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## The First Selectman's Corner

I am happy to report that the Town ended fiscal year 2017-2018 with an unaudited estimated surplus of \$618,000. Credit goes to Town employees for the excellent management of their department budgets. The surplus can be attributed to our aggressive prior year tax collections as well as revenues from our building and engineering fees due to our ongoing successes in economic development.

Once again, we are delighted to report that Standard & Poor's Rating Services has reaffirmed the Town's "AAA" credit rating, which is its highest rating. Supporting its decision, Standard & Poor's credited the Town's strong management and budgetary performance, which is evident by its past nine years of continued surpluses and increasing unassigned reserves, as supporting its highest rating. The Town on August 1st went out to market to bond \$12 million in long-term bonds and \$3.2 million in short term notes. A rate of 2.92% was received for the long-term notes and 1.84% on the short term notes. The rating report also mentioned the town's continuing economic development, which provides additional diversity and growth to the tax base.

The Energy Task Force has been re-established by the Board of Selectmen and has already started working toward its goal of making Guilford a Certified Sustainable Connecticut community. In addition, the committee will also work with local groups advocating for a town ordinance banning single use plastic bags. The Bring Your Own (BYO) group is encouraging stores to offer paper bags only, with the ultimate goal of having people bring their own reusable bags when shopping.

The Town and Board of Education is in the process of

rolling out ClearGov profiles. This is a transparency and benchmarking platform with easy to understand profiles of the Town and Board of Education budgets. Residents will be able to get a clearer picture of finances and see how our town compares to other towns as well. We hope this will allow people to be more informed and involved with the budget preparation process.

During this summer the Public Works Department prepared and chip sealed 6.8 miles of roads south of Route 1. Workers installed drainage and paved Old Sachem Head Road from Indian Road to Uncas Point Road. Crews also took down more than 140 trees around Town. As winter approaches the focus will now shift to storm preparedness and cleanup. **continued on page 3**



**PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATIONS** for any business/ business owner, farmer, any owner of an unregistered or out of state registered motor vehicle or owner of a horse(s), must be filed by November 1st. Penalties will be applied to non-filed declarations. Additional information is available on the Town's website and the Declaration can be found at: www.ci.guilford. ct.us/town-departments/personal-property.htm.

**QUADRENNIAL REPORT** for new organizations seeking tax exempt status must file their initial Quadrennial Report by November 1st, 2018 to be considered. Amended Quadrennial's are also due for organizations that have acquired Real Estate, Personal Property and/or Motor Vehicles between October 2, 2017 and October 1, 2018.

The following is an abbreviated look at some of the Exemption Programs that the Guilford Assessor's Office administers. If you think you might be eligible for any of these programs, please call the Assessor's Office, Monday through Friday, 9:00 am to 4:00 pm for more information. There is also additional information about these programs (and other important information) on the Town's website: www.ci.guilford.ct.us under Departments; Assessor's Office. Please note: Exemptions are always stated in assessment dollars. To calculate the actual tax savings, multiply the assessment exemption amount by the appropriate mill rate (e.g., the assessment exemption amount is \$1,000 and say the mill rate is 31.28 so the tax savings is \$31.28 or \$1,000 times 0.03128.)

**FARM MACHINERY (STATE PROGRAM)** which is used exclusively by a qualifying farmer may qualify for a \$100,000 assessment exemption. An M-28 Form must be filed no later than November 1, 2018 along with a Personal Property Declaration.

**FARM MACHINERY (LOCAL PROGRAM)** which is used exclusively by a farmer, who qualifies for the above described program, may be eligible for an additional \$100,000 assessment exemption. An M-28 Form must be filed no later than November 1, 2018 along with a Personal Property Declaration.

**FARM BUILDINGS (LOCAL PROGRAM)** which are used exclusively for farming activities by farmers, who are receiving an exemption for their farm equipment [See FARM MACHIN-ERY (STATE PROGRAM) Above] are eligible for an assessment exemption of \$100,000 for certain eligible farm buildings. An application must be filed no later than November 1, 2018 along with a Personal Property Declaration.

