The East Lyme Parks and Recreation Department reserves the right to reschedule, relocate, or cancel any announced program due to facility availability and public response. The Parks and Recreation Department may also establish minimum or maximum class sizes to ensure appropriate instructor-to-participant ratios. Program registration hours are Monday - Friday 8:00 am - 4:00 pm.

DIRECTIONS

95 South - Take Exit 74; turn right onto Flanders Rd (CT-161) & continue for approx. 1 mile. Turn right at stop light onto Society Rd. (Clauson Nursery is on corner). Turn right immediately after Lillie B. Haynes School, following signs to East Lyme Library/Community Center (complex will be on left). The Parks & Recreation Office is located in Community Center complex.

95 North - Take Exit 73; turn left onto Society Road. Follow road until 3-way stop sign. Bear left onto Society Rd. and follow to Lillie B. Haynes School; take Left (see above). There are two ways to register for programs: In person at the Parks and Recreation Department office in the E. Lyme Library Community Center on Society Road or by mail (Mailing address: 41 Society Rd., Niantic, CT 06357). Loss, Grieving, and Holidays

As we head into a season of family gatherings and celebrations, images of joyful events and smiling people abound. Adults and children both look forward to favorite traditions, family get-togethers, and gathering for meals, gift exchanges, and most importantly, the exchange of stories which bind people closer. But mixed with the joy is also an increase in feelings of loss, magnified by the contrast in emotions. Within the family celebrating together is the widow mourning the absence of her husband, however long ago; the child missing the military parent serving overseas, the young adult missing a sibling currently in rehab. If we don't look and ask we may miss this-as they strive to look "okay" and act the part they think is expected. What would really help them to be "okay?" We know that people who grieve do best when they feel the support of family and friends. They need to know their feelings are normal and don't have to be hidden. When others try to avoid all reminders of the loss, it only highlights their sense of aloneness and the feeling they "should" be okay by now. Instead, we need to acknowledge those who aren't present. Talk about them and our memories of them. Continue with our traditions, but don't pretend we don't miss them there. When we laugh, cry, and remember together, the grief lessens through sharing, and our joy, though bittersweet, has room to break through.

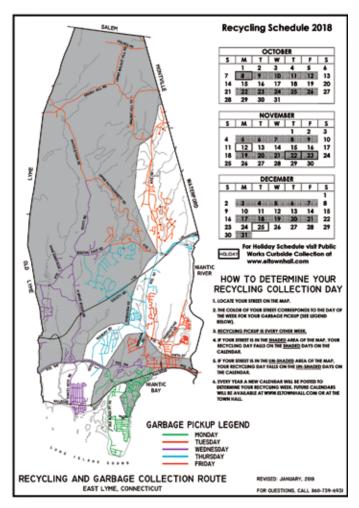

DO NOT put these things in the recycling can: Unacceptable: Plastic bags, plastic films, flower pots, styrofoam, wood, food waste, garbage, leaves/yard waste.

Unacceptable Paper - Wax paper, soiled paper, soiled napkins/paper towels/tissues, pet food bags & dryer sheets, shredded paper.

Unacceptable Plastics - Non-Bottled Plastics (e.g., Garden hose, trash & zip lock bags, cereal box bags, bubble wrap, clear plastic wrap, potato chip bags, single cheese wrappers, soiled plastic bottles & bags, styrofoam, coolers, straws, plastic silverware, plastic totes, coolers, toys, clothes hangers).

Unacceptable Metal - Dirty aluminum foil, dirty tin cans, wire clothes hangers.

Unacceptable Cardboard - Soiled pizza boxes & soiled cardboard (Examples: Greasy cardboard, moldy cardboard, cardboard with paint.)

Unacceptable Glass - Window pane glass, plated glass, windshield glass, ceramics, candle glass, dinnerware, drinking glasses, pottery, mirrors.

Unacceptable Misc. Items - Pillows, clothing, furniture, sheet rock, grass clippings, patio umbrellas, furniture, electronics.

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FEMA News for Residents



The Town of East Lyme is a participant in the Federal Emergency Management Agency Community Rating System (CRS) program which entitles its residents to discounts on their flood insurance policies.

