

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
First Selectman's Corner

East Haddam is alive with activity!

We continue to work cooperatively with one another and our neighbors to adapt to the realities of the current economic situation. The following is a list of amazing accomplishments by the Town and Board of Education employees, our boards and commissions and volunteers!

- Shared Services: In order to identify and implement cost savings, and ensure the best use of our resources we have initiated a town-wide plan to allow the Town of East Haddam and the Board of Education to share technology, building maintenance, purchasing and operations. With the help of our auditors Blum, Shapiro we are working on a comprehensive analysis of all areas where we can save money and provide better services to the taxpayer.
- Public Safety: We have significantly improved public safety at no additional cost to taxpayers by a fundamental reorganization of police services. The Town has hired its first two full-time officers who, with the Resident State Trooper and our four part-time officers, will be able to significantly expand patrol and police services.
- Town Library System: In order to expand services, realize operating efficiencies, and provide a stable benefit structure for the employees, the Rathbun Library and the East Haddam Free Public have embarked upon an ambitious plan to merge the two


organizations into a unified town library system. While maintaining two physical locations, they are already sharing a professional library director. This new structure will allow for the long term financial viability of the libraries, and insure the proper maintenance of the historic buildings in which they reside.





Connecticut River Valley Council of Governments (RiverCOG) the Town of East Haddam, along with 16 other towns (Chester, Clinton, Cromwell, Deep River, Durham, East Hampton, Essex, Haddam, Killingworth, Lyme, Middlefield, Middletown, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, Portland and Westbrook). The formation of the RiverCOG also included the merger of two regional planning agencies (Midstate Regional Planning Agency and Connecticut River Estuary Metropolitan Planning Organization); a merger that is believed to be one of if not the first in the United States.

• Animal Control: In an effort to share costs and improve the professional operations of our Animal Control services we have created a regional animal control facility. East Hampton is utilizing our facility for an annual fee. We are negotiating to open up to other towns in the near future with a goal of continuing to improve the services offered to our residents while reducing the cost to East Haddam's taxpayers.

We continue to seek out grants for infrastructure improvements as well as economic opportunities. These grants are a critical boost to our community and not funded thru local taxes. The Town has been awarded the following grants:

- State of Connecticut Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) grants: The Town currently is recipient of three STEAP grants totaling \$730,678 as follows:
- \$99,478 to rehabilitate, repair and improve the operations of the sewer treatment plant.
- \$200,000 for improvements to the Town and Grange Halls including historical restorations, lighting, paving, window replacement and improved handicapped access.
- \$431,200 to develop an agricultural business incubator and community farm (Center for Community Agriculture) for area residents located at the old Harris farm off of Mt. Parnassus.

- State of Connecticut, Department of Agriculture Farmland Restoration Grant in the amount of \$20,000 for the purpose of installing fencing around the cultivated parcels.
- Consumers Union of United States (dba Consumer Reports) gift in the amount of \$16,000 for the Center for Community Agriculture for a timber-framed garden shed and a gift in the amount of \$9,000 for batting cages for the boys baseball and girls softball teams.
- State of Connecticut, Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, BOR-Boating Division Grant in the amount of \$45,000 to design and install floating docks for transient dockage for transient boaters on the Connecticut River.
- Federal Emergency Management Administration: The Town is in the process of applying for grant funds for Storm Sandy and the February 2013 blizzard to help offset the costs incurred for these weather events.

The Financial Needs Roundtable Committee has completed its' review of the Town's short and long-term capital needs. Key recommendations were conversion of the old middle school to municipal offices, creation of an emergency operations center, evaluation of company one and company two firehouses and renovations to the elementary school. The Town has contracted with O & G Industries to provide preliminary feasibility, program-

ming, conceptual planning, referendum, support and site design. These professionals will help our committee's evaluate the true costs and pull these complicated options together. Informational public hearings will be scheduled once they have completed their analysis.

The budget is complete with under a 1% increase in expenses thanks to the dedicated work of all our employees, boards, commissions; especially the Boards of Education and Finance and our joint Finance Director Cindy Varricchio. The town budget public hearing will be held Tuesday, April 23rd at 7 pm at Town Hall.