**FARM, FOREST OR OPEN SPACE (STATE PROGRAMS)** applications must be filed between September 1, 2018 and **continued on page 6**

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



October 31, 2018. For Forest Land, a State Forester's Report must accompany application and be dated by September 1st.

#### ONE SPECIALLY EQUIPPED OR SIGNIFICANTLY MODIFIED MOTOR VEHICLE (LOCAL OPTION)

if owned by the applicant as of October 1, 2018 and used exclusively for the purpose of transporting the medically incapacitated owner and if such vehicle is not for hire and the required application is filed with the Assessor's Office by November 1, 2018; or for such motor vehicles purchased after October 1, 2018, within 30 days of purchase.

**ONE MOTOR VEHICLE FOR AN ACTIVE DUTY SERVICEMAN (STATE PROGRAM)** Applications must be filed no later than December 31, 2018 for taxes due and payable July 2017.

**DISABLED SERVICEMEN OR EX-SERVICEMEN (STATE PROGRAM)** may apply for an additional exemption by filing Form 20-5455a (issued by the Veterans Administration) with the Assessor's Office by March 31, 2019. The amount of the assessment exemption will vary depending on the degree of disability. If you have previously been granted an exemption due to your disability, then you do not have to re-apply.

**The State Election** will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 2018 and Absentee Ballots become available on Friday, October 5th. An application must be filled out in order to receive a ballot and these are available in the Town Clerk's office. The applications are also available on the Town of Guilford website under the Town Clerk Department. They can be mailed in and a ballot will be sent to the address that is designated on the application as soon as the ballots become available. Ballots must be returned by November 6th, the day of the election, in order to be counted.

June is Dog License month in the State of Connecticut but you can purchase a license for a newly acquired dog all year long. Dogs do not need to be licensed until they are six months old. The fee for a spayed or neutered dog is \$8.00 and unspayed, unneutered animals are \$19.00. We will need to see a current rabies certificate. We will also need to see a certificate stating that the dog has been spayed or neutered. For dog license renewals there is a late fee of \$1.00 per month after June 30. If your dog has lost his tag, a replacement tag may be obtained for fifty cents. **Marriage license** applications are now available online. To access them go to: www.ci.guilford.ct.us and go to Town Clerk under Town Departments. A list of Guilford Justices of the Peace is also available. The fee for a marriage license is \$50.00 and the license is good for 65 days from the date of issue. Both parties need to appear and present I.D. (driver's license or passport). Once the marriage has been performed and the license has been returned to the Town Clerk's office you obtain a certified copy of the marriage license for a fee of \$20.00. Applications for certified copies of births, deaths and marriages are also available online.

**Shellfish licenses** may also be obtained from the Town Clerk's office. The fee for an annual resident license (calendar year) is \$25.00 and a senior license (65+) is \$15.00. An annual non-resident license is \$75.00 and a non-resident senior license is \$65.00. A non-resident daily pass can also be purchased for \$25.00. Applicants must provide I.D. and proof of residence. Payment is cash or check only. The licenses may also be obtained from the Lobster Pound, Captain Morgan's in Madison or a member of the Shellfish Commission.

## THE TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE OFFERS NOTARY SERVICES.

The fee for each notarization is \$5.00, cash or check only, and I.D. is required. We cannot notarize wills, deeds that will be recorded on the Guilford land records, or I-9 forms.

**THE UPCOMING ELECTION & WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW!** On November 6, 2018 Guilford (and the entire state) will be voting for a new governor for that state of Connecticut. In addition, we will be voting for our US Senator, US Representative, four constitutional state officers, State Senator, State Representative, Judge of Probate and Registrar of Voters (see below for a fuller description of the ballot.) Please vote at your usual polling place which will be opened from 6:00 am until 8:00 pm. Please see the Registrar of Voters section in the website for town of Guilford at: www.ci.guilford.ct.us, for information on your exact voting place.

