

# First Selectman's Corner

It was the fall of 1984, I had recently ended my partnership with the other founder of Tower Labs, and I was looking for a new home for my business. A local Westerly RI realtor said there were no appropriate buildings for us in the immediate area, but he had noticed a listing that he thought might work in a far off town called Essex. We made the pilgrimage and looked at a building in the Industrial Park in Centerbrook, which was being used to store cars for Essex Leasing, and the owner of the building was Herb Clark. Lil Paul was the Realtor on this end who did the showing. After a quick tour, I commented that the building would be great, but we would need to do significant work on the interior to make it suitable for Tower to produce its products, and I didn't know how I would be able to afford what needed to be done. Lil said the owner might be willing to help, so I met with Herb; he agreed to make it suitable for my needs, we moved to Essex in the spring of 1985, and the rest is history.

By the time my family moved to town in 1988, I had learned that Essex was comprised of three villages, each with its own unique character and attributes. Moving here also allowed me to begin to understand the special place this town really is. We are graced with a natural beauty afforded by being on the Connecticut River and by being part of a community of towns

that also appreciate that natural beauty. It also became apparent to me that the people who live here are invested in preserving the special qualities of the area, and that the New England spirit of volunteerism was alive and well in Essex. Although we have a staff of paid municipal employees and elected officials, a huge percentage of the work done to maintain this town






most out of each and every dollar they receive, either from our property tax or from the State. The educators in our towns should be applauded for their hard work and dedication.

Over the past few months we have begun to make some enhancements to the services provided by the town. We modified the budget process and have received positive feedback for our efforts. It is up to the citizens of the town to approve the budgets that have been presented by the Boards of Education, Board of Finance, and the Board of Selectmen. Difficult choices had to be made to arrive at the final numbers that were unanimously approved by the various boards. Those of us that worked on preparing these budgets hope they will be well received. Kelly Sterner, our Finance Director, with the collaboration of Bob Dixon, Town Treasurer, prepared a "Citizens' Guide to the Essex Town Budget." It was based on a similar document prepared by the Town of East Hampton. We greatly appreciate Kelly's efforts, also the East Hampton Board of Finance for allowing us to work off their format. This guide is available on our website, and printed copies can be obtained from the Town Hall.

Other goings-on in Town Hall include the first issue of Essex News, which was sent out to the citizens who responded to our request for their e-mail address in our last issue of *Essex Events*. We hope this will be a valuable tool through which we can communicate with our citizenry. If you wish to sign up for the newsletter, please send an e-mail request to essexnews@essexct.gov, and we will add your address. A group of dedicated

volunteers is working on improving our website, and we hope that a new site will be launched later this year.

As usual around this time of the year, we look forward to several upcoming events. The Garden Club, which is featured in this issue of *Essex Events*, will be hosting the May Market on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12. Our renowned Memorial Day Parade, which starts at the Foot of Main Street, goes past three cemeteries, and ends up in Centerbrook, at the VFW, will kick off at 9:00 a.m. on May 28th. The new season at the Ivoryton Playhouse will be under way, and the Valley Railroad as well as the River Museum will be open for business as usual.

Also, please don't forget that the stores in town rely on your business to thrive. Many people lament the fact that we no longer have the type of shopping in town that we had many years ago. It's our responsibility to support local business.

On a final note, I would like to encourage everyone to take a moment in their day to reflect on how lucky we are to live here. After almost 25 years, sometimes I just forget, in the business of my day, what a great place this really is.



# Waterfront Happenings at the Connecticut River Museum

If you're looking for some waterfront fun and adventure in the coming months, head down to the Connecticut River Museum for a variety of special events for all ages and interests. On Saturday, May 12, don't miss the annual Burning of the Ships Day when the historic 1814 British raid on Essex comes to life through storytelling, re-enactors, colonial weaponry demonstrations, maritime activities and team row boat races. It all takes place dockside from 3 pm to 5 pm immediately following the Sailing Masters of 1812 Commemoration Parade. Then at 5:00 pm, all are invited inside the Museum's Burning of the Fleet exhibit for rum, grog, and a special presentation of the night the British burned our ships and stole our rum. The program will end in time for the 8 pm start of the Regency Ball hosted by the Sailing Masters of 1812 at Essex Town Hall.

