## First Selectwoman's Corner

Let the summer of 2018 begin! The leaves are out, the flowers are in bloom and the warmth finally surrounds us! Many of us are celebrating graduations, new jobs for our graduates, weddings, and planning fun times with barbecues and picnics! The Town of Old Lyme is in good shape, despite a reluctant-to-end winter and severe spring storms.

I am happy to report that Phase 1 of the Sound View Improvements Project is completed! If you drive down Hartford Avenue, you'll see just how nice everything looks, with the decorative street signs and banner poles installed, and the line painting completed. We celebrated the completion with a ribbon cutting ceremony on May 4th at the Sound View Beach Association Community Center, with plenty of smiles and pizza for everyone. The project came in well under the budgeted \$911,000, which included extras such as improved drainage on the east side of Hartford Ave. and repaying of the road from just north of Bocce Lane to the corner of Pond Road and Hartford Ave. Special thanks go to Selectwoman Mary Jo Nosal who was devoted to seeing the project through completion, and to all of the committee members, including Angelo Faenza, Frank Pappalardo, former Selectman Skip Sibley, Jim Lampos, and John McDonald, and Rob Haramut of the RiverCOG for his technical assistance. It was a lengthy process, but well worthwhile in the end, as the Town of Old Lyme was responsible for only 20% of the total cost of the project.

Another project that has been completed is the Cross Lane Playground, and a ribbon cutting celebration was held on April 26th at the playground. There were LOTS of children celebrating by making use of every aspect of this ADA accessible playground, parents who seemed delighted to let the kids "run off some energy," and plenty of pizza to go around. The Chairman of the Parks & Rec Commission, Bob Dunn, was there to help cut the rib-

bon and congratulate the committee on a job well done. By now, the fence should be fully installed, and Old Lyme now has a very safe environment for all families to enjoy! Special thanks go to the Junior Women's Club, whose hard work and perseverance were instrumental in making this happen. The JWC raised over \$50,000 to help pay for the playground, and the members spent months researching playground equipment for the project. In addition, Dave Catalano, an Old Lyme resident who represents the equipment company, donated hours of his own time to oversee the installation of the playground, with the help of a few other volunteers. Public Works helped with the site preparation and tree removal, and the

Tree Commission provided pruning of trees in the area. This was truly a community effort, and the beneficiaries are the children of our community. Please stop by and see what a wonderful resource this is for the families in our community. Special thanks to the Playground Committee – Anna Reiter, Emily Griswold, Meghan Anderson, Missy Garvin, and Nicole Stajduhar, Finance Director for Town of Old Lyme.

IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT: The Town has been notified by the vendor who receives all of our recycling that we are sending DIRTY recycling. Yes, it is too dirty for recycling – so consider this a reminder that containers should be rinsed, grease laden pizza cardboard should NOT be put in the recycling bin, and plastic shopping bags are not to go in the green bins for recycling. FORGET what can? We have provided a convenient reminder for you further in this magazine – a full page reminder with a section that you can cut out and put on your refrigerator door or cabinet. This is perfect as a reminder to your family, friends and guests. PLEASE HELP US TO IMPROVE OUR RECYCLING EFFORTS – clean recyclables only! And remember that the blue bin for garbage is ONLY garbage – no grass clippings, branches, building materials, etc.

The Police Services Options Committee continues to meet on a regular basis to determine if combining with the East Lyme Police Department is in the best interest of our community. The committee has developed a good working rapport, and has already met with the Chief of the East Lyme Police Department, Michael Finkelstein. Michael spent nearly two hours with the committee articulating how he saw this regional effort working, and answering questions from the committee, as well as from the public. The committee will continue to collect information to assist in making this decision, which will be based on the needs of our community and the ability to serve those needs.