#### Make sure you are registered to vote THE DEADLINE IS OCTOBER 30, 2018. DO IT SOONER RATHER THAN LATER. HERE'S HOW: Online Registration


and/or party affiliation, online (to change/add online you must have a current, valid Connecticut Driver's License with your Guilford address). The process is very easy. One path is to go into the Town of Guilford's website at: www.ci.guilford.ct.us, choose Registrar of Voters from the Town Department list and then "Register to Vote Online" which is located on the left side of that page. Another way is through the Secretary of the State's website at: www.sots.ct.gov, choosing the Elections and Voting tab. A third, and the best way, is to go directly to the website: www.voterregistration.ct.gov. Online registration is available 24/7 until Tuesday, October 30, 2018.

#### DMV

When creating, updating or renewing your Connecticut drivers you will now be given the option to register to vote (if you are not already a registered voter in Connecticut), or to change your current voter registration. This is a process to streamline the voter registration system - one-stop shopping.

#### **ELECTION DAY REGISTRATION**

If by any chance you have not been able to register to vote before November 6, 2018, you may come to our office, register to vote, and receive a ballot on Election Day. We highly recommend that Election Day Registration be your last option. Your voting experience will be many times smoother if you complete your voter registration by October 30, 2018. On that day, the Registrars will be in their office

to receive applications for voter registration until 8:00 pm.

#### A DESCRIPTION OF THE BALLOT

You can expect to see a very full ballot this November. There are eleven separate races - two federal (US Senator and Congressional Representative); seven State (Governor/ Lt. Governor, Secretary of State, Comptroller, Treasurer, Attorney General, State Senator and State Representative); two local (Judge of Probate and Registrar of Voters). For each race Democratic and Republican candidates will be on the first two lines of the ballot. Minor party endorsements for the major party candidates will be on the next two lines. Unique candidate from minor parties will follow, if there are any. Petitioning candidates with no party endorsement will be next. The bottom line for the ballots will provide space to vote for write-in candidates. A list of certified write-in candidates for each race will be available at each polling place.

#### Other Useful Information ABSENTEE BALLOTS

All absentee ballot processing is handled by the TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE. If you know you will not be in Guilford on Election Day, November 6, you can submit an application for an absentee ballot to the Town Clerk right now and a ballot will be mailed to you by the Town Clerk when they become available on October 5, 2018. In order to be counted, completed absentee ballots must be received by the Town Clerk's office by the end of Election Day (8:00pm), November 6, 2018. If you have further questions regarding absentee ballots please call the Town Clerk's office at: 203-453-8001.

#### **CURBSIDE VOTING**

Curbside Voting is available if, for any reason, you cannot walk into your polling place on Election Day. Two poll workers will come to your vehicle and give you a ballot to fill out. Please call the Registrar of Voters office at: 203-453-8028 when you are ready to go to the polls so we can set the process in motion and save you time when you get to the polling place.

#### PERMANENT ABSENTEE STATUS

We would like to remind you of the availability of permanent absentee ballot status. Here's how it works: If you have a disability which prevents you from going to your polling place to vote you may file a request for an absentee ballot and include with that request a letter from your physician which states that your physical condition prevents you from going to the polls to vote. From then on the Town Clerk will automatically send you a ballot for every election, primary, and referendum, which you can fill out and return by mail. Every year we will send you a letter asking you to confirm the accuracy of your address.

In past issues, we have commented on many new construction/major renovations occurring throughout Guilford. 

#### SACHEM'S HEAD PLAQUE DEDICATION

The plaque to commemorate a raid to destroy a British supply depot at Sag Harbor, N.Y. under the command of Lt. Col. Return Jonathan Meigs, which commenced from Sachems Head on May 23, 1777, was dedicated and unveiled on Saturday, August 18. Those present included Regiment members from the 6th CT, 5th CT, 9th Regiment of Foot, Lebanon Militia, Pawlings Levies, Hearts of Oak Independent Militia in addition to members from the SAR, DAR and CAR, 1st Selectman Matthew Hoey, and many from the public. The ceremony began with re-enactors marching in among fife and drum music. The Chester (the first National Anthem sung by New England troops as they marched into battle) was performed. The history of the raid was provided by Capt. Richard Swartwout (6CR), an essay written by E.C. Adams Middle School student, Matthey Kotzbauer was read, and proclamations from the Town of Guilford and from Governor Malloy were presented by Matthew Hoey. Tracy Tomaselli was made an honorary member of the 6th CT. The ceremony concluded with a musket salute, and the unveiling of the plaque by Craig Reynolds, Lt. Ross Kenney, and Tracy Tomaselli. After the ceremony, refreshments, provided by the Marketplace and Big Y, were served.

