

Sam became my mentor and supporter of my career. Sam's handprint and impact on our community can be seen in all of our parks. In recognition for his service the town re-named Bridebrook Park to Peretz Park at Bridebrook in 2004.

Charlie Fenick was a Parks and Recreation commission member for almost 30 years. His service to the commission and community will be dearly missed. Charlie was an avid runner/walker and a champion for youth sports and providing recreational opportunities for people with disabilities. The department has recently renamed its annual 10k road race in his honor: "Niantic Bay 10k; Charlies Race."

In these difficult times I encourage you to stay active while practicing safe social distancing and keeping your spirit, mind and body healthy. Park and Beach Information

MCCOOK POINT PARK, HOLE N' WALL, & CINI PARK:

- Open daily from 8:00 am to sunset
- Pets are permitted on beaches from the Tuesday after Labor Day until the Friday before Memorial Day ONLY**; must be under owners control at all times and it is the owner's responsibility to clean-up all pet waste. Dogs are not permitted on the Niantic Bay Boardwalk at any time during the year.
- Once restrooms re-open, they will remain open until mid-November as weather permits.
- Contact the Parks and Recreation Office for Pavilion reservations/availability.
- All East Lyme parks are tobacco free.

State Statute 22-364 states that dogs must be under the direct control of their owners at all times when using town parks. It is the dog owner's responsibility to clean up all dog waste.

NO PETS MAY 22 - SEPT 7, 2020 AT ANY BEACH **FACILITY: SEE BELOW REGULATION

State Regulation (Public Swimming Area Regulations) Section 19a-36-B61 (10) states domestic animals shall be prohibited in the water and the land immediately adjacent to the water of a public swimming area when the public swimming area is open for use.

A Spring Unlike Any Other

What happened? Not one game has been played by any of our youth sport leagues. This virus has many of our patrons contained to the confines of their homes, many out of work, and many grieving the loss of friends and/or family. The question on everyone's mind, when will it end?

Our department is essentially shut down. We have a skeleton office staff and our maintenance team is working their hardest to keep our parks operating as close to normal as possible. We have yet to hold interviews and staff trainings and have no real idea how close to "normal" our summer will be.

TO PASS MY FREE TIME, I HAVE UTILIZED THE GREAT OUTDOORS.



I have rigged my fishing gear and my kayak has either been in water or on the roof of my vehicle for a month. I have fished just about every freshwater pond or lake with a public launch in our town this spring. Kayak fishing has been my go-to activity for social distancing. I have had lakes all to myself and also shared them with fellow fishermen on canoes, kayaks, and boats. As the weather warms, I am sure more of our patrons will begin heading for the water as their outdoor escape and seeking a "tug" on the end of their line.

Aside from being in my kayak, my bicycle has been my second choice for spending my free time. It is hard for me to be on a bicycle and have anything but a smile on my face. The sights, smells, and sounds are all so unique on a bike. Riding around town on a frequent basis has allowed me to see the early signs of summer; the arrival of osprey, the blooming of flowers, and boats appearing at some docks. If you have a bicycle, take it for a spin, start in your neighborhood and gradually expand your rides to include more difficult terrain. One benefit to these unfortunate times is that there are considerably less cars on the road, making it a great time to get more comfortable on your bicycle.

A Miracle Built by Community



Students of Flanders Elementary school enjoyed an up-close look at the construction equipment working during their recess, and I want to personally thank the staff members of the school for adapting to the construction while school was in session. Once the virus hit and schools were closed, the construction team kicked into high gear, and the project really took shape.

East Lyme Superintendent's Note



Superintendent Jeffrey Newton

It's my hope that our East Lyme residents and all families have remained safe during this most unusual and unprecedented time in our lives. Your safety and the safety of our children remains paramount across our schools and community.

I've seen many positive and negatives during my seventeen years as an educational leader, and I have dealt with

numerous issues many of which have been on a large scale. What I have never done before is orchestrate a district-wide move of 2700 students to remote learning within a week and half's time. The world of administrators, teachers, and school staff members has been completely flipped upside down. These professionals have rapidly made a massive adjustment to working from home and quickly re-connecting with students. Whether it be from a kitchen table, a living room, or a quiet corner of their household, our educators have made a huge transition. They are adjusting schedules to not only engage their own children in the remote learning that they need to do, but they are also engaging their classrooms and students.

