it brought some joy to the town.



Home visits from the Town Nurse are provided one per month, free of charge, to individuals. For couples needing care, the Town Nurse can visit the home twice per month at two week intervals. If you need additional skilled nursing services, the Old Lyme Visiting Nurse Association can work with our agency, the Visiting Nurse Association of Southeastern Connecticut to provide these services.

Since 1922, the Old Lyme Visiting Nurse Association has provided healthcare to residents of all ages. OLVNA awards scholarships to high school graduates from Old Lyme and Lyme who plan to pursue healthcare degrees. We also hold a Flu Vaccine Clinic and Wellness Fair in the fall and a Blood Pressure Clinic in the spring.

## What is Your COVID-19 Mental Health Temperature?

On a scale of 0–10, are you feeling relieved over the absence of social obligations; or, "chomping at the bit" to resume in-person social connections? Tele-mental health is revealing clients at every point on the continuum. It appears that introverts tend to be on the "This is not so bad," end of the continuum while extroverts tend to be on the "chomping at the bit," end. Of course, there are many other factors affecting where you find yourself on the continuum—living alone, balancing work at home or outside the home while home-schooling, unemployment, etc. Wherever you find yourself on the continuum, here are a few universal prescriptions:

- 1 Create a flexible daily schedule—time for sleep, time for productive activity, and time for leisure time activities = balance.
- 2 Incorporate time for personal reflection draw, paint, journal, meditate, pray. Explore apps such as "Breathe," to assess your physical and emotional status followed by recommendations such as brief guided mediations.
- 3 Incorporate exercise—walk, hike, bike, or dance in your living room.

If you are struggling with depression and/or anxiety during this crisis, tele-mental health is available to you now.

Wherever you are on the continuum at this time, reach out/remain connected--though it may be virtual for now!

Within those constraints the Historical Society still hopes to host docent-led walking tours of Lyme Street, Tad Fallon's presentation on Caring for Antique Furniture, and other events. 
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

Club members also have collaborated with Lyme-Old Lyme Junior Women's Club to install native plantings and pollinator gardens around Cross Lane Playground. In 2019, volunteers revived and replanted the raised flower bed at Sound View Beach flagpole.

## **Rogers Lake Authority News**

Everyone on the Rogers Lake Authority hopes that you and your families are well during this time. Because people are getting out and enjoying the lake, the patrol boat is now in the water for the season. As a reminder, there is a 6 MPH speed limit from sunset until 10:00 am, as well as within 100 feet of shore, rafts or other boats. Jet skis are only allowed 10:00 am - 6:00 pm weekdays and until 7:00 pm on weekends. Jet skis must stay 200 feet from shore, rafts or other boats. There are six places on the lake where

jet skis cannot maintain this 200-foot distance and must proceed at a 6 MPH speed limit. This will be heavily enforced this year for the safety of all on the water. The RLA asks for your assistance in reporting unsafe activity occurring on Rogers Lake. To report such activity visit RLA's website at: www.oldlyme-ct.gov/rogers-lake-authority. If unsafe activity needs immediate action, call 911. **Reminder that the horsepower limit on Rogers Lake is 135 HP.** 

We are planning to draw down the lake 14 inches this year beginning September 15th. This is so lakeshore property owners can conduct any maintenance to their docks or sea walls as needed. We expect the drawdown to take one week and the lake will be allowed to refill October 22.

The joint venture between CT DEEP and

Professor David Post's research group at Yale University is yielding results. Several thousand alewives have migrated back up the fish ladder at the dam on Rogers Lake. Last year there were only 300 alewives that migrated back into the lake.

A whole lake invasive weed study will be conducted in late June. At this time there are no plans for an invasive weed treatment.

#### "Do Not Feed the Waterfowl" The

Connecticut Department of Environmental Protection indicates waterfowl are wild birds that can locate natural food sources throughout the year. Supplemental feeding by people is unnecessary and can lead to malnutrition and disease transmission.

Connecticut State law 12-155 prohibits the use of a fertilizer containing phosphorous less than 20 feet from any body of water. A \$500 fine is imposed on violators. If you have questions on the phosphorus legislation or soil testing, call the UConn Home & Garden Education Center at: 877-486-6271.

## Old Lyme Open Space Commission

This past April, we celebrated the 50th anniversary of the inaugural "Earth Day." The Connecticut DEEP

and organizations across America promoted the slogan/hash tag #EarthDayEveryDay on the occasion. Old Lyme has a truly extraordinary environment - direct frontage on the Connecticut River, hailed as one of our hemisphere's "Last Great Places;" other scenic rivers such as the Lieutenant and Black Hall; Long Island sound beaches and marshes; and rural fields and verdant hillsides. The Open Space Commission and the Old Land Trust together protect about 2,000 acres of land in Old Lyme. The town's commitment to open space, like the Earth Day celebration, goes back 50 years. The 1965 Old Lyme Plan of Development stated, "considerable areas of land should become public open space." Since then, thousands of hours of volunteer work have gone toward a goal of creating and maintaining plentiful open space and preserves. So even though the "day" has passed, let's still consider "Every Day as Earth Day."



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
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
