WELCOME TO SPRING! FINALLY!

In the first quarter of the year the town endured several snowstorms, one of which caused widespread power outages that lasted for days. Those without heat cuddled up with blankets and sleeping bags, bunked with nearby friends and family or made do with the limited output of generators and fireplaces.

Anticipating an extended power outage, town leaders from Essex, Deep River and Chester made the decision to open a community emergency shelter at the John Winthrop Middle School. Running on a 450 kW generator until its own power was restored, the school offered residents of all three towns heat, showers, three meals a day, charging stations for technical equipment, and even sleeping accommodations in the gym. Those without water were able to fill up buckets to take home. With this well coordinated community program in place all three towns are made more resilient and better able to withstand potential disasters.

In the wake of the state's budget cuts for energy programs, the Clean Energy Task Force (ECCE) has turned its focus to what residents and business owners can do to be more sustainable and self-sufficient.

Assessor's Office

Real Estate Tax Relief

FOR PERSONS TOTALLY DISABLED OR OVER AGE 65



The Assessor's Office is accepting applications for the State of Connecticut Circuit Breaker program until May 15th. In order to qualify for this program a

person must be totally disabled or over age 65. In the case of a married couple, only one spouse needs to be over 65. The total household income, including Social Security benefits, must be less than \$43,000 for a married couple; and less than \$35,300 for a single person.

The property that you are seeking assistance for must be your primary residence.

Once qualified for the State Circuit Breaker Program, a person/couple is also eligible for the Town of Essex matching benefit.

The amount of tax relief is a sliding scale based on the total income. For example, if a married couple had a total income of \$20,000 for calendar year 2017, they may qualify for assistance from the State of up to \$1,000. The \$1,000 would be taken off their tax bill and the Town would match that benefit up to 100%, depending on age and years of residence in the home. In this example, the tax bill could be reduced by as much as \$2,000.

If you, or someone you know, might be eligible for this benefit, please have them come to the Assessor's Office at Town Hall with their 2017 SSA 1099, and proof of any income earned in calendar year 2017 or a copy of the 2017 tax return prior to May 15, 2018.

The Town of Essex also offers a tax deferral program where your real property taxes are essentially "frozen" at the 2017 level. There would be a lien placed on the real property so that the amount of deferred taxes would be paid to the Town in the event of the sale of the property or death of the owner.



ELIGIBILITY FOR VOTING IN PRIMARIES IN CONNECTICUT

In Connecticut you must be registered with the political party whose primary you wish to vote in. If you are registered as unaffiliated you may switch to a party up to 12 noon the day before the primary.

If you are currently registered with a political party and you want to switch to another party to vote in their primary you must do that at least 90 days before the scheduled primary.

There are potential primaries scheduled for August 14, 2018 for

Governor and other offices. The cut-off date for switching parties will be May 14, 2018.

You can check your registration status through the Secretary of the State's website: WWW.SOTS.CT.GOV or with your local Registrar of Voters office. You can do a party registration change online through the Secretary of the State's website: WWW.SOTS. CT.GOV or with your registrar of voters or town clerk.





RENTERS REBATE PROGRAM

The Renters Rebate Program starts April 1, 2018 and runs through September 30, 2018.

To qualify you must be 65 years or older or 100% totally disabled through Social Security and your income must have been less than \$43,000 for a married couple \$35,300 for a single person.

The following information is needed to complete the application for the 2017 calendar year.

EXPENSES: Rent receipts, letter from landlord stating what you paid for rent in the year 2017. Utility (electric, water, oil and/ or gas) receipts or statement from utility company. You can call Eversource for a printout at 1-800-286-2000 (have account number ready).

INCOME: Social Security SSA-1099 statement or print-out from the Social Security Office, bank interest, pensions, VA benefits or any other sources of income. If you file a federal income tax return, a copy of your return is required.

If you are filing as 100% disabled, proof of disability is required every year by the State of Connecticut. A statement from social security STATING TOTALLY DISABLED OR A TPQY FROM SOCIAL SECURITY DATED FOR CURRENT YEAR stating that you were disabled the previous year.

You must have all information to file your application. Filing period is from April 1, 2018 through October 1, 2018. Appointments with the Town of Essex local office will begin in April 16. Application to the Renters Rebate Program is by appointment only. Call 860-767-4340 x201.

Essex Court & Essex Place Residents please use the appointment signup sheets will be located in the Community Room of Essex Court.

Please note that legislation allows for a reduction of renters rebate grants if claims exceed what is provided in the state budget for that program. Therefore, the estimated calculated grant may be subject to reduction.

Six years in the making, from just an idea to an actual new building, Essex Place Centerbrook, an affordable senior residence, has occupants in its 22 units. The new building was completed in September, except for the kitchen space, which was unfinished due to lack of funding. You can dispose of your prescription medication anonymously at the 24-hour locked drop box located in the lobby of the State Police Barracks at: 315 Spencer Plain Road in Westbrook.

Other tips for properly disposing of your prescriptions:

- Remove the medicine from its original container and mix it with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds or kitty litter.
- Place the mixture in a sealable bag, empty bag, or other container to prevent medicine from leaking or breaking out of the garbage bag.
- Many pharmacies have medication disposal bags that safely dispose of leftover medication.



