

They also enjoyed field trips designed to nurture a good rapport between our youth and local police. STATEWIDE EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS DRILLS: For the last two days of July, the Town of Old Lyme has taken part in the Statewide Emergency Drills, hypothetically preparing and responding to a Category 3 Hurricane (as was the Hurricane of 1938). These drills include all towns, the utility companies and the state, and will assure that our team is prepared, should the "real thing" come along. Many of our department heads, first responders and support staff took part in this exercise, and I was quite impressed with the thought process that goes into planning for any disaster.

Here are some things you can do: • Register on CT Alert to get up-to-date warnings and announcements. Once registered, you will automatically be notified with bulletins and updates. Sign up at http://www. ctalert.gov.

• Subscribe to our town website. By doing this, you will receive email notifications of news and announcements as soon as they are posted to our website, keeping you informed in real time. Subscribe at www.oldlyme-ct.gov.

• Register with us if you have special needs. See page 34 for the Special Needs Form or upload one from our website. We want to make sure we know where you are and how to prepare to take care of you.

Our primary concern is, and will always be, the safety of our citizens and visitors when storms come our way.

BLOOD DRIVE: July started off on a good note, with a very successful Blood Drive on July 3rd . I was amazed at the number of people who came in to donate blood. By the end of day, 50 units of blood were donated, which was nearly twice what was expected. A big thank you to all who came out and waited so long, just to make a donation.

LANDFILL CLOSURE: After years of discussions, preparations and anticipation, the closure of the Town of Old Lyme Landfill has begun. As you know, we changed over to a Transfer Station some time ago, but we still had the Landfill for limited

and restricted use. Over the past several years, the Board of Finance has set aside funds for the closure, so that we would not have to bond for this expense when the time came. On July 9, ET &L Construction began the process of closing and capping the Landfill, and we anticipate it will be completed by October of this year. Our planning for this eventual closure has put us in an advantageous situation, as the funds set aside will cover the cost of the closure. During this time, the Transfer Station will remain open and it will be business as usual.



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Shoreline Legislative Update

Two new laws important to shoreline residents were passed during the recently concluded legislative session. Both new laws - *Enhancing Emergency Storm Response* and *Changes to the Coastal Management Act* - addressed storm related issues. Late last August, Tropical Storm Irene buffeted the shoreline with high winds and rising tides leaving many residents without power for days that stretched into a week or longer for some.

In the aftermath of Tropical Storm Irene - one of the most powerful storms to hit the shoreline in 70 years - new legislation requires that utility companies execute a faster, more coordinated level of emergency response and preparedness. The new law, Public Act 12-148, An Act Enhancing Emergency Preparedness and Response sets forth the following performance standards for utility companies:

- establishes new performance standards for utility companies to restore service when an emergency results in 10% or greater of the utility's customer base without service for 48 hours or longer;
- requires regulators to review utility company staffing levels and implement a viable communications plan between the utility company and its customers;
- reviews each utility company's plan for tree trimming and tree removal; and

• establishes standards for how utility companies communicate and organize communications with local and state officials for a coordinated emergency/storm response.

Changes to the Coastal Management Act, Public Act 12-101, were also enacted in response to Tropical Storm Irene's damage to so many shoreline properties. This new legislation

- assists in defining reconstruction solutions after storm damage to protect inhabited structures; and
- permits the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) to work with communities to prevent shoreline erosion.

This new law offers responsible environmental stewardship while maintaining the property rights of shoreline residents.

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



Assessor's Office

Assessment Date of Taxable Property in the Town of Old Lyme is October 1st. The Town of Old Lyme has complied with the provisions of Section 12-41 of Connecticut General Statutes. It is no longer necessary for persons liable for taxes of Real Estate and Automobiles registered with Connecticut Motor Vehicles Department to file Tax Lists with the Assessor annually as covered under Section 12-42 of the General Statutes.

Owners of tangible Personal Property, other than registered automobiles, such as commercial furniture, machinery and equipment, leased equipment, unregistered automobiles, camp trailers, etc., must file personal property list with the Assessor annually during the month of October. Failure to file prior to November 1, 2012 forces the Assessor, by law, to file the list and add a 25% Penalty (Sec. 12-42, PA 87-245).

Totally Disabled Persons, if they meet the requirements of Section 12-81(55) of the General Statutes, are eligible for the \$1,000. Exemption upon submission of proof of such a disability between October 1, 2012 and January 31, 2013.