The proposed Blight Ordinance continues to be considered by the Board of Selectmen, after reviewing feedback from the public. A public information meeting was held and there was a mix of reactions. Some residents felt that the ordinance went too far, and felt like government overreach. Others, particularly those who have lived in close proximity to "blighted" properties, were very supportive of the ordinance. The selectmen reviewed all of the comments, taking people's concerns seriously, and shared them with the Town Attorney. There may be adjustments to the language to address the concerns, and there will definitely be additional public information meetings to allow residents to express their views on this issue. For the most part, everyone agrees that with an ordinance like this, it is worth the time spent on making sure it is right for our community.

The Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library is planning some impressive renovations and upgrades to the library, and is asking for help from the Town and the public. Many of our residents may remember the "Keep Phoebe Smiling" campaign, which helped with the "new" section of the library. Believe it or not, that "new" section is now 25 years old, and other parts of the library that did not get attention in that campaign are now in need of updates. The library was surprised when it was notified by the State of Connecticut that they were awarded a million dollar grant – yes - \$1,000,000, to help with the renovation, which is estimated to cost \$3,050,000. PGN Library will have a campaign to raise an additional \$300,000 (watch your mailboxes!), and has asked the Town to fund \$1.75 million. Of course, this will need to be approved at a Town Meeting before any work can proceed, so a Town Meeting will likely be scheduled for late June, if recommended by the Board of Finance. The Library will continue to host tours and informational meetings to educate residents on the planned renovations, and further information will be presented at the Town Meeting. Please consider attending one of the planned presentations, or stop in the library to learn about the project. This will help everyone understand the needs and be prepared to decide at the Town Meeting.

**The Annual Town Budget Meeting** was held on Monday, May 21, 2018 at the Lyme Old Lyme Middle School to approve the budget for fiscal year 2019, which was proposed to increase the

mill rate from 21.75 to 21.91, or a .75% increase in the mill rate. Thank you to the members of the Board of Selectmen and the Board of Finance for their diligent work in bringing a reasonable budget to the residents.

The Halls Road Improvements Committee is pleased to announce that it will be working with the Yale Urban Design Workshop to develop a master plan for Halls Road. After several meetings with the group at YUDW, it became apparent that this was just the group to help develop a plan that would maintain the character of Old Lyme and encompass most of the amenities that were identified by many in our community. The process will include public meetings to solicit feedback from stakeholders and community members, which is essential in developing a plan that is supported by the community. Please be sure to register for updates on the town website and attend the meetings as we continue our effort to improve our town's commercial area.

**The Historic Survey Committee** is hard at work finalizing the RFP for a survey of historic structures within our town that have not yet been surveyed. The survey is being done with the help of a \$30,000 grant from the State Historic Preservation Office, and should provide information on up to about 200 structures of historic significance.

## **Assessor's Office**

The Assessor would like to bring to your attention the following important deadlines.

Per CGS 12-41, all businesses operating in the Town of Old Lyme are required to file a list of Business Personal Property with the Assessors office on or before November 1, 2018. Declaration forms will be mailed by the end of September. Failure to receive a form from our office does not relieve the obligation of a business owner to file prior to November.

Any Service Members eligible for a Veterans Exemption under CGS 12-81 must have on file their DD214 or equivalent discharge papers with the Town Clerk before October 1, 2018.

Any property owner wishing to file for Farm, Forest and Open Space under PA490 must file an application with the Assessor between September 1 and October 31, 2018. Applications are available in the Assessors office.

## **Tax Collector's Office**

Notice is hereby given to the Taxpayers of the Town of Old Lyme that I have a warrant to collect the taxes on the Grand List of October 1, 2017. Motor Vehicle taxes are due in full July 1, 2018. Real Estate and Personal Property bills may be paid in full on that date. However, Real Estate and Personal Property bills over \$100.00 are paid in two installments: July 1, 2018 and January 1, 2019. Partial payments are always accepted.

If the tax due, or installment due, is not paid within one month of the due date, the tax becomes delinquent and subject to interest at the rate of one and one half percent (1 1/2%): 18% per year. The minimum interest charge is \$2.00. August interest is 3%.

