

First Selectman's Corner

This fourth quarter *Chester Events* report is an opportunity to reflect on the past year and express my appreciation to Chester's Town employees, the Chester Hose Company, and the 120 residents who generously give their time and expertise by their service on our boards and commissions. I also want to thank Selectmen Larry Sypher and Tom Englert for their good counsel and positive collaboration to keep Chester one of the best small towns in Connecticut.

Working together, Chester's boards and commissions have accomplished much in 2012. Here are some of the highlights:

- The fiscal year 2012-2013 budget, \$12,748,081, was unanimously adopted at Town Meeting on May 15th. The increase in spending was held to 1.5 percent, .34 of a mil. 70 percent of the budget is allocated to education, 27 percent to Town operations and 3 percent to fund capital projects such as road repairs and vehicle replacements.
- The Middlesex Avenue Denlar Drive water main project was completed in July. 1,800 feet was installed and three hydrants to serve the apartments and commercial properties. This infrastructure work was 100 percent funded by a grant from the Connecticut Department of Health.
- The Town of Chester and Essex Savings Bank signed a 10 year lease at \$67,599 per year plus 20 percent cost share for utilities for the 3,200 square feet the Bank will occupy

- in the Town office building.
- The Water Street bridge reconstruction project was completed on time by the Department of Transportation's contractor. The new sidewalks on Water Street safely connect the municipal parking lot with Main Street businesses.
- The Main Street Project Committee selected the firm of Kent and Frost as the design consultant to prepare the Town Center streetscape master plan, phase






one preliminary construction plans and cost estimate. The Committee will hold a series of public participation workshops early in 2013 prior to completing the project in March.

• The Library Board of Trustees completed the Design Feasibility Study for Expansion and Renovation to the 1906 Library building. The Board of Trustees will begin to hold community workshops to explain the needs for building improvements and cost estimates. The concept design proposed by the Board would double the building's size from 2,100 square feet to approximately

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A Note from the Public Works Foreman

It is not too early to think about WINTER and PLOWING...

- Please remember to move your vehicles off the streets during winter storms for efficient snow plowing.
- Please do not place your garbage receptacles into the street as the road crews will need to plow your street– keep receptacles at the inside end of your driveway otherwise the plow will have to go around and not be able to plow the snow completely from in front of your driveway. The trucks have long arms and can reach into your driveway.
- Sand and salt will be available at the Town Garage on Grote Road. Please, only one pail per household.

4,000 square feet.

- The Board of Selectmen endorsed a plan to replace the Community Center's lost space and functions by making renovations to the second floor of Town Hall. These renovations would increase the size of the meeting room to accommodate 65 persons and reallocate existing areas for increased Park and Recreation and food pantry storage. The cost for renovations will be funded by the insurance payment; project bids will be received in December with construction starting in February.
- The Clean Energy Committee's recommendations for reduced electrical usage at Chester Elementary School have been addressed by the installation of more efficient lighting. A savings of up to \$14,000 per year is projected; this savings is approximately 20 percent of the School's annual electrical bill. Another project for electrical cost reductions will be the installation of a 8,000 watt solar system, and this is expected to save \$1,500 per year and provides an educational benefit for students learning about clean energy alternatives. The Board of Finance approved funding \$8,000 for the Town share to match the \$32,000 Connecticut Energy Finance Investment Authority's Grant.
- During 2012 2.5 miles of road construction was completed.
 Cedar Lake Road, Straits Road, Maple Street and a short section of Hoop Pole Hill Road were paved. Also a new ambulance was purchased with funds set aside over the past five years in the Town's Capital Improvement Program.
- The Town's web site was modified to present a new look and organized for easier access to meeting notices, agendas and minutes. The new format provides users with calendar meeting dates for boards and commissioners as well as community events.

Do You Have Septic Tank Pump-Out Questions?

The Sanitation Office is updating its septic pump-out database program. Therefore, in an effort to reach all households, property owners are reminded to have their septic tanks pumped out and inspected a maximum of every 5 years and sooner if there is heavy usage. If you do not know when your pump-out was last done, stop in the Development office or call the Sanitarian or the First Selectman's office to help you.


The Town of Chester does have an ordinance that requires all septic tanks to be pumped out every 5 years as a safeguard for the entire septic system and to also benefit the property owner from potential costs with repairing a replacing the septic system. It is much more economical to pay a small expense for preventative maintenance than to have to pay substantial costs for a repair!

In addition to septic tank pump-outs residents are encouraged to conserve water, repair any leaking fixtures, spread out laundry times and days, etc.

A Busy Winter for the Historical Society

During the winter, while the Chester Museum at The Mill is closed, members and committees of the Chester Historical Society are studying how our ancestors traveled to and around Chester. We're preparing for our Museum's next exhibit, opening in May 2013, which will be named "Over the River and Through the Woods."

Five exhibit areas, each related to a different mode of transport – roads, ferry, train, trolley and steamboat – will show how the progress of transportation impacted our town. We will demonstrate how the evolving methods of transportation were key to the town's population, industry, and commerce.