We also completed our state mandated Grand List revaluation. Our Grand List has dropped by an average of 15% from the previous year. This will require the mill rate to adjust up

to generate the same tax revenue as last year. Finally we continue to find creative ways to make your town records available to you on-line. This effort will save you the effort and time of coming to the town office to review your public records. We are launching a new link to your building office records, land use records and assessor property cards. You can also now sign up for Parks and Recreation activities and pay for them on-line. The Town Clerk has launched on-line access and payment for land records.

Please stop by or call to discuss any of these important changes to our healthy town!



Happy Birthday East Haddam Swing Bridge



Town officials from East Haddam are planning an historic bridge crossing and special commemoration ceremony on Saturday, June 15, to celebrate the "Swing Bridge Centennial." The East Haddam Swing Bridge was officially opened on Flag Day, June 14, 1913, with a community celebration that included, a band concert, an automobile parade, addresses by Governor Baldwin and others commemorating the life of Nathan Hale. A century later, similar community-themed festivities will include participation from Goodspeed Musicals, Moodus Drum & Fife Corps, businesses and community groups on both sides of the Connecticut River.

A detailed list of related events will be available as the event draws near, however various activities have already been confirmed. A season-long exhibit on the history and construction of the bridge, considered an engineering marvel in its time, will take place at the East Haddam Historical Society Museum. An Art Exhibit featuring the Swing Bridge theme is also planned at the Museum. The Haddam Historical Society will be preparing a traveling exhibit titled "Crossing the River," about the ferries and the bridge.

Antique cars will participate in a ceremonial drive across the decorated bridge beginning at 9:00 a.m. on June 15th and car clubs will hold a car show at Haddam's Eagle Landing State Park. The governor and other dignitaries have been invited to

attend. Goodspeed Musicals, celebrating their 50th Anniversary, will hold a "Family Lawn Party," outside the Goodspeed Opera House from approximately 10:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Stations of hand-on activities will showcase various facets of musical theater, such as tap dance instruction, stage makeup, and set design. A Children's Carnival with old-fashioned games and prizes will be sponsored by the East Haddam Business Association.

Free Eye Screening

The East Haddam Community Lions Club recently announced that it now has the capability of performing pediatric eye screenings of pre-school children, ages 2 through 5. Members of our Lions Club have been trained in the use of the new Pedia Vision Spot VS100 vision scanner and will be available to perform screenings at local nursery schools the week of May 6th. Town youngsters not attending a nursery school/day care can call for an appointment and be scanned also.

The vision scanner we use is capable of screening for astigmatism, nearsightedness, farsightedness, lazy eye, misalignment of the eyes. Nearly 20% of children between the ages of 2-5 are found to have a problem and need to be referred for treatment. The earlier the child's problem is diagnosed the chance to return to normal or near normal vision by age 7 is possible.

The individual screening takes just a few seconds and is performed from a distance of three feet. There is no physical contact with the child and no eye drops are administered. Our equipment provides a print-out of the results for each individual tested.

This service is offered free of charge by the Community Lions under the Lions Eye Health Program administered by the Connecticut Lions Eye Research Foundation. Lions work world wide to help the visually impaired and to eliminate preventable blindness by diagnosing and treating eye disease and diabetes. Local Clubs statewide schedule eye screenings, collect old eyeglasses, sponsor diabetes clinics and do what ever they can to serve their communities.

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Sophie Soja Retires

On March 24, Sophie Soja retired as Manager of the East Haddam Food Bank after thirteen years of dedicated service. The Food Bank began in 1996 when Linda Cherry, then Principal of the East Haddam Elementary School, came to Audrey Martin, a member of the East Haddam Community Lions, with the concern that "children were coming to school hungry". The Community Lions made the first donation to the food bank with a check for \$1500 and a community institution was born. Several members of the Community Lions came forward to volunteer their services at the Food Bank as did staff from East Haddam Youth & Family Services.

Space was provided at the "old" middle school, refrigerators and freezers were donated by community residents and shelves were donated by the East Haddam Public Library.

The Boy Scouts held the first community-wide food drive and volunteers made regular trips to Connecticut Food Bank in order to stock the shelves.

In 2000, when Audrey Martin had to step down as manager of the food bank, Sophie Soja came on board. She joined Mary Halish as co-manager and never looked back. In 1998, East Haddam Youth & Family Services became the sponsoring agency for the food bank, supporting increased fundraising by providing the group with non-profit status. And, in 2008/2009, the town renovated the first floor of the Grange Hall so that the food bank could move out of the middle school basement.

