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Selectwoman's Corner

Summer 2013 has been very interesting, with extremes of weather that we often see over the course of years, rather than months. We have suffered through several heat waves, rainy humid weather, a few cooler than normal days, and some perfect, sunny days. Such is weather in New England, but we are all fairly accustomed to this. Heat wave or cool weather, there has been a lot happening in Old Lyme!

WASTEWATER MANAGEMENT TASK FORCE/WPCA: After working hard to choose a firm to conduct a study of Wastewater Management in our Shoreline area, the members of the Task Force all agreed to serve on the Old Lyme WPCA, so the Task Force was disbanded by the Board of Selectmen. The WPCA is the appropriate Board to work closely on Wastewater issues, so this was a welcome transition. Woodard and Curran, the firm conducting the study to determine our options along the shoreline, has been pleased with the rainfall, as it provides excellent data to base recommendations for treatment in the area. Public information sessions were made available to residents on July 30th at Town Hall and August 3rd at the Shoreline Community Center. We hope to have more definitive information on recommendations by early September and are anxious to hear about the possibilities. Special thanks to the Task Force/WPCA for their hard work and diligence on this issue.

FY 2014 BUDGET: The budget was unanimously passed at the Town Budget Meeting held on Monday, May 20, increasing the mill rate from 19.26 to 19.30. This increase represents an overall increase of \$169,825 over the FY 2013 budget, or .75% increase. It is clear that the Board of Finance worked hard to keep taxes in line, while continuing to meet our obligations. Thank you to all of them for their hard work once again.

GRANT FUNDING: The process for hiring a firm to develop the Plans and Specs for the Bike Path and Improvements in Sound View began in May. After advertising a Request for Qualifications in the spring, the Town received qualifications from six firms, and all were interviewed by the Selection Committee. In the end, BSC Group was chosen, and the Town is now working with the Project Manager to develop the Scope of Work and negotiate the cost. As we move forward,





there will be a Town Meeting to approve the cost for the Plans and Specifications portion of the project. There will continue to be public information meetings and information posted on the Town's website. The project is being funded by a grant through the Connecticut Department of Transportation, which allows for 80% reimbursement of the cost. This is a great opportunity for our community and we are grateful to have this funding.

ROGERS LAKE DAM UPDATE: The repairs have finally begun on Rogers Lake Dam, which is clearly evident when you travel on the south portion of Town Woods Road. You will see the area sectioned off, and lots of sandbags and equipment on site. A letter from the Town of Old Lyme was sent out to residents surrounding the lake regarding the lowering of the lake level in order to accommodate the repairs. The Town is closely monitoring the progress to make sure that the level is only lowered to the extent necessary for the work. While we understand that this is an inconvenience for some, the work must be done, and we have a short window of time within which to complete it. The work includes installation of a Fish ladder at the dam, which has been funded by the CT River Watershed Council. Once completed, alewives could return to their natural spawning grounds of Rogers Lake, completing the natural cycle of the fish. Since this effort has been worked on for over ten years, it will be good to see completion of the project. The expected completion date is no later than October, 2013, though we anticipate it will be completed by the end of September. Thank you to all of our residents for their patience as we complete this much needed project.

STEAP GRANT AWARD: On Wed. July 17th, the Town of Old Lyme was informed that we have been awarded a STEAP (Small Town Economic Assistance Program) Grant for \$478,000 for expansion and renovations of the boathouse at Hains Park. The boathouse is used by students and adults for storage of boats used for Crew, or rowing on Rogers Lake. Crew is a popular sport both at the Lyme Old Lyme High School and others within our community. Local clubs have formed, making the sport available for all ages and becoming so popular that the boathouse has become inadequate for the need. We are delighted to have this opportunity to enhance our services at Hains Park. Thank you to all the individuals who worked hard on the original application that resulted in this grant award.

NEW SENIOR CENTER COORDINATOR: Stephanie Lyon, our new Senior Center Coordinator, joined the Old Lyme team on May 29. Since her arrival, she has been extremely busy working together with the Board of Directors to enhance services, reaching out to potential members, and developing new connections with local organizations. Watch for the new Senior Center newsletter, which has taken on a new format. In addition to her regular duties, Stephanie has also addressed some maintenance issues that happened to crop up upon her arrival. The stove in the kitchen has needed repair, the well water was tested and had to be treated for low pH, and some water pipes developed leaks, requiring immediate attention. In the few short weeks that Stephanie has been here, she has proven that

Also, BE SURE TO REGISTER at ctalert.gov to receive alerts from both the State and our local Emergency Management Operations when emergency notifications go out. This is the best way to stay informed in an emergency. We all hope for the best, but it is prudent to be prepared for the worst.