In November 2012, we hosted a program by CT Valley Railroad Historian Max Miller about Chester's trains and train station. During the winter we're hosting a program on the trolley that came to Chester in 1916, presented by Bruce Edgerton. We're also hosting a concert by Leif Nilsson's Side Doors band on April 20 in the Meetinghouse. Maybe they'll sing "I've been working on the railroad"? More information will be on our website, chesterhistoricalsociety.org.

Library Renovation/Expansion Update. The first in a series of two community meetings on the possible renovation of the library is planned for Saturday morning, February 9 at the Meeting House. Everyone is encouraged to become part of this conversation.

The recently completed Library Renovation/Expansion Feasibility Study provides the answer to two frequently asked questions, "Can our library building be made accessible to all?" and "Is there any way we can make our library building bigger?" The answer to both is, "Yes!"

The feasibility study, which was funded by a \$20,000 grant from Connecticut's State Historic Preservation Office, was wrapped up in late summer and the results presented to the Library Trustees and the Selectmen this fall. The scope of the study, which looked at only the existing library building and property, was determined by a 2009 Community Needs Assessment from which it was learned that there was strong community interest in preserving, but expanding and updating the current building.

Working under the guidance of the Chester Library Building Expansion Committee, which was appointed by the Selectmen in January 2011, Ken Best of DRA (Drummey, Rosane, Anderson, Inc.) brought in experts to assess the existing building (including mechanicals, air handling, and hazardous materials), available land and suitability of soils for septic installation. Mr. Best then developed preliminary conceptual designs for an expanded, fully accessible library. These were reviewed, discussed and modified in meetings with library staff and the Building Expansion Committee and eventually narrowed to one possible approach.

The concept:

- provides for a handicapped accessible entrance on the parking lot side of the building
- maintains the historic entrance and façade
- adds an elevator and accessible restrooms
- creates a reading area by the old fireplace
- adds new children's and teen spaces
- includes space for tutoring and quiet study, as well as work space for the staff
- features flexible programming/meeting space that can be used by the community when the library is not open.

Current collection size will be maintained, housed comfortably and accessible to all patrons. In all, the new plan would approximately double the size of the existing library. As part of his charge, Mr. Best was asked to develop a cost estimate for this conceptual plan, which came in at approximately \$3 million.

Mr. Best, a CT-certified Historic Architect, and DRA were selected from a group of 17 firms who submitted proposals for the feasibility study. Both DRA and Mr. Best have extensive library planning experience and their work in the area includes the Essex, Old Lyme and Westbrook Libraries.

Meanwhile, drop by the library to look at the conceptual plans and add your thoughts to the conversation.

Mark Johnston Book Discussion Series. The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn by Mark Twain and The Souls of Black Folk by W.E.B. DuBois will be under discussion this April when Charlotte Rea returns to lead the series. Dates for the discussions are Wednesdays, April 10, 17 and 24 from 7:30-9:00 pm. Books on paper and on CD will be available at the library. EBook versions of both titles can be downloaded from Overdrive. Please call the library to register, or visit the library website to register online.

Library Hours. Your librarians are available to assist you on Mondays, 10 am - 8 pm; Tuesdays, 2-6 pm; Wednesdays, 10 am - 6 pm; Thursdays, 2-8 pm; Fridays, 10 am - 6 pm and Saturdays 10 am - 2 pm. The library will be closed in observance of Martin Luther King Day on Monday, January 21, 2013, of Presidents Day on Monday, February 18, 2013 and of Good Friday on March 29, 2013. 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Complete Care for Lung Cancer Patients

According to the national Centers for Disease Control (CDC), more than 350,000 people in the United States have been diagnosed with lung cancer. Although lung cancer is very serious, if it is detected in its earliest stages and appropriate treatment is provided, a cure is possible.

The Middlesex Hospital Total Lung Care Center offers a coordinated approach to providing everything patients with lung cancer need - including the one-to-one services of a specially trained nurse navigator, Gean Brown, R.N., O.C.N., increased surveillance improved screening, and appropriate treatment options, including surgery, chemotherapy and radiation therapy.

Surveillance. When Brown first arrived at the Cancer Center in 2009, she realized there wasn't a coordinated system to help patients suspected of having lung cancer "navigate" the steps from diagnosis through treatment, and on to potential recovery. Since then, Brown and a number of physicians have worked hard to change that. The first step in developing the Center was to begin a quality assurance program to ensure that any abnormal lung testing done through the Radiology Department would automatically be sent to her. Brown takes the results and informs the patient's primary care physician if the finding looks serious, and then recommends a consultation with a pulmonary physician or thoracic surgeon to review the findings further. The clinicians then refer to what is called the "Fleishner Society" guidelines to assess the lung nodules. The Fleishner Society

comprises a group of thoracic surgeons who developed standard guidelines to follow for appropriate actions to take based on the differences in lung tumors, i.e., size, whether or not the person is a smoker, has a history of lung disease, etc.