Sophie Soja expressed that her passion for feeding her




friends and neighbors was born from the time as a little girl that she and her sister with a little red wagon would go to their local food bank to supplement their own family's needs. This background drove her to tirelessly build the food bank into an organization of which East Haddam can be very proud. She made it her sole mission to raise funds to support the food bank and continually sought donations from East Haddam residents, businesses, civic groups, and churches. She went door to door, bringing a personal touch to her fundraising efforts. She made it difficult to say no. Sophie used the same personal approach

with area food markets; she went every day, cultivating partnerships that allowed her to get the best prices and even regular donations of bread and other baked goods. Store managers knew her by name and were happy to be part of such an important cause.

Because of Sophie's efforts and the commitment of so many dedicated volunteers who have spent countless hours picking up food at the Connecticut Food Bank, sorting and stocking shelves, and distributing food every week, the East Haddam Food Bank grew to serve more than 100 East Haddam families. Because of them and the never ending generosity of East Haddam community organizations and residents, youth and adults alike, who donate money and food and organize food drives, the Food Bank continues to offer a much needed service. Because of them, fewer children are going to school hungry.

There will be a major surprise for everyone who visits the New Wing.


The education/social program offers three dates:

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Dog Licenses

Bridging rich tradition with an innovative future

The East Haddam School District has enjoyed a very busy and productive winter season, in spite of the petulant weather that extended the school year and shorted April vacation. With that noted (and as the saying goes), "...neither rain, nor sleet nor gloom of night..." will keep our teachers, administrators and staff from doing their very best to meet the needs of our students. Accordingly, our relentless charge is to adhere to the principles addressed within the framework of our District Improvement Plan (DIP), which provides a clear focus on Teaching and Learning. Within the structure of our DIP is a great deal of attention relative to the Common Core State Standards.

What are the Common Core State Standards? Adopted by 45 states, including Connecticut (2010), the Common Core State Standards for English-Language Arts, Mathematics, and Literacy in History, Social Studies, Science, & Technical Subjects ("the Standards") are the culmination of an extended, broad-based effort to fulfill the charge issued by the states to create the next generation of K-12 standards in order to help ensure that all students are college and career ready by the end of high school.

Why are academic standards important? As a natural outgrowth of meeting the charge to define college and career readiness, the Standards also lay out a vision of

what it means to be a literate person in the twenty-first century. Indeed, the skills and understandings students are expected to demonstrate have wide applicability outside the classroom or workplace. Students who meet the Standards readily undertake the close, attentive reading that is at the heart of understanding and enjoying complex works of literature. They habitually perform the critical reading necessary to pick carefully through the staggering amount of information available today in print and digitally. They actively seek the wide, deep, and thoughtful engagement with high-quality literary and informational texts that builds knowledge, enlarges experience, and broadens worldviews. They reflexively demonstrate the cogent reasoning and use of evidence that is essential to both private deliberation and responsible citizenship in a democratic republic. In short, students who meet the Standards develop the skills in reading, writing, speaking, and listening that are the foundation for any creative and purposeful expression in language. Additionally, the Standards define what students should understand and be able to do in their study of mathematics.

Of course, high standards are not the only thing needed for our children's success, but they are a necessary first step!

Graduates Two Cert Classes

East Haddam Emergency Management recently sponsored two Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT) classes and welcomes 30 new members to our CERT Group. The classes were taught by Jennifer Spencer, John Blaschik and Bill Dexter and held in January and February of 2013. With the addition of these new members the East Haddam CERT team in now 60+ members strong.

The CERT program educates people about disaster preparedness with particular emphasis on hazards that may impact our area. During a major incident, emergency service personnel may not be able to reach everyone right away. By getting trained in CERT, you will have the basic skills to help emergency responders save lives and protect property. Using the training learned in the classroom and during exercises, CERT members can assist others in their neighborhood or workplace during an emergency. East Haddam Cert Team members have been very active and a great asset during

recent large scale emergencies such as Storms Irene and Sandy that have affected our community.

The program, which is supported by funds from the Department of Emergency Management and Homeland Security, includes training sessions in: Disaster Preparedness, Fire Safety, Medical, Light Search and Rescue Operations, CERT Organization, Disaster Psychology and Terrorism. Additionally, those taking the training must complete a course review, final exam and hands on practical stations.

All graduates were equipped with safety equipment such as gloves, goggles, helmets, CERT vests and other supplies.