Questions pertaining to the assessments and exemptions should be directed to the Assessor's office at 860 434-1605 ext 218 or 219. Tax questions at 860 434-1605 ext 216.



#### Herbicide-Free Weed Management

There are no weed-free landscapes, but there are good alternatives to herbicides for some weeds.

Consider, for instance, the wooded edge that has bittersweet vines, thorny brambles, and herbaceous weeds. Strategy? Mow or clip the area as low to the ground as possible. Cover the area with an eight-inch layer of raw wood chips (or more). You might even place brown cardboard over the clipped weeds before

spreading chips. This lengthens the time the weeds will be "smothered."

Get the chips from companies that take down trees. (Caution: Keep cardboard and chips six inches or more from the trunks of desirable trees and shrubs.) Raw wood chips shade and smother weedy undergrowth for up to two years. They rob nitrogen from the upper inch of soil, denying a key nutrient to newly germinated weed seedlings. (What a shame!)

Got Japanese knotweed? With patience and sharp clippers, you can learn how to defeat it. Hand-pull garlic mustard in May and early June, before it goes to seed.

Japanese stiltgrass is a fast-moving invader that produces voluminous seeds in September. Mow or weed-whack as low as possible in late August to prevent seed production. There may be a large seedbank from prior years, so be vigilant, explains Todd Mervosh of TM Agricultural and Ecological Services, Suffield.

Always bag and trash cuttings to prevent spreading weeds elsewhere.



#### Renters' Rebate Program

State law provides a reimbursement pro-

gram for Connecticut renters who are elderly or totally disabled, and whose incomes do not exceed certain limits. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program. The application for this program is April 1 - October 1. #### **Connecticut Energy Assistance Program**

Helps income eligible households in paying for their heating costs during the winter months. Households are determined eligible based on state income and asset guidelines. You may be eligible for benefits even if heat is included in your rent payment (depending on your income and rent amount.) Application period begins August 1st. # **Old Lyme Land Trust Hosts 52nd Annual Meeting**

#### **Honors Volunteer of the Year**

The Old Lyme Land Trust held its 52nd Annual Meeting at the Lymes Senior Center on Sunday March 18th. This year was the largest attendance in the Trust's history.

The meeting was highlighted by an informative and entertaining presentation on bobcats in CT. The program, "The Bobcat: Connecticut's Secretive Wild Cat" was presented by Master Wildlife Conservationist, Paul Colburn. Paul discussed the natural history of bobcats in Connecticut and provided an overview of bobcat habitat, diet, behavior, reproduction, and current research efforts. Paul encouraged the audience to

report b obcat sightings to the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (deep.wildlife@ct.gov). The bobcat photo was captured on a trail cam by an Old Lyme resident.

Bobcats, *lynx rufus*, are CT's only wild cat and have been sighted in almost every town in the state. The bobcat was once hunted for its fur and for bounty payments, but is now protected and population is estimated at 1500 - 2000. Even though bobcats can catch and kill a deer, they are shy of humans.

In the business portion of the meeting, the Trust honored Lea Harty as the Volunteer of the Year. Lea is the former Trust secretary and still edits and produces the Trust's Annual Letter, Tributaries. She has organized work crews to eliminate invasive burning bush on the

Jericho Preserve and will soon lead another crew to plant native shrubs at Watch Rock.

Trust President Michael Kiernan announced that the newly acquired 11-acre "Denison Farm" parcel is now fully accessible through the trail system on the Upper Three Mile River Preserve. Mike also announced receipt of a \$36,000 grant toward the purchase of Denison from the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection OSWA grant program. The Trust conducts regular work parties to maintain its 14 preserves; volunteers are always welcome to participate.

In other business, Mary Devins and Sabine O'Donnell were elected to the Board of Directors.

MARK YOUR CALENDAR: Visit the Land Trust display at the MidSummer Festival on Saturday July 28. Meet some of the local wildlife (the non-human kind) that make their homes in the Trust's preserves. Raptors, reptiles and a variety of insects will be looking forward to meeting you.