THE ANNUAL MIDSUMMER FESTIVAL was held again this year on July 26th and 27th, culminating in a Fireworks Display behind the Middle School on Saturday evening. We were blessed with excellent weather for the event and a great showing in Old Lyme. It was wonderful to once again have fireworks as part of the festivities. Town Assessor

Assessment Date of Taxable Property in the Town of Old Lyme is October 1st.

The Town of Old Lyme has complied with the provisions of Section 12-41 of Connecticut General Statutes. It is no Ionger necessary for persons liable for taxes of Real Estate and Automobiles registered with Connecticut Motor Vehicles Department to file Tax Lists with the Assessor annually as covered under Section 12-42 of the General Statutes.

Owners of tangible Personal Property, other than registered automobiles, such as commercial furniture, machinery and equipment, leased equipment, unregistered automobiles, camp trailers, etc., must file personal property list with the Assessor annually during the month of October. Failure to file prior to November 1 forces the Assessor, by law, to file the list and add a 25% Penalty (Sec. 12-42, PA 87-245).

Totally Disabled Persons, if they meet the requirements of Section 12-81(55) of the General Statutes, are eligible for the \$1,000. Exemption upon submission of proof of such a disability by October 1.

Any individual who is Blind is entitled to an exemption under Section 12-81(17) shall provide proof to the Assessor and must file by October 1.

Ex-Servicemen claiming statutory exemption, because of physical disability, in addition to regular exemption must

submit exemption certificate from the Veterans Administration annually to prove claim.

Veterans must have filed this discharge (DD214) in the Town Clerk's office by on or before October 1 in order to receive exemption. Section 12-81(g) provides for an increase in the property tax exemption amount granted to a qualified veteran if certain income requirements could be met.

Persons on active duty must present to the Assessor (Sec. 514) of the Soldiers and Sailors Act or a letter from their Commanding Officer stating date of entry and they are on active duty. Any service person on active claiming Connecticut as their legal residence is entitled to one car exemption if the car is garaged out of State.

An application for property owners claiming land as farm, forest or open space should file an application before October 31. The only exception is during a revaluation year, when the deadline is extended to December 30th. No other extension of the filing period is available, and failure to file within the prescribed time period is a waiver of the right to the classification for the assessment year commencing October 1st.

List must be filed at the Assessors Office, 52 Lyme St., Old Lyme, Connecticut 06371. Office Hours are Monday through Friday, 9:00 am to 4 pm.

Annual Absentee Ballot Program for Permanently Disabled Now Available

Sylvia Peterson (D) and Donald F. Tapper (R), Registrars of Voters in Old Lyme, have announced that, effective January 1, 2013, electors with permanent disabilities became eligible for permanent absentee ballot status. This status enables the elector to receive an absentee ballot for each election, primary, and referendum in the municipality in which they are eligible to vote. Prior permanent status enabled the voter to receive an absentee ballot application only.

To be eligible for permanent absentee ballot status, an elector must file with the Town Clerk an absentee ballot application along with a doctor's certificate stating they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place. The law does not prescribe an official form to be used. As such, a note from the elector's doctor (presumably on letterhead) indicating a disability and the statement that they are unable to appear in person at the polls will satisfy this requirement. Absentee ballot applications are available through the Town Clerk and can be downloaded from the Town of Old Lyme (www.oldlyme-ct. gov) or the Secretary of State's website.

Once an absentee ballot application and doctor's certificate are received by the Town Clerk, the Town Clerk will send out absentee ballots to the eligible elector throughout the year for each event for which they would be eligible to vote.

The Registrars of Voters will conduct an annual review each January to determine the continuing eligibility of Permanent Absentee Ballot Status.