Vietnam veteran who has been living with PTSD since his return home. Recently he took part in The Equus Effect program at High Hopes, and it has been "life-changing." This five-week program is designed to introduce the principles of natural horsemanship as a way to help vets regain trust and experience emotional regulation. "Through our equine partners vets learn to demonstrate the value of using finesse vs. force and cooperation vs. control," explains Lauren Fitzgerald, an Advanced Instructor at High Hopes and one of the program's facilitators. "Each veteran works with a peer and a clinician from the VA. Some veterans return for multiple sessions as they see the impact that horses have on their lives, families and relationships with their communities."



Regional Mental Health Board

It feels like nearly every week we're learning about another school shooting or threat. There has been lengthy discussion, often heated, regarding the issue of gun control and mental health. Proponents on each side of the debate argue which needs our attention first, with some arguing that we should address both issues concurrently. In many ways, our exposure to such devastating events has become common place. It begs examination of how we're treating each other, a reality that starts in Kindergarten and extends well into our adult lives. Recently there was a post on social media outlets challenging students to "Walk Up." The post encouraged students to consider reaching toward a classmate they would not typically talk to, sit with or engage with. A variation of the idea challenged, "Who's your 17?" In honor of the 17 lives lost during the Stoneham Douglas high school shooting.

The profiles of many school shooters include them as being bullied, troubled and isolated. These characteristics did not happen overnight. There seems to be a common thread - a lack of social connection to peers or close friends and challenging home lives. Despite signs, the rest of us wonder how that can be? How can that be? How can we miss that?

What if someone stood up ... stood out ... or pulled in this person? What difference could that have made in their decision and behavior? We all want to feel accepted, valued, and understood and yet with nearly 8 billion people in the world, many still feel alone. What will you do to change that ... even just for one person? Who's your 17?

Riding The Rails: Connecticut's Shore Line East

Connecticut commuters, as well as leisure travelers, have enjoyed the benefits of the Shore Line East (SLE) rail service over the years, but not everyone knows a lot of its history.


The line was built in the mid-nineteenth century by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad as part of the New York to Boston mainline. This local service was operated on the line between New Haven and New London until 1969. The service was then reduced to one local train that operated until 1972. Amtrak ended the local service and substituted various types of more limited local services that ran until 1981 when all local service was ended.

The State revived the service in 1990 with the current name of Shore Line East as a temporary service to local stations between New Haven and Old Saybrook, to alleviate traffic congestion from construction work on I-95. Since then, service and ridership has expanded with new stations and more trains. Shore Line East

also connects with MTA Metro-North in New Haven providing service to New York City.

Today, SLE serves over 500,000 commuters annually who travel along nine stations: New Haven Union, New Haven State Street, Branford, Guilford, Madison, Clinton, Westbrook, Old Saybrook and New London. Most stations have free parking, and there are fun surprises as well—a classic pizza eatery in the Old Saybrook station and wonderful New England scenery as SLE runs right through Rocky Neck State Park.

SLE is much more than a commuter service. Many commuters use it to visit Mystic Aquarium or Mystic Seaport, attend performances at the Garde Arts Center in New London, or visit New Haven sites like the Yale Peabody Museum or The Shubert. And Mohegan Sun runs a special free shuttle from New London right to the casino. For schedules and special attraction offers visit: ShoreLineEast.com.


Love Quest - a new comedy opening at the Ivoryton Playhouse on April 25th - explores the journeys of two women in the perilous world of online dating.





News from the Riverfront at the Connecticut River Museum



German Wines

Germany is the fourth largest wine growing country in Europe. Even though it is a big grower of grapes, it is small in comparison to the other products that are grown there. Most of the high quality wines are grown on steep slopes above the Rhine river. These vineyards need to be handpicked, which takes many extra hours. Where there are smaller portions of flat land, machines are used for harvesting.

In the 80s Liebfraumilch was one of the largest white wines exported, which brought a lot of new people into drinking wine due to the sweetness. The most popular grapes now are Riesling, Muller-Thugau, and Silvaner.

One of the most difficult things about German wines is understanding the label. One item that is always on the label is the region. There are thirteen winemaking regions in Germany. The four major wine regions are Mosel, Pfalz, Reingau, Rheinhessen.

You might also see words like Kabinett, Spatlese, Auslese, Trocken, Beerenauslese, Trockenbeernauslese, and Eiswein. Trocken meaning dry. In a Riesling you get a dry crisp wine if this term is on the label. Kabinett is picked during normal harvest which leads to a semi dry or dry wine. Spatlese means picked late, hence these wine are a little sweeter. Auslese is a process that the fullest ripe grapes are picked, which results in a fuller, slightly sweeter wine. With the Beerenauslese method the best grapes are hand picked to produce a juicy sweeter wine of slightly better quality. Trockenbeernauslese is similar to that of Beerenauslese but the grapes are dried so they become raisny and hence produces a sweeter and more intense wine, which is usually expensive.

Lastly, one other type of wine is Eiswein. This is a process of freezing the grapes on the vine, they are then pressed while they are frozen which makes for a concentrated wine with sweet fruit, also classified as a dessert wine.

Hopefully this will give you a better understanding of German wines and make it easier to pick out the wine you desire from Germany. With the variety of the wine making processes you can purchase a Riesling from bone dry to intensely sweet. Have fun with your next selection of German wines, as they will prove to be a tasty accompaniment to the upcoming holidays.