# Book a Bus Ride on Your Smartphone

9 Town Transit's new mobile app promise to simplify your travels throughout the valley-shore region. You can now book trips yourself in real-time right from your Android or Apple device without the need of calling, for the same flat \$3.50 fare. The app allows users direct access to review and manage their transportation needs. Reservations are booked or canceled with a few taps. Notifications remind passengers when the pick-up time approaches, reducing the need to call and check on the bus arrival time.

Probably the biggest enhancement is the ability to see how far away the bus is. When you are the next trip, you can view the exact location of your bus on a visual map.

"The goal of this app is to make using the bus more like the ride-hailing services that have become a popular means of travel," says Joseph Comerford, Executive Director of 9 Town Transit. He adds that while trips must still be booked a day in advance now, they are looking at ways to do same day trips with this new technology.

The app, called Ecolane, can be downloaded from the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. It requires the customer to obtain log-in information from 9 Town Transit, which can be done by phone at 860-510-0429 or online at www.9towntransit.com. The service is open to the general public and is available for trips anywhere within the twelve town service area Monday through Friday.

Mediterranean herbs such as oregano, basil, and lavender are relative newcomers to New

England. Nineteenth century immigrants from southern Italy found marjoram (a relative of oregano) in the markets here, but if they wanted the real thing they had to grow their own. What Americans call Italian oregano is actually a hybrid of common oregano crossed with a wild marjoram found in Italy and Greece. Lavender and Italian oregano are among the herbs in our garden.

#### GREEN LIGHT - PLEASE PULL OVER!

None of us would ever want to delay emergency responders and equipment from arriving at our residences as soon as possible when called. Unfortunately, recent history continues to show that there are an increasing number of incidents in Old Lyme in which drivers have refused to pull over and allow Old Lyme Emergency Medical Service (OLEMS) volunteer personnel the ability to get to a scene in an expeditious manner. With this in mind, I would like to review and possibly enlighten some readers as to the reality of an emergency response.

First off, the OLEMS is augmented by a significant number of volunteers 24/7. When a person(s) in need calls "911" to report a medical emergency, Valley Shore Dispatch, which is located at Connecticut State Police Barracks Troop F in Old Saybrook, immediately "tones" or pages all members of OLEMS advising them of the location and type of emergency. OLEMS volunteers respond, utilizing their privately owned vehicles (POV's). Each one of these volunteers has a department-issued synchronized GREEN LIGHT mounted on the dash of their POV. It is designed to catch your attention and obliges you to let the volunteer pass. All responders have one goal and that is to get to the medical emergency as safely and as quickly as possible.

We will not disregard traffic lights, speed limits or stop signs. Quite the contrary, your safety is always our concern. Some of the OLEMS members will be responding directly to the fire house/ambulance station during non-salaried staffed hours to drive an ambulance to the emergency. I cannot overstate the fact that TIME LOST CAN TRANSLATE INTO LIVES LOST. We must have the public's cooperation in giving our responders the right of way by PULLING OVER.

As previously stated, there are permanent EMS staff on duty from Monday through Friday, 6 am - 6 pm. Other than the latter time-frame, all emergency medical responses are by volunteer Old Lyme EMS members only who utilize the GREEN LIGHT in their automobiles. I cannot overstate the importance of adhering to state law and PULLING OVER for EMS. A rapid, unimpeded response by EMS personnel IS the difference between life and death.

In both cases, PLEASE HELP US AVOID AN UNNECESSARY TRAGEDY BY DOING THE RIGHT THING. PLEASE PULL OVER AND LET US BY SO WE CAN SAVE LIVES.

# **Middlesex Hospital Strengthens Breast Program**

With the addition of nationally recognized breast surgeon Kristen Zarfos, Middlesex Hospital is investing in its breast program and enhancing the services it offers.

Dr. Zarfos joins Dr. Andrea Malon, medical director of the Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center, and Dr. Chia-Chi Wang, a surgical oncologist, as surgeons who treat women who have breast cancer. Together, the trio—with years of surgery experience between them—provide compassionate, individualized care, and they aim to strengthen an already robust breast program.

