

First Selectman's Corner

Summertime in Westbrook

The summer months are a time of increased activity when our community justifies its title "The Jewel of the Shoreline." Our population expands from approximately 6,800 residents during the year to at least 11,000 beginning Memorial Day weekend.

There is something for everyone and I direct your attention to the following events including the responsibilities that we all have to fully engage and enjoy our community:

- Our beaches are increasingly popular to residents of the shoreline. Beach passes are required and free to Westbrook residents. All you need is a valid driver's license or a piece of mail with a Westbrook address or a tax bill to be presented to the attendant. Out of town individuals must come to the Selectman's Office to purchase a beach pass (\$20 per vehicle, daily pass only). Beginning Memorial Day weekend, passes are necessary on the weekends only. Passes will be required daily beginning June 24th.
- There has been considerable discussion regarding pets, especially dogs, on our public beaches. Certain restrictions will apply. There will be a public hearing

before the restrictions are finalized which may not be until the end of May.

• We have an outstanding Park & Recreational program and there are many opportunities for Westbrook families to participate. I encourage you to sign up early by coming to the Town Hall.

- The Chamber of Commerce has developed a listing of all of our historical sites; marinas; Bed and Breakfast establishments; shopping malls, etc. The summer months are an ideal time, even though they are open year round, to take advantage of these resources. One Westbrook resident recently told me "Westbrook has become a destination."
- With the increased population and visitors, there is an additional strain on traffic and safety. Our Constables and State Police monitor traffic but it requires the due diligence of all of us to obey the speed limits.
- The following restrictions apply to ATVs and golf carts
 - o Golf Carts are not allowed on public roads
 - o ATVs are not allowed on public roads.
 - o ATVs are not allowed in wooded areas without permission from the land owner

Finally, I encourage any interested individuals to come to our municipal Town Center at least once. We have excellent employees and I know that they look forward to meeting you and listening to any of your ideas and concerns. Have a great Summer!

Working to Prevent Tax Hikes

My focus at the State Capitol continues to be on policies which help ease the financial burdens businesses and families face.

Example #1: I recently threw my support in favor of a bill which would cancel a gas tax hike slated to take effect in July. If the tax hike is allowed to go into effect, we would see prices at the pump rise by several cents per gallon. The people and businesses of Connecticut need a break. Our gas taxes already rank among the highest in the nation. In passing this bill, we can provide relief to hard-pressed consumers and ease some future pain at the pumps.

Example #2: My district is made up of thousands of heating oil users. When I go talk with seniors, low-income working families, and those who are on fixed incomes, one of their main concerns is their heating bills. Area residents rely on home heating oil to stay safe and warm. That's why I have come out strongly against a proposal which would tax all heating oil, propane and fuel sold for the purpose of residential heating or domestic hot water. Taxing this necessity makes no sense and would hurt needy families, the disabled and the elderly. I will fight against this tax on behalf of consumers in Westbrook and throughout the state.

Town Notes

Town Begins Work on Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan

The Westbrook Planning Commission is working with the Lower Connecticut River Valley Council of Governments (RiverCOG) to adopt a Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan (NHMP). The Regional Planning Agency sought and received a FEMA grant to assist the Town in preparing the Plan. Adoption of an NHMP was recommended in the 2011 Plan of Conservation and Development.

The purpose of the Plan is to develop proactive mitigation policies and actions to help reduce risk and create a safer, more disaster resistant community. The hazards that could potentially impact the Town of Westbrook to varying degrees include flooding, wind and tornado, drought and wildfire,

Town Hall Closed

May 27th - Memorial Day July 4, 5 - Fourth of July Holiday winter storm, earthquake, hurricane, sea level rise, and tsunami. The Plan will include an assessment of the vulnerability of critical resources and identify mitigation opportunities specific to the various natural hazards.

Adoption of the Plan will make the community eligible for various grant programs that could assist with implementing recommendations in the Plan. Other benefits include increasing public awareness of threats and hazards, communicating priorities to State and Federal officials and helping the Town to focus resources on the greatest risks and vulnerabilities.

A key component of the Plan is development of a process to keep the Plan current. Progress on implementing the Plan must be monitored on an annual basis and the Plan must be updated every five (5) years.

A Technical Advisory Committee, consisting primarily of Public Safety and Land Use Officials, has been appointed to assist the Planning Commission with reviewing the Plan. Workshops and public meetings will be scheduled over the summer months as work progresses on the Plan. Once the Final Draft of the Plan has been completed and approved by FEMA, it will be forwarded to the Board of Selectmen for adoption.

