Selectwoman's Corner

It's hard to believe another Fall is nearly gone, and we are within striking distance of a new year! We have been happy to have gotten through the Hurricane Season with no major storms, and hope that the Winter will be as kind!

WPCA/ WASTEWATER MANAGEMENT STUDY: The Wastewater Management Study, being conducted by Woodard and Curran out of Windsor Locks, has continued throughout the summer and early fall. The first portion of the study included many test holes, soil sampling, and other data collection to determine if a local option is viable. Once the data was collected, the firm spent time applying that data to anticipated waste flows. In addition, they were required to confirm information and costs for a regional solution for this issue, so that comparisons could be made. In the beginning of October, they presented their findings to the WPCA, confirming that both the local alternative and a regional solution are viable options. They continue to work with the CT DEEP to validate their findings and determine the permitting requirements for a local alternative. Stay tuned for further updates and a Public Information Meeting to present their findings.

ROUTE 156 BIKE PATH AND SOUND VIEW IMPROVEMENTS GRANT FUNDING: Thanks to a DOT Enhancement Grant, a Bike Path on Rte. 156 and improvements to Sound View are one step closer to becoming a reality.

The process has been moving forward since the selection of BSC Group as the firm to develop the Plans and Design Specs for the project. The Selection Committee, headed by Selectwoman Mary Jo Nosal, is working with BSC to define the Scope of Work, which will provide the cost of this first phase of the project. Once the cost is identified, there will be a Town Meeting to approve the funds for this part of the project. While 80% of this cost is paid



for with the grant, the entire amount must be approved at a Town Meeting. The second phase of the project will be the actual construction, and that will also go to a Town Meeting for approval of funding, which is also part of the 80% grant. There will be public information meetings scheduled to preview the design as the project moves forward.

ROGERS LAKE DAM REPAIRS: After years of preparation, plans and applications for funding, the Rogers Lake Dam has been repaired. The repairs began in late June, and continued through the summer, with the lake being lowered to accommodate the work. Because of aquatic life, weather and other considerations, the lowering of the lake could only take place



during August and Sept. While the lake was never lowered more than the anticipated 18" to accommodate the work, the extremely dry weather of August and September caused the lake level to continue to drop through evaporation. Some residents with shallow wells in the Rogers Lake and Grassy Hill areas of town had experienced water shortages due to this. When asked, the Town provided drinking water to those residents in an effort to help. The fish ladder has also been installed, as planned, and a dry hydrant will be installed at the dam for Fire Safety for residents and businesses in this area. Thankfully, we will not face repairs of this kind for many years to come, as we acknowledge the inconvenience that this has caused. Thank you to all of our residents for their patience as we completed this much needed project.

BOATHOUSE/STEAP GRANT AWARD: The Board of Selectmen has created a Boathouse and Hains Park Improvements Committee (BHPIC) to oversee the expansion of the Boathouse at Hains Park on Rogers Lake. In July of 2013, the Town was awarded a \$478,000 STEAP grant for this project. The project will include improved docks, a larger boathouse and bathrooms inside the boathouse, as well as other work in the area. Selectman Skip Sibley is the BOS representative who has agreed to serve as ex-officio on the BHPIC. Anyone interested in helping on this committee should fill out the application form, which is available on the town website at www. oldlyme-ct.gov. The Board will be announcing the committee members soon.

SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING REMINDER: Single stream recycling makes recycling very convenient, as we no longer have to separate paper, plastic, glass, etc. The bins help to keep the recycling contained, and we no longer have papers blowing around in the wind. But on occasion, we need a reminder to only put those items that are approved for recycling in the green bins. If you are unsure of the entire list of recyclable items, please go to the Shoreline Sanitation website and click on Single Stream Recycling, or you can type in this url: http://www.shorelinesanitation.com/recyclelist.htm

Please remember – GREEN bin for recycling; BLUE bin for garbage. Thank you for recycling properly.

