


The First Selectman's Corner

On April 10 Guilford residents will go to the polls to vote on the 2018-2019 budget. The Board of Finance approved a budget totaling \$97,460,807, which represents a 2.39% spending increase over the current budget and after providing for potential decreases in revenue from the state would result in a property tax increase of \$2,382,870 or 2.67%. Due to this being a revaluation year, it makes it more difficult for property owners to realize the true effect of the tax increase on their individual assessment. A calculation tool has been provided on the town website within the budget information section to help residents calculate the impact of this budget on their individual tax payments.

The Town of Guilford has applied for a grant from the Connecticut Department of Housing. If awarded, the grant will provide \$400,000 in 0% interest loans to eligible low- and moderate-income Guilford residents to make needed health and safety improvements to their homes. Eligible repairs under the program include electrical and plumbing upgrades; ADA modifications; windows, door, and roof replacements; septic repairs, energy improvements, and other types of improvements. To be eligible, property owners must satisfy three criteria: have 10% equity in home; be up-to-date on local taxes, and be income eligible based on 2017 HUD income limits (e.g., income less than \$47,600 for a one-person household or \$68,000 for a 4-person household). The application process includes submitting

an application in April. The town generally hears results of application submissions in July. If awarded, the town implements the application as written, generally with the assistance of a consultant hired for the purpose.

The Board of Selectmen has enacted an ordinance to prohibit hydraulic fracturing and extrac-

tion waste in the town. A total of 34 communities in the state have approved such ordinances. The next step is to amend the town's purchasing policy to put protections in place to make sure materials the town acquires are free from this type of waste.

The Town of Guilford is initiating a new Safe Streets Mobility Plan (SSMP). This plan will build upon and update the Town's 2002 Transportation Plan and will reflect the changes in development trends, transportation patterns and community preferences that have emerged over the past decade and a half. It will be prepared by a new Safe Streets Mobility Plan Committee through a year-long, "bottom up" process with extensive input from Town residents, and with technical assistance from a transportation continued on page 3

consultant. We have received interest from over a dozen citizens who would like to participate and we will soon be announcing the formation of the committee.

The Town has been awarded a \$50,000 grant from the State of Connecticut Department of Housing for a Phase II feasibility study on the Woodruff/Driveway Property to determine if the site is suitable for an affordable housing development. Once the study is completed, town officials will decide whether or not to pursue a project. This potential project is in the very early stages and if it goes forward there will be many required approvals from various boards and numerous opportunities for public input.

After a difficult end to winter, I am sure we are all looking forward to spring. I want to thank our Public Works, Police, Fire and Parks and Recreation Departments for all their hard work during the several severe weather events we experienced. With the warmer weather comes all our wonderful spring and summer events.

Town Clerk's Office

The annual Budget Referendum will be held on Tuesday, April 10, 2018. Absentee Ballots become available on Wednesday, April 4, the day after the Annual Budget Meeting. An application must be filled out in order to receive a ballot and these are available in the Town Clerk's office. Ballots can NOT be mailed for a referendum. If you are unable to come in person to fill out an application for a ballot then a family member or caregiver can pick up an application for you. You must then fill out the application and designate this person to pick up the ballot for you. Ballots must be returned by April 10, the day of the Referendum, in order to be counted.

June is Dog License month in the State of Connecticut. We usually have the licenses prepared and ready to issue about mid-May. When you receive your annual renewal notice in the mail you may come in person to pick up your dog's license or you may mail it in. Dogs do not need to be licensed until they are six months old. The fee for a spayed or neutered dog is \$8.00 and unspayed, unneutered animals are \$19.00. We will need to see a current rabies certificate. Check your renewal notice before you come in to make sure your dog's rabies vaccination has not expired according to our records. We will also need to see a certificate stating that the dog has been spayed or neutered. There is a late fee of \$1.00 per month after June 30.

Marriage license applications are now

available online. To access them go to www.ci.guilford.ct.us and go to Town Clerk under Town Departments. A list of Guilford Justices of the Peace is also available. The fee for a marriage license is \$30.00 and the license is good for 65 days from the date of issue. Both parties need to appear and present I.D. (driver's license or passport). Once the marriage has been performed and the license has been returned to the Town Clerk's office you obtain a certified copy of the marriage license for a fee of \$20.00. Applications for certified copies of births, deaths and marriages are also available online.

