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First Selectman's Corner

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

Spring is here and I encourage you to go outside, enjoy the warmer temperatures and partake of the many activities happening in Town this time of year. Take some time to enjoy the Garden Club's May Market and the Memorial Day and the Burning of the Ships Parades. Think about signing the kids up for the Park and Rec Department's summer camp. Go visit the River Museum, take a ride on the Steam Train, or see a show at the Ivoryton Playhouse! While you are out and about, I encourage you to support our local businesses.

The Boards of Selectmen and Education have sent their 2016-2017 Budget proposals to the Board of Finance, which has moved them to Public Hearing. Residents will have a chance to vote on the budget at a Town Meeting on May 9th. For more detailed information about the budget please check the Town and Region 4 websites. Once again the Citizens Guide to the Essex Town Budget is available at the Town Hall and online at Essexct.gov/finance-department.

Several projects will be occurring simultaneously in town beginning this Spring. Bids have gone out for the Essex Court septic repair project and we anticipate completion in the near future. Construction has begun on the new affordable senior housing units, Essex Place, on the lot adjacent to Essex Court. Renovations will begin on May 1st at the Town Hall in the Land Use, Building, and Health departments and we expect that work to be completed by October 31. These departments will be temporarily relocated to the auditorium and kitchen during the

construction period. Construction will begin on a new 4 bay garage for the Public Works Department to store equipment and a new heating system to replace an older existing system in one of the buildings. This should be completed in the fall. Slow but steady progress is being made on the Walnut and Ivory Street bridges.

The Planning Commission and Essex Elementary School officials embarked on the development of a "Safe Routes To School Plan" several years ago. Thanks to a recent grant from the DOT, construction will begin this summer with the installation of new sidewalks around the Essex Elementary School area, replacement and widening of sidewalks down to Falls River and a new crosswalk at Charles Street. 





58th Essex Annual Shad Bake – A Local Tradition



The Rotary Club of Essex's 58th Essex Annual Shad Bake returns to the Connecticut River Museum on June 4th! Co-hosted by the Museum and Rotary Club, this quintessential summer event is a longstanding tradition on the Connecticut Shoreline.

A London household with available food and a place to sleep would place a fish symbol, a reference from the Bible, in the house's front window to let displaced people know that free food and a place to sleep were available.

Residents of our three towns wanting rides and having no other means of transportation may call 860-388-2693 up to noon the day before their appointment (Friday noon for a Monday ride) to schedule a ride for the following day. The destinations are within the triangle of Middletown to the north, Guilford to the west and New London to the east.

For calendar 2015, we had 783 round-trip rides for our three towns of which over 60% are for Essex residents.

The modest budget for FISH is funded by grants from the Essex Community Fund, the Community Foundation of Middlesex County, the Essex Rotary, the Essex Savings Bank, the Deep River Community Health Committee, and more recently the Town of Chester and other organizations, as well as by contributions from our drivers and riders.

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Trying To Sell Your House?

Unpermitted Work May be a Problem

Increasingly as potential buyers perform their due diligence or lenders and appraisers check property files in Town Hall they discover unpermitted or unapproved work and are refusing to move forward with transactions. What are town officials able to do to help a homeowner who finds themselves in this position?

At Essex Town Hall we strive for a friendly experience for our land use customers. In these cases we are often able to issue an "after the fact" permit for the work that was performed so that a homeowner can receive a Certificate of Approval. What does this entail?

Basically the procedure is the same as if the work had not already been performed, with a couple of important caveats. Depending on what specifically was done health and zoning permits may be required in addition to a building permit application. We generally waive the requirement to supply building plans since the work has already been done. You must pay a building permit application fee based on the current fair market value of the work including labor and materials. Please be aware that the Building Official has no authority to issue a permit under a previous code version, so all work must comply with TODAY'S building code.