All three surgeons are part of the Middlesex Hospital Surgical Alliance, and their goal is to coordinate care in a way that helps patients better navigate cancer diagnoses and treatments – in a way that eases fears and makes the process a little easier.

Dr. Zarfos is no stranger to Middlesex Hospital. Her first job after residency was at Middlesex, where she worked from 1987

to 1999. During that time, she became a leader in the national fight to force health insurers to cover Hospital stays for mastectomy patients, and she remains a passionate advocate for women's health issues.

Since early detection is key when it comes to all types of cancer, detection technology is at the forefront of Middlesex Hospital's breast program. The hospital offers 3D mammography machines at all of its radiology locations. These 3D machines detect 40 percent more invasive cancers than 2D machines, which are no longer used by the hospital. Middlesex also offers dual-head molecular breast imaging, which uses a radioactive tracer to better detect breast cancer cells in women with dense breast tissue.

In addition, services like genetic counseling are available to Middlesex patients, and caring nurse navigators at Middlesex Hospital Cancer Center help patients throughout their experience. The Cancer Center has locations in Middletown and Westbrook.

Allowed 10 am to 6 pm weekdays and to 7 pm weekends. Wakeless speed (6 mph) within 200 feet of shore, rafts or other boats and personal watercraft.

#### TRAFFIC PATTERN

At speeds above 6 mph, go in a counterclockwise direction. Keep islands on your left when going North. Go one-way South on West side of Picnic Island.

All Connecticut boating regulations apply to Rogers Lake and are enforced by DEEP. Reference the 2018 Connecticut Boater's Guide available at DEEP in Old Lyme and your local marine store.

Connecticut State law 12-155 prohibits the use of a fertilizer containing phosphorous less than 20 feet from any body of water. A \$500 fine is imposed on violators. If you have questions on the phosphorus legislation or soil testing, call the UConn Home & Garden Education Center at 877-486-6271.

#### **Parking:**


- Soundview Parking Lot and Hartford Ave. Street Parking "Pay- to- Park" 9:00 am to 7:00 pm. After 7:00 pm parking is free Parking lot closes at 9:00 pm. Spaces are for one automobile or motorcycle.
- Parking fees are as follows; weekdays \$5.00 per 2 hours and weekends/holidays \$7.00 per 2 hours. Payments should be made at the Kiosk meters (cash or credit card accepted) there is a 2 hour minimum and you are able to pay for up to 8 hours or go back to the kiosk and add time as needed.
- Beach Sticker: residents with current Old Lyme Beach Stickers Park free. The sticker must match your license plate and be attached to your windshield.
- Handicap Parking: 2 hour handicap parking spaces are located on Hartford Avenue and 5 in the Town parking lot. Same rates as regular parking apply.
- Business Parking: There are 30 minute short term free parking spaces on Hartford Avenue for business patrons.

#### **Beach Rules:**

Prohibited: Littering, alcoholic beverages, pets, motorized vehicles, glass containers, ball playing, open fires/grills, smoking of any kind, watercraft tied to any buoy line, fireworks, loitering, camping or sleeping on the beach after dark. All containers are subject to inspections. There is no lifeguard on duty – swim at your own risk. Beach is open sunrise to sunset.

Cooler size restriction: NO COOLERS LARGER THAN 5 QUARTS allowed on the beach.

# Riding The Rails: Connecticut's Shore Line East

Connecticut commuters, as well as leisure travelers, have enjoyed the benefits of the Shore Line East (SLE) rail service over the years, but not everyone knows a lot of its history.

The line was built in the mid-nineteenth century by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad as part of the New York to Boston mainline. This local service was operated on the line between New Haven and New London until 1969. The service was then reduced to one local train that operated until 1972. Amtrak ended the local service and substituted various types of more limited local services that ran until 1981 when all local service was ended.

