Town Manager's Corner

Hello East Hampton,

Here comes winter! It is a favorite time of year for many of us. Whether it's the idea of family and celebrations at the holidays, the thrill of winter sports or the quiet solitude of a snowfall, we all probably have something we like about winter. This year, those new twists to our favorite activities are really showing themselves now. Unfortunately, the pandemic has experienced a bit of a resurgence in East Hampton and in Connecticut, but, as I have learned in the last year and, certainly, in the last eight months or so, we are resilient and adaptable here. We carried on and we made things happen.

We managed to have a COVID-sensitive celebration of the Town's new Town Hall facility and officially dedicated it to the community. At the ceremony, we took time to thank all of those that were involved in bringing the building to completion including the members of the Town Facilities Building Committee and the design and construction teams. We even reburied a time capsule from the old Town Hall on East High Street that was originally placed by the Fourth Graders of Middle Haddam School in 1976! (May you all be there when it is officially opened in 2076 at our country's 300th birthday!) We also took time to honor a special resident, Robert "Red" McKinney, who passed away in 2019. A plaque remembering Red is in the Town Hall lobby along with the dedication plaques for the building. Come by and see them.

In the last few months, the Town completed some projects that were put on pause last March. The Library Advisory Board and the Town Council approved a Strategic Plan for the Library, which was developed with major resident input and focused work by staff and other community members. The plan, which lays out the goals and vision for the next three years, is available at the library or

on the library website. The Planning and Zoning Commission also adopted a significant update to the regulations that protect our watershed and water bodies including Lake Pocotopaug. Many residents invested lots of time to providing input to the Commission and Town staff as the Town worked toward a set of regulations that balance property owner needs with the protection of our greatest water resources. Information on these regulations is available at the Land Use Department or on the Town's website.

As this Events Magazine is distributed, the Town is hard at work on the budget for the upcoming fiscal year. Undoubtedly, we will face challenges as we prepare for the upcoming year and will have to make choices, but we will do so with a watchful eye to the future. The Town's financial plan will consider our people, our continued on page 5

Land Use Department

After nearly a year of work, several public workshops, and many months of public hearings, the Planning and Zoning Commission approved the updated Section 3.1 - Lake Pocotopaug Protection Zone at their regular meeting on November 4, 2020. This update goes a long way to accomplishing stated goals found within the Plan of Conservation and Development and the Nine Elements Watershed Plan of protecting the watershed from development impacts. It requires additional site planning, buffer strips along the lake and tributaries, and increased

requirements regarding stormwater runoff from all properties within the watershed. It requires large clearing activities to be completed in a phased approach requiring stabilization before moving to another phase and prohibits the opening of vast amounts of land during the rainy season.

We would like to thank all of the residents and groups that joined together to help make the update a reality. This was a community driven process and will benefit the lake watershed for years to come.

We continue to ask that during these challenging times, you rely on our website and communicate through email and telephone calls as much as possible to limit the number of people in the building and ensure everyone's health and safety. We recognize that submitting information digitally and attending meetings virtually can be frustrating at times. Thank you to all Commission members for continuing to volunteer your time and to everyone in the community for your patience during this unprecedented time.

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Office of the Collector of Revenue

The second installment of taxes for real estate and personal property as well as motor vehicle supplemental tax is due and payable on January 1, 2021. The last day in which to pay without penalty is February 1, 2021. Motor vehicle supplemental tax is generated when a vehicle is registered between October 2nd and August 1st. As a reminder, there is not an additional mailing for the second installment. If you have misplaced your bill you may look it up by visiting www.easthamptonct.gov or contact the Tax Office at: 860-267-2300. Please make all checks payable to Town of East Hampton.

There is a drop box located in the front of the Town Hall at 1 Community Drive. Also, there is a second drop box located inside the lobby.

Paying in Person:

When paying in person all taxpayers must adhere to the CDC guidelines. This includes wearing a mask upon entering the building and practicing social distancing.

