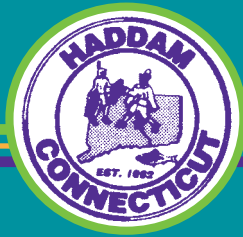

TECHNOLOGY WITH A HUMAN TOUCH

First Selectman's Corner

The Town of Haddam, like all other one hundred and sixty-nine towns in the State of Connecticut, launched its operational plan for our 2012-2013 fiscal year on Monday, July second. It wasn't a particularly memorable day. The usual problems were there to greet the start of a new week. Perhaps the list of telephone calls that needed to be returned was a bit lower, the pile of budget paperwork to be sorted and organized a bit higher, and the staffing a bit thinner. The flurry of year-end activity had come and gone, and although I could still feel the demands of its wrath lingering in the air like the smell of clothes left in the washing machine too long, I did my best to shake off the memory of days and nights that I thought would never end, put yesterday behind me, and began what I hoped would be a new, positive chapter in the saga of our town's evolution. I was doing just fine, until I heard a co-worker, frustrated with a frozen computer, grumble "the more things change, the more they stay the same."

For some uncanny reason, his words stuck with me all day long. Was he right, I wondered? Was all my effort to create positive change simply a gust of wind that would eventually settle itself into a pile of dust? Would the energy I so demanded from those that shared my vision for a better town escape into the future like the gas from a child's balloon?

Could the mountain really be scaled, and if so, would the achievement be only momentary and give way to a pyramid of indifference?

Doubt is a precarious invasion of the mind. In many ways, because it can either lay dormant and unnoticed or erupt at any time, it is similar to some of the physical ailments we have grown to accept as part of our innate makeup; but unlike hypertension or diabetes, there are no medicines that can be taken to control its effects. Even knowing that the experience is as old as Zeus didn't change the overwhelming urge to ask uncomfortable questions.

Our justice system proclaims that a person accused of a crime is innocent until proven guilty "beyond a reasonable doubt." For those of us who have sat on a jury that has been asked to decide the fate in a criminal matter, you know that the demands of our system are far more difficult than they sound. For more generations that we can count, we have been subject to the power of doubt in one form or another, so I

guess when all was said and done, deep down I knew that I should not be too concerned. Somehow that didn't make me feel much better, so I did what anyone would do under the circumstances – I took stock.

I asked myself, "what have you done to create a positive change for the Town of Haddam?" I looked back to the early days of my first administration and thought about the promises I had made to myself to resolve the Transfer Station enigma, enhance consumer services, strengthen the office administration, create an open dialogue with legislators, improve communications with the citizens, provide quality tools for the commissions to do their jobs efficiently, promote economic development and implement rigid fiscal controls. So far so good, I thought; yet, the nagging feeling in my stomach still prevailed.

What about the infrastructure, I wondered. Have I done enough to tackle this essential ingredient to growth? The pockets of water contamination in Tylerville, although pretty well identified now, have not yet been corrected effectively. Knowing that the process with the State is moving forward and having a back-up plan to secure water from Chester helps, but is it enough? No, I must do more to secure funding from the State to complete our efforts there. The need for public sewage in Higganum is at a critical juncture. My efforts to partner with a developer to share the costs to remedy the situation have been hampered by a poor economy and restrictive village regulations. The economy may get better someday, but despite the excellent work being done to enhance our village regulations, it does not appear that developer assistance is viable. I must promote a town initiative to address the situation there once and for all to really achieve a positive change.

I began digging deeper. What about the roads...the old nagging land use issues...the ugly uncollected tax problems...the bridges...dams...retaining walls... senior tax relief...blight issues...protection of natural resources...town safety...

escalating taxes; had I done enough? The questions had taken on a life of their own when a member of our 350th anniversary committee walked into my office and mercifully interrupted the barrage.

The 350th anniversary committee has been working diligently over the past several months in preparation for a grand celebration to be held in conjunction with our annual River Days event on Saturday, September 8th. There will be a parade, invited dignitaries, historical re-enactments, a festival, and fireworks. God willing, it will be a time for the town as a whole to take stock in our heritage, our progress, and our future. Listening to the committee's exciting plans gave me the opportunity to step away from myself for a while; it provided the window I needed to see more clearly the purpose and hope that drove me to serve the Town of Haddam from the start. It reminded me that 'Rome wasn't built in a day' and that progress is not only measured by a rear view mirror, but also by the road ahead. After all is said and done, that is the thought that soothes the doubts that pass through me. That is the thought that gives me hope. That is the thought that reminds me that the more things change, the more they do not stay the same, but rather the more we have accomplished and the closer we get to the goal of building a better future for our children and our children's children.