The State revived the service in 1990 with the current name of Shore Line East as a temporary service to local stations between New Haven and Old Saybrook, to alleviate traffic congestion from construction work on I-95. Since then, service and ridership has expanded with new stations and more trains. Shore Line East also connects with MTA Metro-North in New Haven providing service to New York City.

## **Transfer Station Information**

**Transfer Station/Landfill Hours.** The Transfer Station located on Four Mile River Road is open Tuesday-Friday, 7:30 am-3:45 pm and Saturday, 8:30 am-4:00 pm. Closed Sunday and Monday.

Taxpayers' vehicles should have a Transfer Station sticker affixed to the right-hand side of windshield. The free windshield stickers are available in the Selectman's Office. Bring vehicle registration (& proof of Old Lyme property ownership if car is registered outside of Old Lyme). Vehicles without a sticker should bring proof of property address (i.e., tax bill, mortgage statement or closing papers), along with a driver's license and registration.

**Bulky Waste and Demolition:** Waste is charged by weight at \$110/ton. Recyclables cannot be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads less than 100 lbs. are charged a minimum fee of \$5.

**Brush** is charged on a per load basis. No wood or limbs thicker than four inches are accepted.

**Grass clippings** are not allowed at the Transfer Station because of chemical contamination from pesticides and fertilizers. DO NOT DEPOSIT in your TRASH CAN. Please compost on your property.

#### Electronics are now accepted at the Transfer Station.

Residents are able to bring the following items to the Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road: computers and related equipment; televisions, printers, keyboards, mice, adaptors, stereos, speakers, VCRs, scanners, fax machines, copiers, telephones and telephone systems, computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, CD ROMs, hard drives), power supplies, circuit boards, microwaves, scrap copper (cable, pipe, etc.), scrap aluminum (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc.), fluorescent light bulbs, UPA (uninterrupted power supply) batteries, and related computer and electronic equipment.

# FREE ELECTRONICS RECYCLING For Residents at Old Lyme Transfer Station

Reminder: Old Lyme residents can bring their unwanted electronics to our Transfer Station on Four Mile River Road at no charge.

Transfer Station hours are: Tuesday - Friday 7:30 am-3:45 pm and Saturday 8:30 am-4 pm. Acceptable materials include, but are not limited to:

Clearly mark your address on recycling and trash receptacles to avoid mix up, removal or displacement of cans. 

# Lyme-Old Lyme High School Offers Exceptional Art Program

Year after year, students from Lyme-Old Lyme High School (LOLHS) bring home major awards from two prestigious art contests: the *Future Choices Juried Student Art Competition*, which covers 24 towns in the shoreline region of Southeastern Connecticut, and the *Connecticut Scholastic Art Awards*.

#### This year was no exception.

Senior Emily Archer from LOLHS won the Best in Show award and First Place in Print in the Future Choices contest, while fellow senior Claudia Mergy was awarded First Place in Painting for the second consecutive year and also won the Ruth Baxter-Tagliatela Award. Another senior, Amanda Murphy,

took First Place in Ceramics, and Honorable Mentions were awarded to junior Mya Johnson and sophomore Nathan Ramella in Sculpture, junior Kathryn Atkinson in Drawing and senior Cora Koproski in Photography.

Meanwhile at the 2018 *Connecticut Scholastic Art Awards*, Mergy received two Gold Keys for individual works and a Gold Key for her portfolio, Archer won a Gold Key in Printmaking, Johnson a Silver Key in Ceramics, and Atkinson earned Honorable Mention in Drawing.

# Why then is the art program at LOLHS so successful?

Adam Raiti, who teaches digital and three-dimensional art at LOLHS, suggests there are a number of reasons. First, he explains, "Lyme-Old Lyme Schools hire teachers who are artists," and that represents a major difference over many other high school art programs. Apart from being a teacher, Raiti, a graduate of the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD), is

an acclaimed freelance illustrator and designer. Similarly, LOLHS Art Department Head William Allik, a Wesleyan University graduate with a Masters from New York Academy, is a highly respected artist, whose work has been featured in numerous exhibitions around the country.