On Friday, May 18, the new exhibit Blue Water Bound opens to the public, chronicling eight river-to-sea voyages through model ships, ship's logs, navigational instruments, and an interactive Life at Sea section where young visitors can take their own Blue Water adventure!

For those who like their history served up gourmet style, the Connecticut River Museum's 19th Annual RiverFare is sure to deliver on Thursday, May 31 from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm with savory bites and fine spirits from leading Connecticut restaurants and silent auction, all on the grounds of the Museum overlooking scenic Essex Harbor. Tickets are \$60 and include all food, wine, and microbrew sampling.

Other events include the return of Schooner Mary E in June for daily river cruises and charters and the Antique & Classic Boat Show on Saturday, July 7. 

Sergei Prokofiev's musical tale. We'll also be making musical instruments together and will enjoy a concert or two from Charles' Music School. In September we will host a multi program event put on the by the fine staff at the Eric Carle Museum of Art. We'll hold an interactive session for parents and educators addressing art and literacy and the Whole Book Approach to reading. Later that day, children can participate in the museum's "Art-Studio-to-Go" where they will engage in the creative process with art making using materials featured in the Museum's current Art Studio Program. We also plan to host a series of classes for teens who wish to learn more about graphic novel design with professional artist Frank McLaughlin. Also in the works is a reader's theater program series for little ones.

With the help of the Middlesex County Community Foundation, we hope to spark a new-found excitement for the arts and to help bridge the gap between the art education we want for all children and that which we can provide in a tough economy.

**ADULT PROGRAMS:** The Charles W. Morgan is the last surviving wooden whaling ship from the great days of sail. Built in 1841 in New Bedford, MA, the Morgan had a successful 80-year whaling career. She made 37 voyages before retiring in 1921. In 1941, she came to Mystic Seaport, where each year thousands of visitors enjoy getting a hands-on introduction to the restored tall ship and learning about her place in history. Take your own journey into the story of this remarkable survivor with Mystic Seaport's Project Historian Matthew Stackpole, whose illustrated lecture will illuminate this classic ship's decay and rebirth, Thursday April 26th at 7 p.m.

You may have seen the 295-foot (sparred length) U.S. Coast Guard training ship, the Eagle. Coast Guard cadets and officer candidates train on her at sea, learning to handle her 23 sails and six miles of running rigging. But did you know that she was built as a German training ship in 1936? Then called the Horst Wessel, the ship was claimed as a war prize by the United States, commissioned in the U.S. Coast Guard and renamed *Eagle*. Tido Holtkamp has a special connection to the ship - he served aboard the Horst Wessel as a German naval cadet for six months in 1944. After the war, he emigrated to the U.S. and settled in Connecticut. While crossing the Gold Star Memorial Bridge over the Thames River more than 40 years ago, he caught sight of his old ship. Since then, he's sailed on her many times, and has a fascinating collection of photographs and memorabilia related to her history. Thursday, May 3rd at 7 p.m.

Documentarian Alexandra Isles will show her film Hidden Treasures; Stories From a Great Museum, Thursday May 24th at 7. The film, shot at the Metropolitan Museum, introduces us to museum staff who spend their days working with its treasure trove of art and objects, and develop some surprisingly

# What You Need to Know About the Essex Wastewater Management Ordinance

The Essex Health Department promotes and protects the physical and environmental well-being of residents from disease, injury and environmental health hazards through prevention, education, enforcement and collaboration. The Health Department is responsible for protecting the public health through enforcement of the State of Connecticut Public Health Code, local laws, regulations, and town ordinances.

The Health Department, in collaboration with the Essex Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA), oversees the Essex Wastewater Management Ordinance. The primary purpose of the Wastewater Management Ordinance is to protect the public health and welfare of the town through the prevention of public health nuisances and environmental degradation that may have a detrimental impact on the quality of the town's groundwater and surface water resources.

To put it simply...the purpose of the ordinance is to protect groundwater (source of private drinking water) and surface water (local streams and rivers) from contamination caused by poor maintenance or failure of resident's onsite sewage disposal systems (a.k.a. septic systems).