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

Volunteer Ambulance - EMT Course

The East Haddam Volunteer Ambulance Association is sponsoring an Emergency Medical Technician class this summer to be held in town. The class will be 13 weeks in length and involve 180 hours of training. This exciting and demanding course covers human anatomy and physiology, treatment of sick and injured individuals, and transportation of these patients to the hospital. The course curriculum involves interactive lectures, hands-on practical training, and 20 hours of clinical observation time in a variety of settings including on board ambulances and in hospital emergency departments. Students must be 16 years of age or older by the end of the course in order to become certified in Connecticut.

Master Gardener's Corner

This is the year; you have decided to plant a floral garden. But, you don't have enough of sun to supply your garden. Typically, a garden needs six to eight hours of sun daily. Too much shade is a big problem for gardener aspirants. Don't be quick to bail out of your plan because you can plant a stunning 'shade garden.' Yes, you can have your trees and garden too!

Shade gardening has been increasing in the past few years and more garden enthusiasts are learning to adapt their unique landscape rather than reconstruct their property to fit the common plans of sun gardens.

So where do you start? Pick a location in a shady area where your new garden will add beauty in your yard. Visit the Middlesex County Extension Center in Haddam on Saybrook Road and request a kit for soil testing. The results will help you understand what your soil needs for the perfect loam for shady gardens. Then you are ready to prepare your section. You can start small and expend each year.

I find the *Taylor's Guide to Shade Gardening* offered by Houghton Mifflin Company to be an excellent reference book for starting your project giving all the simple details you need. Plus, it list over 350 trees, shrubs, and flowers that thrive

under difficult conditions, illustrated with color photographs and detailed drawings. Another great book is Shade Perennials, by W. George Schmid. More than 1000 plants and 310 photographs will assist you on what to plant and how to care for your garden. If you need any assistance, stop by the Master Gardener's office at Middlesex Extension Center and chat with a volunteer. Also, your local garden centers are pleased to guide you with planting specimens that will thrive under your shade conditions.

Shade gardening is an exciting opportunity if you haven't ventured into this arena. Make it a family project where everyone is involved in designing your shade plot, picking out your plants and creating a unique view for all to enjoy. The benefits are plentiful.

My final recommendation is the New Encyclopedia of Gardening Techniques, offered by the American Horticultural Society; it is an indispensable illustrated practical guide that will assist you in every aspect of your garden projects. Happy planting!

Neighborhood Crime Watch Program

On February 26 the East Haddam Police/Resident Troopers Office in Conjunction with the East Haddam Local Prevention Council sponsored a meeting for residents interested in starting a Crime Watch Program in their neighborhood. The meeting was attended by over 30 residents representing several neighborhoods throughout East Haddam and Moodus.

The Neighborhood Watch Program is one of the oldest and most effective crime prevention programs in the country, bringing citizens together with law enforcement to deter crime and make the community safer.

The purpose of the Neighborhood Watch Program is to make residents aware of the steps they can take to make their homes more secure against crime. The program shows neighbors how they can help each other protect their entire neighborhood, and to make local law enforcement more effective in the fight against crime through involvement and participation of the residents.

Residents and police work together to achieve one common goal - "Making Their Neighborhoods Safe." Residents are taught

how to protect their property and report suspicious activities to the police. Additionally, residents get to meet their neighbors and work together towards a common goal. They watch out for each other and report suspicious activities to the police.

Trooper Jeff Rhoades and Officer Craig Mansfield presented an overview of the East Haddam Neighborhood Crime Watch program and discussed the next steps for starting up programs in their own neighborhoods. Residents were asked to go back to their neighborhoods and coordinate a time and place for a first meeting. - 3. Begin construction of the bridge replacements in Spring 2014

CONNDOT has agreed to hold a final information meeting for Town businesses and residents. These updates will be posted on our website, in the Events Magazine and via future correspondence.

A Brief Look at Alzbeimer's Disease

More than 5.4 million Americans suffer from Alzheimer's disease, the most common form of memory illness known as dementia. This means millions of spouses, adult children, friends and other family members are suffering alongside the Alzheimer's patient as they progress through the different stages of the disease. It also means no one travels through dementia alone, and family and friends are needed now more than ever.

Spouses or other relatives may be the first to notice warning signs of memory loss beyond what is considered normal, such as a change in someone's ability to concentrate or work with numbers, taking much longer to do things than before, confusion of time and place, or even complications having a conversation. (Visit the Alzheimer's Association at www.alz.org for more information on early signs and symptoms of memory loss that may help determine if there should be concern).