BUSINESS BREAKFAST: On Sept. 25, The Town of Old Lyme and the Lyme Old Lyme Chamber of Commerce hosted a Business Breakfast for local businesses in Old Lyme. The breakfast took place at 7:30 am at the Old Lyme Town Hall Meeting Room, with a delicious selection of foods and coffee. The Keynote Speaker was Barbara Crowley of The Chocolate Shell, who spoke about expanding your business through Social Media. Following Barbara's excellent presentation, we had an open discussion about "What a Business Friendly Town" looks like. The meeting was well attended by business members of the community, members of the Economic Development Commission, the PGN Library, the Chamber of Commerce and a new group in town called the Mentoring Corps for Community Development (MDDC). With so much interest, we hope to have another Breakfast in the Spring to continue the discussion.

REVALUATION: The Town of Old Lyme has hired Vision Government Solutions Inc. to complete its state-mandated revaluation program. The reassessment project will establish market value as of October 1, 2014, which will be reflected in the tax bills issued in the summer of 2015. Revaluation has commenced in the village area of the Town, and will continue through October 2014. Data collectors will be visiting all buildings to record exterior measurements and conduct interior inspections. They will carry a letter of identification from the Assessor's Office, a photo ID badge and their cars will be registered with the Police Department. All property owners and tenants are respectfully requested to cooperate with data collectors to insure that accurate information is used in the revaluation process. Any property owners who have questions concerning the revaluation process can contact the Assessor's Office during working hours at 860-434-1605 ext.219. Look for further updates as the revaluation process continues into the new year.



Off To A Good Start for Business

A volunteer organization seeking to assist start-up entrepreneurs and nonprofits has formed in the Lower River Valley. The Old Lyme-based Mentoring Corps for Community Development (MCCD) provides experienced volunteer "mentors" to aid entrepreneurs and non-profit organizations in start-ups, and turnarounds. The focus of the Mentoring Corps is to improve company operations, efficiency, effectiveness, and performance. The work of this community-minded group is pro bono.

Originally conceived to assist students with their careers and to help victims of natural disasters with economic issues, the Mentoring Corps for Community Development (MCCD) of Old Lyme was formed in 2012. MCCD's roots are grounded in addressing basic needs in the local community.

One of MCCD's first and most challenging efforts was to aid those whose lives were disrupted and whose homes were damaged or destroyed by tropical storm Sandy in the fall of 2012. Focusing on the urgent needs of individuals and families who sustained devastating damage to property during this super storm, MCCD identified the sources of appropriate financial, technical and social assistance. Since then, the Mentoring Corp has assisted other families and individuals with acute financial needs.

Recently, the International Executive Service Corps (IESC), headquartered in Washington, DC, and the Mentoring Corps



for Community Development (MCCD), headquartered in Old Lyme, have announced an agreement to collaborate in assigning volunteer experts to provide consulting services to businesses and other organizations in Connecticut and nearby states.





Ashlawn Farm to Host Lyme Land Trust's 2014 Tour de Lyme

Ashlawn Farm on Bill Hill Road, Lyme's popular coffee house, will host next year's Tour de Lyme, the fundraising cycling event launched this year by the Lyme Land Conservation Trust.

Land Trust President John Pritchard announced the Ashlawn Farm venue and the date for the next year's Tour de Lyme cycling event, which he said will be on Sunday May 18, 2014.

"We are delighted that Carol and Chip Dahlke are allowing us to hold our event at their lovely Ashlawn Farm. Everything will be in one spot – parking, registration and a picnic lunch with music by the EightMile River Band," said Pritchard.

Pritchard went on to say, "One of the goals of Tour de Lyme, apart from raising money for the Lyme Land Trust, is to showcase the special agricultural heritage and rural beauty of our town. Being able to associate Tour de Lyme with iconic Ashlawn Farm is an honor and privilege for the Land Trust."

"Ashlawn Farm is the embodiment of why so many people love Lyme – farms, forests, stone walls and lightly travelled roads," he said.

Ashlawn Farm was an enthusiastic supporter of the 2013 Tour de Lyme, he noted, offering free coffee to participating riders who stopped for a break, and along with Erik Block, and Erica's E-List they helped field a riding team – Builders, Baristas and Blabbers.