If you cannot pay your bill in full you may communicate with the Tax Office and make partial payments.

Please do not ignore the bill completely.





Simple Fire Safety Tip from the East Hampton Fire Marshal

Everyone knows about the importance of smoke detectors and carbon monoxide alarms. But did you know that in addition to these excellent devices, there is a very low tech, zero cost fire prevention device you can use tonight to increase your chances of surviving in a fire? The East Hampton Fire Marshal's Office, during our numerous fire prevention presentations, has always touted the importance of sleeping with your bedroom doors shut. The door that a bedroom has will provide extra minutes of protection should a fire occur during the night, but only if it is closed. Right is a picture that demonstrates how important this simple act is to increase your chances of survival during a fire. The room on the right did not have the bedroom door shut.

The argument I hear from most people is that they will not be able to hear their children during the night. With modern technology there are numerous monitors on the market that will allow you to hear children in their rooms, and speaking from experience, they allow you to hear more clearly than if you had the bedroom doors open.



The Fire Marshal's office urges you to seriously consider this simple act of fire prevention to increase your family's chance of survival if a fire should occur during the night.



East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department - BUCKLE UP!!!

Quite often, firefighters respond to serious motor vehicle accidents involving cars or trucks that have been damaged so severely that they are hardly recognizable. As the apparatus arrives on scene, hearts sink as the prospect for survivability appears to be non-existent, only to find the occupants in remarkably good shape. Conversely, victims can suffer serious or even fatal injuries in accidents that, comparatively speaking, may seemingly be minor in nature. The differentiating factor between these two scenarios is often attributed to the use of seatbelts.

Over the years, automotive engineers have developed and extensively tested design concepts and devices that have had a significant impact on increasing vehicular safety and occupant survivability. Energy-absorbing crumple zones, structural components that convert roofs and side panels into roll cages, air bags and other physical enhancements have significantly reduced the risk of fatal or serious injury in motor vehicle accidents.

However, these enhancements are all based on a single premise - - - that the driver and passengers are securely fastened into the seat they are occupying. An unsecured occupant involved in an accident now becomes a projectile that continues to move at the same rate of speed as the vehicle was travelling at the time of impact. The occupant's body will then strike against interior features of the vehicle (steering columns, dashboards, side posts, etc.) or be completely ejected, causing

severe and potentially fatal blunt force trauma injuries.

It is vitally important that seat belts be properly secured for vehicular safety features to function as designed and members of the East Hampton Volunteer Fire Department encourage all to Buckle Up, without exception, each time you venture out in your vehicle - - - we can meet you some other time, some other place . . .

Public Works

The 2020 construction season has been very busy and successful. Along with our normal road and fleet maintenance operations the Public Works Department has completed nearly 2.5 miles of pavement restoration, along with several drainage projects throughout the town including improvements on Lake Drive, Meeks Point, Walnut Avenue, Collie Brook Road, School House Lane, Holly Drive, Sunset Drive, and Dogwood Drive. The parking lots at the Community Center and Fire Company #1 on Barton Hill were also reconstructed and paved. Additionally, crews from Indus Inc. have completed crack sealing operations on Fernwood Drive, Crestwood Drive, Birchwood Drive, and Country Lane. Crack sealing is an important pavement preservation technique that prevents water from

seeping into the pavement structure causing premature failure.

As the construction season winds down winter preparation work for the Public Works Department is in full swing.

Traditionally the official winter season runs from November 15th through April 15th. We have already encountered our first snow event of the season on October 30th, and department staff is continuing to prepare and calibrate winter maintenance equipment to ensure it is ready when needed throughout the winter season. In the upcoming weeks we will be preparing for the winter months including filling of potholes, gravel road maintenance, tree work

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and roadside ditch clearing. Residents are reminded to refrain from parking on the road during snow and storm events. Cars parked on the road substantially hinder and delay our snow removal operations. Please find an off-road location

to park your vehicles. Please also be reminded all garbage and recycling carts should be placed behind the curb/edge of the road and removed promptly when emptied as these obstacles can also be a significant impediment.