The CRS program recognizes and encourages activities that reduce flood damage to existing buildings and protects new buildings beyond the minimum Nation Flood Insurance Program protection level. The Town of East Lyme currently provides property protection advice by providing individuals with information as to what they can do to protect their own properties from flood damage. Those who have a federally backed mortgage, or plan to refinance with a federally backed lender, are required to purchase flood insurance if their home is shown in a high-risk flood area, known as a Special Flood Hazard Area, on the FEMA Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

Residents are urged to contact their insurance agent or visit www.floodsmart.gov to learn more about how and where to get a policy. There are many ways to protect a property from flood damage, including but not limited to the following:

- Demolish the building or relocate it out of harm's way;
- Elevate the building above the flood level;
- Elevate damage-prone components, such as the furnace or air conditioning unit;
- Dry flood proof the building so water cannot get into it;
- Wet flood proof portions of the building so water won't cause damage;
- Construct a berm or redirect drainage away from the building;
- Maintain nearby streams, ditches, and storm drains so debris does not obstruct them; and
- Correct sewer backup problems.

There are several qualified people at the Town of East Lyme that can talk to you about flood hazard, flood protection measures, and/or possible financial assistance.

Are You Ready for Winter?

Prepare for the worst before the snow starts to fly!

THINGS TO CHECK AROUND THE HOUSE:

- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Remember: Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

PLANNING TO USE A SPACE HEATER TO KEEP WARM?

- Be sure that it has been certified by a nationally recognized testing laboratory.
- Space heaters account for 43 percent of U.S. home heating fires and 85 percent of associated deaths.
 - * Always follow the manufacturer's directions for proper use.
 - * Always place the heater on a level, hard, nonflammable surface.
 - * Always keep heaters at least three feet away from combustibles.
 - * Always have a three-foot "kid & pet-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
 - * Always turn the heater off if you leave the area.
 - * Never leave a space heater on when you go to sleep.
 - * Never place a space heater close to any sleeping person.
 - * Never use gasoline in a kerosene space heater. Even small amounts of gasoline mixed with kerosene can increase the risk of fire.
 - * Never use portable propane space heaters indoors or in any confined space unless they are specifically designed for indoor use.

NEVER USE YOUR OVEN TO HEAT YOUR HOME!

CHECK YOUR SMOKE & CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS!

• Be sure to place smoke alarms on every level of your home, outside of sleeping areas and inside each bedroom. Guard against carbon monoxide (CO) poisonings as well by installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Make sure that your batteries in all alarms are fresh and working.

The E.L. Boardwalk Plaques - Stories of the Soul of a Small Town

A REFLECTION OF THE HEART OF THE COMMUNITY OF EAST LYME

As people walk the 1.1 miles of the East Lyme Boardwalk, they are able to ponder this gem of vintage Americana. One can see families strolling together, couples - old and new - holding hands, even people rehabbing from injuries as they welcome the waterside hand-hold and the many benches to rest and appreciate the view.

On clear days one can hear the wild cry of the sea gulls, the quiet lapping of the waves, the sometimes gentle rush of wind, and the blaring horn of the passing train as the conductor signals hello to the walkers.

Twenty four years ago, no one would have predicted the popularity of the plaques that line the East Lyme Boardwalk. Over those years, 1911 plaques have been installed, each with its own unique story. The plaque donors have come from 28 different states across the nation and from 2 foreign countries. Connecticut towns are represented from north to south and west to eastfrom Windsor to Woodbury and Greenwich to Guilford .



However, it is the unique story behind every plaque that is captivating as they celebrate weddings, anniversaries, births, and graduations. They express loss, sorrow, laughter and contentment. Because the co-chairs of this project -Bill and Fran Rinoski- are romantics, Board 1057 (at the request of Tony Terraciano) was put up in the snow one Valentine's Day. "Tony loves Christine," it stated and she said yes, right there on the boardwalk. When the boardwalk was re-dedicated in 2016, the pair were there with their 3 children!

One woman explained that she forced herself not to look at the plaques until she had finished the first half of her continued on page 30

walk. Then, she would allow herself to turn seaward to read some of the plaques as she returned to her starting point. Many of the inscriptions indicate what the Boardwalk has meant to people: The Perfect Walk, A Tiny bit of Heaven, Smell the Ocean Air, Walk the Path in Silence. The one that best reflects the mood of this crescent shaped "dream" is To All Who Pass Here - Peace.

Bill and Fran Rinoski have been the chairs of this fundraiser for 24 years! When I asked Bill why they were willing to take on this project and continue with it for such a long time, he said, "I believed in the Boardwalk from the beginning... and I wanted to make this dream come true. I signed up to see this project through to the completion of the re-built Boardwalk." Every town should have volunteers with this dependability and perseverance.

For a \$100 tax-deductible contribution, become part of that permanent history by sponsoring a plaque with your own memory engraved, to be placed on the re-constructed Boardwalk. All funds raised by the sponsorship of the plaques are used to contribute to the maintenance of the Boardwalk and other Foundation projects.

Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health - jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/ trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer,

the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program. And there is assistance for ILROG - the International Lymphoma Radiation Oncology Group. "We're global in nature but local in giving," observes John.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."

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