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
Old Lyme Historical Society

Noteworthy Houses of Old Lyme – Latest Publication

Noteworthy Houses of Old Lyme is this year's publication produced by the Old Lyme Historical Society. It consists of a 16" X 20" four color poster of eleven local houses built between 1666 and 1913 and an accompanying booklet which not only describes the architectural features of the houses, but also includes a snap shot of information about events occurring in Connecticut around the time the houses were built. Written by Alison C. Mitchell and Michaelle Pearson with additional research by Leslie Markowicz, it promises to be one of the most popular publications put out by the Society. Mitchell says in her introduction that choosing which houses to include... "was similar to being told by a grandparent that you may select one toy, and one toy only, at The Bowerbird or Toys "R" Us teeming with hundreds of selections. It is a temporarily paralyzing experience: Old Lyme has so many historically interesting houses, and so many fascinating stories associated with them." The handsome photography and poster design are by James Meehan of James Meehan Art & Design. The posters and accompanying booklets are available for purchase at the Old Lyme Pheobe Griffin Noyes Library, The Florence Griswold Museum, and other local merchants.

Oral Histories are now Online

The Old Lyme Historical Society is pleased to report that its recently completed oral histories are now available online on the "Oral History" page of the organization's website www.oldlymehistoricalsociety.org. This is a milestone for this long term project that began about four years ago when Sousan Arafeh, then a Board Member, created and organized the Oral History Committee to interview Old Lyme residents to cull their memories about life in Old Lyme as they experienced it. In addition, special sessions were held to interview local World War II veterans about their combat experiences. The eventual goal is to record as many local residents as possible to create an ongoing living history archive. The Society is grateful to Sousan Arafeh for laying the groundwork, and also for providing training for volunteers in interview

techniques. A number of volunteers are now trained including Julia Griswold, Barbara Bair, and Mark Lander. Once the first round of interviews was completed, they needed to be edited and made web-ready. Old Lyme resident and IT specialist, Tammy Noyes, made this become a reality this year. On the Old Lyme Historical Society's website you will find video and audio interviews and links to transcripts. Interviewees include members of the Lyme – Old Lyme High School Class of 1960, World War II Veterans, Matthew G. Ely, Jr., James Noyes, Gloria Pendleton, George James, and Jean Thompson, among many others. The Society plans to continue the work that Sousan started by conducting additional interviews that will then be made available online. The Society welcomes anyone interested in becoming involved with this interesting project to call the office (860) 434-0684. Training will be provided.

A Challenge from the Archives

In the last issue of Old Lyme Events the Old Lyme Historical Society issued a challenge, inviting readers to identify two objects from the archives; their use and approximate dates. The winner is David Olson and he will receive a reproduction of a historical map of Old Lyme. The first object is indeed a noise maker, but for a very important reason. It was issued to local Air Raid Wardens during World War II to use in case of a suspicion of toxic gases. A Historical Society volunteer tried it out in front of Town Hall one day recently. It certainly caused people to stop talking.

The second object is a school bell. But not just any school bell this bell was donated to the Society by local resident Gloria Pendleton. It had been passed down to her for safe keeping by the family of a teacher who used it to call children in from the play yard of the last one room school house on Mile Creek Road around the turn of the century. The Society has found it to be an effective way to bring Board meetings to order.

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Reducing Connecticut's Economic Vulnerability



A recent assessment from the Fitch Agency revised Connecticut's bond rating outlook downward from "stable" to "negative." This negative outlook is based delayed repayment of borrowed funds, added to already high state debt, along with unfunded pension obligations creating an unstable, vulnerable financial position for Connecticut. This warning comes on the heels of another that finds our state to be the only state in the nation without economic growth in the last two years. The message is clear - Connecticut must get serious about controlling state spending and reducing state debt.

Connecticut is currently 46th of the 50 states rated for the cost of doing business. Businesses are reluctant to invest and expand in a state where unpredictable tax policies, state mandates and high health care costs are the price of commerce. For example, the corporation tax was scheduled to expire. This is good news for businesses and consumers. However, short on operating revenue, Connecticut's majority voted to extend this tax for another two years. Is it any wonder that Sikorsky, when awarded an \$800M helicopter contract sends \$600M of this work out of state because business costs are lower and more predictable?

For as long as Connecticut delays repayment of deficit borrowing, imposes historic levels of taxation on citizens and businesses, adds to its already high debt, and spends grant money unwisely, Connecticut will remain economically vulnerable and our fiscal recovery will persist as slow and unpredictable.

Fire Safety Tips for Fall

- Use a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying out of the fireplace.
- Allow at least three feet of empty area around space heaters.
- Never leave a burning fire unattended.
- Make sure a fire in a fireplace is completely out before going to bed.
- Never leave candles burning if you go out or go to sleep.
- Never use your stove or oven to heat your home.
- NEVER PUT HOT ASHES INTO A FLAMMABLE OR PLASTIC CONTAINER.