In the end, I guess it comes down to a matter of perspective. One person can feel doubtful and give way to the notion that 'the sky is falling.' Another can use the opportunity to second guess his or her decisions and actions. Yet, still another can take the opportunity to positively assess, refocus and push forward. I'd like to think that I line up more closely with that outlook. I have come to learn that although no result is perfect, without a thorough commitment, no result is truly meaningful or complete. Whether we like it or not, doubt is a necessary part of the evolutionary decision-making process that guides all our lives. I think it helps to remember, though, that its influence over those decisions is neither right nor wrong and that we freely choose our own paths using the tools of our makeup and experiences. That's about the best we can do. As long as we are honest with ourselves, and do our very best to stay true to our principles, the rest is in the hands of a far greater power.

Board of Assessment Appeals

In September, the Board of Assessment Appeals will hold hearings to give those of you who disagree with the town's assessment of a motor vehicle an opportunity to challenge the assessment.

When will the Board meet: Wednesday, September 12 from 6:00-8:00 p.m. at the old Town Hall, 30 Field Park Road, Haddam.

How to make an appointment: Call or visit the Assessor's office in the Town Office Building.

What you will need to bring to the hearing: (1) Your tax bill; (2) The motor vehicle for our inspection, if possible; (3) If you can't bring the vehicle, bring photos that clearly show the condition of the vehicle; (4) Supporting evidence, such as a written estimate of value and/or retail sales price listings for similar vehicles.

What happens next: An Action Letter with the Board's decision will be sent to you within 2 weeks of your hearing.

From the Assessor's Office

IMPORTANT DATES TO REMEMBER

Active Members of the U.S. Armed Forces – Any active member of the United States Armed Forces (defined as United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Air Force and any reserve component thereof, including the Connecticut National Guard) is eligible for the exemption of one motor vehicle. Applications for the exemption must be completed annually and forwarded to the Assessor's office not later than the December 31st following the date on which property tax is due in the town in which the motor vehicle is registered. In other words for the 2012 Grand List year the deadline is December 31, 2013. The forms are available in the Assessor's office.

Veterans are reminded to file their Honorable Discharge with the Town Clerk's office on or before October 1, 2012. Those veterans who have already submitted their DD214 need not file again. Veterans who have a disability rating must file the Veteran's Administration Disability letter with the Assessor's office. The Connecticut General Statute 12-81 (20) has been amended. The filing of the letter has been changed from an annual filing "up to age 65" to a one time filing unless the disability rating has changed.

If an individual's disability rating is not changed, no proof shall be required for succeeding assessment years once the exemption is granted.

If the service-connected disability is modified the proof of the new disability rating must be submitted to the Assessor's office so that the exemption can be amended.

Exemption forms/letters for the Totally Disabled and for the Blind must be filed on or before October 1, 2012.

Additional Veteran's Exemption – The filing period for Additional Veteran's exemptions is February 1, 2012 to October 1, 2012. The exemptions for income qualifying applicants will be based on the income maximums as follows: the maximum income for single applicants will be \$32,300 and the maximum for married applicants will be \$39,500.

Exemption forms for the Totally Disabled and for the Blind are available in the Assessor's Office.

Farm, Forest or Open Space under Public Act 490- New applications for property owners claiming land as Farm, Forest or Open Space must be filed with the Assessor's Office before October 31, 2012. The certificate from the Forestry Department must be dated on or before October 1, 2012. Applications are available online at www.haddam.org on the Assessor's page.

All forms for the above programs are available in the Assessor's office.

Trade Name Certificates – All new businesses in the Town of Haddam: According to the Connecticut General State Statutes under section 35-1, no person or persons shall

conduct or transact business under any name other than the real name of the person or persons conducting business in the Town of Haddam unless a Trade Name Certificate has been filed in the office of the Town Clerk.

Business Personal Property Declarations – Personal Property Declarations will be mailed from the Assessor's office sometime during the last two weeks of September.

Notice is hereby given to all persons liable to pay Personal Property taxes in the Town of Haddam that they must return to the Assessor's office, on or before the first day of November 2012, their personal property list (declaration). Failure to declare will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

The personal property declaration shall include all furniture, fixtures, equipment and machinery of all commercial and industrial businesses; unregistered motor vehicles, snowmobiles, farm machinery and horses. Manufacturing Machinery Exemption Applications must also be filed at this time.