#### ORIGIN OF THE CHRISTMAS TREE ON THE GUILFORD GREEN

In 1916, the annual Christmas festivities were held at the Guilford Grange. A large number of members attended who thoroughly enjoyed the evening, a large Christmas tree loaded with gifts as the special attraction. Mr. Samuel Blatchley and Miss Bertha Benton, who acted as Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus, created much merriment in the distribution of presents. In 1917, Guilford would have its first community Christmas tree. The people of Guilford wanted to make it their purpose to awaken the real Christmas spirit and send forth a message of goodwill in spite of the sadness of the country being at war. They wished their "Tree of Light" to stand as an expression of the highest and noblest sentiment of the town. An article in the Shore Line Times urged the townsfolk to join in, stating:

"It will do our spirits good if we will gather in a neighborly way, it will cost some effort no doubt, but it will be worth the effort just to be neighborly and when we all raise our continued on page 18

feeling an ownership [with] it."

happy voices proclaiming good will to man, if we catch the contagion of it it will make us feel as if we would rather be good than bad, that we would rather give than be given to, that we would like to be of service to others and to our country. So come every one gay, lonely, sad, rich and poor all and help - your presence will mean that, and as the church bells finish their call and the star flashes its light, all join the summons to mankind "Oh! come all ye faithful" to be followed by other carols, after which bands of carolers will form, carrying the tidings of cheer to the sick and shut- ins, leaving we hope a real joy behind them. This is to be a community tree each one

The town paid for the lights, different citizens agreed to furnish and set up the tree, and another contributed a large double electric star to cast its pure white light from the very top of the tree. The weather leading up to Christmas Eve was ideal, the air crisp with frost and the ground covered with snow. But when it was most needed for a typical Christmas Eve celebration, the temperature suddenly changed and rain began to fall just as the exercises commenced. However, the beautiful spirit of celebration was manifested as 200 people, of many ages, gathered. Many were the exclamations of delight when the colored lights were turned on, while all the bells in the borough churches rung out joyfully. The Liberty Chorus sang a number of Christmas carols, though the program was not completed on account of the rain. Selectman Stowe made a short address, explaining that there might be some gathered about the tree who would not go to church, so the church had been brought to them. He extended an invitation to all to attend services in Christ Church immediately after the exercises at the tree. Due to the storm, visits by the carolers to the homes of shut-ins was postponed until Christmas night at which time, the temperature having become much colder, about twenty-five singers in automobiles visited 27 homes carrying song and good cheer which was thoroughly appreciated by invalids, aged, and others unable to attend church service. On January 4, 1923, the Shore Line Times reported the Christmas tree on the green a success. "The entire community wish to thank all who in any way helped in making the community Christmas tree, under the direction of Darrow Post, a success, and especially to the men who cut and selected such a beautiful tree. It could not have been improved. It has been illuminated each evening from Christmas Night until New Year's Night. It is hoped that this custom will continue to be carried on from year to year, showing the real Christmas spirit of Guilford."