These signs may not necessarily mean someone has dementia. There can be medical reasons for them, such as depression, or the result of an infection, or even dehydration. If there ever is any doubt about changes in memory, all families are encouraged to seek a proper diagnosis from a qualified geriatrician or physician with specific geriatric experience.


If the diagnosis is indeed a memory illness, you can work together as a team to prepare a care plan that works for everyone.

It is ideal for those suffering from memory-related illnesses to be in a safe environment that also offers stimulation and engagement throughout the day. Sometimes that can be done in a home setting if they don't wander, or at an adult day care center, or at an assisted living community with a memory care specialty.

Regardless of where a person with dementia lives, it is very beneficial for them to have interaction with those who know and love them. For family and /or friends who may be uncomfortable around people with Alzheimer's, it is important to realize that although these memory- impaired folks don't recall your name or relationship, they often sense that you are a significant person to them. By talking about people and places from their past, you not only act as their memory, you validate their sense of self.

Life with dementia is a challenging one, but does not have to mean the end of a relationship with your loved one. Families dealing with this illness are encouraged to seek out educational events as well as educational reading material, to join a support group , and to view your relatives as your care partners during this journey. You may be surprised by how many special moments you will continue to enjoy and treasure with your loved one.

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Tax Collector

The Tax Office is in the process of preparing for the mailing of tax bills for the 2012 Grand List. All bills will be in the mail by June 30, 2013 with a due date of July 1, 2013, payable by August 1, 2013 without interest.

If you still owe taxes on the 2011 Grand List, an attempt should be made to clear up the back taxes before the new bills come out. Liens will be placed on all outstanding Real Estate balances in June 2013. This is an additional charge.

Tax payments may be made in person, by mail or on-line. Office hours are; Monday, Wednesday, Thursday 9:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m., Tuesday 9:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. and Friday 9:00 a.m. - Noon. The Tax Office will be open late on Thursday August 1st, 2013 9:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m. There is a secure Lock Box in the front alcove, which is open 24 hours per day, seven days a week. Payments may be dropped there after hours. Our on-line payment service provided by Point and Pay, a firm that enables public and private sector clients across the country to accept electronic payments for taxes using credit/debit cards or e-checks. The service is available to all taxpayers

who wish to pay tax bills for Real Estate, Motor Vehicle, Motor Vehicle Supplement, Personal Property and Sewer Usage. Point and Pay will process the tax bills paid by credit/debit cards at no cost to the town but will charge the taxpayer a fee of 2.95% on the amount charged. The fee for e-check is \$2.95 per transaction. The Town will receive the tax money, less the fee, by direct deposit in one to two business days. This service is provided at the counter, over the phone or on the Town's Web page, www.easthaddam.org.

To inquire about taxes owed, go to www.easthaddam.org. Under town departments select Tax Collector. Click link for "Online Tax Information"

To pay taxes online, go to www.easthaddam.org and click the link "Pay Taxes".

This office is for the collection of taxes only. Any adjustments to your bill must be made by the Assessor. Email: assessor041@easthaddam.org Phone: (860) 873-5026

Grilling Tips and Fire Safety Classes

The warm weather is right around the corner along with all of the fun outside activities and family barbecues. Barbecues are great summer fun but they also come with fire and safety hazards.

The following list of items should be checked prior to the first use:

- Shut the gas off first
- Check all tubes that lead into the burner for any blockage from insects, spiders, or food grease. If blocked check the owners manual for a solution.
- Check all hoses for cracking, brittleness, holes or leaks.
 Make sure hoses/tubing do not have sharp bends. Replace all hoses that appear damaged or have unit serviced.
- Move gas hoses away from hot surfaces and dripping hot grease. If you can't move the hoses, install a heat shield/pan to catch the grease.
- Replace damaged hose connectors.
- If a gas leak is detected, immediately shut off the bottle and do not attempt to light. Contact your gas company for repairs.
- Keep all lighted cigarettes, matches, candles or open flame away from a leaking grill.
- Never use a grill inside (house, garage, shed, carport, breezeway, basement) and always keep away from any structure a minimum of 10 feet unless the owners manual requires a greater distances.
- Do not attempt to repair leaking tanks CALL 911
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- Turn gas off after each use.
- Do not store tanks inside any structure or open sided structure.