Shellfish licenses may also be obtained from the Town Clerk's office. The fee for continued on page 6



an annual resident license (calendar year) is \$25.00 and a senior license (65+) is \$15.00. An annual non-resident license is \$75.00 and a non-resident senior license

is \$65.00. A non-resident daily pass can also be purchased for \$25.00. Applicants must provide I.D. and proof of residence. Payment is cash or check only. The licenses may also be obtained from the Lobster Pound, Captain Morgan's in Madison or a member of the Shellfish Commission.

Registrars of Voters

VOTE - VOTE - VOTE

Tuesday, April 10, 2018: Town Budget Referendum, vote at your regular polling place from 7:00 am until 8:00 pm.

Again this year, the Registrars of Voters will be conducting an annual Canvass through June. All voters with an active forwarding address order on file with the US Postal Service will be targeted to receive Canvass letters from our office. Additionally, voters for whom we have received information that they no longer reside in Guilford will also receive Canvass Letters. Also those individuals who have not voted in the last four years will be getting a letter, just to make sure you still live in Guilford! Please return these letters to us (using the enclosed prepaid return address envelope).

If you do not indicate that you still remain in Guilford, we will start the process of removing you from our voter registry. The first step in that process is to put you into 'inactive' status.

DO NOT RISK YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE – please answer these letters!

Assessor's Office

Elderly tax relief applications will be taken in the Assessor's Office, between February 1st and May 15th during the hours of 9:00 am and 4:00 pm, Monday through Friday. If you are unable to come in, an agent of your choice may file on your behalf. Please bring all proofs of income for both spouses (for the year 2017), including (but not limited to) your Federal Income Tax Return (if you file or will file), your Social Security (SSA-1099 Form) annual statements, statements of pension, interest or dividends, etc. All information must be in English and U.S. dollars.

HOMEOWNERS PROGRAM, A.K.A. CIRCUIT BREAKER (STATE PROGRAM)

Under this program, the State of Connecticut pays a portion of your tax bill ranging from \$150 to \$1,250. There is no requirement to re-pay the state.

The basic requirements are as follows:

1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date;



- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year;
- 3. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state;
- 4. The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; and
- 5. The homeowner must have income (including Social Security) of not more than \$35,300 for a single individual or \$43,000 for a married couple.

TAX DEFERRAL, A.K.A. GSTRP (TOWN PROGRAM)

This program allows you to "defer" up to 75% of your taxes (depending upon income) until either the property is transferred or at the time of your death (at which time the taxes must be re-paid with interest). The deferred taxes constitute a lien on your property.

The basic requirements are as follows:

- 1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from social security as of that date;
- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Connecticut for at least one year;
- 3. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state;

- 4. The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence; and
- 5. The homeowner must have income (including social security) of not more than \$37,300 for a single individual or \$45,000 for a married couple.

ELDERLY TAX RELIEF PROGRAM, A.K.A. ETRP (TOWN PROGRAM)

Under this program, the Town attempts to "freeze" your taxes subject to budgetary restrictions and the requirements of the enabling ordinance.

The basic requirements are as follows:

- 1. The homeowner must be at least 65 years of age as of last December 31st or was receiving 100% disability benefits from Social Security as of that date;
- 2. The homeowner must have lived in Guilford for at least one year;
- 3. The homeowner must occupy the property as their principal residence;
- 4. The homeowner, if eligible, must be on the State Program known as Circuit Breaker (see above);
- 5. The homeowner must not owe any taxes (including motor vehicles);

- 6. The homeowner must not be receiving tax relief from any other town or state;
- 7. The homeowner cannot be on both the town's tax deferral and this program; and
- 8. The homeowner's income is based upon residency (as follows):

9 to 20 Years	\$62,500	\$75,000
21+ Years	\$79,000	\$95,000

Economic Development Department

As we enter the second quarter of 2018, we truly hope spring is in the air and the trees and flowers are in bloom. Although we had a few issues during the winter, I think most would agree we have experienced more severe conditions in the past.