Screening. The Total Lung Care Center offers screening for lung cancer using low-dose CT scanning. Studies have shown that these low-dose CT scans have the potential to catch lung cancer in its early stages, which means that it is more likely to be cured (Stage 1 or 2). The test takes ten minutes and there is no preparation needed. In addition, Hospital pulmonologists utilize an endobronchial ultrasound (EBUS) machine, which employs sound waves to detect cancerous tumors in the lungs.

Treatment Options. Thoracic surgeons work in concert with other Middlesex Hospital surgeons to treat lung cancer, using minimally invasive techniques.

The Total Lung Care Center is a coordinated and comprehensive one, which includes radiologists, oncologists, pulmonologists, surgeons, radiation oncologists and Brown, the Lung Nurse Navigator. The cost for the low-dose CT scan is \$250 and is not covered by insurance. A physician order is required for the scan. If you do not have a physician, Brown can assist you in getting a referral. She can be reached at (860) 358-2066. Middlesex Hospital also offers a smoking cessation program that provides information and counseling to motivate smokers to quit tobacco use. Call (860) 358-3003 for more information.

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Reminders From the Tax Collector for the January Tax Payment

First: I hope everyone is enjoying the holiday season. But right after the holiday season comes the January tax payment for real estate, personal property and any new MV's purchased during the year! Be sure to remember to verify your tax payment before writing your check. Do NOT include the MV amount that was due in July, if you have already paid it in July. MV bills are just once a year, unless you have bought a MV after October 1st. If you are not sure of the amount due, please call our office at 860 526-0013 x 513, and we will try to check the amount for you. And of course, when you do write the check, be sure to sign your check before mailing it to us, to prevent any delay in getting your bills paid!

Second: This winter will be our first time implementing a bounced check fee, since we have gotten quite a few returned checks recently and the bank is now charging the tax office for that bounced check. So be sure to double check your bank balance, before you pay your taxes, so that your check does not bounce, which will then incur a \$15 fee from our office, beside the fee that your own bank might charge you, and your bill could then incur more interest because another month might pass during the time when you wrote the check originally and when you replace the check. So a word to the wise,

double check your bank balance first before paying your taxes or any other bill.

Third: Wo do NOT mail out another bill for Japuary so it.

Third: We do NOT mail out another bill for January, so it is the taxpayer's responsibility to remember that their second half real estate and personal property taxes are due during the month of January. After reading this, PLACE A REMINDER ON YOUR CALENDAR, so you will not be late. Also, try not to wait until the last week or last day, so if bad weather arrives, you won't have to panic or worry about paying on time. Remember, the rule that tax offices must abide by is "LATE IS LATE"....no matter what the weather or emergency or reason in your life might be!

Fourth: For those who use the online payment system with your own bank, where you set the Tax Collector as a company that must be paid, be sure to put all pertinent information on the account, so that when the check arrives from the bank, it tells us accurately and easily which account is being paid. An old MV bill number does NOT help us post the account quickly or efficiently. What would help would be the full name of the person whose bill is being paid and the plate number of the vehicle, which usually stays the same for a long time. In the case of a real estate bill or personal property bill, the full address is a great item for the check to contain. Since the bank does NOT include any portion of the bill that normally comes to us, we really need something definite to know where to apply the money, especially if there is more than one person with your last name living in town. If you are paying for someone with a different last name, be sure to include the name of that person, whose bill you are paying, on the account set up for the online payment. You might know who you are paying for, but we don't have any idea, unless their name or pertinent information appears somewhere on the bank check.

Keep in mind that online payments through your bank could take SEVERAL DAYS to get to us. Give yourself plenty of time so that the payment does not arrive late and cause another mailing with interest added. Do not wait...process early or mail early! Thanks!

Lastly, be sure to remember to pay your taxes in JANUARY, or before, and have a very Healthy and Happy New Year.

The group is now starting to focus on energy savings for residents and businesses by:

- Encouraging residents to switch the "supplier services" portion of their electrical bills to a lower cost supplier and /or a "green supplier" (CtEnergyInfo.com). This will either reduce your costs or allow you to buy from a supplier using alternative clean energy sources, while continuing to get delivery and billing from CL&P.
- Persuading residents (home, condo or apartment) to sign up for energy checkups through the Home Energy Solutions (HES) program. For a minimal fee (ranging from \$75 to zero for income qualifiers), property owners can make a guaranteed dent in their energy costs.
- Businesses can also participate in these energy surveys through the DEEP's Small Business Advantage Program. A new PACE program is currently being rolled out to provide low cost, long term financing for big and small energy saving business projects. Go to the DEEP web site for specifics.

Most importantly, the Energy Group continues to monitor and digest all the existing and new State and Federal programs to make sure that Chester is maximizing our participation. There are private and State sponsored programs being developed right now to provide solar electricity and solar hot water for homes and businesses at significantly reduced costs by grouping the projects in an area with a single approved supplier. These and all future programs will continue to be "localized" and communicated to Chester residents and businesses through mailings and the Town