After the permit is issued you will need to request an inspection. Normally the Building Official has the opportunity to see the work at various stages of construction before work is concealed. However in the "after the fact" scenario the Building Official just performs a thorough inspection of everything he can see without destructive testing. He will normally get a good idea of the level of quality and code compliance after this inspection. If the Building Official feels confident that the work is substantially compliant he will issue a Certificate of Approval that includes a notation that rough inspections were not requested or performed.

If code violations are discovered during the inspection they must be corrected before a Certificate of Approval can be issued. If the Building Official becomes concerned about any of the work that is covered up he will require enough of the finish materials to be removed to satisfy him that the work is code compliant. So why should anyone obtain approvals in advance of doing the work if they can just get an "after the fact" permit at a later date?

First and foremost, it is the law. Any person who violates any provision of the State Building Code is subject to penalties as per Section 29-254a of the Connecticut General Statutes. But if you need more personal motivation or are concerned that someday you may have trouble selling your house consider these points: 1) The "after the fact" process can be lengthy. Sometimes health or zoning issues come up that can be time consuming to resolve. 2) If you wait and count on getting an "after the fact" permit you may then have to pay for upgrades to comply with today's code. These costs could easily be more than the original building

permit fee. 3) You are going to pay for the permit anyway. Building permit fees are approximately 1% of the value of the improvement, so the fee is not a huge budgetary consideration when planning an upgrade to your home. 4) If you do work without a permit and thus without approval by the Building Official you may be in a position of increased liability if something goes wrong. Imagine a visitor to your home falls on a set of stairs, gets injured, and decides to sue. Would you rather go to court and be able to show the judge that the stairs were permitted, inspected, and approved by the Building Official or that you built the stairs without approval or inspection according to how you thought they should be? Town officials have rules that are applied through the departments that constitute the Essex land use offices. The point of a great deal of the State Building Code is to make our buildings safe to occupy and use. We certainly prefer to see you before the start of a project or before you try to sell your house, but let us help you, even if it is "after the fact".


- Be Planning to pursue studies related to the environment in an accredited two-year or four-year institute of higher learning. Fields of study may include:

Remembering the Essex Rope Walk by Steve Knauth

This is not a story of the wide sweep of history, but one of a moment in the past so ordinary that no one noticed or suspected at the time that it would ever be special. And yet the unknown writer who penned the recollection for the local newspaper on March of 1893 sees, with the passage of time, that the present becomes the past, that the once-commonplace events of our lives slowly, inexorably, turn into history.

The Essex rope walk, located in the middle of the town, was hard to miss. Some 800 feet long and 20 feet wide, it extended from what is now North Main Street down to the Connecticut River at North Cove, and included a 2-story office at one end and a tar house next door.

Inside, a dozen or so men turned bales of hemp, manila and flax and barrels of tar and oil into lengths of rope for the local shipbuilding industry. Fibers were twisted into yarn, yarns into strands, and those into rope along the great length of the wooden building, using clanking, clattering machinery powered by a horse in the basement below. Built circa 1817, and a thriving business for well over a half-century, it was also a wondrous playscape to the children of 19th century Essex, venturing from their school houses at The Academy, Pound Hill or the Point.

"Every recess, some in every school would run down to the rope walk," our writer begins. There was a little cellar where "not a ray of light penetrated, and [we] children would dare to go in, where there was an old horse going round and round all day long hitched to a beam, which turned a wheel that twisted the ropes" in the building above. The youngsters would watch their chance and when the horse had passed the door, they would spring onto one of the heavy beams and ride around.

The walk above held its own fascinations and rituals. At the far end of the building was a crank used to coil up the new-made rope on a big spool, and the children would run

down the mighty length of the walk, take a swing on the heavy handle, and run, then run back. Sometimes they'd challenge each other to walk the length of the wooden rail which ran down the middle of the building – without falling off. "We have never known it to be accomplished," the unknown author writes.