This year's Tour de Lyme on May 11 was "a huge success," said Pritchard, noting that it was the first time the land trust held the event and that the weather was overcast and raining for most of the morning.

More than 300 cycling enthusiasts turned out to participate in several road and trail bike rides, he said, and 13 local and regional businesses signed on as sponsors.

Tour de Lyme is a non-competitive event in which none of the rides are timed. It is intended as an opportunity for both serious and casual cyclists to enjoy the beauty of Lyme's highways and byways and of the trails on the thousands of acres of preserved open space in the town.

"When we started planning our first Tour de Lyme more than a year ago, we really didn't know what kind of turnout to expect," he said, "but as the event date approached and pre-registrations poured it, we were pretty sure that the cycling community was going to support this fundraiser. On the eve of the event, we were a bit nervous because of the rain forecasts, but 90 percent of those who preregistered showed up, and last-minute on-site registrations more than made up for the no-shows."

Now that the Tour de Lyme is an established cycling event, Pritchard predicted that next year it will likely draw even more participants who can enjoy the rural beauty of Lyme.



Harry Holtzman and American Abstraction, on view through January 26, brings new attention to the role Holtzman played in shaping abstract art from the 1920s to the 1980s. A close friend and colleague of Piet Mondrian, Holtzman is best known for helping to bring Mondrian to America. Nearly 60 paintings, sculptures, and drawings highlight the different facets of Holtzman's role as perennial stalwart of the New York avant garde.

Throughout the holidays, the *Magic of Christmas* will be in full swing once again. This year marks the tenth year of the painted palettes for *Miss Florence's Artist Tree*. One hundred and forty artists from across the country have donated works to this one-of-a-kind tradition. Visitors can also enjoy the Florence Griswold House decorated for a 1910 Christmas.

Teas, special events for families, hands-on crafts for children and adults, and wonderful items in The Shop are sure to bring holiday cheer!

The sure cure for cabin fever this winter – two exhibitions opening February 7! *The Artist's Easel*, on view through March 16, provides a rare look at the tools of the artist's trade from inside the Museum's expansive collection of artistic materials – one of the largest such collections in the nation. Examine easels, paint boxes, brushes and palettes once used by Lyme's famed artists, as well as the paintings these tools helped create.

Lyme Artists Abroad, on view through June 1, looks at the eclectic styles and techniques cultivated abroad by American artists such as Harry Hoffman, William Henry Howe, and Willard Metcalf.

Long Range Plan for Rogers Lake Needed: A Conservation Commission Perspective

Ten years have passed since a major study of Rogers Lake gave the lake a water quality rating of "average." The Rogers Lake Authority deserves credit for pursuing mechanical weed harvesting and hand removal, controlling the water fowl population, testing benthic blankets to prevent weed growth, lowering the lake to kill shallow water plants, providing inspectors at the State boat launch, etc. As a last resort they have now recommended that herbicides be applied to kill the weeds and algae that now clog large portions of the lake.

Rogers Lake's 4800 acre watershed is the main source of potable water for most of the wells in Old Lyme. The sand and soils surrounding the lake act as a natural filter for the Lieutenant River and the Black Hall River aquifers, supplying most of the water for shoreline water company wells.

All of the herbicides recommended for use in Rogers Lake are rated "toxic" by Beyond Pesticides, a firm that collects scientific studies of their impact on humans, animals, and aquatic organisms. In addition, applying herbicides in relatively small sections will be ineffective on the total weed population. Weeds will grow back again after a year or two after herbicide treatment and may be thicker than ever.

The Conservation Commission has recommended that the two towns form a task force to develop a long range plan that will address the larger issue of protecting a vital natural resource as well as considering the recreational values and property values of the residents. The task force would address the sources of increased nutrient loading as well as the cost effectiveness of the various options available to preserve Rogers Lake as our number one natural resource.

2014 Now and Then Community Calendar



are responsible to replace lost, stolen or broken cans at their expense.


