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First Selectman's Corner

Thank you for the vote of support in the management of our town with my third term as your First Selectman. I can say with enthusiasm that the time in office is truly a gift which I plan to use wisely. We have navigated thru some of the worst economic times and weather disasters in decades with the help of countless volunteers and talented employees. Our goals and actions always answer the question "Is it in the best interest of our town?" My decisions have to answer the guestion "Is it fair?" A focus I want to emphasize with many of our boards and commissions will be to prepare our town to be in the best condition to control our own destiny. This has been proven over and over by the great results of our emergency management and emergency service departments every time we have a storm or 9-1-1 call. Due to the preparation and skills of our citizens we have fared better than most other towns.

Our financial controls have set our finances in great shape with improved bond ratings for lower borrowing costs and great reserves so that we have options to borrow from ourselves to complete many of the capital projects on the drawing board. Thank goodness our town stands on firm financial ground because our coming decisions will be clouded by the uncertainty of the state, federal and international economies. After a meeting I recently attended with Governor Malloy and our State Representatives, I can assure you that we will be squeezed with no increases in state or federal aid, continued reduced revenues and an increase in the cost of living. It will not just be in Connecticut; all 50 states will feel the pinch of declining federal support for state programs. Massachusetts just legalized casino gambling further cutting into the state funds that flow back to our community.

So how do we protect ourselves in this new norm? Our Economic Development Commission will use the new jobs bill to help advise companies with less than 50 employees on new financial assistance thru loans, grants and job creation incentives. Our Agricultural Commission will pursue aid from the jobs bill to get grants to convert some of our best land back into agriculture. We just approved at our town meeting the creation of a Council of Government of the Lower River Valley with 17 neighboring towns. This will give us increased leverage on seeking Federal and State funding as well as a continuation of sharing the costs of our services with neighboring towns.

Needs and wants will continue to be an important measurement when making decisions this year. To help you become an informed decision- maker please visit our town web site www.easthaddam.org. We now display our monthly financial reports and we achieved a very clean audit for last fiscal year.

We just had a great send off party for three young men about to serve our armed forces: our son Drew Walter - Army National Guard, Luke Newton - Navy and Eric Cooley -Marines. Two men who have recently left to serve our armed forces are Dylan Carter and Paul Huot. This is a great reminder of how grateful I have always been to all those that have served our country.


We recently won a grant to build a floating dock at the town easement on the Connecticut River next to the Goodspeed Airport runway. This will give boaters the chance to dock

From the Assessor

The October 1, 2011 Grand List of all real and personal property is anticipated to be certified on January 31, 2012. Assessment notices will be mailed for all personal property and only real estate which had increases due to improvements on the property. Any persons who wish to appeal their assessment may appeal to the Board of Assessment Appeals in March, 2012. Requests to the Board are due by February 20, 2012. Written requests should include the property owner's name, name and address of the person appealing the assessment, type of property being appealed (real estate or personal property), reason for the appeal, and opinion of value. Although any written request is accepted, forms are available at the East Haddam web site: www.easthaddam. org. The mailing address for the Board of Assessment Appeals is P.O. Box K, East Haddam, CT 06423.

The Assessor's Office will begin taking applications for the Homeowners Credit Program and Additional Veterans Benefits on February 1, 2012. To qualify, total income must not exceed \$32,300 for a single person, and \$39,500 for a couple (joint income), including Social Security and Medicare. The deadline for applications is May 15, 2012. Applications for the Homeowners' Local Option Program will be accepted from February 1, 2012 until May 15, 2012. The age and proof of income requirements are the same as for the state programs but the income limit is \$50,000 per household.

Disabled veterans must submit proof of disability by March 31, 2012 to receive exemption benefits. Qualifying income for Additional Veterans Benefits is the same as the Elderly and Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program. Applications for the Additional Veterans Benefits will be accepted until October 1, 2012.

Any person or entity starting a new business in town should notify the Assessor's Office so that we can send a personal property declaration in the fall. Personal property assessments are based on the declarant's filing. These assessments can be appealed to the Board of Assessment Appeals in March, 2012. Please note that recent legislation has raised the assessment limit for appealing to the Board from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. Assessment appeals over \$1,000,000 will be tried in the Superior Court.

