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First Selectwoman's Corner

Before we know it, the Winter of 2016 will be upon us. I am sure that many of us are busy preparing for the holiday season, hopefully looking forward to warm family times. Many of our projects continue to move forward as we head into the cold weather, though we won't see action until the Spring.

Rogers Lake Weeds Study Update: In early October, New England Environmental (NEE) conducted the mussel survey within Rogers Lake, required by DEEP, to determine the presence, distribution and density of the Eastern Pondmussel, a "species of Special Concern in Connecticut". The report indicates that Eastern Pondmussels were observed in relatively low densities in Rogers Lake, with the targeted areas for treatment having the lowest density due to the thick vegetation. The survey report has been submitted to the CT DEEP for review, and they will use this to determine the requirements for a permit to treat the weeds with an herbicide. While there were two fish that were also identified as species of Special Concern, the DEEP did not require any additional action prior to applying for the permit. It will now be up to the DEEP to determine if further action is needed before issuing the permit. The report on the survey is available for viewing on the town website under Current Projects (www.oldlyme-ct.gov)

Rte 156 Bike Path and Sound View **Improvements:** While the Board of Selectmen voted to go to Final Design for this project at their July 27th meeting, the State of CT DOT did not send approval for Final Design until early November, after reviewing all aspects of the Preliminary design and submitting comments. As we proceed to Final design, we are looking for ways to keep the construction phase on schedule - that is, we would like to have

the work completed before Memorial Day of 2016. With that said, depending on DOT requirements, it may not be possible to schedule the actual construction until after Labor Day of 2016. Under no circumstances will work be done during the summer months, as the disruption cannot be tolerated during the peak season. The best news is that the State DOT decided to increase the threshold amount so that the project as submitted will receive the full 80% grant. The Committee is planning on scheduling another public information session to keep people informed about

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the project and next steps. Special thanks go out to Selectwoman Mary Jo Nosal for keeping this project moving forward.

Boathouse/Hains Park Improvements: The BHPIC continues their work on developing just the right plan for the boathouse to be constructed in Hains Park. While they hoped to begin construction prior to winter setting in, it was more important to be assured that the plan matched the needs of the program and the townspeople, and did not exceed the funding amount. The committee narrowed it down to one scheme, which will utilize the existing slab, and construct three bays, each 22 ft. wide, which is the standard size for boathouse storage. There will be no bathrooms in the boathouse building, which results in substantial savings on the project. The savings will be invested in upgrading the bathroom (final plans to be approved at a future meeting) and the installation of a pavilion, which everyone agrees will be an asset for the park. The committee hopes to have construction documents that will allow them to present the plan at a public information presentation and go out to bid in the near future. The construction schedule is still up in the air, as they have to work around the schedule for both the high school program and the rowing association programs.

Coastal Wastewater Management Plan: The Town of Old Lyme is still working through the Administrative Order issued by CT DEEP in June of 2015. The order requires that the Town complete the study, submit an Environmental Impact Evaluation (EIE) and respond to comments on the EIE from the DEEP and the public. At this time, the Town is considered to be in compliance with that order, as Woodard & Curran has agreed to submit the EIE at no additional cost to the Town. The engineers of Woodard & Curran and DEEP officials are working together on finalizing the report. Once submitted in final format, comments can be received on the EIE, and W&C will respond to those comments. The WPCA, Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance continue to monitor the progress of the plan.

Dredging Project/Grant: In August, the Town of Old Lyme was notified that they were approved for a grant of \$1,614,074 to pay for the dredging of the Black Hall and Four Mile Rivers. The Harbor Management Commission, particularly Chairman Steve Ross and Vice Chairman Ned Farman, worked very hard to complete a study of the rivers to determine the need, and then applied for the grant. The grant pays for 100% of the work, resulting in huge savings for our residents. At the Town Meeting on Sept. 8th, the voters approved spending the grant money for the dredging, which should be completed by March, 2016. Congratulations and a big thank you to the Harbor Management Commission for their diligence in getting this done!