Back to School Fall Safety Tips

As children return to school in the fall, they are excited and may not be paying as much attention to their surroundings as they should. Keep them safe with these fall safety tips.

- If your child's school bus is equipped with seat belts make sure your child uses THEM.

Trash that would normally be collected on Thanksgiving will be picked up the next day, along with the regular Friday pickup. For Monday holidays, garbage pickup will move up a day, except on Thursday and Friday, which will remain on schedule. This does not affect the curbside recycling program. printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCR's, scanners, fax machines, copiers telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles are charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads of less than 100 lbs. will be charged a minimum fee of \$5.00.


Brush will be charged on a per load basis. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches will be accepted.

Although the College provides the students to fill the housing, we do not own the housing: it was built and will be maintained by a developer.

We welcomed our new freshman class in late August and then, shortly after, those who studied here in years past will return for the Alumni Reunion weekend. The weekend is centered on the Alumni Exhibition 2013 for which there's an opening reception on Friday, Sept. 6, from 6 to 8 pm. There are 89 alumni participating in the exhibition ranging from recent 2012 BFA graduates to artists who studied at the College when it was still an Academy in the 70's and 80's. The general public is invited to attend the reception and to enjoy this unique and diverse display of talent, on view through Sept. 28.

The next day, Saturday, Sept. 7, is reserved for College alumni to enjoy a full day of activities, including faculty and alumni-run workshops and lectures, followed by words from keynote speaker Peter Drake, Dean of Academic Affairs at the New York Academy of Art's MFA program in New York City.

Friday, Oct. 11, is the opening of a new exhibition, "Tim O'Brien: Portraits and Illustrations: A Retrospective," featuring the work of the nationally acclaimed illustrator. A Connecticut-born artist, O'Brien's intricately detailed illustrations have



Helping Seniors Transition to a New Chapter

As senior citizens age, their health and lifestyle needs change, sometimes necessitating a change in their retirement living plans. While some senior citizens may welcome the move into a smaller home or into an independent or assisted living community, others may be less enthusiastic. They may be hesitant to leave the home where they raised their families, enjoyed their neighbors, or tended to their gardens. They may worry about losing their independence, or about not fitting into their new community.

It is helpful to everyone involved in this transition when there is as much support as possible during this time. This can come from a network of family, friends and caregivers, or from the "welcome teams" found at most retirement and assisted living communities who help residents manage change.

The welcome team at The Saybrook at Haddam retirement and assisted living community in Haddam includes a recently hired, full-time social worker. She offers support and care for residents and their families during the move-in transition, and is able to respond immediately and personally to any other concerns. She also works to educate families and staff so they can provide the best care (and lifestyle) in their new home.

During this transitional time, experts suggest helping loved ones by focusing on the positive sides of the move. Celebrate the things that do go well during this time and reinforce that the right living decision was made. Have a card or small "care package" arrive the day your loved one makes the move. If you can, join them for a welcome visit to share lunch or dinner right away (remember to set up a date for the next visit before you leave). Also, if they do move into an assisted living residence, try to attend one or two social events held at the community together.

You are helping them start an adventure, another chapter with new friends, group activities, daily walks and exercise, lectures and classes, and more (perhaps even a new garden).

Florence Griswold Museum

Harry Holtzman and American Abstraction, on view through January 26, is the first retrospective of abstract painter Harry Holtzman (1912–1987). Drawing primarily from the holdings of the Holtzman Trust, the exhibition brings new attention to the role he played in shaping abstract art in America. In 1934 Holtzman traveled to Paris and developed a friendship with Dutch painter Piet Mondrian that would form the rest of his career. Adopting a Neoplastic style inspired by Mondrian, Holtzman went on to produce an extensive body of work that explored pure geometric form in drawings, paintings, and sculptures.

This exhibition is the third presented by the Museum that brings a better understanding of modern artists that lived in the greater Lyme area. Holtzman was part of a local community that has been little studied but included significant artists. In 1962 Holtzman chose a monumental barn along the country roads of Lyme to personally convert into a home and studio workspace. He lived and worked there until his death in 1987.

In 2010, the Museum presented a rediscovery of the work of the Bauhaus-influenced artist and Yale professor Sewell Sillman, followed by a 2011 retrospective of the work of photographer Walker Evans, who discovered the artistic community in Lyme in the 1940s and lived here in the last decades of his life.