Anyone not receiving a personal property declaration should contact the Assessor's office. Even though a declaration was not received, it does not preclude you from filing.

PLEASE NOTE: if you do not receive a personal property declaration and you are a resident business in the town of Haddam it is your responsibility according to Connecticut State Statutes to file one. Failure to declare will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

If you have received a personal property declaration and will not be conducting any business in Haddam as of October 1, 2012 you must complete the Affidavit on the front page of the declaration and return it to the Assessor's office prior to November 1, 2012. This signed affidavit is mandatory as proof to allow the Assessor to remove you from the Grand List. If the documentation is not received it will force the Assessor to apply an arbitrary assessment and a 25% penalty.

Local M.D. Named Full-Time Hospice Medical Director

When people think of hospice care, they often focus on death and dying. But according to Middlesex Hospital's new, full-time Hospice Medical Director (and Haddam resident) Bill Zeidler, M.D., the essence of hospice care isn't about dying.

"One of the big misconceptions out there is that a lot of people think that hospice is just about dying. It's truly not. It's truly about trying to live to the best of one's ability until the moment you die," said Dr. Zeidler.

And Dr. Zeidler should know. He has been certified in the specialty of hospice and palliative care since 1997. He is also a founding member of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Care Physicians.

The Middlesex Hospice and Palliative Care program began as an inpatient unit at the Hospital back in the mid-1980s. At that time, Dr. Zeidler became its first, part-time medical director. The original, six-bed inpatient unit has since expanded to a 12-bed hospice and palliative care unit and the program also provides hospice care in the home setting throughout Middlesex County and beyond.

Dr. Zeidler has a long history with Middlesex Hospital. He became a Family Practice Resident in 1975. In 1978, upon graduating from the program, he set up a private family medicine practice in Higganum. In 1997, he became a member of the Middlesex Hospital Primary Care network with offices on Saybrook Road in Middletown. Dr. Zeidler left his primary care practice this year to become the Hospital's first, full-time Hospice Medical Director. As such, Dr. Zeidler will be caring for virtually all the Hospice patients on the inpatient unit, and some in the home and in area nursing homes as well.



But, according to Dr. Zeidler, "My function is part of a large, interdisciplinary care team that includes inpatient and homecare nurses, social workers, physical therapists and occupational therapists. We use the expertise of pharmacists, who are well trained in pain medications. We have wonderful volunteers who serve a whole host of functions, from playing music on the unit to creating legacy stories about patients' lives for their families to cherish. There are clergy members who are also a key part of what we do; along with the many home health aides and patient care technicians who are also part of the caregiver team."

Dr. Zeidler admits that managing a patient's pain is an important aspect of hospice care. But he adds that the ultimate goal is to control the pain, while still keeping the patient alert and oriented. This not only benefits the patient, but the family as well.

"When we get the patient's pain under control, the patient often relaxes, which means the family can relax as well," Dr. Zeidler added.

Dr. Zeidler is looking forward to his new, expanded role in the Hospice and Palliative Care program, and for good reason.

"It's a wonderful program and it is truly amazing how much patients and families benefit from it. The message is that we're just trying to make things a little bit better for patients, and significantly better for the family. And the more support you give the patient, family and other loved ones, the better everyone does. Often, we are actually able to bring some joy into their lives during a very difficult situation."

Borrow Materials from Other Libraries in CT through Brainerd Memorial Library

Did you know the Brainerd Memorial Library can get you materials from other libraries in Connecticut? The library is a member of LION (Libraries Online), a group of libraries that share an integrated library computer system. Currently LION has 24 member libraries. The LION Collection of materials contains over 700,000 titles and includes books, DVD's, music CD's Books on CD and other items. To search LION go to the library website www.brainerdlibrary.lioninc.org, then click on the Catalog button on the left. The catalog starts out searching the Brainerd Library Catalog, but you can change it by going to click the down arrow to the right of where it says Haddam/Brainerd Library and select All Lion Libraries. You can now find materials in LION and have them sent to Brainerd for you to pick up. You will receive an e-mail or telephone call when your materials arrive at the library. Then you have one week to come to the library to pick things up.

If you can't find what you need in LION, the library also takes part in reQuest, the Statewide Library Catalog of Connecticut. reQuest contains over 5 million titles from more than 400 academic, public, school and special libraries in the state. More than 200 libraries in the State participate in inter-library loan through reQuest. The reQuest Magazine Catalog can be searched to find magazines and journals from more than 400 libraries in the State. Brainerd Library patrons can place requests online through the reQuest Main Catalog. To search go to the library website, then click on the reQuest button on the left. Begin searching once you are in reQuest. Again, the materials will be sent to Brainerd for you to pick up within a week.