To avoid accidents while transporting LP gas containers, always keep containers secured in the upright position. Never keep a filled container in a hot car, trunk or in the direct sunlight. The increased heat will cause the gas pressure to increase, which may open the relief valve and allow gas to escape.

Never attempt to extinguish fires, repair gas containers, or secure tanks that the relief valve has opened or ventilate escaped gasses from your home. CALL 911

The East Haddam Fire Marshal's Office is also happy to announce the start of (3) public education seminars that will be starting late summer or early fall. These classes are designed for adults but kids are also welcome. Listed are the classes coming.

- Baby to Toddler: Come and learn the hazards to this age group along with how to make your home safe and the fun ways to teach fire prevention. Target audience is parents, grandparents, teachers, caregivers and babysitters but all are welcome.
- 2. Toddler to 18: This group has its own unique hazards and safety concerns. Target audience is to all.
- 3. 18 to Senior's: This group covers the widest range of age and has some of the highest hazards. Target audience is adults, adults that care for seniors and seniors that live alone.

Assessor's News

I would like all residents to be aware that there has been a change in the filing period for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Rebate Program. The Assessor's Office will be taking applications from April 1 to October 1. Applicant's total income must not exceed \$33,500 for a single person, \$40,900 for a couple (joint income), including Social Security and Medicare. Applicants must be 65 or older or totally disabled and bring all income, rent, and utility information from 2012.

In addition, the deadline for filing for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Homeowners Program is May 15. Qualifying income and age requirements for the Homeowners Program and Additional Veterans Benefits is the same as the Elderly and Totally Disabled Renters Rebate Program. It should be noted that the town of East Haddam has adopted by local option an additional tax credit to homeowners 65 and older whose income does not exceed \$50,000 (including Social Security). Applicants must bring proof of income including Social Security for 2012. Applications for the Additional Veterans Benefits will be accepted until October 1.

As the Tax Collector's Office prepares the July tax bills, those residents whose motor vehicles have been sold, stolen, totaled, or who have moved out-of-state may be eligible for a pro-ration of their car taxes.

Two forms of proof are necessary to pro-rate or remove a vehicle from the grand list. Residents must bring a copy of the plate receipt issued by the Department of Motor Vehicles at the time of cancellation of registration, and a copy of one of the following; bill of sale, transfer of title, receipt from junkyard, notification of total loss, trade-in papers, or some other document showing the date on which the vehicle was disposed.

The Assessor's Office has its own web page on the town website. Included is information on real estate, personal property, and motor vehicle assessments; property tax relief for seniors, veterans, and the disabled; renters' rebate; information on revaluation; access to applications and forms pertaining to the Assessor's Office. Also, the new assessments as a result of the October 1 revaluation are available on the website.

Hands-On Innovators

Eddie Lupinek is a skeptic. It's in his nature to question, analyze and think through everything. Especially when it comes to equipment for Eddie's Auto Body, his shop in the small town of East Haddam, Conn.

"I don't necessarily take everything as it's presented," says Lupinek, the second-generation owner of the family business, founded by his father in 1956. "I think about things a lot and I'm always jotting down ideas. I have all of these sketches everywhere."

Lupinek and his wife, Carol Lupinek, who together run the 3,300-square-foot shop, are

firm believers in the ability of ingenuity and old-fashioned hard work to drive success - it has at their facility, especially in the paint department. When they were unable to find a paint booth that met their needs, they built their own, one that is turning heads in their market, drastically reducing energy costs and helping the shop complete vehicles faster.

It's a reflection of the progressive thinking that has helped the little repair center breach \$1 million in annual sales without a single direct repair relationship.

Building a Better Booth

In recent years, Eddie's Auto Body had grown to the point where it could no longer handle the volume of traffic coming through its doors. About a year ago, the shop was repairing 50–60 vehicles a month, but it had the potential to repair closer to 70.

The shop's biggest bottleneck was its paint booth, Eddie Lupinek says.

"We had an old cross-flow booth, which 30 years ago was fine," Lupinek says. "But it was getting outdated."

He had known for years that the booth should be updated, but until Carol Lupinek joined the shop as office manager about five years ago, he hadn't been able to free up enough time to solve the problem. Knowing he wanted a downdraft booth, he researched his options, but none of them quite matched the vision he had spent years developing in his head.