On view through January 5 is the holiday favorite, *The Magic of Christmas. Miss Florence's Artist Tree* has become a holiday icon for the region. Nearly 150 artists have donated works to this one-of-a-kind tradition. The Florence Griswold House evokes a 1910 Christmas with historically accurate decorations that reveal homespun creativity and the use of surprising materials.

Harry Holtzman and American Abstraction features roughly 60 paintings, sculptures, and drawings featuring many works not exhibited since Holtzman's death and highlights the different facets of his role as perennial stalwart of the New York avant garde.



Wines for Fall

Fall is on its way and the cooler temperatures call for some fuller-bodied red and white wines. Two great varietals that come to mind are Malbec and Torrontes, which are both mostly produced in Argentina.

The red varietal, Malbec, originated in France, and is used for blending in small amounts in Bordeaux, and in larger quantities in Languedoc. In France, Malbec tends to be drier than in Argentina due to the soil and the climate. The long warm season in Argentina allows for Malbec to become full and juicy, which enables it to stand on its own as a varietal in the wine-making process. The flavors are rich with dark fruit such as black cherry, cassis and blackberry. Malbec does maintain its dry finish and also can acquire a slight spicy component. Malbec is also blended with Cabernet Sauvignon, Bonnarda, and Syrah in Argentina to create huge red blends that knock your socks off. These blends can be over-looked due to the

huge popularity of red blends in California right now, but they are definitely worth trying for a fuller, spicier mouth-feel.

Torrontes is a white varietal widely grown in Argentina. It is a unique and unusual varietal showing a floral nose with complex fruit flavors of apricot, and citrus fruits with a medium dry finish. Torrontes has a heavier mouth-feel, like that of a Chardonnay, but with a lighter finish. This varietal is a great pairing for lemon chicken or heavier seafood dishes.

Although the lazy days of summer are slowly dwindling away, the beautiful New England fall weather calls for more barbeques and gatherings. Being extremely versatile, both Malbec and Torrontes pair with almost any fare you choose to serve up! So take a step away from your every-day go-to wines and serve up some South American treats!



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Raw Milk vs. Pasteurized Milk in Cheese

Customers often come in to our shop, having just returned from a trip to Europe, looking for that great cheese they had enjoyed in their travels. My usual reply is, "That's made from raw milk and it is not allowed in this country." The disappointment is obvious as they sadly accept the best possible alternative I can find.

Raw milk cheese has been blamed for many illnesses, hence the ruling against it here in the States. According to the CDC (Center for Disease Control), between the years 1993 to 2006 over 121 outbreaks occurred, causing over 1,500 illnesses and two deaths. Older people, pregnant women, children and those with weak immune systems are the most vulnerable.

First, we need to understand the difference. Raw milk is milk straight from the animal with no processing done to it. Pasteurized milk is raw milk that has been heated to a high enough temperature to kill most of the harmful bacteria present. You might be aware of the 60-day rule, which simply states that no cheese under 60 days old is allowed to be imported. The reason is that young raw milk cheeses are associated with salmonella, E.coli, and listeria, just to name a few. So why the 60-day rule? The reason is that any harmful bacteria present in the milk or cheese does not survive past this time period. So, if a cheese is over 60 days old, it is considered safe for consumption.

As a general rule, cheeses made from raw milk taste better that those made from pasteurized milk. The issue then becomes the taste quality of raw milk cheese vs. the safety of pasteurized milk cheese. I agree that raw milk cheese has more depth in flavor, more complex aromas, and a better finish than pasteurized cheese.

Europe takes a different viewpoint on raw milk cheese. Some countries allow distribution of raw milk cheese, while others do not. Scotland bands them, while England, Wales and Northern Ireland allow them. France is the biggest proponent of raw milk cheese, considering it a sacrilege to use pasteurized milk in cheese production. There does not seem to be any issue for France when it comes to eating raw milk cheese. The thought is that they have built up immunity to the raw milk bacteria and, as a result, they don't get sick from them.

In any case, you will not find raw milk cheeses such as Brie or Camembert in the United States anytime soon. The older cheeses, beyond 60 days old, are available and considered safe. The decision is yours. I enjoy them, but as stated earlier, pregnant women, children, the elderly and those with weak immune systems might want to proceed with caution.