REGISTRATION AND PROGRAM INFORMATION

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic our program offerings are ever changing based on local and state guidelines. Please check out www.easthamptonrec.com for the latest schedule and offerings. Our programs all follow in accordance with current CDC and OEC guidelines. Program enrollments are accepted online at: www.easthamptonrec.com. Registration forms are available online at: www.easthamptonrec.com or at the Parks and Recreation Office.

All registration forms must include payment. Payment is required at the time of registration. All registrations are taken on a first come, first served basis. We accept MasterCard and Visa. Please make checks payable to East Hampton Parks and Recreation. Cash payments should be made in the office only. Please do not try to register or pay program instructors unless indicated.

Registration confirmations are available by email if subscribed to on your main account page at www.easthamptonct.gov. No other confirmations are provided; however, if you have registered with us and paid, you will be on the final roster.

Program Refund Policy

If you are unable to attend a program you have registered for, please contact us. You must contact us 7 days before a program starts to receive a 100% refund. Cancellations inside of 7 days will receive a 50% refund or be issued an account credit for another activity. After the program starts no refunds will be issued. Our ability to refund money for trip cancellations depends on our contractual agreement with the travel companies.

In the event of inclement weather, all programs are cancelled if

school is closed or has an early dismissal. Cancellation information is posted on WFSB Channel 3 Early Warning Network. Households who have subscribed to the online registration site's email notifications will receive an email regarding the cancellation.

Program times are subject to change based on enrollment numbers. Programs will be cancelled if the minimum enrollment number is not reached.

Applications for reduced-tuition scholarships are available at the Parks and Recreation Office and Youth and Family Services. All information is strictly confidential. This is an application process. Only programs run directly by East Hampton Parks and Recreation qualify.

A portion of your enrollment fee may be put into your Special Revenue Program account for the East Hampton Parks & Recreation Department to maintain or enhance this program or other programs. This fund is not associated with the General Fund of the Town of East Hampton.

Youth Recreational Basketball

Registration is open now for these programs. We will be operating in accordance with CIAC guidelines for sports as related to COVID-19. All participants must fill out the attached waiver prior to the start of the program. We are awaiting more guidelines for attendance at games and practices and those will be posted prior to the start of the season.

Lake-Smart Award Program for Lake Pocotopaug

CONSERVATION-LAKE COMMISSION LAKE-SMART AWARD PROGRAM

Congratulations to these six families in the Lake Pocotopaug Watershed who have received the Lake-Smart Award: Pam Joslyn and Gary Greenwald of Hale Road, John Roche Family and Ellen Braun Family both on Raymond Road, Cap & Craig Nelson on Lakewood Road, Don Burr on Bay Road, and Lynn & Marty Podskoch on O'Neill Lane.

The East Hampton Conservation - Lake Commission (CLC) started the Lake-Smart Award Program for property owners living on Lake Pocotopaug or in the surrounding watershed. The purpose is to encourage property owners to improve the quality of Lake Pocotopaug by doing projects to prevent infiltration of phosphates, nitrates, pesticides, and other impurities from entering the lake. Those that achieve seven requirements will receive a Lake-Smart Award sign they can display on their property. It is hoped the program will not only improve the quality of the lake but also encourage neighbors to make improvements to their property.

Some of the seven criteria property owners will be evaluated on are do they have a "buffer zone," rain gardens, diversion ditches, etc. that contain stormwater runoff before it reaches the lake. Do owners refrain from using chemical fertilizers containing phosphates and nitrates or using pesticides and herbicides. In mowing their lawn do they maintain the level of their lawn at 2 1/2-3" and use a mulching

blade instead of bagging grass clippings. Do they cover bare soil areas with mulch or plantings. Do they refrain from feeding water fowl and discourage them from coming onto their property. Finally, do they prevent leaves and grass clippings from entering the lake.