On March 21, about 35 people attended a presentation entitled "Management of Westbrook's Barrier Islands for Shore Bird Habitat and Recreational Resources". Presenters were Rick Potvin, Refuge Manager of Stewart B. McKinney National Wildlife Refuge, Corrie Folsom-O'Keefe, Important Bird Area Coordinator, Audubon Connecticut, and Tom ODell, Chairman of the Westbrook Conservation Commission.

The presentation discussed the fact that Salt Island is Town owned, Menunketsesuck Island is owned by the US Fish and Wildlife Service, and Duck Island is owned by the Connecticut DEEP, all with different rules for use by humans, and all with different rule enforcing agencies. Twelve people volunteered to be on a steering committee to form a "Friends of Westbrook Barrier Islands" group, and to determine how the group can help management of the Islands as well as steer the three separate owning entities to management of all three Islands as a unit, with equal emphasis on wildlife and humans.



that the site has been updated with new aerials from a state flight in April 2012. The Town of Westbrook participated in an Aerial Buy-Up Program with the Towns of Essex, Old Saybrook and Old Lyme to get higher resolution photos than what the State provided. The quality of the photos is evident when compared with the 2008 aerials which can still be viewed. The new aerials were used to update the Town's building layer.

One of the most popular pieces of information on the mapping system is the New FEMA Flood Zones. The higher quality aerials and updated building layer will better enable property owners to determine if their structure is in a Flood Zone. The higher quality aerials were also helpful in assessing damage from recent storms and provided critical backup for receiving disaster funds.





Free Notary Public Services

This is another service the Town Clerk's office is happy to provide. As a courtesy, the Town Clerk's Office provides the free services of a Notary Public to the residents of Westbrook. Non-residents are charged a fee of \$5.00.

If you are in need of Notary services, please be aware that the person whose signature is being notarized, must sign the document in person in the presence of the Notary. Two forms of identification with a signature are required.

It has been recommended by the Office of the Secretary of the State that Notaries in the Westbrook Town Clerk's office do not notarize wills or living wills or any document that will be recorded in the Town of Westbrook Land Records.

Please call our office if you need additional information regarding Notaries.

Notary Public Commissions

Notary Public Commissions are issued by the Secretary of the State's Office. Notaries must record their commission, and renewal, in the Town Clerk's Office in the town where they reside. Additionally, they may also record their appointment in the town where they do business.

There is a \$10.00 fee for the recording of a Notary appointment/renewal.

Fishing Licenses and Angler's Guides

2013 Angler's Guides are available in the Town Clerk's office. Please pick up a copy when you purchase your Fishing License.

The costs of Fishing Licenses for Connecticut residents are: Inland Fishing \$28.00, Marine Fishing \$10.00, All Waters \$32. Those Connecticut residents age 65+ receive Fishing Licenses at no charge.

Dog Licenses Renew in June

Reminder notices will be sent out during the month of May to all registered dog owners of Westbrook. Dog license renewal period is during the month of June.

All dogs, six months and older are required to be registered with the Town Clerk's Office proving that they have updated rabies vaccinations.

There are rabies clinics throughout the spring which will accommodate dogs as well as cats. Contact your local veterinarian for rabies clinic information.

Registrars of Voters

The Annual Canvass was conducted by the Registrars. Not all registered voters received a "Confirmation of Voting Residence" letter. Residents who showed some change in their mailing or residence address as reported by the Post Office and those electors who did not vote in the November 6, 2012 election received a notice. If you received a "Confirmation of Voting Residence" form and did not respond by the date indicated on the form, your name will be put on the "Inactive List". Be sure to let the Registrars know whenever you have made a change to your mailing/ residence address, have made a name change or would like to change your party affiliation. Please call our office (860-399-3042), send a note, or stop by the office on Tuesdays from 11:00 am -1:00 pm or Thursdays from 5:00 pm – 7:00 pm. Please call if you would like to make an appointment. Please note that Registration Application Forms are available in the Registrars' and Town Clerk's Office and on a table outside the Registrar's Office. The Budget Referendum will be approaching soon. Registered voters and Property owners who are 18 years of age or older who are liable to the Town of Westbrook for taxes assessed against him/her of not less than \$1,000 on the last completed grand list of the town are eligible to vote. No trusts, no corporations, no LLC's, no partnerships and no trustees are eligible to vote.

2013 Parking Beach Pass Policy

Residents: FREE. No parking pass needed at the gate. You must show a valid driver's license, mail, or tax bill.

Non-resident: \$20 per vehicle/daily pass only sold at the gate.

