Get out, see Clinton, and hit the Farmers Market on Thursdays before going to the concert. Come to a show during Clinton Family Theater week or during





Hospital Opens New Urgent Care Center

Middlesex Hospital opened a new urgent care walk-in medical center on June 1 at 1687 Boston Post Road in Old Saybrook (at the intersection of Spencer Plains Road). The center provides patients with a lower-cost alternative for non-emergency medical care. The Hospital has two other urgent care centers, one in Madison and another in Middletown.

More and more people are seeking lower-cost, more convenient options for their health care needs. As a result, urgent care centers have begun to spring up in many communities to address this consumer preference.

The Middlesex Hospital Center is unique from other such centers, because of the electronic patient medical records system that ties together all hospital medical records, as well as medical records from all Middlesex primary care physcians. This gives the providers at the urgent care center access to a patient's medical history, as well as allowing for results of the urgent care visit to be reviewed by the patient's primary care provider.

The new urgent care center treats non-emergency health problems, including colds, coughs, earaches, moderate fevers, minor cuts, bruises, severe sprains and more. Patients should seek immediate emergency care for things such as head injuries, broken bones, uncontrolled bleeding, chest pains and any signs of a stroke. The urgent care center is staffed with physician assistants and advanced practice registered nurses, and also has x-ray capabilities.

June is the month to license your dog(s). We will need the RABIES CERTIFICATE and doctor's notice of SPAY/NEUTER if applicable. The fee is \$8.00 if the dog is altered and \$19.00 if not.

Beginning July 1st, a late fee of \$1.00 per dog, per month will be charged. Please call 860-669-9101 if you have any questions.

November 3, 2015 Elections

If you plan to be away at that time, you can apply for an absentee ballot beginning in August at the Town Clerk's office or by downloading the application from the Secretary of the State website, www.sots.gov. Click on Elections & Voting. Send application to Town Clerk, 54 E. Main St., Clinton, CT 06413. If you should have any questions call the Town Clerk's office or email townclerk@clintonct.org. Absentee Ballots will become available October 2, 2015.

Permanent Absentee Ballot For Disabled

Public Act #11-173: A disabled elector can file an Absentee Ballot Application together with a doctor's certificate stating that they have a permanent disability and are unable to appear in person at their polling place to obtain Permanent Absentee Ballot status. The law does not prescribe an official form to be used so a note from the elector's doctor, presumably on letterhead, indicating the disability would satisfy this requirement. Once the Application and doctor's certificate are received by the Town Clerk a copy will be provided to the Registrars of Voters to record on the Voter Registration Systems. Absentee Ballots will then be automatically mailed to the elector from the Town Clerk's office for eligible elections that allow for an Absentee Ballot to be mailed.

The Registrars of Voters will send an annual written notice in January of each year to determine if the elector continues to reside at the address on their Permanent Absentee Ballot Application. If there is no response from the elector, the elector will be removed from the status.

Are Your Contractors EPA Lead Safe Certified?

This is a question you want to get answered when you hire a home improvement contractor to do work in your home. Why? In April of 2010, the US Environmental Protection Agency passed a law referred to as the RRP (Renovation, Repair and Painting) Rule that requires ALL contractors who you pay to work on any home, apartment, day care facility or school built before the year 1978 and who will be disturbing paint, must be certified in lead safe practices. This law became effective in April 2010! Many people and even contractors still do not know about this law.

The EPA rule is to protect residents and workers from lead poisoning. Homes and other structures built prior to 1978 are likely to have some painted surfaces with lead based paint. Contractors who don't follow lead safe practices may cause lead to be released into your home environment, leaving behind a serious problem for you and your family. This leaves you with a contamination issue, and exposes you and your loved ones to unnecessary lead dust and chips. It also exposes the renovation workers to preventable levels of lead dust.



Under this rule:

Contractors must obtain an EPA certificate which is proof that the contractor has taken a course in lead safe renovation practices. Certificates must be renewed every 5 years. To obtain a certificate, a contractor must attend an 8 hour course, approved by the EPA.

Not all workers within the company have to be lead certified, but someone within the company in a position of responsibility must be certified and must ensure safe lead practices are being used. Your contractor must give you a pamphlet titled, "Renovate Right" lead safe guide, which describes the rule, lead and its health effects, and things to know before, during and after renovation.

ANY work, including remodeling, repair, maintenance, electrical and plumbing, carpentry, etc., that disturbs more than 6 square feet of interior space, or more than 20 square feet of exterior space falls under this rule.

Testing for lead paint is not necessary for this rule to apply, just the fact that the dwelling was built before 1978 puts this rule into effect.

Exclusions to this rule include: housing built after 1977; certified lead free housing; lead abatement projects; full demolitions; housing for the elderly or disabled, unless a child under 6 years old resides there; minor repair or maintenance; emergency renovations.

The CT Department of Public Health, in its pamphlet about this rule lists 5 reasons you should hire a lead safe contractor:

You'll protect your children's health

You'll protect your own health

You'll maintain the safety of your home

A contractor who made the effort to become certified, shows professional responsibility

It's the Law! Fines for non-compliance may reach \$37,500.00 for each offense!

Be a smart consumer of home renovation services and insist on ensuring your contractor is lead certified!

Understanding Asthma Inhalers

Did you know that only seven percent of people understand how to use asthma inhalers the right way? Combine that with a wide array of asthma medications, and asthma management can become more than a little confusing. Together, we can change that! Everybody is different. So your doctor decides which type of medication and inhaler is best for you. But here's a brief overview of what you need to know.

Types of inhaled medications. Inhaled medications help airways stay open without some of the side effects of those taken by mouth or injection. These medications work in different ways. For example, some reduce airway inflammation, while others relax small muscles around airways.

One class of inhaled asthma medication provides quick relief from symptoms such as tightness and gasping. Often used daily, even without symptoms, the other class is for long-term control. If you often use quick-relief "rescue" medications more than twice a week, you may need a change in your treatment.

Types of asthma inhalers. Asthma inhalers are hand-held devices that deliver medication directly into your lungs. People use inhalers either to prevent or stop an asthma attack.

A metered dose inhaler has a boot-shaped mouthpiece and a pressurized canister containing medication. Typically, you release the medicine by pushing the canister into the boot. Some of these

inhalers contain counters that tell you how many doses remain. If not, track the number of doses you've used.

Some metered dose inhalers contain a spacer. This temporarily holds medication until it's released, which makes it easier to receive a full dose with a slow breath. Some spacers are built in. Others attach separately to the inhaler. Infants or children may require a facemask to ensure the right dose reaches their lungs. Dry powder inhalers release medication when you breathe a deep, fast breath.

Using air or oxygen under pressure, nebulizers deliver a fine liquid mist of medication through a tube or mask.

Misuse of inhalers. Different inhalers require different techniques. For example, some require coordinating your breath with the medication release. Others require a fast, deep breath. Some require shaking and priming. Others require the dexterity to use a cocking device.

If you don't use inhalers or spacers the right way, you might get too little or too much medicine. A recent study showed that 63 percent of those who misused inhalers or spacers missed three or more steps. The most common mistake with metered dose inhalers? Not exhaling before depressing the canister to inhale the medication.

The study found that people's memories fade, so they forget what to do. What this means is you may need a "refresher course" from time to time.

Be sure to ask your doctor or me if you have any questions about inhaler techniques. As this study shows, most people are unclear on how to use inhalers, so don't feel embarrassed about asking questions. We are always here to help... even with that refresher course.





Amniotic Tissue for the Eye