We all share the responsibility of protecting surface and ground waters. The Health Department is required to ensure

proper design of onsite septic systems and each property owner is required to comply with the Wastewater Management Ordinance to maintain a properly functioning septic system.

Briefly, the ordinance states that all property owners shall have their **sewage disposal system cleaned and inspected at least once every five (5) years.** Property owners shall maintain a properly functioning septic system so as to prevent a public health nuisance and environmental degradation. It is the homeowner's responsibility to contact a licensed septic cleaner or installer to schedule a pump-out and inspection of their septic system at least every 5 years or earlier if they experience sewage backup into the home, surface effluent outside the home, or other evidence of septic system problems.

Septic cleaners and installers are licensed by the State of Connecticut and verification of licensure can be found at www.elicense.ct.gov/. The health department retains a list of pumpers, installers and inspectors who provide services in Essex. However, residents may hire any licensed professional they choose. Although pumpers are required to submit a pump-out report to the Health Department, this is not always the case, especially if the pumper is not familiar with the Essex Wastewater Management Ordinance. Therefore, residents

should obtain a pump-out receipt from the pumper and send a photocopy of it to the Essex Health Department. Residents must ensure that the receipt clearly indicates the property address where the pump-out occurred, date of service, and name of the septic cleaner or installer.

Once documentation of the pump-out is received in the Health Department, the information is updated in a pump-out tracking database. The Health Department uses this database to track resident's compliance with the Wastewater Management Ordinance and to send reminders to residents who are due or over-due for a pump-out. The Health Department implements the Ordinance through education and cooperation with residents, commercial establishments and other property owners or, when necessary, through a legal order and financial penalty.

Now that spring is here, the Health Department is once again sending reminder notices to residents who are due for a septic system pump-out. If you receive a pump-out reminder card in the mail please contact a licensed cleaner and schedule a pump-out and inspection. If your septic system was pumped within the last 5 years and you received a pump-out reminder card, please send a copy of the pump-out receipt to the health department so that the information may be verified and the database updated accordingly.

All residents are encouraged to read the Essex Wastewater Management Ordinance located on the Health Department website at www.essexct.gov. If your property is served by a Cesspool, please contact the Health Department as soon as possible. The Wastewater Management Ordinance contains specific details related to cesspools which need to be discussed with the Health Department.

## Sister Cities Essex Haiti

Sister Cities Essex Haiti is in full swing. The organization continues to inspire citizens to get involved; to make a difference. And oh what a difference they're making! There are several programs that have been initiated and continue to evolve and garner support and enthusiasm from both communities. I was fortunate to be a part of the newly-launched sports program on my first visit to Haiti in December. The program focused on tennis and, with help from American tennis pro John DeLong and the Deschapelles Tennis Committee, met with great success on many fronts.

One obvious objective was to teach tennis to both experienced and beginner players. This was met with more challenges than you might expect; there is little sense or experience with organized instruction, there are language discrepancies, cultural differences, and, facility and equipment shortages. In Haiti most children are never given an opportunity to attend school (the three hundred dollar annual tuition is prohibitive for most families) and the majority of people do not have steady work. Without these structured experiences, Haitians find that the concepts of waiting in line, taking turns, focused listening, and instruction are novel and take some getting used to.

Our French is a bit rusty and our Kreyol is essentially non existent but the eagerness with which the Haitians help overcome the language barrier is heartwarming and at times laugh-producing. As you might imagine, much is still lost in

translation. Sports are a universal language unto themselves and as such many barriers - including language - evaporate in the quest toward a common goal. It is hoped that tennis, and other sports that will be cultivated in this way, will become feeder programs. It is possible to develop collegiate or nationally worthy players affording a potential vehicle toward education and overall betterment. And there are benefits for the coaches too. It provides an opportunity for them to take ownership, gain self respect, a sense of responsibility and pride that comes with the task of teaching. After DeLong's departure, the tennis program was left to the Haitian coaches to run. DeLong will keep in touch to help iron out any remaining kinks and return periodically to provide refresher clinics.