## Florence Griswold Museum

MUSEUM'S SUMMER EXHIBITION REFLECTS ON THE PLEASURES AND PERILS OF FARMING IN NEW ENGLAND LAND

The Florence Griswold Museum is uniquely positioned to tell the story of Art and the New England Farm, on view through September 16, 2018. Organized by Museum Curator Amy Kurtz Lansing, the exhibition examines the history, character, and representation of New England's farms in works by artists



George Glenn Newell's Salt Having, Old Lyme speaks to how salt haying proved an irresistible subject for artists for its dependence on old-fashioned methods in an industrialized present. Visiting Old Lyme from New York City in 1906, Newell observed farmers gathering salt hay from the marshes in common for generations with harvesting rights divided among area farmers.




To make relevant connections to the struggles of the modern-day farmer. the exhibition includes works from artist Judy Friday's series, A Year in the Life of Tiffany Farms, which showcases her photographic and literary portrait

of Lyme's historic Tiffany Farms, a beloved local landmark. In her photo of farrier Brent Kirby, Friday was artistically along the Connecticut River, lands held drawn to the similarity between Kirby's hair, as it swings forward with his exertion while shoeing the animal, and the horse's long tail.

from the 19th to the 21st century. Drawing on the agricultural heritage of Florence Griswold's family estate as well as of the Lyme region and beyond, the exhibition traces the patterns and challenges of farming in New England. With its often rocky soil, the pastoral landscapes crafted in New England by European colonists and their successors were the result of intense labor. The depiction of these hard-won farmscapes in art maps the emergence of a regional identity: in the mid 19th century, landscapes by Connecticut painter George Henry Durrie offered influential representations of the New England farmstead that translated it into a national icon.

After reaching their height in the mid 19th century, New England farms underwent transformation and decline well into the 20th century with the pressures of industrialization, urbanization, and suburbanization. Works by Ivan Olinsky, Thomas Nason, Martin Lewis, and Walker Evans offer at times haunting depictions the abandonment as well as the quiet persistence of weathered farms in this region. The more recent revitalization of farming in popular culture, with the enthusiasm for organic produce and farm-to-table cooking, closes the exhibition, with the inclusion of Judy Friday's photographs, paintings, and sculptures inspired by a year in the life of Lyme's historic Tiffany Farms. Throughout these galleries, the shifting representation of the New England farm underscores the role that artists have played in giving visual form to the ideals and realities of this region's rural life.

# **Bipartisan Budget Compromise**

State Representative Devin Carney Lyme, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, Westbrook

This year's legislative session ended at midnight on May 9, 2018. Shortly before the midnight deadline, the legislature overwhelmingly approved state budget adjustments for the current fiscal year and next fiscal year. The budget was the result of bipartisan negotiations and represented a compromise between Republican and Democrat lawmakers to update the bipartisan state budget that passed last year. It was a package that included important items to many folks within the 23rd District, provided funding for our municipalities, and it contained no tax increases.

The Connecticut Department of Transportation was set to reduce funding next fiscal year to both Shore Line East and 9-Town Transit, which both provide transportation needs to many commuters, students, and seniors. These funding cuts would have resulted in service reductions and fare increases. The budget compromise staved off these drastic proposals by transferring an extra \$29 million in sales tax receipts next fiscal year to the Special Transportation Fund. These sales tax receipts will come from the sales tax on new cars, so it makes sense that this revenue will go towards our transportation needs.

Many seniors in the district were concerned about the potential for a reduction in eligibility for the Medicare Savings Program, which helps seniors on fixed incomes with health insurance. This budget fully restored the program in full to all 169,450 seniors who rely on it.

Finally, the sales tax on boats will be reduced from 6.35% to 2.99% effective July 1, 2018. This sales tax reduction will help our local marine industry and will help Connecticut compete more with Rhode Island, which does not charge a sales tax on boat sales.