"I looked at everything that has come out, and what I wanted, certain things that I was looking for - economical to use and creating a safe work environment and all of this kind of stuff - I was not seeing them come in the same package," Eddie Lupinek says. "So when I couldn't get what I wanted, I decided to make it."

But before the booth was built, Eddie Lupinek discovered what he called the "missing ingredient."

At a trade show last year, he came across a Canadianbuilt infrared catalytic drying unit from a company called Sun-Spot. Though he was highly skeptical as always, he decided to purchase a couple of units and test them in the shop. What he found was that the product, similar to those used to reduce dry times in the U.K., was able to dry primer in a few minutes, waterborne paint in as little as 6 minutes - and it could cure clearcoats in 10 minutes.

The new booth would be built around this technology, he decided.

The Fruits of Hard Labor

The Lupineks close their shop for a two-week period every year for a "vacation," that for the last three years has been spent making improvements to the shop. Their vacation last year was dedicated to building the new paint booth.

"From my perspective, we always want to make things better," Carol Lupinek says of the couple's drive to constantly improve. "How can we make things better or more efficient? How can we do things that are more efficient and save money? And we feed off of each other in that we both are not afraid to pick up a shovel."

For two weeks in late June and early July, the Lupineks and a few other employees worked around the clock replacing their cross-flow booth with a custom-made downdraft booth that would incorporate the Sun-Spot units. The result is a booth that has allowed them to repair an additional three cars per week, bringing monthly sales from around \$70,000 to upwards of \$90,000. The booth uses a mere five gallons of propane each month running five cycles a day, resulting in a cost of just 30 cents a cycle. That produces a monthly expense that is thousands of dollars less than conventional downdraft booths.

Some of the booth's most notable features:

- Two adjustable HT-200 Sun-Spot infrared drying units that each have a drying footprint of 4 feet by 8 feet.
- Three portable Sun-Spot infrared units with a drying footprint of 22 inches.
- A clean room above the booth filters room-temperature shop air three times. First, air passes through a 20-foot-wide by 8-foot-high row of household furnace filters positioned at a 30-degree angle to prevent dust accumulation. Then the air

moves through two sets of booth filters. Eddie Lupinek says the air toward the ceiling is several degrees warmer than the air at ground level (he figures a degree of temperature is gained for each foot of elevation), so the booth is naturally being fed a steady flow of warm air. Fresh air is still fed to the shop floor through mechanical dampers in a compressor room, so the booth is creating negative pressure, acting as a big filter of shop air. The Lupineks believe it's a health benefit for employees.

• The booth has no burners. An air makeup unit is unnecessary because the Sun-Spot units, which dry paint from the inside out, do the curing.

"We do spot repair. We're often not painting an entire car," Carol Lupinek says. "So to heat the whole booth to 160 [degrees] and exhaust out 160 [degrees] doesn't make sense to us."

Vision to Reality

The Lupineks invested \$70,000 in the new booth, including the Sun-Spot units, and expect to recoup the cost in less than two years. They were so enthusiastic about the differences the booth and the Sun-Spot technology made that they hosted an open house last year to share it with other shop owners.

The Lupineks say their techs no longer have to work on several cars at once because down time is all but eliminated. When drying primer, for instance, a car will be done by the time a technician gets his sandpaper.

"It's increased our turnover time considerably," says the shop's painter, Rob Cromeenes. "The jobs are cleaner and the fumes in the booth are sucked out twice as fast as they used to be."

Aiming to Improve

Eddie Lupinek is always looking forward. Other recent innovations include a bumper rack attached to a garage door lift that hoists bumper covers to the ceiling to clear valuable shop space, and a bright, portable light that utilizes paint booth bulbs to improve technician views of vehicle damage.

Next up for the Lupineks is a shop expansion, planned for their next summer vacation. It will include an expanded customer waiting area, a wash bay, an estimating bay with a lift and a parts room. The goal, the Lupineks say, is not to get bigger, but to work smarter and be better at what they do.

"I love the industry and I love what I do," Eddie Lupinek says. "If I can do everything I can to build an environment that is safe for the employees and it's something I can grow old doing, that'd be the goal."

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Summer Beauties

Long blooming and vey showy, hydrangeas are often on the "favorites list" for many Connecticut gardeners. They are also the topic on our garden centers "most frequently asked questions" list.