You must come to the twon hall to purchase passes for the following:

Temporary resident - \$10 visitors of Westbrook residents MOTELS - \$20 owner must purchase/limited to number of rooms COTTAGE RENTALS - \$20 rental agreement required, vehicle registered to renter only

BOATERS - \$30 seasonal slip agreement required/vehicle registration to slip renters only **BUSINESS -** \$10 owner must purchase/town reserves the right to limit the number of passes

TIMESHARE OWNERS -\$10 temp. pass for the week. Show proof of ownership.

From the Zoning Office

Zoning Violations. The Zoning Department of the Land Use Office is charged with enforcing the Zoning Regulations. The Zoning Regulations can be found on the town's website: http://westbrookct.us/land-use.php#zoning, or a paper copy is available in the Land Use Office to read or purchase. The staff consists of a Zoning Enforcement Officer (ZEO) and administrative support staff.

Zoning Enforcement does not address anything not in the Regulations such as: high grass, weeds, garbage, litter, residential lighting, on-street parking, animal waste, pet licensing.

Filing a complaint. To report a complaint, it can be done by phone, fax, email, postal mail or in person. After a complaint is received by the ZEO, the complaint is logged and assigned a number in the Land Use Tracking system. A complaint form can be obtained from the Land Use Office or on the town's website: http://westbrookct.us/land-use.php#zoning.

An inspection is conducted, and if it is determined that a violation exists, the property owner is contacted about the violation and advised as to what action must be taken to correct the problem. A timeline is provided to achieve compliance. An extension of time may be granted to the property owner(s) if an effort exists on the property owner's behalf to resolve the violation in a reasonable timeframe.

After the compliance date, the ZEO re-inspects the property. If the violation continues, the ZEO may issue a Citation or refer the matter to Legal Counsel for further action. Zoning would prefer to work with property owners to resolve a violation before moving on to a court proceeding.

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Brownies Help Clean WLCT Properties



Each year the Westbrook Land Conservation Trust (WLCT) conducts two clean-ups; one in the spring to clean its properties in the northern end of town and another in the fall to clean its southern properties. During the clean-ups, litter is removed and the properties are inspected for damaged signs, fallen trees, and other problems. For the past two clean-ups, the WLCT has been joined by Brownies from Westbrook's troop #62822. This troop is led by Sarah Litevich (a WLCT board member) and consists of 16 1st and 2nd graders. The brownies met the WLCT members at the town hall, where they were assigned properties and given large, empty feed bags, provided by board members who have horses, to serve as their trash bags. Then the brownies travel from property to property filling their bags with litter. Along the way, they see first-hand the consequences of littering, learn to identify different plants (ie stay away from poison ivy), and help their community, all while enjoying the fresh air. When asked her experience picking up trash, 6 year-old Brownie, Norah Hayden, said, "It's good for the world and the birds." True that Norah.

Renters' Rebate Program

The Town of Westbrook has begun accepting applications for the State of Connecticut's Renter's Tax Relief (Renters' Rebate) Program. The Renters' Rebate Program runs from April 1, 2013 to October 1, 2013. Due to the high volume of applications for this program, residents interested in applying must do so by appointment only. Walk-ins cannot be accommodated.

The state program provides a one-time yearly reimbursement for Connecticut renters based on income, rent and utilities that were paid from the previous year (2012). The program is available to residents age 65 or older as of December 31, 2012, or residents at least age 18 by December 31, 2012 who have been found by a government agency to be permanently and totally disabled. Income must be no more than \$33,500 for single individuals or \$40,900 for married couples. Persons renting an apartment or room, or living in cooperative housing or a mobile home may be eligible for this program.

A Message from the Open Burning Official

Spring is upon us once again and the urge to burn runs through our minds. The burning of brush is permitted if certain criteria are met. If you have a pile of brush that you would like to burn, contact the "Open Burning Official" and I will meet with you to see if it is safe to burn in your location. 860-399-3040

Bonn fires and campfires are permitted for "ceremonial" purposes only. They should be contained in a stone, concrete block or sunken area away from any dwellings of wooded area. The fire department has been called out to several Bonn fires that were started with an accelerant and caused flames to reach 10′to 15′ into the air. This is a dangerous and illegal method of starting a fire and someone could be injured in the process. Please note that building materials are not allowed in the use of Bonn fires. Some paper and dry kindling should work well if you plan ahead for your fire.

The burning of LEAVES is prohibited, per the Department Energy & Environmental Protection. NO BURNING OF ANY KIND IS ALLOWED DURING HIGH, VERY HIGH or EXTREME BURNING INDEX.

You may call the "Open Burning Official" for advice and to let him know that you will be having a Bonn fire at your location.