JLUS Study: The Towns of East Lyme, Old Lyme and Lyme are working together on a Joint Land Use Study (JLUS) of Stones Ranch, which borders all three towns, and Camp Niantic,

which is solely in East Lyme. The purpose of the study is to review the impact of many aspects of the military facilities on the communities, including such things as Noise, Traffic, Economics, Mutual support, etc. Matrix Design is the firm that was hired to complete the study, which is likely to result in recommendations for continued good relationships between the Towns and the Military. Matrix Design has reached out to various Boards and Commissions to get their input on concerns and suggestions, so that everyone's voice is heard. There will be more public information sessions to review the progress they are making. Thanks to the Town of East Lyme for taking the lead on this study.

Halls Road Improvements Committee: The Board of Selectmen has appointed nine members to this committee, whose first meeting was in November. The Committee will look at Halls Road as a whole in an effort to improve the appearance, safety, and consistency of Halls Road. As it is a State road, collaboration and cooperation with the State of CT will be a key component to the task. It is likely that there will be subcommittees to work on specific tasks for this effort, so if you are interested in helping out, please contact the Selectman's Office (selectmansoffice@oldlyme-ct.gov) and let us know.

Solid Waste/Recycling Review Committee: The Board of Selectmen also appointed a Solid Waste/Recycling Review

Committee to review the Solid Waste Ordinance and develop education outreach to increase recycling in Old Lyme. There are currently four members on this committee, with one vacancy. If you are interested in helping out on this committee, please contact the Selectman's Office at selectmansoffice@oldlyme-ct.gov . The committee meets on the second Tuesday of the month at 4 pm in Town Hall.

Town Woods Playground: Special thanks to the Junior Women's Club for their work on the Love Your Playground initiative. The members of the Club noticed the need for updated playground equipment at Town Woods Playground, worked with vendors on identifying appropriate equipment, shared their ideas with P & R Director Don Bugbee, and raised the funds to purchase the equipment for installation. The Park & Rec Commission approved the plan, and the Board of Selectmen endorsed it as well. We all thank this group of women for their efforts on behalf of our community!

Congratulations Braiden Sunshine! One of our own has made it to the Live showing of The VOICE, which airs on NBC. Braiden is a very talented Lyme Old Lyme High School student whose work with several local bands is well known in our community. This fall he competed on the popular network show, hoping to become the next great star! So far, he has succeeded in remaining on the show, and many in our community are supporting him through the

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


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Old Lyme Historical Society

The popular Old Lyme Now & Then Community Calendar has just been published. 2016 marks the fourth year that the Old Lyme Historical Society has invited sponsors to underwrite months of the year The photographs show the organization as it is now contrasted with what it was in times past. The Town of Old Lyme has pride in place by starting the year off with a salute to a group of World War II veterans who are photographed in the entrance fover of the Old Lyme Town Hall. Behind them is the pastel painting *Spirit of the Doughboy* which depicts a woman and a young man gazing at an American flag. It is the work of Albert Herter (1871-1950) and has particular poignancy as it is thought to be of his wife, Adele, and their son Everit, also an artist, who was killed at Chateau Thierry in 1918. 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Old Lyme Ambulance



The new ambulance was purchased from New England Fire Equipment and Apparatus in North Haven. The ambulance it replaces is currently on loan to a town in Rhode Island whose two ambulances are currently out of service for major repairs. When it returns to Old Lyme (in about 6 months), members of the OL Volunteer Ambulance Association will decide its permanent disposition. The last two retired ambulances were donated to two towns in Maine.

Chemical Pesticides Harm Birds

The Old Lyme Conservation Commission continues to recommend that Old Lyme residents avoid using chemical pesticides, which can harm your children and pets, as well as birds. States Tom Andersen, Director of Communications of the Connecticut Audubon Society, "We know from the experience with DDT and its disastrous effect on ospreys that pesticides can be harmful to birds and it can take years to be evident. We also know that bird populations can rebound, if the poisons are removed from the environment. The incredible comeback of the ospreys on the Connecticut River estuary is proof."

The Connecticut Audubon Society's Osprey Nation program is using citizen scientists, including many in the Old Lyme area, to collect data on the state's osprey population. Details are available at www.ctaudubon.org from the CT Audubon Society, CT's original and independent Audubon, founded in 1898.

The Audubon Guide to Home Pesticides tells us, "Pesticides used by homeowners can wreak havoc on wildlife, even when they're correctly applied. About a dozen pesticides approved

for backyard use have caused documented die-offs of birds." http://web4.audubon.org/bird/pesticides/

To prevent bugs such as carpenter ants, aphids, termites, and grubs, homeowners often use products that contain diazinon, a danger to humans, but also it "is highly toxic to birds, fish, and other wildlife.... The EPA bans its use on golf courses and turf farms, but homeowners can still buy it. Nearly half of all reported wildlife poisonings from home or garden pesticide use involve diazinon."