Then, there was the fascinating Mr. Hannah. A long-time employee, his job was to walk backwards, up and down the walk, all day long, with a large bundle of flax wound about his waist, feeding strands to the twisting rope. "We children," the author writes, "...used to wonder how many times a day the old man walked backward up and down, and how many bundles of flax he could use in a day," but they never asked. "It is as well perhaps," he concludes, "for if one child had thought of asking, the rest would all have had to ask the same questions, and the old man was not pleasant, at best." Nor was his companion. Mr. Hannah "had a dog as homely as his master who always followed him up and down the walk and when he could bear no more from the children he would make the dog bark at them, which was the only thing to mar the happiness of the old rope walk."

Before going back to their schools, the children made it a habit to stop in the office to be weighed [on the rope-weighing scales]. "No matter if we had been weighed in the morning we would wish to be weighed again in the afternoon," he writes. "We never weighed twice alike, but it never entered our childish hearts that we were weighed incorrectly, as long as we got on the scales and off."

The shop manager, Daniel Andrews, performed the duty. He would also wind the children's kite strings, if asked politely. "We thought him cross then, [but] we can see now he had lots of patience with us."

And then, recess or "dinner time" over, the children would scurry back to their schoolhouses, leaving the rope walk behind, unaware that they'd just done something special, something they would remember, fondly, in their later years; that they were a part of history.

That is an awareness which comes with age. Our unknown author, looking back, says simply: "most of the many who have been associated with the old rope walk are

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dead [now] and the old building will be a thing of the past and only memories of the rope walk will remain."

Author's note: The Essex rope walk had one last hurrah. In 1883, the Essex Cornet Band decided to hold a muster, inviting 11 bands and drum corps from around the state, and a crowd of hundreds was expected. Where to host them all? The only building in town large enough was the now-abandoned rope walk, dirty with dust and cob webs, filled with junk and smelling of tar. No matter. In the spirit of the day, supportive citizens got together, cleaned the rope walk out, filled it with cedar boughs to freshen the air and set up 400 feet of tables, covered with white cloths. The celebrants arrived, and were served a sumptuous dinner. A concert followed, "the consolidated band of 160 pieces playing that glorious tune, 'Marching through Georgia' with a vim and vigor that would have waked the dead," reported the Connecticut Courant. "This was one of the greatest gala days that Essex ever had."

Shortly afterwards, 100 feet of the rope walk collapsed after a heavy snowfall; it would never ring with voices again.



New Dementia Caregiver Group Formed at The Saybrook at Haddam

Caring for a family member or loved one suffering from dementia requires patience, fortitude, and a network of much-needed support from others in similar situations. To help caregivers develop this network, better understand the disease, and reduce stress and anxiety associated with dementia care, The Saybrook at Haddam has created a new monthly Caregivers' Support Group. The group, which is open to the public, offers caregivers as well as family and friends of persons with dementia an opportunity to share information, talk through challenges, and learn more about local resources. 
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Hiking & Exploring Essex Open Space – Trail and Property Maps

It's Springtime! What better time of year is there to get out and enjoy the many Town and Essex Land Trust properties available in our community. The town currently has over 1000 acres of open space, of which the Land Trust owns approximately 600. With blazed trails well marked and maintained, different properties are easy to access and explore. Yet, many still want maps to guide them.

There are several ways to access trail maps to Land Trust properties and Town open spaces. In addition to owning a Trail Guide book, given to all new Land Trust members, there are two other ways to access property maps.

1. Maps can be downloaded from the Essex Land Trust website. Use the following link to locate downloadable maps for all the properties with trails: http://www.essexlandtrust.org/04_trails.html.

2. The website also has a downloadable brochure that identifies the entire town's open spaces which are accessible to the public. There is now also a downloadable map to



the recently acquired Preserve. Use the following link: http://www.essexlandtrust.org/01_new.html.