Any individual who is Blind is entitled to an exemption under Section 12-81(17) shall provide proof to the Assessor and must file between October 1, 2012 and January 31, 2013.

Ex-Servicemen claiming statutory exemption, because of physical disability, in addition to regular exemption must submit exemption certificate from the Veterans Administration annually to prove claim. Veterans must have filed this discharge (DD214) in the Town Clerk's office by September 30, 2012 in order to receive exemption. Section 12-81(g) provides for an increase in the property tax exemption amount granted to a qualified veteran if certain income requirements could be met.

Persons on active duty must present to the Assessor (Sec. 514) of the Soldiers and Sailors Act or a letter from their Commanding Officer stating date of entry and they are on active duty. Any service person on active claiming Connecticut as their legal residence is entitled to one car exemption if the car is garaged out of State.

An application for property owners claiming land as farm, forest or open space should file an application before October 31. The only exception is during a revaluation year, when the deadline is extended to December 30th. No other extension of the filing period is available, and failure to file within the prescribed time period is a waiver of the right to the classification for the assessment year commencing October 1st.

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Election Day

Election Day is Tuesday, November 6. Voting takes place at the Cross Lane Firehouse from 6 am to 8 pm.

This is a Presidential Election year. In addition to President and Vice-President, voters in Old Lyme will elect a representative to the US Congress, a State Representative and State Senator. Local Registrars of Voters will also be on the ballot.

You can check your voter registration status and register with either the Registrars or the Town Clerk. Please make note of these important dates: **Oct. 5:** Absentee ballots available at the Town Clerk's office **Oct. 20:** Special voter registration session 10 am to 2 pm

Oct. 23: Cut-off date for mail-in registration forms: includes hand delivered mail-in and mailed mail-in voter registration forms.

Oct 30: Last day to register in person; registrars will be available from 9 am to 8 pm.


Nov 5: Last day to register in person for people who have moved, attained age of 18 years, or have become a citizen after Oct 30. Limited registration session from 9am to 5 pm.



Fire Safety Tips for Fall

When the weather turns cold most people spend more time inside their homes using fireplaces, furnaces and heaters to keep warm.

- Make sure your home heating system is in good working order before the cold weather sets in.
- Have chimneys cleaned and furnaces inspected.
- Use a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying out of the fireplace.
- Allow at least three feet of empty area around space heaters.
- Never leave a burning fire unattended.
- Make sure a fire in a fireplace is completely out before going to bed.
- Never leave candles burning if you go out or go to sleep.
- Never use your stove or oven to heat your home.

Back to School Fall Safety Tips

As children return to school in the fall, they are excited and may not be paying as much attention to their surroundings as they should. Keep them safe with these fall safety tips.

- If your child's school bus is equipped with seat belts make sure your child uses them.
- If your child walks to school or waits at a bus stop, wearing clothes that are brightly colored makes them more visible to drivers.



- Children who ride bicycles to school should always wear a helmet.
- Have your child use a rolling backpack if possible.
- A loaded backpack should not weigh more than ten to twenty percent of the weight of the child.

Safety Tips for Fall Driving

With the fall season comes shorter days making it more difficult to see children playing or people walking and riding bicycles. It is also harder to see motorcycles and other cars.

- Children love to play in piles of leaves. Use extra caution where leaves are piled at curbside.
- Always drive carefully making sure to be aware of poor visibility during certain weather conditions and times of the day.
- Keep a safe distance from the car in front of you. Wet roads make it more difficult to stop.
- Use your dimmed headlights in bad weather with decreased visibility.

Safety Tips for Fall Boaters

Although there are many more boating accidents in the summer season, boaters involved in accidents during the fall months have a higher risk of the accident being fatal. The following are a few tips to make the fall boating season as safe as possible.

- Since fall weather can change quickly be prepared for possible cold and wet weather even if the sun is shining. Small open boats combined with cold wet weather can lead to possible hypothermia.
- Make sure you tell a friend or family member your boating plan and your expected return time. There are fewer boaters in the fall to help in the case of an accident or emergency.
- Always wear your life jacket. If you should accidentally fall overboard, the cold water will quickly drain away your strength.

Fall Season Safety Tips for Home Maintenance

Fall is the time for yard clean-ups and readying your house for the cold winter ahead.

- Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors when you turn back your clocks. Make sure to check the alarms with the new batteries installed.
- Use extra caution when climbing ladders for fall jobs such as cleaning gutters or hanging holiday decorations. Shoes or boots may be wet causing you to slip as you climb the ladder.
- Keep your driveway and walkway clear of falling leaves. They get very slippery when they are wet.
- Check and replace any home fire extinguishes that have expired.
- Always wear work gloves when doing outside yard work.

As the fall season approaches us, remember to stay safe out there.

The Art of First Lady Ellen Axson Wilson: American Impressionist (October 5, 2012–January 27, 2013) illuminates the artistic career of Ellen Axson Wilson, wife of President Woodrow Wilson. Beginning in 1905, Ellen brought her family to Old Lyme so that she could study with artist Frank Vincent DuMond. The Wilsons and their three daughters befriended Florence Griswold and stayed at her boardinghouse. They became full-fledged members of the colony until Ellen's death in 1914.

From October 5 through November 5, 2012, the grounds and gardens of the Florence Griswold Museum in Old Lyme become a site for creativity and wonder. *Wee Faerie Village: In the Land of Picture Making* is sure to delight all ages. Over 30 artists transform the Museum's eleven acres into a magical land featuring faerie dwellings that represent subject matter found in landscape paintings, including trees, flowers, sunlight, and wind. 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Local M.D. Named Full-Time Hospice Medical Director

When people think of hospice care, they often focus on death and dying. But according to Middlesex Hospital's new, full-time Hospice Medical Director (and Haddam resident) Bill Zeidler, M.D., the essence of hospice care isn't about dying.

"One of the big misconceptions out there is that a lot of people think that hospice is just about dying. It's truly not. It's truly about trying to live to the best of one's ability until the moment you die," said Dr. Zeidler.

And Dr. Zeidler should know. He has been certified in the specialty of hospice and palliative care since 1997. He is also a founding member of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Care Physicians.

Modern-day hospice care in the United States only started back in the mid- to late-1970s, explains Dr. Zeidler. He adds, "It's seen amazing growth since then. This means that a lot of people are coming to understand the worth of hospice and palliative care."

A recent *Wall Street Journal* article stated that, according to the National Hospice and Palliative Care Organization, an estimated 1.58 million patients received hospice care from more than 5,000 programs nationwide in 2010, more than double the number of patients served a decade earlier. More than 40 percent of all deaths in the United States that year were under the care of hospice, which provides medical care, pain management and emotional and spiritual support to patients with terminal illnesses.

The Middlesex Hospice and Palliative Care program began as an inpatient unit at the Hospital back in the mid-1980s. At that time, Dr. Zeidler became its first, part-time medical director. The original, six-bed inpatient unit has now expanded to a 12-bed hospice and palliative care unit and the program also provides hospice care in the home setting throughout Middlesex County and beyond.

Dr. Zeidler has a long history with Middlesex Hospital. He became a Family Practice Resident in 1975. In 1978, upon graduating from the program, he set up a private family



medicine practice in Higganum. In 1997, he became a member of the Middlesex Hospital Primary Care network with offices on Saybrook Road in Middletown. Dr. Zeidler left his primary care practice this year to become the Hospital's first, full-time Hospice Medical Director. As such, Dr. Zeidler will be caring for virtually all the Hospice patients on the inpatient unit, and some in the home and in area nursing homes as well.

But, according to Dr. Zeidler, "My function is part of a large, interdisciplinary care team that includes inpatient and homecare nurses, social workers, physical therapists and occupational therapists. We use the expertise of pharmacists, who are well trained in pain med-

ications. We have wonderful volunteers who serve a whole host of functions, from playing music on the unit to creating legacy stories about patients' lives for their families to cherish. There are clergy members who are also a key part of what we do; along with the many home health aides and patient care technicians who are also part of the caregiver team."

Dr. Zeidler admits that managing a patient's pain is an important aspect of hospice care. But he adds that the ultimate goal is to control the pain, while still keeping the patient as alert and oriented. This not only benefits the patient, but the family as well.

"When we get the patient's pain under control, the patient often relaxes, which means the family can relax as well," Dr. Zeidler added.

Dr. Zeidler is looking forward to his new, expanded role in the Hospice and Palliative Care program, and for good reason.