Westbrook Water Pollution Control Commission

The Westbrook Water Pollution Control Commission has submitted its Wastewater Engineering Plan to the CT Department of Energy and Environmental Protection. This is the next step required by the DEEP to address groundwater pollution concerns in several coastal study areas.

Several earlier studies were done to evaluate areas with small lots, high population density, poor soils and aging septic systems. No suitable area was identified for a large community system and no discharge point exists for a large sewer system.

The Plan proposes maintenance of on-site septic systems as the primary wastewater treatment in Westbrook. Our current Ordinance requires stringent construction oversight and pump-outs every five years. The Plan requires further investigation of systems in study areas, and possible upgrades if systems do not meet remediation standards. Following DEEP review, the Plan will be presented to residents at a public meeting.

We anticipate that Westbrook's program will be similar to that of Old Saybrook, but on a smaller scale. The WPCC first plans to hire a full-time staff member as Program Manager to oversee a project that is expected to extend ten to twelve years, and involve site investigation, grant administration, database development and construction oversight. This position is in next year's budget.

The WPCC will keep residents informed through Events articles, public meetings and the town website. WPCC meetings are held on the fourth Wednesday of each month at 7:30 in the Town Hall; the public is welcome.

Connecticut's Mental Health Crisis



A 2012 national survey on mental health and substance abuse estimates that 20% of Americans have had the symptoms of a mental illness while 5% of Americans suffer a severe mental illness such as bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, major depressive disorder or post-traumatic stress disorder. However, 70-90% of those who receive appropriate treatment and support experience a reduction in symptoms. Nationally, Connecticut has lagged behind in mental health access and treatment services for decades. This deficit is critically underscored by the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary School.

A recent report from the Connecticut Office of the Healthcare Advocate released its findings and recommendations on mental health services in our state. Among its conclusions:

- Connecticut lacks an overall vision of how to recognize, evaluate and provide services for individuals with mental health and substance abuse needs
- Connecticut's current delivery system for mental health and substance abuse services is fragmented and inconsistent
- Capacity for delivery of services is insufficient for much needed community-based services
- Mental health and substance abuse care largely is not integrated into overall healthcare models
- For the last five years, complaints about access to mental health and substance abuse services have exceeded all other types of clinical complaints

Connecticut must adopt aggressive measures to increase mental health access, attract qualified practitioners, and offer a range of services that includes more community options so that children and adults can access appropriate services in the least restrictive environment.

The monies will be used to provide scholarship support for Westbrook participants.

Celebrating almost 40 years in existence, the renowned center, which has been at its current location, in Old Lyme since 1990, serves over 250 riders weekly, with a mission to, "...improve the lives of people with cognitive, physical, and emotional disabilities through the benefits of therapeutic horseback riding and other equine-assisted activities, while serving the therapeutic riding profession through training and education."

In 2012, the therapeutic riding center worked with 1,546 people and provided 7,891 equine assisted activities and therapy sessions with the help of a herd of 25, very patient, specially chosen horses of varying ages and breeds, as well as an army of hard working volunteers.

"Scholarship support, from organizations such as the Westbrook Foundation is vital to our ability to continue to provide a safe, quality experience to individuals with special needs," says Stalsburg. "The horse provides a wonderful means to promote things like eye contact, encourage speech and language skills and improved self confidence and self esteem."

In addition, it is reported that physically, the horse's movement closely resembles the normal gait of a human and can be used to produce physical changes in the rider, including normalization of muscle tone, postural and balance improvements and increased strength. Through the development of an individual riding plan (IRP) specific to each rider's needs, the staff at High Hopes works diligently to develop individualized goals and objectives during weekly classes. The 120 acre facility also offers a variety of integrated summer camp programs for riders age three through 14.

"Westbrook folks have a long and proud history with this terrific organization. We on the Foundation are grateful to all who have contributed to the tremendous legacy High Hopes has created over the last generation. We wish them continued

Register Your Cell Phone for Emergency Notifications

The Town of Westbrook wants you to be safe and informed during life threatening emergencies. Westbrook has access to the statewide emergency notification system known as CT Alert ENS (Emergency Notification System).

In the event of an emergency, Westbrook Emergency Officials can alert residents and recommend the protective actions needed. The CT Alert ENS will automatically send recorded messages to all contact devices (listed and unlisted land-line phones, cell phones, texts and emails) within the identified area.

It's important to be aware that CT Alert ENS uses the State's 911 database, which means it can only access your home or business location. We recommend you add your cell phone, text and email to the system. You must register those devices in order to receive alerts. The Town of Westbrook is not authorized to sign up individuals. The CT Alert ENS system is confidential and for extreme emergencies only. You will never receive messages from telemarketers, voting or other local/state civic events.



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