Tennis was taught on the one and only tennis court in Deschapelles which has been there since the early 1900s when the Standard Fruit Plantation inhabited what is now Hôpital Albert Schweitzer (HAS.) The tennis court was installed for managers of the plantation. It remains on the HAS property and is available for use by the community of Deschapelles. Many tennis balls and racquets were donated by area Connecticut individuals but the bulk (35 youth racquets) were made possible with help from Gamma Tennis racquets.

The projects that have been initiated, which have all been identified by the villagers of Deschapelles, include a library, a music program, an Early Education Teacher Training Project and a sports program. Recently the second annual **Have a Heart for Haiti** fundraiser was held at the Left Bank Gallery in Essex. The event, which featured a Haitian band, an appearance by Kathy Pfeifer, author of *Haiti; Footprints in the Heart,* several photography exhibits, Haitian art and crafts sales, and Haitian food and drink, raised nearly \$30,000 for Hôpital Albert Schweitzer and Sister Cities Essex Haiti.

The library, the first big undertaking by the collaborative Deschapelles and Essex teams, has an official site since the February signing of a ten year lease for property in Deschapelles

where the much-needed library and community center will be built. Plans for the structure are being designed and construction is slated to begin within the year. The Early Education Teacher Training Project, while still in the early stages of development, hopes to enhance existing curricula, introduce hands-on manipulative educational materials important for the cognitive development of very young children and provide a platform to learn from one another regarding teaching strategies. The music program initiated in the summer of 2011 continues to foster an already rich musical heritage. And the tennis program is well underway with eager Haitian coaches modeling sportsmanship and dedication which in turn encourages ownership, pride and a new found sense of purpose.

# Common Sense for Maintaining Your Septic System

We are committed to maintaining the public health and safety of Essex – one step in accomplishing this is to ensure all septic systems meet current health standards. To get maximum quality and long term use from your on-site sewage disposal system (i.e. septic system) you should follow these steps:

- DO have your tank pumped at least every 5 years (two years if you have a garbage disposal).
- DO keep a record of pump-outs and maintenance. Send a copy of the pump-out receipt to the Health Department.
- DO check for running toilets this is the most common reason for premature system failure.
- DO use bleach sparingly and drain cleaners rarely.
- DO know where your system is located this information can be obtained from the Health Department.
- DON'T park on or drive over your system unless it has been specifically designed for that use.
- DON'T poison your groundwater no paints, pesticides, paint thinner, antifreeze in sinks.
- DON'T use powdered detergents in washer or dishwasher.
- DON'T use the toilet as a trash can no diapers, grease, plastics or cigarette butts.
- DON'T use commercial septic tank additives they won't help and they may damage your system


Do not put excess solids into the system. Excess solids could cause your effluent filter to clog and will increase the need for more frequent pumping. Oils, greases, industrial/commercial wastes, toxic chemicals, cigarette butts, sanitary napkins, cat-litter, and backwash from water softeners or water treatment systems must not be put into your septic system. Putting any of these items in your system can potentially cause problems and will increase the likelihood of premature failure. It is also noted that the CT Public Health Code does not allow backwash from water treatment systems to be discharged into septic systems.

Be aware of how much water you are using and avoid using excess water. Toilet flushing can constitute 25 percent of water usage in a household. Set your washing machine on the proper load setting so that you are not using more water than needed.

Do not park vehicles or place other large objects on your septic system. This may compact the soil and reduce its ability to treat wastewater. It may also damage the network of pipes within the system. Avoid planting water-loving shrubs with deep root systems or trees near the leaching system, as roots could damage the pipes or clog the leaching system. Water from sump pumps, roof leaders, yard drains, etc. must always be discharged away from the septic system area. The repair of

failing septic systems can pose a significant expense to property owners or to the local tax payers if municipal sewer lines need to be extended to a particular area.

It is far less expensive to properly maintain a septic system than to replace one.

Born on February 9, 1987, in New Haven, Connecticut, Christopher was raised in Ivoryton, Connecticut, where he attended Essex Elementary School, John Winthrop Middle School, and Valley Regional High School, from which he graduated in 2005. After completing high school, Christopher moved on to West Virginia University, where he graduated in 2010 with a degree in History and Chinese. While attending WVU, Christopher completed a Study Abroad Program, spending a semester in China where his interest in the Chinese culture and language grew. Christopher's passion to better understand the Chinese culture led him to become fluent in Mandarin Chinese.