The Connecticut Audubon Society's new Roger Tory Peterson® Estuary Center will host its spring Connecticut River Estuary Lecture Series, highlighting the ecology, science and culture of the lower Connecticut River. The Roger Tory Peterson® Estuary Center Regional Board is one of Connecticut Audubon's five regional boards, formed this year to create a Connecticut Audubon center near the mouth of the Connecticut River.

Behind the Scenes of Emergency Preparedness

Long before a hurricane is forecast to make landfall in New England, or a 48 hour winter snow storm is scheduled to begin, members of the Town's Emergency Management team have begun their preparations for the protection of the health & safety of our residents.

For the next issues of Old Lyme Events, we'll introduce you to the friends and neighbors who have volunteered to be part of Old Lyme's Emergency Management Team.

Respite Center Manager Bill Archer

Bill Archer's phone call offering to help at the Senior Center following Hurricane Irene was the catalyst that led to the Town's Respite Center operation at the Lymes' Senior Center.


During the aftermath of Storm Sandy, the Respite Center was a place where people could pick up water or ice, recharge cell phones and laptops, share a meal with fellow storm survivors, or just gather with others to swap survival stories. Respite Center volunteers purchased and prepared food, offered a friendly ear for those weary from days without power, and kept a watchful eye for people who might need more than just a place out of the storm.

This fall, as soon as Hurricane Joachim's potential impact on our shoreline was announced, Bill Archer retrieved his Respite Center Operations binder from a designated backpack and started planning. He used the Old Lyme Alerts system to send messages to Respite Center volunteers, asking them to stand by to prepare for Respite Center Operations. The Respite Center staffing is done with teams of 6, a system that developed after Sandy, when volunteers were putting in 14 to 16 hour days at the Center. Now, Respite Center team leaders (Bill & Judy Archer, Mike & Mary Lou Rice, Alan & Elda Cone) and volunteers – more than 30, so far – work in shifts from 7am to 9pm. A fourth team (Diane Blackwell & Richard Dakin) concentrates on meeting the needs of Meals on Wheels recipients during the emergency.

Many Respite Center volunteers are Red Cross-trained in disaster services and food service. Bill Archer, a retired wilderness first responder, has taken a number of certification courses, including Safe Serve and CPR/AED. All the volunteers are "yes people," according to Bill, for an operation that demands cooperation, patience, and endurance. He believes that "help your neighbor" is the mantra in our small town, and that the emergencies we have endured together have brought out the best in us.

Special Needs Liaison Carrie McCarthy

Carrie McCarthy is going into her 12th year of service for the Old Lyme Volunteer Ambulance Association (OLVAA) and became its Chief of Service in May of 2015. When she was asked to be the Special Needs liaison in 2010, Carrie says she "jumped at the opportunity to help the citizens of Old Lyme [with] preparation and preparedness, rather than just at their worst time of need when they call 911."

Using information on Special Needs forms completed by residents and caregivers, Carrie maintains contact information for Old Lyme residents who might need extra assistance in the event of an emergency. Special needs might entail a sight or hearing impairment, dependence on oxygen or other electrically powered equipment or reliance on a service animal, wheelchair or walker.

The Special Needs list consists of 200+ mostly year round Old Lyme residents and was initially created by Brett Flynn. Carrie coordinates with the Emergency Operations Center, as well as the OLVNA and the Senior Center during every event "to make sure we have everyone on the list who needs to be." Assisted by her mom, Barbara Rozanski, and Lori Landry, she makes contact with everyone on the list multiple times in advance of an anticipated emergency event. Those who do not answer or call back are visited personally with the help of Public Works, the OLVAA, Old Lyme Fire Department, and Old Lyme Police Department. During the last major storm, the blizzard, the

Special Needs team went door to door to check on about 30 people, some of whom were evacuated for safety reasons. Carrie says they work as a well-oiled machine to ensure the safety of Town crews and citizens. The team conducts annual drills to make sure they are well-prepared.