Sand for Winter Ice

Residents of East Haddam are reminded that they may take only a small amount of sand from one of the municipal sand piles for their personal use in sanding steps, walkways, or ice patches in driveways. Piles are located at the corner of Haywardville and Early Roads, and at the Town Garage, off Mt. Parnassus Road near Shagbark. For safety reasons, residents should not obtain sand during storm conditions when operators are loading trucks and entering and leaving the site.

It is understood that sand is provided for private, personal use and is not to be used commercially or for profit, or for any application other than as a safety precaution. Residents needing more than a few buckets of sand per winter should purchase their own supply.

It's Coming Back! (snow, that is)

We hear frequent complaints about the dangerous road conditions that result when people push driveway snow out into our public roads. We actually have an ordinance prohibiting this practice, which states, "No person shall plow, throw, put or cause to be thrown or put any snow or ice from any private property or from any area in the rear of said private property or in area between a private dwelling house or structure and the legally laid out sidewalk into any public highway in the town of East Haddam." Please keep this in mind this winter. Your neighbors will appreciate it.

Award for Lifesaving



East Haddam Corporal Karl Karabeinikoff

At a ceremony held on November 17, 2011 at the Connecticut State Police Academy the following award for lifesaving was awarded to Corporal Karl Karabeinikoff:

On January 24, 2011, at approximately 12:04 p.m., Troop K received notice of an unresponsive male locked inside a vehicle at a residence in East Haddam. Temperatures were well below zero and it had snowed overnight.

East Haddam Corporal Karl Karabeinikoff and Trooper First Class David Southworth responded and found an unconscious male in the driver's seat and locked inside the snow-covered vehicle. Entry to the vehicle was gained by breaking out the right rear passenger side window and unlocking the doors. Large amounts of snow had to be cleared away from the vehicle before the driver's door could be opened.

Trooper Southworth found the victim to be cold to the touch, without a pulse, breathing shallowly and barely able to open his eyes. Corporal Karabeinikoff began administering oxygen to the victim. Trooper Southworth and Corporal Karabeinikoff kept the victim alert until medical services arrived. The victim was transported to a medical facility where it was learned that he was suffering from hypothermia and carbon monoxide poisoning.

Thanks to the intervention and quick response, the male victim was saved and made a full recovery. The actions of East Haddam Corporal Karl Karabeinikoff are in the highest tradition of the Connecticut State Police.

Why all the fuss about children from birth to age 5?



Every year about 80 or 90 children enroll in our public kindergarten program at East Haddam Elementary School. These boys and girls enter the front doors with more than just new backpacks and crayons. Each child also enters with different strengths, weaknesses, skills and

needs. Some of this diversity is due to the normal differences in development, however, much of it depends on the experiences the child has had in the first five years of life. Current science has shown that these early life experiences actually influence brain development by establishing neural connections. These connections provide the foundation for language, reasoning, problem solving, social skills, behavior, and emotional health. Research shows that children who enter kindergarten "ready" are more likely to become economically productive and engaged citizens and those who do not are likely to continue struggling even into their later years. We can't wait. Success in school and later life begins before a child even enters a kindergarten classroom. 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Being Prepared for a Medical Emergency

From the East Haddam Ambulance Association

Any person, regardless of age, can experience medical emergencies. They can also occur at any time - often when you least expect it. The East Haddam ambulance crew, made up almost entirely of community volunteers, is ready 24/7 to respond to any such emergencies. They can provide temporary medical assistance and transportation to the nearest available hospital. But to be most effective, they need some advance preparation from you.

First, it is critical that the street number on your house be clearly visible. Go outside and check to see if your current house number is:

- · Large enough to be seen easily from the road
- Positioned so that it can be seen regardless of what direction your house is approached
- Posted by all entrances, particularly if there are entrances on different streets (for example, if your house is on a corner lot)
- Close enough to the road that it can be illuminated by headlights
- · Reflective or otherwise easily visible
- If your street number fails any of the above conditions,

Many members of the ambulance crew can recount stories of stumbling in the dark, sometimes in deep snow, knocking on doors at 3 in the morning trying to find a particular house. This kind of situation is what you want to avoid.

Second, make sure you have a list of current medications in an easy-to-find location in your house. Some people keep such lists posted on their refrigerators. Remember that in an emergency, the person who has this information could be unconscious or otherwise unable to provide this critical data to the emergency personnel. So make sure the information is written down and readily available.

If you fulfill these two simple conditions, it could make a difference between life and death.