Just as Christopher had an appreciation and respect for diverse cultures, he held similar views about and a passion for protecting our environment. Christopher was a strong advocate for environmental initiatives such as recycling and carpooling, and constantly championed these causes. In doing so, Christopher spent time with The Citizen's Campaign for the Environment, whose focus is promoting an awareness of and advocating for the protection of our natural resources and public health.

Christopher's strengths included always attempting to reach beyond his limits and never be willing to settle for mediocrity. His determination to work to his fullest potential was a message he encouraged others to follow, no matter what their dreams and aspirations. It was Christopher's mission to make the world a better place through environmental changes and educational opportunities. Christopher had a plan and the plan was to make a difference in the lives of others.

In July 2011, Christopher's life was cut short by a tragic accident. In his memory, the Chris Belfoure Memorial Fund has been established at The Middlesex County Community Foundation. 





# Specialized Hip Surgery Helps Patients Stay Active

Some people never know they have the condition until they're older. Others, especially those people who lead very active lives, realize there's a problem early on, some as early as their teens. The problem is something called "hip impingement," and an orthopedic surgeon at Middlesex Hospital who specializes in sports medicine, is now performing a new procedure to get people who have the condition back in action for the long run.

David Hergan, M.D., who joined Middlesex Orthopedic Surgeons about three years ago, has performed more than 100 hip impingement surgeries since first coming to Middlesex Hospital.

"One of the things that attracted me to this area," said Dr. Hergan, was the opportunity to fill a need for a surgeon who could perform this type of surgery. There are only a handful of surgeons in the entire state of Connecticut who are currently doing this type of procedure."

The goal of the procedure, said Dr. Hergan, is to preserve the hip joint, rather than replace it, through

an arthroscopic approach. Hip impingement is usually a developmental problem. The bones of the hip (ball and socket) develop in an abnormal way, so people have less range of motion and more stiffness. The ball and socket collide in an asymmetrical way, which causes the cartilage to become damaged. The combination of an active lifestyle, with the developmental abnormality, can cause problems early on in life, sometimes as early as the teenage years. The noninvasive surgery involves going into the joint and shaving off the excess bone to restore the hip joint to its normal shape and function. The arthroscopic approach is just as effective, if not more so, than traditional, open surgery and patients' recovery is quicker, they experience less pain and are able to get back to their normal activities, including sports, much faster. Yankees' third baseman Alex Rodriguez, Boston Bruins' goalie Tim Thomas and the sprinter Tyson Gay are just a few of the professional athletes who have had the surgery.

In his role as a team orthopedist at Wesleyan University, Dr. Hergan has seen young athletes with this condition and has performed successful hip impingement surgeries on them using the arthroscopic approach.

"My specialty in arthroscopy and sports medicine is really geared toward patients with a more active lifestyle," he admits. But the definition of "active lifestyle" is constantly changing. Years ago that would have been people under 40, but active Baby Boomers have changed the picture dramatically. Dr. Hergan's youngest hip impingement patient was 17 and his oldest so far was 52.

"A lot of my patients are people over 40 who don't want to give up their active lifestyles, and for good reason. It's really fun trying to keep these people active and moving and "in the game" so to speak, and it's rewarding because they have a bit more perspective on things than perhaps those in their teens and 20s," explained Dr. Hergan.

On January 16, 1920, the United States launched what some considered to be one of the maddest follies in its history. The 18th Amendment to the U.S. constitution, titled the National Prohibition Act, became law, making the sale or distribution of liquor, beer and wine illegal throughout the country.

President Hoover called the amendment "noble in motive" but, though many agreed, seldom had a law been so flagrantly violated.

Americans not only continued to manufacture, barter and possess alcohol...they drank more of it. 'Moonshining' became big business, as did smuggling. Hundreds of ships were anchored three miles offshore, from Maine to Florida, offering liquor to anyone who made the trip out to them by rowboat, skiff or speedboat.

Women, who before the law was enacted had sworn off saloons, now joined men, as they came in droves to Prohibition's new offering, the 'Speak-easy', where 'cocktails' became the popular new concoction.