Economic activity continues to evolve. The Guilford Coffee House, located in the CVS Plaza, opened for business serving breakfast and lunch daily. Cate's Sew Modern opened at 50 York Street (former Blue Moon Artisan), offering a wide range of sewing products, accessories, materials, including sewing lessons. It is good to have growing businesses locally and two moved to support their needs. The House of Fashion relocated to 23 Water Street (essential-

ly behind their former location) in the building that includes ECHO Hair Salon, Hen & Heifer Bakery, and the Country Grocer Natural Foods. Barnum Financial moved to 800 Boston Post Road (Patriot Center). Carson's Restaurant, located at 2 Water Street went through an ownership change and is now operated as Amarone. They offer a diverse menu with many

Italian specialties. After operating La Rosticceria for 15 years in Guilford, the owners decided to retire and close their business. We thank them for being part of our community and wish them well as they enjoy their retirement. However, a new business, CT Lunch, will open in their space at 500 Village Walk. CT Lunch expects to open in the May timeframe. The Guilford Yacht Club pursued a change in our zoning regulations through our Planning & Zoning Commission that would allow a public restaurant in the MR 1 Zone. P & Z conducted two public hearings on the issue and then approved the zoning amendment. Stay tuned, we may see the GYC open a restaurant in the coming months available to the public.

Not only is Guilford a great place to live, work and shop, but it is also recognized as a tourist destination. Many come to enjoy our history, museums, arts, trails, water activities, restaurants, shops, cultural events and more. 



The Big Sleep Out

LOCAL TEEN ORGANIZES SLEEP OUT TO RAISE AWARENESS OF HOMELESSNESS

On Saturday, April 28, Guilford will host The Big Sleep Out on the Guilford Green. Spearheaded by Ella Stanley, a sophomore at Guilford High School, the event aims to draw attention to homelessness, particularly in the New Haven area, which has fourteen percent of Connecticut's homeless people. It will also raise funds for Columbus House, a New Haven organization that

has been helping the homeless for 35 years. Today it serves over 3,000 individuals.

Guilford residents are invited to team up, bring a sleeping bag and get comfortable on the hard ground—no cookouts, toasted marshmallows or scary tales. Instead, participants can attend any of the six workshops and presentations that will take place in the churches around the Green. They include a documentary by Teddi Stanley, "People Who Are Homeless," and speakers from Columbus House programs.

A sleep out center will be located in in the middle of the Green, and security will be provided during sleeping hours. St. George Church will provide a soup kitchen in the hall. Sleep Out

participants will receive wristbands, allowing them entrance to the sleep out center, soup kitchen, workshops and presentations.

For the past four years, Stanley has taken part in Abraham's Tent, an outreach project of Columbus House, where a dozen homeless men are invited to overnight in St. George Church Hall for one week each year. Parishioners provide meals and conversation.

Such sleep outs are well known in other parts of the world, especially the UK and Australia, where the Down Under country has hosted them for three decades. They are gaining momentum in the United States.

To help her in her endeavor, Stanley has enlisted the sponsorship of Columbus House, as well as the aid of clergy and community volunteers: Rev. Dr. Ginger Brasher-Cunningham, John Brooks, Laurie Desmet, Sheree DiMario, Harry Huben, Elizabeth Kozarec, Tony Sicignano, Rev. Stephen Sledesky, Francine Wainer, and Rev. Harrison West.

SACHEM'S HEAD COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE CEREMONY MAY 19, 2018

The Guilford Preservation Alliance endorsed and financially supported (*Huge McK. Jones Memorial Fund**) this event as part of its mission to preserve the history of our Town. You are invited to attend and witness this commemorative ceremony.