But what better time to contemplate growing vegetables in our own gardens! If you've never had the joy of planting your own delicious veggies, now is the time to begin. It is amazing what rewards a few seeds or plants from your local garden store will provide.

To begin, make the decision to create a plot. Start small, with a few easy growing vegetables of your choice. Order seed catalogs from reputable seed companies and get a soil sample test kit from the Middlesex Cooperative Extension office. The easy-to-do soil test will tell you the condition of your soil and instruct you regarding soil needs for a great garden. 

Registrar of Voters News

On November 8, 2011, 2,548 voters of our 5,651 active registered voters, or 45%, voted in our Municipal election. The results in detail are posted on our East Haddam website.

At this time, our next scheduled vote, will be on Tuesday, April 24, 2012 at the Nathan Hale-Ray High School for the Presidential Primary. (There will be another primary vote on August 14, 2012 for state federal positions).

Please be aware of the following calendar if you wish to vote in the Presidential Primary: If you are switching parties for the purpose of voting in a primary you must do so 3 months prior to the primary, or by January 24, 2012.

New voters, or current unaffiliated voters, may register up to noon of the day before the primary, or Monday, April 23, 2012. (Please note that a designation of Independent on your voter card, does not mean you are unaffiliated, an Independent is a registered minor party affiliation.)

Also, if you will be 18 years of age, by November 6, 2012, you may preregister in a political party, and vote in the presidential and federal office primaries of the party in which you registered.

It is important to check the East Haddam website regularly for Town meetings, and Referenda dates and times, as they become scheduled.

Storm Preparation Tips

As we have learned over the past few months, there is a need to be prepared for all kinds of weather emergencies from tropical to winter storms. While the dangers from these storms vary based on time of year there are things we should be doing to prepare ourselves for a storm anytime of the year.

Develop a Family Emergency Plan - Your family may not be together when a storm occurs, so you need to develop an emergency plan for your family in advance. Discuss how your family will contact one another or where you will meet in different situations. It may be easiest to designate a friend or relative that lives out of the area for each family member to contact in the event of an emergency. This person can then help communicate among separated family members. Be sure each person knows the phone number of the emergency contact.

Create an Emergency Kit - Be sure you have a simple storm emergency kit easily accessible when you are preparing to shelter from a storm. Residents should store enough supplies and be prepared to shelter in place for 72 hours. Consider storing some of these items in advance in a plastic tote or similar sealed container:

Flashlight with extra batteries Candles & matches/lighter Bottled water (one gallon per person per day) First-aid kit Spare cell phone charger Battery-powered or hand crank radio / TV with extra batteries Necessary prescriptions / medications Canned, ready-to-eat meats, fruits/vegetables; energy bars (3 day supply per person) Non-electric Can opener Paper and pencil/pen Important paperwork / Documentation (medical information, ID, etc) Cash and change Paper and sanitation products including toilet paper and plastic bags with ties Soap and disinfectant

Blankets or sleeping bags for each person Special-needs items, such as diapers, formula, contact lens supplies, glasses, etc.

Food, water, medications, leash and carrier for pets

Stay informed of Approaching Storms - In our world of technology, the National Weather Service and our local media are able to provide us with adequate warning in most cases of an approaching weather situation. It is our responsibility to continue to monitor the media and heed the watches and warnings as they are issued. Additionally, residents should enroll in the East Haddam Alerts system to receive local alerts and information before and during weather emergencies. By enrolling in the system you can receive messages to your cell phone, email or any other phone numbers you choose. Residents can sign up for the East Haddam Alerts system by visiting the main page of the Town of East Haddam Website at www.easthaddam.org and clicking on the enrollment link.

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Temporary Family Assistance (TFA)

Temporary Family Assistance is the name for the cash assistance program for basic and special needs which are paid to recipients of Jobs First. This replaced what was known as the AFDC program.

Previous welfare programs provided little incentive to find employment as most earnings (after some small disregards) were deducted from the cash benefit. Recipients were not allowed to have or accumulate any savings to plan for future emergencies. Jobs First was designed to reward work by providing incentives to self-support. The program is intended to be transitional assistance and to supply individuals with the tools they need to become self-supporting within twentyone months.

Under Jobs First, recipients who get a job are allowed to keep all earnings up to the Federal Poverty Level as well as their cash assistance for the remainder of the 21 months. They are also eligible to receive medical assistance, child care and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (Formally Food Stamp Program). Child support payments from an absent parent are sent directly to recipients and all but \$50 is counted as income to calculate the amount of their public assistance grant.