The Joys and Benefits of Staying Active

We humans are social creatures. This means we have the natural desire to interact and be with other people during every stage of our lives – including our senior years. However, some seniors, through a variety of reasons, find themselves living alone with limited interaction or engagement with friends or family.

This is unfortunate since social involvement is a major component of the overall well-being and good health of any senior. Consider the 2008 study by the Harvard School of Public Health, which found evidence that elderly people in the U.S. who have an active social life may have a slower rate of memory decline. Or “The Nun Study,” which detailed how positive emotions and thoughts in life (often a result of being active and involved) are linked to less disease and lower mortality rates, and can help develop a natural immunization against Alzheimer’s disease.

These and other research illustrates that when seniors maintain an active social life, and each day is filled with purpose and friendship, seniors have a greater opportunity to enjoy a high quality of life during their retirement years. Social activity also greatly reduces or even eliminates loneliness or depression, something that affects more secluded people.

Being social is achievable through purposeful planning. Individuals can create opportunities to be with other people and be involved in groups by:

- Contacting local senior centers, church groups or other organizations that offer a schedule of daily activities
- Signing up for art, music, or physical fitness classes through the local community college or parks and recreation department
- Volunteering or mentoring at a local school, library, or museum
- Joining a local club (such as gardening, writing, reading, chess, knitting)
- Taking part in travel programs designed specifically for senior citizens
- Attending lectures at a local university or other organization

One time of day when socialization is most important is meal time – which most people share with others at least once a day. Senior citizens are encouraged to attend community meals at a senior center, church, or other organization, or to invite friends and family to dinner at a favorite restaurant, or at their home or retirement community. Additionally, seniors should try to accept invitations to join others at mealtime as often as possible.

Competitive sports are becoming more conducive to active seniors, with the growing popularity of organizations such as the Olympic-style “Connecticut Senior Games” for those over age 50. These events include badminton, table tennis, racquetball, golf, basketball, track and field, tennis, volleyball, bowling, cycling, shooting, softball, and swimming – and athletes up to age 89 take part. Additionally, seniors can be on the

lookout for competitions in art, music, gardening and more at local fairs and other regional events.

Haddam Fire Increases EMS Service Level

Anaphylaxis is a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. It can occur within seconds or minutes of exposure to something you're allergic to, such as the venom from a bee sting or a peanut.

The flood of chemicals released by your immune system during anaphylaxis can cause you to go into shock; your blood pressure drops suddenly and your airways narrow, blocking normal breathing. Signs and symptoms of anaphylaxis include a rapid, weak pulse, a skin rash, and nausea and vomiting. Common triggers of anaphylaxis include certain foods, some medications, insect venom and latex.

According to the Mayo Clinic, anaphylaxis requires an immediate trip to the emergency department and an injection of epinephrine. If anaphylaxis isn't treated right away, it can lead to unconsciousness or even death. As the Town of Haddam's designated "R1" Medical First Responder, the Haddam Volunteer Fire Co. answers several calls each year involving allergic reactions, some of which are severe.

In an effort to improve the care to victims in the field, the Haddam Volunteer Fire Co. in partnership with the Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Auxiliary, are becoming authorized to carry and use emergency doses of epinephrine. The devices known as "Epi-Pens" are going to be placed on fire apparatus at each of the stations. Haddam Fire EMTs will have the devices on scene within minutes of a 911 call and be able to provide the life-saving drug.

"Members must go through an additional training program in order to administer the epinephrine," stated 2nd Assistant Chief Robert Norton. "EMTs must follow a set of guidelines

that indicate when delivering the injection is appropriate – for both adults and children." Two separate devices are being stocked – one with the appropriate dosage for adults, and a second for children.

Funding to start the program is being provided not through the normal tax base, but through a donation from the Haddam Volunteer Fire Company Auxiliary. "The Auxiliary supports us and the town in many ways. They realized the need, and wanted to provide the funds to kick-off the program," stated Chief Gary Klare. The initial purchase of a sufficient number of on-line devices and training units is approximately \$2,500. "If it keeps one resident alive, it's worth it."

Epinephrine is also carried by the Paramedics who respond when available from Middlesex Hospital, and Epi-Pens are kept on ambulances. "Having the devices on scene as rapidly as possible will be a tremendous benefit to anyone having a severe allergic reaction in the Town of Haddam" Norton said.