This lovely custom revived in Guilford by Darrow Post No. 48, American Legion, took on permanency in 1924. In December of that year, conservation of the evergreen and insurance of continuance of the custom throughout future generations prompted the selection of a live tree, with its roots attached, to be planted on the green to serve as the community Christmas tree. Samuel D. Blatchley of Nut Plains, provided a seedling from the Vermont fir trees located in the Nut Plains Cemetery which the cemetery association had purchased circa 1870. The tree was transplant-ed under the direction of Tree Warden Herbert E. Jones and Post members, in the hope that it would grow through the many years of summer sun and winter snow, its shadow ever increasing and its mission fulfilled each Christmas. At the 1924 Christmas Eve ceremony, as in 1917, the weather did not cooperate. With mud underfoot and fog in the air, carols were sung in the Legion Hall. The following year, on Christmas Eve 1925, a pageant plus carol singing was staged at the tree. When the 1938 hurricane caused "many elms on the green to fall like matchsticks", this symbolic community tree remained unyielding throughout the storm. Samuel D. Blatchley's daughter, Mary, recalled, that at the time it was planted. Poetically written in the Times in an article by Phil Dudley:

"Every year now is adding to the little tree's stature. Each Christmastide its increased growth is to be noted. Each passing Christmas henceforth will find a varying community group assembled about the beloved tree, though the carols sung will remain unaltered. Years will pass and the time will come when only the oldest inhabitant will recall that remote date when the young tree was planted... "Then grow on, little fir tree. Lift up thy head toward the stars and open thy branches to the friendly breezes! Cast a friendly shade in the heat of summer and spread thy friendly boughs of green in the white winter! For thy destiny is determined and thy mission to men is established. Thou shalt see the snows of many winters, and hear the Christmas carols of many generations, O Christmas Tree of Guilford Town." Spurred on by this exhortation, plus Sam Blatchley's annual application native bovine fertilizer the little tree indeed "grew on." And, by 1965, the tree had grown so tall that putting lights on it was a "king-size job." In 1972, Richard Dudley proposed that the town light a different tree that had grown into beautiful proportions. This tree, donated by Floyd Hunter, Sr., and planted about eleven years prior, lay north to the one previously used for so many years. The Board of Selectmen light this smaller tree with small white lights thus conforming to the "lone white candle" concept which had gained wide recognition in the community.

The Christmas tree, planted in 1924, still stands on the green. Standing tall and within view of the current Christmas tree (located across from the town hall), and with its long branches are no longer decorated with lights during the Christmas season.

## **Five Garden Myths**

#### MYTH # 1

#### It's October... it's too late to plant.

This is a great time to plant perennials, trees and shrubs. Fall plantings have the advantage of establishing roots in cool temperatures, accompanied by usually abundant rainfall. They are ready to grow as soon as soil and air temperatures warm in the spring.

The good root system developed in the fall will help the plants to be more resilient to the first summer heat and drought than their just planted spring counterparts. Of course, mums and spring flowering bulbs should also be planted now.

#### MYTH #2

#### It's too late to fertilize.

For trees, shrubs, and vines, September through mid-October is a preferred time to fertilize. Even though the above ground portion of the plant is approaching dormancy, the roots are still actively growing. An organic based, low nitrogen fertilizer is most effective, as it has a slow release of nutrients. Younger plants need proportionately more fertilizer than old, established plants. Time your fertilizer before a rain storm, or water thoroughly. Lawns benefit from fall lime and fertilizer application. It is best to lime first, then wait three weeks before fertilizing.

#### MYTH #3

#### Pollinators aren't active in the fall.

Yes the monarchs (and most other butterflies) are gone. But honeybees, some native bees, flies, and beetles are still active. It is important to plan your landscape to include some late blooming perennials and woody ornamentals to ensure the pollinators can find food into the fall.

#### MYTH #4

## Deer, squirrels, and chipmunks eat my bulbs and flowers.

When in doubt, plant daffodils! These

hardy bulbs naturalize and multiply in the garden. Neither the bulbs nor the flowers are a favored food of deer or rodents. They are easy to grow, satisfying, and stand up to the "spring surprise" of inclement weather and late snowstorms.

#### MYTH #5

#### Leaves are bad for my lawn.

In fact, leaves are a good source of nutrients, trace elements, and organic matter for your lawn. They do, however, need to be mulched, which can be easily accomplished with your regular lawn mowing routine.