To provide for future emergencies, recipients are allowed to have up to \$3000 in a bank account. All life insurance policies and pension plans are excluded, and bonds are excluded as long as the combined face value of all bonds owned by the assistance unit are less than \$1,000.

Understanding the need to have reliable transportation for work, one non-luxury car, with an equity value up to \$9500, is excluded from consideration in determining eligibility for assistance.

Other program simplifications have been instituted to allow workers to concentrate their efforts on helping recipients to become employed and eventually self-supporting.

Winter Heating Safety Tips

Staying Warm in an Unheated House


During severe winter storms, your home heating system could be inoperative for as long as several days. To minimize discomfort and possible health problems during this time, conserve body heat by dressing warmly; find or improvise an alternative heat source, such as a fireplace or electric space heater; confine heating to a single room; and keep safety a foremost consideration. While chances of freezing to death in your home are small, there's a greater danger of death by fire, lack of oxygen or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Think "Safety First"

Safety is critical in a heating emergency. Follow these precautions:

 \cdot Do not burn anything larger than candles inside your home without providing good ventilation to the outside.

• Any type of heater (except electric) should be vented. Connect the stove pipe to a chimney flue if at all possible. (Many older homes have capped pipe thimbles in rooms once heated by stoves.) Or hook up your stove to the flue entrance of the non-functioning furnace pipe. If no other alternative exists consider extending a stove pipe through a window. Replace the window glass with a metal sheet and run the temporary stove pipe through the metal.



• If you chose a catalytic or unvented heater, cross-ventilate: open a window an inch on each side of the room. It is better to let in some cold air than to run the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

• Do not use a gas or electric oven or surface units for heating. A gas oven may go out or not burn well, leading to carbon monoxide poisoning. An electric oven is not designed for space heating.

 \cdot Do not burn outdoor barbecue materials such as charcoal briquettes inside - even in a fireplace.

• Do not try to use bottled gas in natural gas appliances unless you have converted the appliances for such use. Also, flues and piping made for gas-burning appliances may be unsafe for use with higher-temperature oil, coal or wood smoke.

• Have one person watch for fire whenever an alternative heat source is used. One person should also stay awake to watch for fire and make sure ventilation is OK. If you feel drowsy or have a headache, it may be a sign of poor ventilation.

• All homes should have battery-operated smoke and CO (carbon monoxide) detectors with alarms installed. Check batteries regularly.

• Keep firefighting materials on-hand. These include: dry powder fire extinguishers, a tarp or heavy blanket, sand, salt, baking soda, and water.

Conserve Body Heat

Put on extra clothing. If cold is severe, your bed may be the warmest place. Use extra blankets and coverings to trap body heat; this is an especially good way to keep children warm. Farm families might consider taking refuge in a warm livestock barn.

Find or Improvise an Alternative Heat Source

You may have alternative heating resources around your home. Possibilities include:

- · fireplace, space heater, catalytic camp stove
- wood, gas or oil heater
- · gas-fired hot water heater

Make sure you have a backup plan if you can't find a safe way to stay warm. Staying with relatives or going to a designated shelter might be an option.

Provide Fuel

Some common materials that could be used for fuel in an emergency include:

- · firewood, newspapers, magazines
- kerosene
- woodchips, straw, corncobs

You can burn coal in a fireplace or stove if you make a grate to hold it, and allow air to circulate underneath. "Hard-ware cloth" screening placed on a standard wood grate will keep coal from falling through.

Tightly rolled newspapers and magazines can be used as paper "logs." Stack them as you would firewood to allow for air circulation. If the heating situation becomes critical, consider burning wood, including lumber and furniture.

Select a Room to be Heated

Close off all rooms except the one to be heated. When choosing a room, consider the following:

 \cdot If you're using a vented stove or space heater, select a room with a stove or chimney flue.

 \cdot Confine emergency heat to a small area.

• Choose a room on the "warm" side of the house, away from prevailing winds. Avoid rooms with large windows or uninsulated walls. Interior bathrooms probably have the lowest air leakage and heat loss. Your basement may be a warm place in cold weather because the earth acts as insulation and cuts heat loss.

· Isolate the room from the rest of the house by keeping doors closed, hanging bedding or heavy drapes over doorways, or putting up temporary partitions of cardboard or plywood.



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