It is estimated that 1,500 people die annually across the United States from anaphylactic reactions, and thousands more are hospitalized due to lack of prompt emergency care. This program will serve to further reduce that risk in Haddam. Persons that have known severe allergic reactions to insects, food etc. should still carry personal epinephrine kits issued through their doctor. Keeping an up-to-date kit with you could be the difference between life and death when every minute counts.

location of the well, septic system, property lines, and the distances from your proposed activity to the property lines. If you do not have a site plan of your property, I will be more than happy to supply you with copies of any maps or documents that we may have here on file so that you will be able to prepare that site plan and get your project going.

You will also need to provide structural plans which will in many instances need to be reviewed by The Chatham Health District and then sent on to the Building Inspector.

Oh, and one more thing ... are there any wetlands on your property? If the answer is yes, I will need to meet with you to determine whether or not you will need to submit your project and plans to the Wetland Commission.

As always, I am here to help and assist you with your Zoning and Wetland concerns.

HADDAM TRANSFER STATION

Hours: Wednesday, 8:00 a.m. - 3:45 p.m. Saturday, 8:00 a.m. - 3:45 p.m. Sunday, 8:00 a.m. - 11:45 a.m. Transfer Station permits must be renewed by July 1st of each year. To insure that there is a clear understanding of the rules, please read below:

- Permit must be clearly displayed and adhered to the driver's side window shield.
- Registration must be written on the permit itself. Any vehicles without a current permit or without a sticker on vehicle will not be allowed to leave its contents at the Transfer Station. Loose permit stickers will be required to be applied to the vehicle before dumping or vehicle will be turned away.
- In order to begin or resume use of the Transfer Station, please come to the Town Clerk's Office and have the following available: **1.** Proof of residency. **2.** Automobile registration. **3.** \$50.00 payment. Cash or Check – We do not accept credit or debit cards. Persons requesting additional stickers must have vehicle registration certificate and \$50.00 for each vehicle.

The Transfer Station is located on Route 154, just north of the Haddam Meadows State.

DOG OWNERS

REMINDER. If you have forgotten, please be sure to pay your DOG LICENSE fee so that you have the current tag. Our Animal Control Officer will be contacting you, if you are delinquent. **Fees:** A neutered or spayed dog \$8.00, an unneutered or unspayed dog \$19.00. Kennel License is \$51.00, beginning July 1, a penalty fee will be charged for every month a resident is late in registering a dog. Licenses can be mailed once proof of current rabies vaccination and a spaying/neutered certificate are mailed to the Town Clerk at P.O. Box 87, Haddam, CT 06438, along with your fee. If you no longer have your dog, please let us know so that we may update our records. If you have any questions or concerns regarding licensing your dog(s) please call or email our office.

SPORTSMEN

2012 SPORTS LICENSES are available. Additional information regarding regulations, permits, conservation education/ firearms safety courses are available on line at <http://www.dep.state.ct.us>. DEP reminds anglers age 65 and older that the free resident "lifetime" inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses for individuals age 65 and older became "annual" licenses effective October 1, 2009. All "age 65 and older" free inland fishing, hunting and trapping licenses obtained since October 1, 2009 must now be renewed annually. Additionally, all "age 65 and older" free marine fishing licenses must be renewed annually. Holders of age 65 and older "lifetime" Connecticut inland fishing licenses obtained prior to October

1, 2009 are not required to reregister for a new license. However, should one lose this "lifetime" license, they will need to obtain a free replacement by accessing the licensing system from their home computer, or by visiting a town hall, DEP office or other participating vendor. All individuals with "lifetime" hunting or combination hunting & fishing licenses will need to register themselves in the Automated Licensing System to obtain the appropriate permits and tags along with their unique Conservation ID#. In subsequent license years, this Conservation ID# will be re-used and the free hunting license will need to be selected annually prior to obtaining permits and tags. For assistance in renewing these licenses, contact DEP Licensing and Revenue at (860) 424-3105.

MARRIAGE LICENSE INFORMATION

The Connecticut license must be obtained in the town where the marriage will take place. You will be asked to show your driver's license, or other form of legal identification. There is no waiting period; the marriage may take place at the time the license is issued. The marriage must take place within 65 days of issuance of the license. The partners do not need to appear at the same time but both must come in and sign the license in person. Cost for a marriage license is \$30.00. The cost for a certificated copy of the license is \$20.00.