Transfer Station/Landfill Hours. The Transfer Station is located on Four Mile River Road and is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am-3:45 pm, Saturday, 8:30 am-4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday. Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. Vehicles without a sticker must bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles are charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads of less than 100 lbs. will be charged a minimum fee of \$5.00.

Brush will be charged on a per load basis. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches will be accepted.

Grass clippings will not be allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers and cannot be deposited in your trash can. Please compost on your property.

Gruyere - A Great Cheese for the Holidays

Gruyere is one of my favorite cheeses and it ranks on my top 10 list. The reason is simple: few cheeses come close to the versatility of Gruyere. It gives fondue its body, onion soup its elegance, and Quiche Lorraine its flavor. In fact it can handle any task when it comes to cooking. It has great melting capabilities, it doesn't get stringy, nor does it solidify. Heat enhances its flavor and its keeping quality is longer than most other cheeses.

Basic Gruyere Fondue

Given the hundreds of recipes out there, my favorite is the traditional Swiss recipe. It's tried and true and I've been using it for over 40 years.

1 cup dry white wine 1/4 cup Kirsch (optional) 1-pound Gruyere, shredded or cubed

2 tablespoons arrowroot (corn starch or flour will work)

1 garlic clove Squeeze of lemon juice Nutmeg & Pepper to taste

2 loaves French bread, cut into bite sized cubes

Rub the fondue pot with the cut garlic clove (discard garlic). Then mix the shredded or cubed cheese, black pepper and the arrowroot in a plastic bag. Try to coat all of the cheese with arrowroot to stop the cheese from sticking together.

Heat the wine in the fondue pot until hot but not to a boil. Stir in the lemon juice which adds acidity to help the cheese and the wine merge. Add the cheese to the wine, a handful at a time while stirring constantly, until melted and smooth. Top with a little nutmeg and additional pepper to taste.

Sparkling Wines for the Holidays


Sparkling wines are a great way to give a little "pop" to your celebrations. Champagne is the most widely known sparkling wine which is grown and produced in France in the Champagne region. There are many other sparkling wines from all over the world but they are only considered true Champagne if they come from this region. The grapes used to produce these sparkling wines are Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier. Varieties of champagne are: Blanc de Blanc, which is made of strictly Chardonnay grapes; Blanc de Noir, which is a blend of Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier; and Rose, which is typically one of the driest and best Champagnes. Rose Champagne has a small amount of still Pinot noir added to give the beautiful salmon color to the wine. Some sparkling wines are made in the same method as that of Champagne, and using the same grapes, these wines are labeled 'Methode Champenoise.'

Sparkling wine comes in a wide range of taste from bone-dry to sweet and floral flavors. The finishing process in which the wine is made determines this. As sediment collects on the cork, it is removed by placing the neck of the bottle in a freezing brine solution, which results in the sediment popping out under pressure when the bottle is opened. This 'clears' the wine and in-turn leaves a space in the bottle which is filled with a dose of sugar solution. The percentage of sugar solution added determines how the bottle will be labeled. From driest to sweetest they are labeled; Natural, Brut, Extra Dry, Sec, Demi Sec and the sweetest is Doux (which is not carried much in the US).

In Italy, Asti and Prosecco are the two most popular sparkling wines. Asti Spumante is sweet and bubbly having been produced using Moscato Bianco grapes. The Prosecco grape produces a sparkling wine that lacks the sweetness of an Asti yet is not as dry as Champagne. Prosecco has quickly become one of the most popular sparkling wines on the market with its shopper friendly price tag and its approachability on the palate. Ranging from Brut to Extra Dry, Prosecco can be enjoyed with a wide variety of dishes or simply as an aperitif, or with dessert.

To jazz up your sparkling wines you can make a range of popular bubbly drinks. Add a touch of peach nectar to your Prosecco for a Bellini, a classic Italian favorite. Or perhaps you are in the mood for a Kir Royal, adding cassis to your Champagne. Orange Juice is a traditional American Brunch favorite to add to your sparkling wine. Or if you just want a kiss of fruit, place a few sliced strawberries in your glass. Whatever the occasion, sparkling wine is always a great addition.