One of the most successful actions during the American Revolution by Connecticut troops was launched from Guilford in the spring of 1777. In retaliation for the burning of Danbury by British troops earlier that year, Lieutenant Colonel Return Jonathan Meigs conducted a daring counter-attack on the British supply outpost at Sag Harbor, New York. Commencing May 23, 1777, 170 Connecticut men departed from Sachem's Head Harbor. Using whaleboats (small boats used to hunt whales) they rowed across Long Island Sound, avoiding British ships patrolling the coast. Under the darkness of the night, they safely arrived at Sag Harbor, and at 2 am commenced the surprise attack. During the engagement with the enemy, not a single patriot was killed or wounded; twelve British ships were destroyed, supplies confiscated, and 96 prisoners captured. Congress recognized the "Prudence, Activity, Enterprise and Valor" in which the successful 25-hour expedition was conducted. Lt. Col. Meigs was awarded a ceremonial sword for leading the action, which today rests at the Smithsonian Institution.

Local resident Craig Reynolds is spearheading the efforts to install a plaque commemorating the attack, known as in the history books as "Meigs Raid" at Sachem's Head. Mr. Reynolds is a corporal in the recreated 6th Connecticut Regiment, a living history group that portrays the Revolutionary War army unit commanded by Lt. Col. Meigs. "The towns historic role in this important moment in the Revolutionary War isn't well known,"

said Mr. Reynolds. "After 240 years we felt it was important to raise the profile of this important event." The commemorative plaque will be revealed during a ceremony on Saturday, May 19, 2018, at 11:00 am at "The Landing," lower Colonial Road, Guilford, Connecticut (with a rain date on Sunday, May 20th, 11:00 am). The public is invited to attend. Parking is recommended along Colonial Road and Uncas Point Road, with limited parking for persons with disabilities closest to the event. The Community Center bus will be able to transport 20 people from the Community Center, leaving there at 10:30 and returning after the ceremony. The first white child born (1639) in Guilford, Connecticut, was John Leete, the second child of William and Anne (Payne) Leete. Some of the names Guilford parents gave their children in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries were Increase, Prosper, Comfort, Friend, Wait, and Jehosaphat, if you were a boy. If you were a girl, you might have been named Mindwell, Obedience, Submit, Silence, Prudence, Thankful, Temperance or Freelove. If a child died young, it was not uncommon to give the same name to a later child.

Spring is Here!

Spring is here, and while most of us made New Year's resolutions, it can be just as important, and much more rewarding, to make New Garden resolutions. These can include practicing organic lawn care techniques, planting for pollinators, growing your own herbs, or supporting CT grown produce, plants and nursery stock.

For many of us, our lawn is an important feature in our landscape. Keeping one's lawn healthy, green and strong can be achieved with organic lawn care. A soil test, sent to the CT Agricultural Experimental Station, is the first step. Correcting soil pH and deficiencies with lime and organic fertilizer is critical, as healthy soil promotes healthy grass. Mowing at 3" height helps to shade out weeds and prevents scorching in hot, dry weather.

Planting for pollinators can start as soon as the soil is workable. Pansies, primroses and perennial creeping phlox can provide the spring bridge to all the summer flowing annuals and perennials. Try to include some native plants and some single-form flowers in

your summer garden plans. Don't forget to plant crocus and early spring flowering bulbs in September.

Growing your own herbs is easy and satisfying. A few pots on your kitchen windowsill, a mixed planter on the deck, or a row of plants in the garden can supply you with fresh herbs until frost. Mint, lemon balm, and chamomile can add a new flavor dimension to your tea.

Finally, resolve to support CT farmers and producers of local products. Produce tastes best from your own garden or from your local farm market. 

What is Glaucoma?

Glaucoma is the result of elevated pressure within the eye. There is a constant production of fluid within the eye called aqueous humor. High pressures within the eye develop when this fluid is not able to drain properly. This pressure increase can cause damage to the optic nerve, resulting in loss of vision. Glaucoma can also result in a significant amount of pain and discomfort for our furry family members.

WHAT CAUSES GLAUCOMA?

There are two type of glaucoma - primary and secondary. Dogs and cats with primary glaucoma have an anatomical abnormality within the eye which is commonly inherited and can occur spontaneously. Unfortunately, there is no specific age of onset for this form of glaucoma. Secondary glaucoma can develop as a consequence of another disease process within the eye.

IS YOUR PET AT RISK?

Although there is no way to predict if or when glaucoma will develop in our pets, certain breeds are predisposed to developing primary glaucoma. These breeds include:


