First Selectwoman's Corner

It's Spring! Unless Mother Nature changes her mind (again). Thank you to all of the people working in the background to get us through winter safely and in good spirits - our wonderful Public Works Department and many outside contractors for helping keep the roads clear, our Tree Warden for managing our urban forest, our Library for keeping the shelves full of good books, the Chester Hose Company for answering the call when a carbon monoxide detector goes off or we slip on the ice, and the organizations, volunteers and merchants who give us fun and productive events to keep us busy! This is a big part of what keeps Chester vital and charming.

BUDGET REPORT

When Governor Malloy released his 2017-2018 Budget Proposal on February 8th, we realized that this was going to be our toughest budget year yet. After analyzing the cuts in Education Cost Sharing and capital projects funds, in addition to the announcement that one third of the teacher pension fund costs would be passed down to the individual towns, we were notified that our expected state revenue would be cut by 12%. On the other side of the balance sheet, expected expenditures are increasing, primarily due to increases in resident trooper costs, storm water monitoring requirements, and contract and salary requirements. The Boards of Finance and Selectmen are working hard to plan next year's budget wisely and carefully. We are looking critically at every line item and asking departments to look again at their budget requests. We are doing everything possible to rethink the way we have been spending money and finding as many ways to save as we can. As difficult as our budget process is this year, there are many towns in Connecticut in far worse shape than Chester. We are making great efforts to think creatively and unconventionally, and welcome suggestions for saving money or restructuring how we purchase big ticket items. Some changes that we are contemplating include restructuring our police staffing, decreasing our energy consumption everywhere possible, postponing large projects

that don't have safety concerns for residents, exploring new options for equipment and vehicle purchasing or leasing over time. Why am I telling you this? First, because we all need to be prepared for a difficult financial year. Second, because you deserve to know what is going on with your taxes and why. Third, and most importantly, because we need you to participate in the process! Below is a schedule of the budget workshops, school referendum, town budget hearing and final town meeting and budget vote. Please put these dates on your calendar and come get informed and let us know your thoughts.

LIBRARY TRUST

As you may have heard, we have been wrestling with a wonderful problem lately...In 1993, Gwendolyn Orton-Jones, a Chester resident and retired librarian, died and left a substantial amount of money in trust to benefit the Chester Public Library. The funds were placed in a not for profit corporation and the Trustee paid out the income from investment to the library and the librarians each year as directed by Ms. Orton-Jones' will. The funds were specifically intended to supplement the ordinary budget of the library, and to provide for items and staffing needs that would not otherwise be possible in the town budget. Recently, the Trustee became ill and was unable to continue, and a new Trustee was appointed by the probate court. In the process, there was a great deal of controversy about how the funds had previously been disbursed and a legal opinion was sought by my office to determine the proper way to handle this unique situation. It was discovered that the procedures needed to be updated to conform to proper ethical and transparency needs of a public library. Accordingly, a new fund is being set up with the Town of Chester which will restrict the use of these gift funds to those appropriate supplemental uses and provide transparency for reporting the income and spending of the trust income. Bottom line is, we are incredibly blessed to have received this gift and our library will be the better for it. Thank you, Ms. Orton-Jones!

STRATEGIC PLANNING

I wrote briefly in the last Chester Events about the desire for long term strategic planning and the need to match town priorities with the money needed to accomplish them. I have been working with members of the Board of Finance, Planning and Zoning and the Economic Development Commission to work cooperatively toward this goal. The deadline for updating of Chester's Plan of Conservation and Development is coming in the near future, and we are hoping to coordinate our efforts to integrate these plans into actionable documents that reflect the goals of Chester taxpayers and coordinate the infrastructure, conservation, housing, natural resources, safety and other crucial elements of life in our small town. This planning process will begin with extensive public discourse and input into what YOU feel is critical in our town, and expresses the goals and expectations of all of our residents. We expect that this public conversation will begin in late spring and continue in various forms into the fall. Watch for announcements of the activities and come join in the discussion.

The merchants and local organizations have been busy planning fun things to do with the expectation of warmer weather, flowers and sunshine! I hope to see you there.



DOG LICENSES

Dog licenses will be available starting June 1st in the Town Clerk's Office. A neutered or spayed dog will cost \$8 while an unneutered or unspayed dog is \$19.

Beginning July 1st a \$1 penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at 203 Middlesex Avenue, along with a self-addressed stamped envelope. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records. For more information call the Town Clerk's Office at 860-526-0013, Ext. 511. The office is open 9 am to noon and 1 to 4 pm Monday, Wednesday and Thursday. On Tuesday the office is open until 7 pm and on Friday the office closes at noon.

BULKY WASTE TRANSFER STICKERS

Spring is here and it's time to clean the basement. If you need to get rid of bulky waste, you need to get a bulky waste transfer sticker prior to using the transfer station, which is located in Deep River on Route 80. Those stickers may be obtained from the Town Clerk's Office with proof of residency and the license plate number of the vehicle you plan to use for hauling the bulky waste.





Today is Tomorrow's History News from Chester Historical Society

Constance Baker Motley Program

The Historical Society with the Chester Land Trust will present a program about Judge Constance Baker Motley on Sunday, May 7 at 4 pm in the Meeting House. The Land Trust will be celebrating its acquisition of an open space parcel of land designated as the Constance Baker Motley Preserve on Cedar Lake Road and the Historical Society will present a program, by local author and historian Marta Daniels, about the important civil rights history of Judge Motley in America. Judge Motley was part of the Chester community for 40+ years, living in her seasonal home on Cedar Lake Road. The May 7 program will highlight her remarkable career with the NAACP, where she was lead attorney achieving Supreme Court decisions advancing civil rights cases. She was the first African American woman elected to the New York State Senate and the first to serve on the federal court. The program is free and refreshments will be served.

Summertime Exhibits

We're very excited to show you what we've been working on this winter and spring when we open the Chester Museum at The Mill for the season on Memorial Day weekend. Our seasonal exhibit, on the first floor, will feature a large display of old Chester postcards and will also feature some Chester notable people from the past. Our permanent exhibit, "Streams of Change," on the second floor has been revised and refreshed. For instance, the Chester Center images are being changed and broadened, and the Silliman inkwell collection has been expanded to highlight its Civil War-era importance. We are also planning to add some old Chester home movies to the exhibit. Following an opening party for the new season on Friday evening, May 26, the museum will be open on Saturdays from 1 to 4 pm and Sundays from 10 to 4 until October.

Preserving Chester History

For 46 years, our all-volunteer organization, despite a very modest operating budget, has preserved, protected and interpreted Chester's rich history. We were thrilled this past winter to help the Town acquire from Goodspeed Musicals the safe used by the C.J. Bates company in the early 1900s, and then create a display for it in Town Hall. - 4. Losing track of date and time
- 5. Difficulty with spatial relationships
- 6. Trouble finding the right words or calling things by another name


- 7. Losing things like your keys and inability to find them

- 10. Mood or personality changes





MAKE A SPLASH THIS SUMMER!

We are an outdoor program specializing in waterfront activities! Our Camp Counselors are Certified Lifeguards.

Our SUMMER CAMP rivals any camp in the area! We offer swimming, sports, science & nature, arts & crafts, team building, and more, but unlike many camps, children choose most of what they wish to participate in throughout the day from a variety of programmed activities. It is open to children entering grades 1 through 7 and the hours are from 8:15 am until 3:45 pm, the weeks of June 26, July 10, July 17, July 24, July 31, August 7, and August 14, at Chester Elementary School on Mondays, Thursdays, Fridays and severe weather days, and Cedar Lake on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. If the camp meets at the school on Tuesday or Wednesday due to weather, Thursday camp will be held at the lake that week. The children take field trips on Fridays. The fee is \$130 per child, per week, and payable at the time of registration. The weeks of July 10 and July 24 (SEE KINDER-CAMP) are open to children entering Kindergarten, too! The weeks of July 10, 17, 24, and 31 include optional swimming lessons the days the program meets at Cedar Lake. All Kinder-Camp children participate in swimming lessons.



KINDER-CAMP for children ENTERING KINDERGARTEN has staff and programming designed specifically to meet the needs of younger children. Activities include games, sports, crafts, nature, teacher-led swimming and story time. The children have their own teachers, lunch time, and activities in their own group of 6 to 8 campers, running concurrently with our grades 1 through 7 camp, at the same location the weeks of July 10 (1 waiting list only) and July 24 (2 spaces remaining). Our camp fee includes all program and field trip expenses, except lunch. Children do not need to be Chester residents to attend.

CEDAR LAKE 2017 SUMMER SEASON

The Town Beaches on Cedar Lake are scheduled to open for the 2017 season beginning June 15 through August 20 with scheduled hours from 10:30 am until 6:00 pm. Hours may vary according to staff availability, training, weather, or special programs. It is the policy of the Chester Park and Recreation Commission that access to the Town parks, including the beaches on Cedar Lake, is by permit only. Vehicles of residents parked at unstaffed parks must display a public access sticker, which is available at the Town Clerk's Office. Non-residents must display a park pass on their vehicles at unstaffed parks and show their pass and identification when entering a staffed facility. Non-resident passes are currently \$65 and valid through June 19 of 2016. They are available at Pelletier Park during operating hours and at the Parks and Recreation Office during the off-season. Chester residents may enter staffed facilities by showing a driver's license, or other proof of residency or taxpayer status with identification. Residents and pass holders may bring up to six people, but must accompany them. All other guests are \$3 each. Groups of 10 or more must make reservations in advance by submitting a completed group use application at the web page link of http://chesterct.org/ ?page_id=7810, a certificate of insurance to the Town, and pay a group fee.

Changes to Shoreline Bus Fares

9 Town Transit introduced a new fare structure in January on all public bus service in the region. The changes were necessary to help offset a decrease in funding from the Connecticut Dept. of Transportation and meet new federal rules. Cash fares increased to \$1.75 on bus routes and \$3.50 on the Dial-A-Ride services and off-route trips. This is offset by the introduction of a senior and disabled fare, which allows seniors 65 or over and people with disabilities to ride any bus route for \$.85, or \$31 for unlimited trips with a monthly pass. To qualify for the new senior and disabled fare, a Medicare card or a Connecticut reduced fare I.D. must be shown on boarding. I.D.'s can be obtained by visiting www.9towntransit.com. Seniors 60 and over residing in the region will still be able to obtain and utilize 9 Town Transit Senior Fare Cards as well.

Another new addition is the U Pass available to Middlesex Community College students. This pass allows students to purchase a monthly unlimited ride pass for only \$35. The pass can be used on any 9 Town Transit, CT Transit or Middletown Area Transit bus route. U Passes are sold only at the Middlesex Community College book store. 9 Town Transit provides four bus routes service the valley-shore region and Dial-A-Ride service to twelve towns. 





Age-Related Vision Loss

Age-Related Macular Degeneration (AMD) is the leading cause of severe vision loss in adults over the age of 50. This eye disease occurs when there are changes to the macula, a small portion of the retina that's located on the inside back layer of the eye. Commonly, older people develop macular degeneration as a natural part of the aging process. AMD causes loss of central vision and it can occur in two forms: wet and dry.

With macular degeneration, you may experience symptoms such as blurriness, dark areas or distortion of your central vision, or permanent loss of your central vision. It usually does not affect your peripheral vision. For example, with advanced macular degeneration you could be able to see the outline of a clock, yet you may not be able to see the hands of the clock to tell what time it is.

The majority of people with macular degeneration experience the dry form, which does not have a known treatment, but many people benefit from a vitamin regimen. Unfortunately, vision loss cannot be reversed. The less common wet form may respond to lasers and medical injections if caught and treated early. Smoking and high blood pressure are often associated with the wet form of macular degeneration.

If you have been diagnosed with dry macular degeneration, you should use a chart called an Amsler grid every day to monitor your vision. Dry macular degeneration can quickly change into the more damaging wet form. If you notice any change of vision, you should contact your ophthalmologist immediately.