Research by scientists at the Ag Station have shown that oak leaves do not adversely affect the pH of the soil, and are just as beneficial as maple or other "sweet" trees.



## Connecticut Cancer Foundation - John & Jane Ellis by Sigrid Kun

## An enduring promise to help Connecticut cancer patients and their families.

The story of John and Jane Ellis is one of love, inspiration and dedication. She says he had the vision. He says she's the angel who does everything. Together, they are strong individuals who never wavered since John made a most solemn promise.

Born in New London, John was a high school standout in football and baseball. He went on to a 13-year major league baseball career. The catcher debuted in 1969 with the New York Yankees (1969-1972), hitting a home run in his first at bat. He also played for the Cleveland Indians (1973-1975) and Texas Rangers (1976-1981).

Jane and John were married in 1988. A routine life insurance examination revealed a spot. He had been a picture of health jogging 10 miles a day. At age 38, the 1971 Topps All-Star Rookie had Hodgkin's lymphoma. He had already lost a brother, sister and sister-in-law, each to cancer. "Sitting there in the hole, getting your juice, and breaking it down. I made a deal," explains John. "If you let me live, I'm going to do this. I said I'd dedicate my whole life to the needs of the needy."

That was 1987. Together, the couple started a foundation whose mission has remained steadfast - to provide financial assistance to Connecticut cancer patients and their families and to fund cancer research. He is the Chairman/Founder. She is the President and Executive Director. The formula is simple. Many individuals affected by cancer struggle with basic living necessities. The foundation is there to help.

Oncology social workers in Connecticut provide referrals to the foundation. Applications are reviewed each Monday, with grants made within a week - an unheard of turnaround. If there is an emergency, they will do what they can right away. "It's all local. "You know where the money is going and that makes us unique," notes Jane. To date, the foundation has provided almost \$6 million in financial assistance to CT families and over \$2 million to lymphoma research. A \$7 million endowment ensures its future.

Their signature fundraiser is an annual celebrity dinner first held in 1988 at the Groton Motor Inn. Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford and Billy Martin were there. "It was like a group of friends, getting together and telling stories," relates Jane. "It was special." The event raised \$100,000. At the end of the evening, Mickey observed "I hope this foundation goes on forever."

The event has grown markedly and is now hosted by a key corporate partner, Mohegan Sun. The next celebrity dinner will be held on February 8, 2019. The list of attendees are a testament to the relationships/trust that the couple forged over the years: Don Zimmer (who once released John), Yogi Berra, Derek Jeter, David Oritz, Hank Aaron, Carl Yastrzemski, Joe Torre, Reggie Jackson, Mariano Rivero, and Roger

Clemens. There are new fundraising initiatives: Cycle Against Cancer, the Fishing Against Cancer tournament, and a Speakers Program.

The foundation recently (July 2017) opened its new location at 15 North Main Street in Old Saybrook. Every aspect of the new facility focuses on the foundation's mission. There is a Hall of Fame. "It's a museum piece," says John. "A tribute to some of the wonderful baseball players who helped literally to build the foundation." There is an art gallery to hold exhibits benefitting the foundation. In fact, the inaugural art gallery exhibition (Horses: In Harmony) takes place from September 28 to October 26. "It's the infrastructure for the next 30 years," says Jane.

John and Jane have assembled plenty of stories. John laughs over that second celebrity dinner when Joe DiMaggio wouldn't sign memorabilia Whitey Ford brought along for him to sign. Yogi Berra successfully intervened. And then there was a single mother whose child was suffering from a rare cancer. "I'll never forget that for the rest of my life," recounts Jane. "They were homeless. She didn't know how to feed her children that evening. We gave her \$2,000. That gave her hope. We continued to help her. We got furniture... I had John schlep it all in his truck."

Thirty years ago, the couple wondered if they'd still be needed. Surely, cancer would be beaten already. "Our mission is more relevant today than 30 years ago," explains Jane. "Everyday expenses...it's so much more expensive to live. Our help is needed more than ever." "There's plenty of work here," adds John. "We look forward to making sure the foundation goes on and on."

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