I have simply been amazed at what has transpired in the education world over such a short period of time. The intense and long hours that our staff have been putting in to make this all happen is truly admirable. East Lyme Public Schools is blessed to have so many excellent staff who truly go above and beyond for our children. I could not be prouder to lead them through this most challenging aspect of their careers. I want to personally thank all our administrators and staff for their massive effort. I also want to thank our parent community for their support and patience as we continue to navigate this change. It has not been perfect, but the long hours and determination to engage students remotely has been a successful venture and one that we are proud of.

We approached remote learning under the premise that many families could struggle at the onset. Many parents have lost jobs, are dealing with financial issues, or they are simply trying to adjust to working from home and now assisting their children with schooling. Concerns and support were our first order of business, while also equipping hundreds of families with computer devices and many with Internet access. We have also been working feverously to renegotiate contracts given our lengthy closure. Our bus contract was one of the largest to modify given they are not running. We

have modified staffing contracts, worked with our unions and collective bargaining groups around changes in job responsibilities, and adjusted our current year school calendar. Many of our food service staff members have prepared and provided thousands of meals over the last few weeks and distributed them every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday to families across our town. Our technology staff members scrambled to pull together laptops from classrooms to give to families and have successfully run a parent helpdesk to support their technology needs at home. Teachers have scheduled and provided 'office hours' for students to communicate and share information back and forth. Our special education teachers and service providers are working hard to do the best they can in providing direct services to students with Individualized Education Plans in a remote fashion. The list goes on and on regarding the number of changes that have occurred in which we as a school district are successfully navigating.

Our Board of Education has been working to make adjustments and reductions to the proposed 2020-2021 district operating budget. We recognize the fiscal climate and recession that has occurred, and we are being responsive to the need to minimize a tax increase on our community.

Through all of this I am saddened by the impact our school closure has had on our senior class. The last few months of a student's senior year is filled with multiple activities such as award night, prom, senior dinner dance, and others. These unfortunately cannot happen in the tradition that every previous class has experienced. This is incredibly unfortunate, and our high school administration and staff are working with our seniors on alternative plans for graduation. This is a most memorable time for families, and we will do our best to be creative and recognize our seniors if we cannot return to school prior to June 19th.

COVID-19 has had a drastic effect on states, towns, and communities across the country. It is my hope that there is minimal impact to our community and family members, and we can eventually return to the normal life we are accustomed to in spending time socializing and being with extended family and friends. Until that time comes please be safe and know that as our mission statement clearly articulates the East Lyme Public Schools will continue to inspire, engage, and educate each student to become a contributing citizen and a responsible, independent, and critical thinker.

Town Clerk's Office - Dog License Reminder

The Town Clerk's Office is reminding dog owners that they must register their dogs by June 30, 2020.

All dogs 6 months of age or older must be licensed. Fees for neutered or spayed dogs are \$8.00 and for dogs that are not neutered or not spayed, the fee is \$19.

A certificate of neutering or spaying from a licensed vet must be presented when licensing a dog for the first time.

An up-to-date certificate of rabies vaccination must be presented before a dog can be licensed. The rabies tag is not acceptable. To license by mail, send all required information (which will be returned) along with a **self addressed stamped envelope** and your **check made payable to:** Town of East Lyme and mail to: East Lyme Town Clerk, PO Box 519, Niantic, CT 06357.

A penalty of \$1 per month will be assessed for payments received after June 30, 2020. For information, call the Town Clerk's Office at: 860-739-6931 ext. 1135.

What is Your COVID-19 **Mental Health Temperature?**

On a scale of 0-10, are you feeling relieved over the absence of social obligations; or, "chomping at the bit" to resume in-person social connections? Tele-mental health is revealing clients at every point on the continuum. It appears that introverts tend to be on the "This is not so bad," end of the continuum while extroverts tend to be on the "chomping at the bit," end. Of course, there are many other factors affecting where you find yourself on the continuum - living alone, balancing work at home or outside the home while home-schooling, unemployment, etc. Wherever you find yourself on the continuum, here are a few universal prescriptions:

- 1 Create a flexible daily schedule time for sleep, time for productive activity, and time for leisure time activities = balance.
- 2 **Incorporate time for personal reflection** draw, paint, journal, meditate, pray. Explore apps such as "Breathe," to assess your physical and emotional status followed by recommendations such as brief guided mediations.
- Incorporate exercise walk, hike, bike, or dance in your living room.

If you are struggling with depression and/or anxiety during this crisis, tele-mental health is available to you now. Wherever you are on the continuum at this time, reach out/remain connected - though it may be virtual for now!

from the Meals on Wheels program. If you are interested in receiving this service, please contact T.V.C.C.A. at: 860-934-1006 for further information regarding eligibility.









Community Matters - Leading the Way in Supporting & Giving Back Mermaid Liquors