If you or someone you know would require special assistance in the event of an emergency, please make sure a registration form has been filed with the Town. Keep in mind that a special needs situation could be temporary (e.g. during recovery from a medical situation), while others may be more permanent. And please don't forget to take name(s) off the list when special assistance is no longer required.

There are typically only 2 or 3 people making the calls to people on the list, so it needs to be as accurate and current as possible. The information on the forms is kept strictly confidential and not shared with anyone outside of the Emergency Management Team. Special needs forms are available at the Town Hall and Lymes' Senior Center, and are contained in Annual Town Reports.

What is 2-1-1? It is Connecticut's free

information and referral service. By dialing 2-1-1, a toll-free number throughout CT, callers can reach knowledgeable, multilingual staff and get information, referrals or seek help in a crisis. 2-1-1 operates 24 hours a day, every day of the year. TDD access is available.

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The SAT Takes Over For the SBAC

After a somewhat tumultuous rollout of the mandated Common Core curriculum and its accompanying Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium ("SBAC"), the legislature voted this past session to remove the SBAC test and replace it with the popular SAT for high school junior assessments. Since federal approval was given in August, this change will go into effect for the current 2015-16 school year. I supported this because many high school students in the 23rd District already take the SAT (many in their junior year), so this would mean one less standardized test. The change should lead to lower student stress and more time spent learning in the classroom.

This should bring a small sigh of relief to Lyme/Old Lyme teachers, parents, and high school juniors. Beyond the benefits of reducing duplicative testing, students will receive a fee waiver to sit for the exam (as opposed to paying the \$50 fee to take it) and the test is completed in one day as

opposed to over several. According to The College Board (the company that produces the SAT), the exam will now focus on math that matters more for career readiness and move away from testing obscure vocabulary words.



In addition, the state has established a Mastery Examination Committee to address standardized testing in grades 3-8. This committee is studying the impact of standardized examinations on learning time, whether these exams are an appropriate assessment, the feasibility of reducing the time required to complete these exams, and the best format in which to take them. The legislature will be receiving reports from the Committee in February 2016 and January 2017.

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

Dredging Project

The past several months have been pivotal in bringing the proposed dredging projects on the Four Mile and Black Hall Rivers to fruition. The application process to dredge was completed after three years of conducting studies, testing, planning and determining the details required to improve the navigation channels of these two rivers and and restore the tidal flooding of the marshes and other marine vegetation.

The project was managed and coordinated by HMC Vice-Chairman Ned Farman with support from Chairman Steven Ross and First Selectwoman Bonnie Reemsnyder. It is important to note that this project will be completed without expenditure of any Town funds or tax dollars, and all funds required have been received in advance, not as a reimbursement. This is an extraordinary accomplishment and benefit to the Town, literally a "once every few decades" opportunity.

Applications were submitted to the CT Department of of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) with copies of all test results, reports and the precise planned routes for the dredged channels. This included determination of the amount of material estimated to be removed and plans for transporting the material for disposal.

Application was concurrently made to obtain approval from the Army Corps of Engineers. It was a complex process involving professional expertise and much of the work was contracted to Coastline Consulting LLC. The cost of all studies and testing was paid in full with funds received in a grant from the CT Department of Transportation in 2011.

We received approval for the Black Hall River application from DEEP on April 21 and for the Four Mile River on May 5. Approval from the Army Corps followed shortly thereafter.

The bid specifications were then developed and bids solicited in June. Once we had the bids for the projects, we applied for another grant and it was awarded by the CT DOT on July 28 in the amount of \$1,614,074. This amount is the combined total of the bids for the two rivers.

Contracts were drafted with Patriot Marine for the work but were held tentative pending receipt of the grant funds and a vote at a Town Meeting which is required to authorize the expenditure. The Town Meeting was held September 8 and the proposal was approved overwhelmingly by a vote of 117 in favor and 11 against.

Contracts were then executed with Patriot Marine for the dredging and Coastline Consulting LLC for the pre and post dredge final surveys required and management services. We were thrilled when dredging commenced October 9. The project should be completed sometime in January, depending on weather, of course.

The Four Mile River dredging was started first and involves increasing the depth and improving the navigation channel from the Four Mile River marina south into Long Island Sound. Approximately 13,000 cubic yards will be removed. The process is complicated by having to transfer dredge materials from small scows to a large barge due to having to pass under the railroad bridge near LIS.