3. The latest tool to access maps is to purchase the Maplets Application from your Apple or Android app store (one time cost is \$2.99). The Essex Land Trust has created and installed 16 Essex Open Space properties. Download this application onto your smart phone, select "your location" and maps are then listed in terms of proximity to where one is located. Once a map is selected, you can use the map to locate yourself on the particular property, making it much easier to know where one is and how to reach a specific destination.

The Maplets App can also be used for any number of available maps of national parks, state parks, zoos, ski resorts, trail maps, transit systems, university campuses and more. At last count there were nearly 12,000 different downloadable maps. Maplets is a product of Zaia Design and is available for your iPhone, iPad or Android devices.



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Public Advisory From The Essex Tree Warden

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES) is advising all residents of Connecticut that the emerald ash borer (EAB – agrilus planipennis) has quickly spread throughout Connecticut, making it now part of the federal EAB quarantine. Residents should be aware of this invasive insect and the threat it poses to all ash trees in our community.

The emerald ash borer is a beetle in the buprestid family that is native to Asia. First discovered in 2002 in Detroit, it has rapidly spread across the US. It may have first been introduced via wood-packing materials and continued spreading by humans in everything from firewood to rustic crafts. Because the beetle is a strong flier, it can spread on its own as well.

CAES describes the adult beetle as a metallic green, about ½ inch long. It feeds exclusively on ash trees in the genus *Fraxinus*. Tiny, flat, round 1mm long eggs are laid in the bark crevices. Seven to 10 days later, the eggs hatch and the young larvae begin to feed on the tree's conducting tissues. As they feed and grow, the larvae create distinctive tightly-winding 'serpentine galleries.' This process quickly stresses and girdles the ash tree.

During the winter the mature larvae remain in a pupal chamber and pupate in the spring. The adult beetles emerge by chewing a distinctive 4mm wide D-shaped exit hole. The adults feed on the margins of the ash foliage prior to mating. The lifespan is 4-5 weeks, during which time a single female may lay upwards of 60 eggs.

It has been difficult to survey for this pest because of its small size. Some monitoring and trapping methods have been used including purple panel traps. Another is "biosurveillance" by scientists and volunteers who monitor the nests of a native wasp that specifically hunts buprestids, including EAB.

The overall effect of the ash borer is the

decline of the ash trees. Infected trees are attacked by woodpeckers who strip bark while trying to reach the larvae. The eventual loss of ash trees will have ripple effects on other organisms including butterflies and moths as well as wood duck, bob white, purple

finch, pine grosbeak and fox squirrels all of which eat the seeds of the ash tree.

To identify an ash tree look for compound leaves and opposite branching. Ash trees have diamond patterned bark which provides distinct crevices. Ash seeds are winged, resembling maple pinwheels. Ash trees do not produce berries. The ash tree is valued for its combination of strength and flexibility. It is used as shovel handles, baseball bats and in construction of guitar bodies.

According to the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection, Connecticut is seeking to slow the spread of EAB by a quarantine to keep any infested ash materials from leaving Connecticut and going to an area that is not infested. The quarantine targets ash logs, hardwood firewood, yard waste and ash nursery stock. Also, a ban on the importation of firewood into Connecticut through New York or Massachusetts - unless it is properly certified as not coming from an infested area - has been instituted.

Individuals can help in the following ways:

- 1. Know what an ash tree looks like and monitor the ash trees you are responsible for.
- 2. Act quickly to report any ash trees that are declining and may pose a threat to people or structures.

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- 3. Be careful when moving firewood or young trees. Use locally obtained firewood.
- 4. Notify the Tree Warden of concerns about street or park trees.

Private trees are the responsibility of the property owner. DEEP encourages owners of ash trees to contact an arborist for further help in monitoring the status of your trees and to use the resources available at the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station and DEEP.

According to the CAES, ash trees

that are still healthy can be treated for and protected against EAB using commercially available pesticides. Ash trees that are not treated will eventually die and should be preemptively removed. Please contact your local arborist for expert advice.










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About Essex

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
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