Joan Joyce - Our Finest Athlete by Sigrid Kun

Many fondly remember going to Raybestos Memorial field in Stratford, CT. Amid chants of "Joanie, Joanie," the softball phenom mowed down the competition. Joan Joyce dominated women's fast pitch softball for decades - beginning her amateur career at age 13 with the Raybestos Brakettes. The Waterbury, CT native excelled at every sport she tried - a true competitor, a lifelong coach/mentor. Joyce combines an unbridled, remarkable talent with a matter of fact, humble personality. While she readily speaks about her success, there is no bragging.

Many consider her as "The Greatest Woman Athlete of All Time." Her jaw-dropping achievements/honors take pages to list, including 20 Hall of Fame inductions, Connecticut Athlete of the Year (selected by the Connecticut Sports Writers Alliance), and a softball field renamed Joan Joyce Field (a part of Municipal Stadium in Waterbury).

A LIFETIME OF ASTOUNDING **ACHIEVEMENTS**

Jovce's softball career covered 1954-1963 and 1967-1975 with the Brakettes and 1964-1966 with the Orange Lionettes. The slingshot pitcher notched 150 no-hitters and 50 perfect games with a lifetime earned run average of 0.09. An outstanding hitter, her career batting average is .327. In 1974, her Brakettes were the first American team to win the World Championships.

She co-founded the International Women's Professional Softball Association, being the star player for

and part-owner of the Connecticut Falcons. The Falcons won every championship of the IWPSA's existence (1976-1979).

She is a four-time Women's Basketball Association All-American and three time AAU Basketball All-American. She played on the USA Women's National Team in 1964 and 1965, setting a national tournament basketball single-game scoring record (67 points) in 1964.

She formed the Connecticut Clippers volleyball team in 1968, and competed as a player/coach. She was named to the All-East United States Volleyball Association Regional Team. Taking up golf at age 35, she spent 19 years on the LPGA tour (1977-1995). She still holds the LPGA and PGA record of just 17 putts in one round of golf.

Now 80, Joyce is the women's softball coach at Florida Atlantic University. Starting the program from scratch in 1994, she has amassed 12 Conference Championships, participated in 11 NCCA Tournaments, and won 8 Coach-of-the Year Awards.

THE SECRET TO SUCCESS?

"I don't know," she says. "The only thing I can say about me is that I am very competitive. . . . I will beat you at just about everything. If you beat me, I'd shake hands. But I'd say to myself, you are not going to beat me a second time."

Her mother worked days. She, her father (above) and brother played sports all the time. "We would end up going to my father's softball games," she recalls. "We had no gloves. We'd run around everywhere while my father was playing. When they came in from the field, they'd put the gloves under the bench. We'd take them and start catching. When they went back in the field, they'd have to come and get the gloves back from us." When her father played basketball, she and her brother would wait for the halftime buzzer and then fly onto the court to play.

of fundraisers in 1961 and 1966; Aaron in 1978 in a West Hartford exhibition. There were no radar guns then. A doctorate study from USC determined her pitching speed to be the equivalent of 119 mph in baseball.

Invited to China by the All-China Sports Federation (1979).

"It was the first team ever invited to China," she recalls of the Connecticut Falcons. "When we played our last game sixty thousand people came to the game. I was looking out and it was like a flood of people just coming and coming and coming. And I'm thinking, 'Oh, my God!" The American team won all six games. In the final game, Joyce pitched a no-hitter to beat the Chinese all-star team.

Joyce pitched a no hitter against Australia. "Only one walk. And we picked her off," notes Joyce. "It would have been a perfect game." She also stymied Japan, giving up only two hits. No team wore helmets then. Japan showed up wearing them. Was it to distract her or out of fear of her? "It didn't work," she laughs. "You did not want to get me focused or to get my attention. Stare at me? Give me looks? I would say to myself,

keep doing that 'cause you're never going to beat me. I just didn't like to lose."