The Black Hall River dredging will overlap the Four Mile work to some extent and will improve the channel form the Shore Road Route 156 bridge south into Long Island Sound. Approximately 9,800 cubic yards will be removed.

When completed, this project will provide much better access for recreational boating from the State boat launches on the Back River that flows into Black Hall and the one located on the Four Mile River. It will also benefit the three local marina businesses and their local customers. Improved flow and removal of sediment provides an environmental benefit for the surrounding salt marshes by diminishing any stagnation from very low depth.

Your Harbor Management Commission and its members are pleased to have been able to complete this lengthy process and improve our unique natural resources with no burden to our taxpayers.



Champagne & Sparkling Wine for the Holidays

'Tis the season and holiday shopping is upon us. Shopping can be fun, especially if you are in the market for a festive Champagne or Sparkling Wine. There are some important things to know when looking for a "bubbly" so that you can best decide which to purchase.

Champagne is a region in France, and only wines from this region can be called "Champagne," all others are considered to be sparkling wine. Champagne is considered in many eyes to be the premier sparkling wine. There are large Champagne houses such as Taittinger, Veuve Clicquot, Perrier Jouet and Moet & Chandon which are very popular and sell extremely well. Smaller, less well known houses that have the grapes grown and produced on the property are called "Growers Champagnes." These champagnes are becoming very popular since there is such time and care put into the winemaking process. These Growers Champagnes are of superb quality and are usually a very good value. Many other areas in France produce less expensive sparkling wines including the towns surrounding Champagne, Alsace and the small town of Limoux.

There are many different styles of Champagne and sparkling wine. The most traditional is a blend of Chardonnay, Pinot

Meunier and Pinot Noir. Blanc de Blancs is a sparkling made solely of Chardonnay. Blanc de Noirs is made from Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier, which has a pinkish hue resembling the color of onion skin due to the grape skins having longer contact with the grapes. Rosé is considered the best wine of the winery and gets its color from still Pinot Noir being added during the winemaking process. Brut is a very dry sparkling wine, drier even than Extra Dry, and a lot less sweet than a Demi-Sec.

Sparkling wines are available from all different parts of the world which can be much less expensive than Champagne. The United States produces a good amount of sparkling wine, most notably in California, but also has a wide selection from Washington and New Mexico. Spanish sparkling wine is called Cava, and is traditionally made with Macabeo, Parellada and Xarel-Lo varietals. These wines are extremely approachable and are significantly less money than Champagne. Then there is the very popular Prosecco, a light and pleasing varietal from Italy. Prosecco has grown in popularity over the years, most likely due to its very reasonable pricing and friendly palate. For something a little sweeter Italy also produces fantastic Moscato d'Asti and Spumante sparkling wines.



Influenza

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death. The best way to prevent the flu is by getting a flu vaccine each year.

Signs and symptoms of flu: Fever* or feeling feverish/chills; cough; sore throat; runny or stuffy nose; muscle or body aches; headaches; fatigue (very tired); some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.*It's important to note that not everyone with flu will have a fever.

How flu spreads. Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or possibly their nose.

Period of contagiousness. You may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young

children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.

How serious is the flu? Flu is unpredictable and how severe it is can vary widely from one season to the next depending on many things, including: what flu viruses are spreading; how much flu vaccine is available; when vaccine is available; how many people get vaccinated, and; how well the flu vaccine is matched to flu viruses that are causing illness.

Certain people are at greater risk for serious complications if they get the flu. This includes older people, young children, pregnant women and people with certain health conditions(http://www.cdc.gov/flu/about/disease/high_risk.htm) (such as asthma, diabetes, or heart disease).

Flu seasons are unpredictable and can be severe. Over a period of 30 years, between 1976 and 2006, estimates of flu-associated deaths in the United States range from a low of about 3,000 to a high of about 49,000 people.

Prevent seasonal flu: Get vaccinated. The single best way to prevent the flu is to get a flu vaccine each season. The quadrivalent flu vaccine protects against two influenza A viruses and two influenza B viruses.







Many Old Lyme residents are unaware of a hidden treasure open 365 days a year with free admission right in the center of their town.

Travel down the driveway on Lyme Street on the southern side of Lyme Academy College and you will reach Gilbert V. Boro's expansive Sculpture Grounds. 

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