Most common question: My plants are gorgeous and full, but no blooms. Why? It helps to know what kind of hydrangea you have and when it sets its buds, The iconic "Nikko Blue" hydrangea usually begins blooming in mid to late June, depending on how warm the spring has been. It is one of the H. macrophylla hybrids that set their buds on last years old wood. When it first emerges in the spring, the tender new foliage at the base of the plant appears up to a month before the foliage and buds swell on the old twigs. So, often, people will see the old naked woody twigs above all the green foliage, think they are dead, and prune those stems down to the ground. They just cut off all this years flowers! *Don't prune until June* on macrophylla hybrids!

Several years ago, Hydrangea All Summer Beauty arrived on the scene. This new macrophylla hybrid flowers on both old and new wood., so it blooms even longer into the fall. It created a sensation in the horticultural world. A whole series of longer blooming hybrids in a range of colors of pinks, blues and whites have appeared on the market in both double ball and flat "lace cap" varieties.

Hydrangea flower color is determined not only by variety, but also by soil conditions as well. Generally, hydrangea macrophylla will be more blue in acid soils and more pink in alkaline soils. The intensity of colors is also influenced by micronutrients in the soils, so soil amendments like good rich

compost, sea kelp, and green sand will make hydrangea colors more vivid.

Cold and drying winter winds can sometimes desiccate the dormant flower buds, so it is good to plant in areas protected from extreme winter wind, and to chose varieties listed for your zones' winter temperatures. Some folks wrap their hydrangea with burlap or fabric in the fall to protect them from the ravages of winter. This has the added bonus of protecting the buds from winter deer browse. The fat buds are deer candy! If you have severe deer problems in your summer garden, you will need to protect the plants by either fencing or application of deer repellant.

Fall blooming Pee Gee Hydrangeas (H. paniculata grandiflora) are less prone to deer damage or winter burn, since they flower on strictly new wood. The buds open in early August first as a cluster of green flowers that open to white, then turn to blush pink or mauve in the fall. They are beautiful cut and make great dried flowers.

Oakleaf Hydrangea (H. quercifolia) is a native shrub blooming in July and August with huge plumes of white flowers up to 12" long. The toothed dark green leaves turn bright burgundy in the fall. And the cinnamon colored bark adds interest to the winter landscape.

This is just a sampling of the riches of the hydrangea world. We invite you to explore the huge array of this diverse and well-loved genus.

Protect Your Skin from the Sun

As summer approaches, the Department of Public Health reminds the public of the dangers of skin cancer and to protect their skin while enjoying the outdoors. DPH joins the National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention and other health organizations in recognizing the Friday before Memorial Day as "Don't Fry Day" to highlight sun safety.

"As warm weather approaches and more people enjoy the outdoors, the risk for ultraviolet (UV) damage of the skin increases," said DPH Commissioner Dr. Jewel Mullen. "While outside enjoying the nice weather, it is important to take simple steps like putting on sunscreen and wearing protective clothing to protect your skin from the sun's harmful rays. Protecting your skin not only helps prevent skin damage, it also helps prevent skin cancer."

According to federal health officials, skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States and the most common cancer among 20 to 30 year-olds. It's estimated that one American dies every hour from melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer. In Connecticut, there were 930 cases of malignant melanoma diagnosed in 2009, and 100 deaths from the disease. State health officials encourage Connecticut residents to protect their skin to help reduce rates of skin cancer from overexposure to the sun's UV rays. Because no single step can fully protect you and your family from overexposure to UV radiation, DPH suggests following the tips below as possible:

• Avoid sun burning, intentional tanning, and using indoor tanning. Use sunless self-tanning products instead.

- Apply sunscreen generously (SPF 15 or higher and containing both UVA and UVB protection is recommended)
- Wear sun-protective clothing, a wide-brimmed hat, and sunglasses
 - Seek shade, especially during midday hours
- Use extra caution near water, snow, and sand due to reflection
- Get vitamin D safely through food and vitamin D supplements

Individuals with lighter-toned skin are more susceptible to UV damage, although people of all races and ethnicities can be at risk for skin cancer. Those who have a family history of skin cancer, plenty of moles or freckles, or a history of severe sunburns early in life are at a higher risk of skin cancer. To minimize the harmful effects of excessive and unprotected sun exposure, protection from intense UV radiation should be a life-long practice for everyone. Fortunately, skin cancer can be prevented and is highly curable if found early. The best way to detect skin cancer early is to examine your skin regularly and recognize changes in moles and skin growths.

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
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