"It's a wonderful program and it is truly amazing how much patients and families benefit from it. The message is that we're just trying to make things a little bit better for patients, and significantly better for the family. And the more support you give the patient, family and other loved ones, the better everyone does. Often, we are actually able to bring some joy into their lives during a very difficult situation."



Additional automated trash and recycling containers can be ordered through Michele Hayes-Finn (860-434-1605, ext. 212) in the Selectman's Office at the Memorial Town Hall on Lyme Street. Containers cost \$80 each.

Curbside recycling is performed every other week by Shoreline Sanitation (860-434-0052). Single Stream Curbside recycling pick-up is provided for clean bottles, cans, #1 - 7 plastics and paper products co-mingled in the new green recycling carts. Corrugated cardboard boxes need to be



flattened for recycling. A complete list of acceptable single stream recyclables is available on the Town's website (www.oldlyme-ct.gov), trash and recycling link on both the Selectman's and Public Works pages, as well as on Shoreline Sanitation's website (www.shorelinesanitation.com) and in the Selectman's Office at Memorial Town Hall on Lyme Street, or at the Landfill/Transfer Station. For other holidays, recycling pickup moves up a day until Friday, which remains on schedule.

Bulky Waste and Demolition: Vehicles will be charged by weight at a 110/ton rate. Recyclables should not be mixed in the same load with Bulky Waste or Demolition debris. Loads of less than 100 lbs will be charged a minimum fee of \$5. Brush will be charged on a per load basis. Grass clippings are not accepted. Please phone either the Transfer Station or Michele Hayes-Finn (860-434-1605, ext. 212) with additional questions.

Electronic Recycling is now available at the Old Lyme Transfer Station. Covered and non-covered electronic devices (CEDs) including computers (personal computers, mainframes, mid-range computers, laptops); networking equipment (hubs, switches, control cards, etc.); computer monitors, televisions, printers; keyboards; mice; adaptors; stereos; speakers; VCRs; scanners, fax machines; copiers; telephones and telephone systems; computer wire and cable; computer drives and storage devices (floppy drives, scrap aluminum; (machine and machine parts, cable extrusions, etc); fluorescent light bulbs; UPS (uninterrupted power supply) batteries; and related computer and electronic equipment.

Great Wines for Grilling

Although summers' end is approaching there is still plenty of time for grilling out. I would like to explore a few less widely known red wines to pair with your grilled fare. Both of these wines come from Italy, however they are very different. The first of the two is Barbera. This wine has medium fruit and a light, dry, acidic finish. Barbera is one of the top 5 most widely grown red grapes in Italy. Some of the most popular are Barbera D'Alba and Barbera D'Asti. The latter part of the name represents the town in with the grapes are grown within the Piedmont region. There are representations of this wine in California which tend to have soft fruit and a little bit of spice.

The other wine that is overlooked is Valpolicella. Sometimes thought to be a light, inexpensive Italian wine, it can actually be quite full and delicious. It comes from the Veneto region and is made mostly of Corvina grapes and occasionally blended with a small amount of other varietals such as Molinara and Rondinella. Valpolicella gives way to flavors of black cherry and dark red fruits with a soft, slightly dry finish. Even more interesting is enjoying this wine when it has been produced in the "Ripasso" method. This term means "re-passed," which consists of re-fermenting the wine over un-pressed, dried skins of Amarone grapes. Many people call this style of Valpolicella a "Baby Amarone." This process develops the wine into a richer, fuller bodied wine with a raisin like characteristic that is slightly higher in alcohol.

It is easy to go to the local wine shop and pick up a Cabernet or Merlot, but sometimes it is fun to change it up and try something new. The nest time you are grilling out with family and friends tantalize your palate with these exciting wines. They are sure to not only impress your guests, but keep them coming back for more!



We humans are social creatures. This means we have the natural desire to interact and be with other people during every stage of our lives – including our senior years. One time of day when socialization is most important is meal time – which most people share with others at least once a day. Additionally, seniors should try to accept invitations to join others at mealtime as often as possible.

Competitive sports are becoming more conducive to active seniors, with the growing popularity of organizations such as the Olympic-style "Connecticut Senior Games" for those over age 50. These events include badminton, table tennis, racquetball, golf, basketball, track and field, tennis, volleyball, bowling, cycling, shooting, softball, and swimming – and athletes up to age 89 take part. 
